Jimmy Wheeler Shows the World That Permit Fishing Here is HOT!

When you mention fishing out of Everglades City or Chokoloskee, the fish that immediately come to mind are snook and redfish. However, if you venture offshore into the beautiful green-blue water, there is an entirely different fishing experience that awaits.

I spoke with Jimmy Wheeler and his wife Michelle, owners of the Everglades Fishing Company (EFC), regarding their newest business ventures including their new store in Everglades City, and their growing tour guide and kayak rental business.

A fifth generation 'Glades man, Captain Jimmy Wheeler has been fishing the inshore and offshore waters of this area his entire life.

Recently, Jimmy has been featured on a few fishing shows for using a unique drone technique to catch the easily spooked (and delicious) permit.

Drones cannot be used inside of Everglades

National Park, but many of Jimmy's favorite spots are not within park limits, where this creative technique has been put to the test.

On a recent TV appearance with Captain Ray Van Horn (of Chokoloskee), they fished together using the drone, and the results were spectacular. The drone operator navigates drone until the school is located, and then eases the bait into the water. When hit, the line releases much like an outrigger...and the fight begins.

The Permit bite is best in the Summer but they hang out on the wrecks all year long. It is here that Wheeler employs this, and other techniques he has mastered over the years, to catch these beautiful fish.

In addition to permit, they catch many others including cobia and tripletail, and all three are considered high quality food fish.

Jimmy first learned about the drone technique from a friend who mentioned it to him. Intrigued, he researched the drone that was used, got his hands on one and set out to try it for himself.

Since that time, he has been featured on a show with Van Horn, and he also fished with Roland Martin using the drone technique. The show with Martin air later this year. His show with Van Horn recently aired and will be available on YouTube soon.

When I asked about the permit, Jimmy said that "it is an untapped fishery out there." The fish are plentiful and they are **big**. When I asked him why we aren't known more for the great permit fishing, he said that that area is so renowned for snook, tarpon and redfish, people just assume that is what you catch here...but he added that more and more of his clients want the permit experience too, and he is happy to oblige.

The Everglades Fishing Company Store is located at 203 Collier Avenue in Everglades City. When the store's renovations are complete, the shop will feature EFC boots, gear and apparel. They will have healthy foods (sandwiches, snacks, smoothies, and more), and almost anything else you would need for a successful day trip. Over recent weeks the District has received a number of financial awards that will enhance operational

capabilities without significantly impacting the budget.

In September, the District received funding through the Local Mitigation Strategy in the amount of \$75,000 for the purpose of acquiring a new generator for the Fire Station 21 public safety complex in Naples Manor.

FEMA requires local governments to develop and adopt such hazard mitigation plans as a condition for receiving certain types of non-emergency disaster assistance, including funding for mitigation projects. Jurisdictions must update their hazard mitigation plans and re-submit them for FEMA approval every five years to maintain eligibility.

On October 8th the District formally accepted a FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant in the amount of \$554,772 for the acquisition of new Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus for the front-line fire apparatus. The primary goal of the Assistance to Firefighters Grant is to meet the firefighting and emergency response needs of fire departments and non-affiliated emergency medical service organizations. Since 2001, AFG has helped firefighters and other first responders to obtain critically needed equipment, protective gear, emergency vehicles, training and other resources needed to protect the public and emergency personnel from fire and related hazards.

In early October, the District was notified by the Florida Department of Health that it has been awarded emergency opioid antagonists through the Helping Emergency Responders Obtain Support (HEROS) Program. The purpose of this program is to reduce the number of drug/opioid overdoserelated deaths and adverse events by providing emergency responders with the appropriate pharmaceutical resources to address this crisis.

The District has also been awarded \$5,000 from the Preferred Government Trust Insurance (PGIT) program. This is a reimbursement program with matching training/safety incentives that can be applied for by any current member of PGIT. The District applied for the program to support its Ballistics program, providing for personal safety equipment for firefighters responding to incidents of potential mass violence. In total, the District has invested more than \$50,000 for the program over the last year.

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SAWFISH NEWS by Tonya Wiley, Havenworth Coastal Conservation To See a Sawfish in Public Aquariums: Making Conservation Connections by guest authors Paula Carlson, Stacia White, and Alan Henningsen Visit: www.Havenworth.org



Since the early 1930's when the Shedd Aquarium in Chicago displayed a smalltooth sawfish for the first time, public aquariums have created connections between people and these very unique rays. Over the years millions of visitors to zoos and aquariums around the world have enjoyed that experience, and for many it is the only opportunity they will ever have to see a living sawfish. Because of the decline of sawfish populations worldwide public aquariums are in a unique position to build on these connections and help to create conservation solutions. Sawfish conservation requires a multi-faceted approach to be successful, and the public aquarium community shares common concerns with researchers,

field biologists, and conservation and management agencies in terms of the need for continued and increased collaboration between stakeholders at all levels.

Many of the public aquariums in the United States are members of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA), which is a non-profit organization dedicated to the advancement of accredited zoos and aquariums in the areas of animal care, husbandry, conservation, education, science, and recreation. With more than 183 million visitors to accredited institutions each year, AZA's focus on connecting people and animals provides a critical link to helping animals in their native habitats. For many years, members of the AZA Marine Fishes Taxon Advisory Group have worked with governmental and nongovernmental conservation agencies to find solutions to protect sawfish in their natural environment. In addition to their role in education, research, and conservation, AZA member zoos and aquariums also play an important role in the preservation of species through population management programs and AZA Species Survival Plans® (SSP). The mission of an SSP is to cooperatively manage specific, and typically threatened or endangered, species populations within AZA-accredited zoos and aquariums, certified related facilities, and approved non- member participants.

Smalltooth sawfish (Pristis pectinata), largetooth sawfish (Pristis pristis), and green sawfish (Pristis zijsron) are the three species most commonly displayed in aquarium

In the United States you can view sawfish with amazement at Dallas World Aquarium, Ripley's Aquarium Myrtle Beach, Ripley's Aquarium of the Smokies, National Aquarium, Shark Reef at Mandalay Bay, Shedd Aquarium, Georgia Aquarium, SeaLife Minnesota, Sea World Orlando, Landry's Downtown Aquarium Denver, and Landry's Downtown Aquarium Houston. 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The First Recorded Python in Everglades National Park, 40 Years Later

one anniversary we'd rather not the first recorded python was caught in the park near Everglades Safari Park on Tamiami Trail.

Although the actual species is not listed on the record, researchers presume that

this report was of a Burmese python, the invasive snake that has been linked to the severe decline of mammals in the park. And many also think that this was not the first Burmese python in the park.

over 100 years in Florida, but this 1979 date is the first recorded it's another tool to manage their spread and control their removal from the Everglades," said Bryan Falk, supervisory invasive species biologist for Everglades National Park. "Historical reports like this help us piece together the past and paint a picture of how and when these pythons became established in the park."

Forty years after that first report, we still have a lot to learn about pythons in the Everglades and how to control their spread. That's not due to lack of effort.

Tools in the toolbox for python control

Park and partner scientists have tested many methods to slow the spread of these invasive snakes. Everything from visual surveys, to training dogs to locate the snakes, to trapping, to pheromones, and more, have been tried.

Each tool is successful to some extent, but there isn't yet one method that can remove all Burmese pythons from the Everglades. So, it's best to use multiple tools at the same time.

the Everglades in the last few years, but almost all these removals occur only on roads because the pythons are so cryptic that they can't be seen otherwise.

Trained dogs can sniff out an area where a python may be hiding, but pinpointing exactly where the snake is located is still difficult.

Trapping is possible, but food-baited traps aren't extremely pythons, that wait for their food to come to them.

Removing large, reproductive females may help slow Burmese python population growth, and that's the focus of what's been nicknamed a "Judas snake" approach.

Large male pythons are caught, implanted with radio transmitters, and released back where they were captured. Because multiple male pythons may find and court female pythons during the mating season, these "Judas snakes" lead researchers to other pythons, including large females, before they have the chance to produce more pythons.

Results are promising, and several large reproductive females Everglades National Park just had a have been recently caught using this method. And scientists are 40th anniversary on October 24. It's trying to make this method work even better.

A major downfall of using Judas snakes is that female pythons celebrate. That's the day in 1979 when aren't receptive to mating for very long, making it less effective. The US. Why are invasive species so hard to get rid of?



The more I learn about invasive species, the more I think of them as a cancer in our environment. Like cancer cells, once they become established, they're hard completely remove.

The quicker you catch them, the easier they are to eradicate.

And often the best way to eradicate them is by using a Expert snake searchers have removed thousands of pythons from combination of methods. You have to throw all the tools in your toolbox at the problem.

Even if you have a successful eradication, you'll always have to do routine checks and maintenance to ensure they are gone.

So like cancer, invasive species are hard to remove, difficult to deal with, and they can really get you down.

But the park is not going to give up in the fight.

"This is a big deal for all of us here in Everglades National successful when food is plentiful or with sit-and-wait predators, like Park," said Pedro Ramos, superintendent of Everglades and Dry Tortugas National Parks. "What concerns me most as a park manager is the invasion of plants and animals that seem to be taking over the landscape, both on land and water."

Ramos knows we don't have a silver bullet for the invasive species problem, but he has some ideas for how to move forward.

"There are two things we can do," Ramos said. "One of them is Biologists use the radio transmitters to regularly find the snake. to continue our efforts. We cannot throw in the towel. The other thing is to invest in research because we all know that's where the answers are going to come from."



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My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock

The state of Florida is about to renew a permit that will allow a private company, Seven Springs Water, to siphon out 1.2 million gallons of water per day from Ginnie Springs, a picturesque site not far from Tallahassee...for a ridiculously low permit fee of \$115. That's right, \$115.

Seven Springs pumps out, and then sells the water to Nestle, the huge, Swiss multi-national that has several brands of bottled water including Pellegrino, Deer Park and Zephyrhills.

Most troubling is that the river's flow is already 30 to 40% below what it used to be according the Florida Springs institute, and the new permit would almost quadruple the amount of water being siphoned out every single day.

The permits, called a "consumptive use" permits are approved by regional water management districts whose boards are appointed by the Governor.

First term Florida Governor, Ron DeSantis, has gone on record as a bit of an environmentalist vowing to escalate the restoration of the Everglades and closely monitor our water quality issues, which have been increasing with each passing day, it seems. I hope he is watching this...

Other states also allow the siphoning of water for free...which is then sold to large corporations like Nestle. Michigan has been under fire by local environmental watchdogs for doing the very same thing.

Reducing flow and lowering the water table causes multiple issues to fall like dominoes-and impacts us all.

What scientists are seeing today at Ginnie Springs is an increase in the nitrites and pollutants that were never present in the spring in past years. The spring is far different today from what it was only 20 years ago.

Additionally troubling is that dangerous sinkhole activity is increasing in Florida. The lowering of groundwater creates large voids beneath the soil. The soil then percolates downward which creates the openings called sinkholes. Viral videos of complete homes being swallowed up in Florida are easy to find on the internet.

Yes. Some sinkholes are naturally forming, but many today are directly related to the lowering of the groundwater table. I found a 1981 report by the SWFL Water Management District that clearly outlines what happens when the water table is lowered.

Sometimes the table is lowered by drought. That, we cannot control. But allowing a company to take our most precious resource for free? Well, that is outrageous, unacceptable, and preventable (Just Say NO).

In a State where water is critical to our fragile and unique ecosystem, and water quality is on the tip of most of our leaders tongues, why would Florida virtually give away our water so that a private company can profit from it, when that activity is also directly related to some of the ongoing, and escalating problems, we are battling every day?

Why, as a State, do we let private companies who profit of off the land, create additional problems the rest of us have to live with, clean up, and pay for? I don't get it. If farming practices are causing pollution and runoff from their farming efforts, they should contain it or pay to clean it up. Period. Why is that even a question?

As the water table is lowering, causing dangerous sinkholes, and exacerbating our well-documented water quality problems, why issue a permit to quadruple the amount already being taken? We need to be smarter! We need rethink these permits and protect our water supply.

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Ingredients:

- 3 Tbsp butter
- 2-3 leeks, white and light green parts only, rinsed and chopped

Use an immersion blender if you have one. Otherwise, transfer soup to a blender or food processor in 4 to 6 batches, and puree. Transfer to another pot as you process. Reheat with salt and pepper to taste.

Serve as is, or garnish with cooked bacon bits, and shredded cheddar. Very hearty and delicious, and it tastes even better on days 2 and 3!



The permit is one of the most soughtafter game fish in Florida. Anglers have been known to fly into the Keys from everywhere on the planet to catch one of these elusive members of the jack family. In the Florida Keys, the permit is stalked in flats boats while feeding over grass flats. It is most often taken with small crabs, but it is also targeted by fly fishermen, and, because of its cautious nature, is considered (along

with bonefish) to be one of the hardest fish to catch on a fly. Because of its similar shape, the immature permit is readily confused with the pompano. The best method of identifying one from the other is to remember that the belly of a pompano is yellow, and the back anal fin region of a permit is a distinct orange.


Locally the permit is almost never found in the back bays and estuaries. The most likely place to find large schools of permit is over the near shore and offshore artificial reefs of Collier and Lee County. In the early spring though the summer permit congregate in large schools over offshore reefs and structure. Few anglers ever attempt to take them on a fly in deeper water, and the baits of choice are two-to three-inch crabs or fresh, live, hand-picked shrimp.

The fish over the reefs tend to be large, averaging 15 to 35 pounds. Fluorocarbon leader, light tackle with good drag systems, and buried hooks are a must. The permit is a sight feeder and has sharp eyesight. Any sign of a hook and it will not bite. Extremely wary, the permit has to be approached slowly, and care must be taken not to spook the school.

Coming upon one of these schools, even if you are not trying to catch a permit, is a true marvel. They often number in the hundreds of fish per school, and their bright, silver sides flashing in the sunlight make for a fantastic sighting.

In the wild the permit feeds on mollusks, crabs, and shrimp. It seldom feeds on small fish but has been known to do so on rare occasions. Once it reaches adult size, which can top 50 pounds, the only fish capable on feeding on permit are large sharks. A tireless fighter and considered good table fare, the permit will always be a top-notch catch in Florida waters.

Editors Note: Permit Regulations outside of Special Permit Zone (North of Cape Florida and Cape Sable): Not less than 11" at the fork, not more than 22" at the fork.

Fishing the 10,000 With Captain Mike Merritt

The fall fishing continues to be red hot! There has been so much bait down the entire coast line and the fish seem to be everywhere. I have fished plenty of places this past month that were just trying new spots and I found fish almost every time. We have been fishing a lot of live bait as they are so plentiful. This will change but for now it is insane!

Catching 50-75 Snook in a day is possible if you want to stay on the schools of smaller fish. I usually will give a spot a try and if we don't find good size fish pretty quick we will move on. The best bite seems to be the incoming but as long as water is moving you will find a bite. The outside islands on the incoming and the river areas on the falling seems to be a good pattern.

Knocker rigs, corks, and free lined baits all produce depending on tides and water depth. How you hook your baits can make a difference also. Nose hook, tail hook, pectorals, back, are all proper but depending on water flow and depth you will find one better than the others. Change things up and you will soon see a pattern.

Reds are still cooperating and we are catching all different sizes. You will find small 18" fish, and the next stop might produce some 34-36" fish. Sometimes they are scattered but keep moving and you will find the school you are looking for. Smaller baits work best for the Reds, but a 36" fish will eat a big bait!

Tripletail are around and we manage to catch keepers even though the minimum size is now 18". I have not fished for Seatrout in over a month but they are still on the flats.

Get out and enjoy the last of the fall fishing. Once we get some cold fronts things can change pretty drastically. Good luck fishing!

FLORIDA PANTHER UPDATE



Vehicle accidents are the number one cause of death for our beloved, and endangered, Florida Panther.

So far in 2019, twenty panthers have been recovered by FWC. Of the 20, sixteen died on the roads after being hit by vehicles.

Nine males and 10 females perished, one was not identifiable.

There is a bit of good news, however. To date in 2019, 5 litters have been documented with 11 new kittens. In all of 2018, FWC documented three litters with nine kittens. The increase in litters and kittens is a positive sign.

Panthers are most active at dawn and dusk when they may wander onto roads or cross them looking for prey.

Dusk and dawn are also the times of day with limited visibility. When driving on rural roads where panthers are known to roam, please use extra caution and watch your speed so that you can avoid any wildlife on the roads.

We have many other critters living among us too. On October 28th a river otter was struck by a car on CR 29 between highway 41 and Everglades City.



Otters are seldom seen, but do occasionally cross the roads. They are not fast moving, and very low to the ground and difficult to see. They too are active in early

mornings so please keep an eye out for them and other animals so you do not accidently hit one while driving.


