

UPDATE ON OUR WATER by Patricia Huff

Recently a tourist commented that the water in their rental unit was yellow and asked if it is this way all over town. Unfortunately, it is; apparently some places worse than others. However, according to state and local officials, the water is still safe to drink.

No.

Our City water comes from wells in Copeland and the well water has to be disinfected with some type of chlorination process. However, when water is treated with chlorine, there are by-products; two of these are Trihalomethanes (TTHM) and Haloacetic Acids (HAA5). In January 2007 the City changed its potable water disinfection process from free residual **chlorination** to a **chloramines** disinfection with the hope that this would lower the TTHM and HAA5 levels. Chlorine also determines the color of the water: when the amount of chlorine is cut back in the system (in order to lower the by-product levels), the more discoloration of the water; hence, the yellow color.

From January through November 2006 the TTHM results reported were above the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL). A year ago at the October 3, 2006, City Council meeting, Scott Lewis of U.S. Water Services Corp., reported that the yellow water was due to rust that got into the system when a filter was bypassed. He also said that the TTHM by-product of chlorine would be reduced by the new treatments. By March 2007 the levels had dropped significantly after the City switched to **chloramines**. However, the quarter ending June 2007 saw the TTHM levels rise again. According to Mark Charneski of the Florida DEP, the ammonium pump failed and the amount of chlorine had to be cut back. This is why we are again seeing the discoloration. The color is a secondary concern; the main issue for our health lies with the reduction of TTHM and HAA5 levels.

In an August 1, 2007, letter from the Florida DEP to the Mayor, the City water system generated a MCL violation for Color. This requires the City to take necessary corrective action and submit a written plan of action to the DEP for approval. The plan would identify the steps to be taken to correct the color violation. Gary Heins, Regional Project Manager with U.S. Water, says that they are awaiting results from this month's analysis and are all working on solutions to the problem.

Mayor Sammy Hamilton told the *Rapper* that the City is continuing to work on the water system to improve its quality. If the current disinfection process does not solve the problem, it may be necessary to either dig the wells deeper or completely clean the storage tank. This would require applying for grants but may be the necessary course of action.

We feel that this should be a top priority given the length of time it has taken to clear the water and reduce the TTHM levels.

SCHOOL ADVISORY COUNCIL REPORT by Patricia Huff

Parents, staff, teachers, and community members attended the first meeting of the School Advisory Council on Tuesday, September 25. School Board member Richard Calabrese was also on hand to respond to any needs the school may have. In the absence of Principal Bobby Jones, the agenda item relating to school uniforms was postponed until the next meeting on October 23. Elections for new officers will also be held at that time. Vice-Chair Patty Huff discussed the Perfect Attendance Program that has been ongoing since 2003 but with very little increase in school attendance. Rather than awarding the students with a field trip, it was recommended that the students be rewarded on a more regular monthly basis, similar to the Great Gators program. Pam Drake agreed to take over the after-school Kids Activity Club on Thursdays. Extra-curricula programs with the park services was discussed; i.e., Big Cypress Swamp 6th grade program, ENP's Junior Ranger Day and Career Day Rookery Bay. Tim England, from Museum of the Everglades, presented programs for students and invited teachers to consider a Summer Art Exhibit with students submitting essays about the history of our area, historical buildings, or people from the past as well as pieces of art. He also mentioned that next April there will be a celebration of the 80th anniversary of the opening of the Tamiami Trail and invited the school to participate.

Mrs. Snider said that Everglades City School had increased to C+ based on last year's FCAT scores. Mr. Calabrese said that 13 schools in the County had dropped down a grade so it was a great achievement to see that our school had increased. He also mentioned that no high school in the County had received an "A".

Fishing Report by Bill Lindsay

As days get a little shorter and the water temperatures drop a little, large schools of bait fish start to migrate south. Many of these schools have birds over them and it can be productive to cast jigs or spoons around them. Mackerel, jacks and even trout can be taken this way. Keep an eye out for schools of "breeder" redfish moving up and down the coast. At this time of year, they may look like a copper patch moving just below the surface. Soon sheepshead and gag grouper will begin to move into shallow water and can be caught on oyster bars and wrecks. Snook should start to head for the backcountry where water levels start to drop as a result of northeast winds and less rain. Top water plugs are the most fun, but on bright sunny days, try going with jigs or deep running plugs. Through September snook and redfishing has been good. Captain Herb Kehoe reports catching some nice snook and tripletail. Captain Ray Culver brought in a 33" snook. If the water stays warm, we should hook plenty of tarpon early and late in the day.

Capt. Bill Lindsay lives in Chokoloskee and has been fishing in the Everglades National Park for 27 years. In 1992 he was Master Angler of the MET Tournament.

SWAMP TALES

1 - ---

Before coming to Florida, I used to think a hammock was a rope bed hung between two trees in which you took a nap during the summer. In the Florida Everglades, a hammock is also a cool, shady ground higher than its surrounding area covered with many hardwood broad-leaved evergreen trees. Some of the trees found in a Florida hammock have quite unusual names, such as gumbo-limbo (*Bursera simaruba*). This unique tree can sprout a new tree from one of its fallen branches and then create a living fence of gumbo-limbo trees.

Gumbo-limbo's have massive trunks two to three feet in diameter which support huge, irregular branches with spreading, rounded crowns. They becomes leafless during the year but bloom in winter, producing small inconspicuous flowers composed of three to five greenish petals arranged in elongate racemes that are spike-like clusters with each flower on its own stem.

The first time I ever saw one of these strange, but beautiful trees was alongside US 1 in Key Largo. They were red, barkless trees with an abundance of shady tree canopies. Some of my Haitian friends have told me the wood is very soft and easily carved and that they make drums from the trunk of gumbo-limbo trees.

The gumbo-limbo is also a very useful tree. Resins obtained from its bark smell like turpentine often used to make varnish, water repellent coatings, glue and incense. Several kinds of birds eat the fruits of the gumbo-limbo. The two largest gumbo-limbos in the United States are at the St. Mary's Star of the Sea Church in Key West and on Captiva Island near Fort Myers.

Down here in Florida, we call the gumbo-limbo tree the "tourist tree". Its red bark is mindful of tourists with flaking skin as they begin to peel from too much sunburn. Look for this unusual tree while you are here in South Florida. It is worth a picture and serves as a reminder to be careful while you are out in the sun. You may go home looking like a gumbo-limbo tree.




