CITY COUNCIL REPORT

Mayor Sammy Hamilton welcomed the eight firefighters to the meeting on October 2. The City will honor them and the Sheriff's Department with a cook-out on the second Saturday in May. He said that the County will give flu shots here on November 8th and that Halloween will be celebrated in McLeod Park on October 27.

Bobby Campbell, on behalf of the firefighters, presented the Mayor with a plaque and thanked him for "putting Ochopee Fire Control District on the map" within the County and for supporting their union negotiations recently.

Chris Ammerman, President of Reach Out & COPS, said that the County will provide transportation here for people who can not get to Naples by themselves for medical or other essential reasons. CAT busses would be available under the ParaTransit scheme if people fill in the forms, which are available at City Hall.

John Wilson said that he would postpone his question about the airport because the issue of a new City Attorney was pending. He also mentioned that the City water levels were not acceptable. The Mayor said he expected the water problem to be resolved within 30 days. In response to a question from Vicky Nagle about the color of the water, the Mayor said that U.S. Water has to pay the fines when the water is not up to standards.

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STONE CRAB SEASON STARTS!

It's that exciting time of year again that we've all been waiting for – October 15!!! The beginning of stone crab season and one of our favorite no-cook meals. Living here and listening to the boats motor out early every morning, we take pride in our



local fishermen who bring us food from the sea.

Driving or biking behind Everglades City School you'll see thousands of traps all lined up on the side of the road; in fact, one crab boat captain estimated that there are well over 50,000 traps in this area alone. Today, October 4, I saw several captains making final preparations for tonight. At 12:01 am on October 5 traps can be dropped in the water so fishermen and their families are all preparing. The Wells family has a 17-year tradition at the beginning of the season by making pound cake for the crew setting out (with lots of caffeine to keep them awake on the job).

Another young boat captain, Joe Stem Jr., spent quite a bit of time aboard the boat "Christy Lee" pulling crab traps and grouper fishing. This year he bought his own boat, one of the smaller ones in Everglades City, and will be setting out tonight with a crew consisting of the captain, one puller and one stacker as crew. He says he learned a lot from his time aboard the "Christy Lee" (owned by Sergio Valdez) and Capt. Joe says Capt. Sergio is one of the best. However, the owners sold their traps last year and the boat will now be used for grouper and lobster fishing.

To establish himself as a crabber, Capt. Joe purchased 800 certificates from another crabber (the State does not issue any new certificates so they have to be bought from someone willing to sell or getting out of the business). Each trap has to have a certificate and a tag. Prices can vary for the certificates; if they are sold for \$5 a piece, you would need \$4,000 for 800 certificates. THEN, the State keeps 22 ½ % of these so you end up with only 620 certificates. In addition, every year the tags must be renewed with the State (at a cost of 50 cents each) AND the state also charges "transfer fees" for each certificate purchased. In Capt. Joe's case, this amounted to another \$1412 (over 35% of certificate cost). Crab traps vary from \$14 to \$16 each so for 620, it will cost approximately \$9,300.

Today may be the final day of preparation, but it takes 2 to 3 months to prepare the traps, and the boat. Lots of hard work ... so when you go to the local fish market to pick up a couple of pounds of stone crabs, think of the effort and cost that goes into bringing those claws to your table. It's worth what you pay!

We appreciate our local crabbers and all their hard work. THANKS!!


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

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
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WELCOME CENTER **WELCOMES ADVERTISERS**

LOCAL HISTORY



It is that time of year when the 50,000 alligators that inhabit the Park, I might be off in numbers but it seems that many, move out to the river mouths following the schools of mullet or whatever draws them out of where they should stay.. It is a time that they can become a nuisance and dangerous if you are not careful. Like Willie, I named him after a close Gator booster friend that had a bull gator growl that even out-did the Howler monkeys. Bill was a serious Gator fan. Back to Willie; Willie was one of those free loaders who reached 10' 3" by getting what he wanted when he wanted it. He took residence under my dock about a month ago, the opening of snook season to be exact. It was like he knew when the season would open, and where his food source would be.

Why he chose my dock, I do not know. He was there the first day I started cleaning fish and there every day there after. He stayed under the cleaning table gathering all the free hand outs until I quit dropping over fish scraps; then friendly Willie turned into a different gator. He started following our movement up and down the dock; he once tried to leap into the boat after one of my clients. Another time he came half up on the dock trying to reach some fish we had laying there. I try to coexist with nature and avoid what dangers it presents, but the situation had turned bad. I realized I had created this problem and when we stopped dropping scraps, it made the situation worst. It was too late to turn it around. The gator was upset he had no food and he obviously connected us to the source. I had hoped he would leave and move on to another food source but that was not happening. He was becoming hungrier and more aggressive every day.

I know some of you who are reading this would have already said: "The first time he popped his head out from under that cleaning bench I would have popped him; you wouldn't have to worry about him jumping up any boat after any body." I kind of felt that way too, at first, but

decided to go through the process, so we called the state for a nuisance permit. I was amazed how quickly the permit got to the trapper and how quickly he responded. It must have been the first time a nuisance permit had been drawn for Everglades City because he was not to familiar with the area and was a half hour late arriving.

It was not difficult to capture Willie, a couple of nooses, hold on tight, drag him up on the dock, tape his mouth shut, load him in the pickup unharmed. Off to another destination he went. Now I have no idea, or yeah, I guess I have an idea, what Willie was in for at his next stop, but he left here alive so I can only imagine. I did not have to witness his demise if that was to be. I think that is the way the FWC would like it handled and I liked it that way also. Although if it had been done another way, taping his jaws would have been much easier.

Several days later, I stopped at City Seafood for lunch and, of course, did not miss the opportunity to visit with Virgil who mentioned he heard about the gator and that Harold Mays said it almost got him. I told him that the gator was gone and everyone over there was free to walk the docks. Then the conversation led to why there were so many gators out at this time of year. It went from it is mating season, to abundance of mullet, then to why the mullet were so many and that they were schooling up preparing to leave to go off shore to spawn, etc. etc. It is always interesting to here Virgil's version. Then, Virgil, rubbing his cup of coffee, said; "Speaking of offshore, I had a friend of mine tell me he saw a mass of blue crabs off shore that was three miles long and a mile wide and however deep it was.

Now, I listen to Virgil most of the time and when it comes to blue crabs I would never doubt a word he said, cause he knows blue crabs better than blue crabs themselves. Then in the same breath he said; "Going back to gators, I was up at Faka Union the other day and I saw this big log floating and

I went over to it and it was an alligator every bit of 19 feet long, the biggest alligator I have ever seen around here." I looked over to him expecting to see one of his grins but he was still looking at his coffee and then he reach up putting his arms in a big circle like he was reaching around a Volkswagen and said "He was this big around too." Since Virgil has been around here longer than saw grass and has seen a lot of gators I would not be going up in Faka Union in any kayaks.

According to the FWC in 2006 they received more than 21,000 complaints and nuisance alligator trappers were issued over 19,000 permits and tags and removed more than 11,000 nuisance alligators. They also advise disposing of fish scraps in the garbage. Do not throw them in the water. They say, although you are not intentionally feeding alligators, when you do this the end results will be the same. I am sure most of us do not want all the trash cans and dumpsters in Everglades City full of fish scraps, so Virgil Hand offers this suggestion: he recommends installing a large section of PVC at your cleaning bench and extend it below the water level to discard your fish scrapes. Make sure you puncture the eyes and bladder so the fish scrapes sink. This way the alligators do not connect you to their food source.

If you are having trouble with an alligator and you feel that they could be dangerous and want to resolve the problem, call (866) 392-4286. Remember the only thing predictable about an alligator is that he is unpredictable. Be careful!!

Editor's Note: According to the FWC website "Alligators are an important part of Florida's heritage and play an important role in the ecology of our state's wetlands. A better understanding of these facts and a broader knowledge of alligator behavior will help ensure that humans and alligators can continue to coexist." Again, as Jim mentioned, they advise discarding fish scraps in the garbage rather than in the water. It would be wise for both residents and visitors alike to read information about living with alligators on the FWC website www.myfwc.com/gators/fag/LWA.

Big House Coffee in Chokoloskee is closed until November.


Joanie's Blue Crab Cafe in Ochopee is closed until November.

There will also be a raffle and members of the society will be present to offer information about the care and growing habits of plants. For info, phone Kit at 262-0987.








Ten Thousand Island Refuge Day


