





A Fishing Experiment by Matthew Scully

<u>Problem</u>: Which lure is better, artificial or live?

<u>Research</u>: The Largemouth Bass weighs 1 to 3 pounds and adults are 8 to 18 inches long. A regular Largemouth Bass's diet consists of many different animal species. As a baby, a Largemouth Bass will feed on zoo-plankton and small insects. At just 2 inches long a bass is considered a predator eating small frogs and worms. As an adult, bass will eat worms, frogs, snakes, crawfish, and insects. Largemouth Bass live from the Appalachians to the Rockies. The Largemouth Bass lives at a depth of about 2.5 meters so a lot of fishermen use diving minnows or 1/8th-ounce weights.

<u>Hypothesis</u>: The hypothesis for this experiment is that more bass will be caught using live bait.

Live bait (Night Crawler): Live bait gives realistic motions that would attract bass; Live bait is a bass's natural food; Live bait gives realistic smells.

Artificial bait does not give off real smell but spray on smell can be bought Artificial bait sometimes gives off a bright glimmer which attracts bass

<u>Procedure</u>: A chart was made that was made that was divided up into thirty minute intervals. Then one person took the live bait (night crawlers) and the other person took the artificial lure (Rapala minnow). Each person fished for thirty minutes and tallied up the number of fish caught. This was repeated three times exactly the same.

<u>Result</u>: The final data was:

- 1st session: Artificial 5, Live 2;
- 2nd session: Artificial 4, Live 2;
- 3rd session: Artificial 6, Live 3.

After that the numbers were averaged and the results were:

Artificial = 5 Live = 2.33

<u>Conclusion</u>: More than twice as many fish were caught with artificial bait than with live. If the experiment were repeated, some of the factors that could be changed would be the weather and the time of day.

What is a Cracker?

extract from an article by Patrick D. Smith, author of A Land Remembered

"It came from the cracking sound of the rawhide whips used by pioneer cattlemen. Thus the original Crackers were men who herded cows. The sound of the whips could be heard for miles, so the whips were also used for communication purposes. One crack meant come to dinner, two cracks something else, and so on. It was pioneer Florida's first wireless telegraph system. The whips were lethal, capable of popping the head off a rattlesnake at ten paces. During hard times, when gun powder and bullets were in short supply, men used the whips to kill small animals for food.

What really makes a person a true Florida Cracker (besides being born in the state)? Several things: A love of the land and nature, growing things in soil, close family ties, and a deep sense of religion. A Cracker's word is his bond. They have no pretense, never put on airs, never try to appear to be something other than what they are, and they never "blow smoke" over you. They either like you or they don't, and it's as simple as that."
