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CITY COUNCIL REPORT

Mayor Sammy Hamilton said at the meeting on Tuesday, February 12, that it was time to do something about the "Lovers' Lane" property, the abandoned Gawn Fishing development near the airport. On the advice of Building Inspector Ken Badke, the Council moved to send a notice by certified mail informing the owners



that they are in violation of local building and development permits. If they do not respond within 10 day, the City can tear down the buildings and clean up the grounds and levy a fine of \$250/day for each code violation.

On a more cheerful note, the Mayor said that the problem of repairing the City docks might be solved because documentation from the early 1960s had been found from the Collier Corporation signing over the streets and rights of way to the City which should include the submerged land under the docks. He hopes that he can prove to the DEP that the docks belong to the City because the river has eroded its banks.

During Public Comment, John Monroe Wilson asked that the City get a guarantee from developers before clearing all the trees from a tract (and then replacing them with non-native species or going bankrupt and leaving a barren landscape). Councilor Tammy Smallwood said that some trees we consider "native", like the Poinciana, are actually exotic although they grow well here. The Mayor replied that he would look into the issue. The Mayor also said, in response to another question from John M. Wilson, that there was no progress on the handover of the airport. Finally, John M. Wilson said that websites still advertised weekly rentals on Pleasure Island and the Mayor said he would ask the Building Inspector to write another letter.

The next council meeting will be on Tuesday, March 4, at 5:30 p.m.


From Savannah's Eyes



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Recipe for Good Eating

PANKO CRUSTED FISH

(from Tsunami Restaurant, Memphis, TN) provided by Denise Rousseau



2 to 4 fillets of any white fish (snook, snapper, grouper or halibut) Peanut or olive oil for searing fillets

1 c. Panko (Japanese bread crumbs)

½ c. canola oil

1 tsp lemon zest

1 c. fresh cilantro, finely chopped


salt and pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 400°. Rinse and pat dry the fillets, then salt and pepper each side. Mix Panko and next three ingredients together until Panko mixture is moist enough to form into a ball. Heat oil in oven-proof frying pan on medium-high heat; add fillets. Cook for 3-4 minutes. Flip each fillet over and spread 1/4 cup of the Panko mixture on top of each fillet to cover. Place pan into oven to finish, about 4 to 6 minutes depending on thickness of fish. Flesh should be flakky and opaque. Serve immediately.



This is the fourth annual festival which is sponsored by Collier County Museums and the Collier County Public Library plus the Friends of the Museum of the Everglades and the Friends of the Library.

The Festival honors Marjory Stoneman Douglas whose 1947 book "Everglades;

River of Grass" drew attention to the Glades. She became an active environmentalist, lobbying for the preservation of this unique area until her death in 1998 at the age of 107 years old. Marjory saw so much change during her years, having arrived in Miami in 1915 to join her father Frank Stoneman who was editor of the *Miami Herald*. She describes driving to the end of the Tamiami Trail at the Dade County border to have picnic breakfasts and watch flocks of birds at dawn. She spent much of her life writing; articles for the newspaper and short stories for magazines and, eventually, books including fiction for youngsters. Her autobiography "Voice of the River" is a history of Florida as well as of her life, written in her



lyrical flowing style with wonderfully wise words on the human condition.



Fishing Report

Snook season finally opens on March 1st. A lot of us can't wait for a good snook dinner. I hope the coldest weather is behind us. March can be windy and cold but it can also be warm. When that happens, tarpon will move up and down the coast. Trout fishing was good last month and should only get better. Spanish mackerel have been thick. March, as a general rule, is a transitional month. Sheepshead start to move back into deeper water. In some back bays, when the water levels get right, small bait fish are forced out of runoffs and snook fishing can be as good as it gets. Redfish should improve this month. When it does get cold, many fishermen tip jigs with shrimp and fish the deep holes and oyster bars. Cut ladyfish also works well.

Tornado Bird

After the tornado twisted our two car canopies and threw them over the fence into the VR Corp, many of



our neighbors were wandering around with us looking at the aftermath. All of a sudden something landed on the front of my shirt. I looked down and there was a bird. 10:00 o'clock at night and there was a warbler using my shirt for a safe spot in the storm. The poor bird was wet, confused and very scared. I tried to tell everyone there was a bird on my shirt but they were more interested in cleaning up the damage before the rain started again. The bird stayed on my shirt for almost a minute while I walked. When I got near the garden fence he hopped off and went into the bushes. After those wonderful folks from the VR Corp helped pull the car canopies out of the sky and back into our yard in pieces, I went back to look for the warbler where I left him. With my flashlight in the dark I couldn't find him. I hope that my garden served as a refuge for that bird for the rest of the rainy, rainy night. I looked around the property in the daylight and found no bird carcasses I must think that he/she made it through the night.

By the way that yellow-rumped (myrtle) warbler became the 46th bird on my list of birds I have seen from my yard.



DAVID KEISER, 1950-2008

In a moving memorial service on Wednesday, February 20, friends from near and far celebrated the life of David Keiser who passed away unexpectedly at home in Everglades City on February 11. Neighbor Donny Barton described how Dave would spend up to 150 hours on his burnt wood engravings, earning "about 10 cents an hours" if he sold one. His neighbor on the other side, Parker Oglesby, said Dave was a good person, he had no enemies, was pals with the people at the Fire Station behind his house, and thought that Everglades was "paradise" with its water and quiet. Parker then sang a song in memory of his friend. Boyhood chums from the east coast all spoke of Dave's love of nature, his fishing and hunting, his go-cart which was a precursor to the swamp buggy that was always being worked on. At the end of the service, brother "Skip" handed out some of Dave's artworks to people who had been promised them and was sorry there were not enough for everyone in the large congregation.

David Keiser was born in Miami and raised in Coral Gables. He came to this area with his family as a youngster to go hunting and to fish from Chokoloskee. His brother said that dinner at the Rod & Gun was just one of the highlights of these trips. Dave finally settled here about five years ago. He will be remembered locally as the "hot dog man" who had a stall near Right Choice Supermarket, for his wood carvings which were shown in the Museum of the Everglades in spring of 2005, and for his love of the area and the friends he made here.





SHERIFF'S REPORT

Lt Mark Milligan stated at the Council meeting on February 12 that two burglaries were due to unlocked cars (one at the Ivey House and the other at Camilla Street Grill after closing hours). There was also a theft on Plantation Island for which the Sheriff's Office has suspects. He reiterated "Don't be an easy target" said "Look out for your and neighbors", referring to the unoccupied home on Plantation Island.

Mayor Sammy Hamilton thanked the Sheriff's Office for their generosity and Lt Milligan responded by thanking the City and its residents for their cooperation.

Earlier in the day, Sue Gentry of the CCSO Crime Prevention Office, had bestowed gifts on the City. She presented the Mayor with over 20 footballs, soccer balls, and basket balls from the CCSO Police Activity League (whose slogan is "filling playgrounds, not jails"). A further donation will be a bicycle rack and helmets which can be used for skating or bike riders. She also told the Rapper that she had dropped off items for the Food Pantry at the Community Church, clothes and kitchen items for the Thrift Shop, and a check for \$600 to the school. She told the Rapper, "I hope to bring a lot more programs down there in the coming months."

Lt Milligan told the *Rapper* that Seafood Festival was calm with no rowdy behavior and that he estimated there were about 45,000 attendees (from the automatic counter on SR-29 coming into town).

Since the meeting, he reported that a prop was stolen from a boat on the river and generators were taken from an electrical company work trailer on SR-29 north of US-41.

First Lady Announces Essay Contest



First Lady Laura Bush paid a surprise visit to Everglades National Park on Wednesday, February 6, to help put a spotlight on the National Park Foundation's 2008 Junior Ranger essay contest.

Open to students across the country ages 9-12, the essay's theme is:

WHAT CAN YOU DO NOW TO TURN OVER A NEW LEAF TO HELP THE ENVIRONMENT AND PRESERVE OUR NATIONAL PARKS?

Mrs. Bush spoke at the Royal Palm/Anhinga Trail before a fifth-grade class of Florida City Elementary School and approximately 100 park visitors and National Park Service personnel. She encouraged all students to enter the contest.

"I'm so happy to be with you here today in your neighborhood national park, which also happens to be one of the most fabulous national parks in the world," Mrs. Bush said.

Essays must be no more than 500 words (about 2 typed, double-spaced pages). They will be judged on how well the essay shows: understanding of the issue; originality; clarity and effectiveness of style and organization; and adherence to format and length rules.

The deadline for contest entries is March 14. They can be submitted online or by mail. Essays sent by mail must be received by the National Park Foundation by midnight on March 14, 2008, and must include a parent's or legal guardian's signature and phone number. Grand Prize: A trip for four to Everglades National Park from April 20 to April 23. The winner will star in an electronic field trip from the Everglades on April 22. The package includes air fare for four, car rental, hotel and all meals. Winner also wins a \$1,000 shopping spree at Macy's.

Third Place: A \$250 Macy's shopping spree.
