Water Quality Update

According to U.S. Water Services Corporation, the results of the laboratory analyses (TTHM and Haa5 levels) of the water for Everglades City area have been well within (or below) the acceptable range limits since Dec. 2007 so there has been no need to issue reports this year. An Annual Consumer Confidence Report will be released July 1. If your water is discolored or you are concerned about the quality, contact U.S. Water at (866) 753-8292, ext. 207.

The City reported that they are starting a new water billing system and a letter will be sent with the next bill to explain the new format.



Park Fire Now Contained

On May 14 a fire was reported in the Everglades National Park west of Krome Avenue and south of the Chekika Visitor Center. Within days the fire had spread, covering nearly 40,000 acres. By Saturday, May 24, 85% of the fire had been contained due to the combined efforts of many dedicated fire fighters and volunteers. More than 250 personnel were needed to help fight this area's fire. At one point prison officials and inmates from the Everglades Correctional Facility, Krome Detention Center and Geo Corp facility had to be evacuated. FCAT Scores

Everglades City School 3rd grade reading and math scores were released last week. The students scored 300 compared to 316 last year. This is below the state average of 313 and the Collier County average of 307. The percentage of students who scored at level 3 or higher was 58% compared to 73% in 2007. Again below state percentage of 72% and county percentage of 68%. However, for mathematics, the 3rd grade students scored higher than the previous year: 293 compared to 274, and 42% compared to 27% but still below state and county averages.





What is the River of Grass Greenway? It is a proposed multi-use pathway across the Everglades along the Tamiami Trail. Many times as you drive on US-41 to Naples, you will see bicyclists carrying groceries to their homes in the newly developed subdivisions or you may see touring cyclists who are traveling across the State on the only rural road going from coast to coast south of SR-80 (which connects Ft. Myers to Palm Beach). Bicyclists are not allowed on interstate highways. My husband and I have thousands biked over of miles throughout 22 states and have discovered that more and more states are converting old railroad beds to paths and established greenways. The East Coast Greenway is in the process of linking Key West to the northern tip of Maine for bicyclists. Collier County has already approved of a multi-use path east of CR-951 when they widen US-41. On May 27, 2008, the County passed a resolution supporting the River of Grass Greenway. Off the Shelf - Book Review

"The Life of the Skies" by Jonathan Rosen

I've often watched birdwatchers at the Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk in the Fakahatchee Strand and wished that I had all the knowledge to identify the many birds they were observing. Slowly over the years I have learned a lot about our native Everglades water birds and our purple martins that have come to call 207 North Storter their home every winter. So, when my daughter recently presented me with the book "The Life of the Skies; Birding at the End of Nature," I was eager to start reading about a world I know so little of. Jonathan Rosen lives in New York City and it is there that he grew to appreciate bird watching, mostly in Central Park. He argues that anyone, anywhere, can enjoy the avian life. According to U.S. Fish and Wildlife, almost 48 million Americans watch birds. This book is full of his personal stories of going out into nature with professionals to learn about the wide varieties of birds in different environments (he even traveled to Israel for some bird watching). This is also a history book about the people who devoted much of their lives to studying birds. It is well written and observes the effect humans have on the environment, attempting to preserve nature but at the same time destroying it.

In addition to this interesting book on birds, there are a number of educational books and material available in Everglades City at WinCar Hardware and the Gulf Coast Visitors' Center at the Everglades National Park (upstairs, above the Everglades National Boat Tours). One new book is "Birding Florida" by Brian Rapoza which contains accurate bird-finding information for the entire state of Florida including the Everglades and the Keys. An item for children regarding birds is a deck of playing cards featuring 54 different coastal birds.



June Fishing Report by Capt Bill Lindsay

So far May has been so windy that a lot of us have not been able to fish our normal patterns. West or southwest winds have made tarpon and snook fishing with fly tackle almost impossible on the outside. Fishing in the backcountry has been OK; but because of the wind, lots of shorelines and points can't be fished. We need rain and southeast winds to bring the fishing back to what it should be at this time of year. Plug casters have been finding good snook fishing even in these windy conditions. Capt. Tim Brady took several large snook this week, using plugs in the backcountry. So for those who want to put in the time, it's worth it. The good news is that all this should change soon. I still think early summer fishing offers the light tackle angler the best chance for first class Everglades fishing.

NO GAS IN FLAMINGO

Everglades National Park has announced that there is no gas available in Flamingo and warns visitors to be sure to fill up before taking the long trip down there.

According to Superintendent Dan Kimball, the park has closed its

Kimball, the park has closed its gas fueling facilities at Flamingo due to a recent fuel spill. During the course of removing the fuel-contaminated soil, evidence of previous contamination was discovered. Until the contamination is removed and mitigation measures are in place to prevent future spills, the park has discontinued all fuel deliveries. This also applies to boats. The park hopes to begin mitigation and tank removal by June 27, and resume fuel-dispensing operations by August 1, 2008. Diesel fuel will continue to be available until the current supplies are exhausted.



Waterways: The Florida Bay Map & Guide

This free educational video, published by the Everglades National Park, is designed for all boaters who want to navigate into the backcountry of Florida Bay without running aground and disturbing the sea grass. A free copy of the Florida Bay Map & Guide can be picked up at 55 different locations from Homestead to Marathon and at all NPS visitors' centers. Copies are also available at the website www.nps.gov/ever. Click on "Plan your Visit" and go to "Things to Do" and then "Florida Bay Map & Guide" or phone (305) 852-0324, ext. 0338.

Florida Bay comprises one third of the area in the Everglades National Park and is visited by tens of thousands of boaters every year. According to rangers, over the past 20 years more boaters and inexperienced boat operators have visited the park with over 30,000 acres of sea grass being scarred by propellers. The ideal boat is a shallow water, shallow drafting skiff with a maximum length size of 17 to 19 feet. These boats have the least impact on the sensitive resources. However, even these boats can do some damage so the most important thing is to learn the waters; even the experienced boaters need to be attentive since water levels will change with the dry season and flats will be affected by storms and wind.

Boat operators should also have NOAA Chart #11-451, a compass, wear polarized sunglasses, and carry a GPS (although learning the waters is more important than a GPS). Channel markers may change or disappear after storms so use your eyes and look for the shallow water and your wake. Larger boats with higher horsepower motors often get grounded and create more problems when trying to get off the flats; rangers recommend that if you do get grounded, do not try to power out; call a towing service. Also, be courteous to other boats and anglers and keep a distance from the wildlife.

Boat operators who live here in the Everglades area are knowledgeable about Florida Bay and the flats; but, if you have a friend visiting or know of anglers coming to fish in the backcountry, it would be worthwhile for them to view this 15 minute video and definitely to pick up the free Florida Bay Map & Guide. A copy of the video will also be available in the Everglades City branch library.



Miles City is hardly a city but that is the name given to the area at what is now the intersection of SR-29 and I-75 (Exit 80).

Miles was the second son of Barron and Juliet Carnes Collier. He was born in 1914 and at that time the family had its permanent residence in New York although Barron spent some of his time in Florida looking after his interests here. After Barron Collier's death in 1939, Miles helped to run the Collier Corporation with brothers Barron, Jr, and Sam and manager Norman Herren.

After World War II the brothers lived in Palm Beach some of the time and flew into the new airport in Everglades City for the day to attend meetings. It was thanks to Miles that the official opening of Everglades National Park was in Everglades City in 1947, bringing President Harry S Truman and other dignitaries to the town.

Miles and Sam were well-known in car racing and rallying circles, especially for the British MG sports models they drove. They were so fond of the cars that they set up the MG Sales Company to import the vehicles and founded the Automobile Racing Club of America which issued a Journal with Miles as the editor.

Miles won the 1949 Watkins Glen Grand Prix in a green car called the "Ardent Alligator". Sam was the first racing fatality at Watkins Glen, NY, race track in 1950 when he was leading the race in a Ferrari. Miles' mother made him promise to stop racing, which he did, but in 1954 Miles died of polio at the age of 40. The "Collier Cup" (formerly the Collier Brothers Memorial Trophy Race) is named in honor of Sam and Miles.

For Everglades' enthusiasts with a keen eye, the month of June finds a number of native orchids blooming in the mangrove backcountry. The Butterfly Orchid (Encyclia tampensis) is the most common. They are usually found on the skeletons of old buttonwoods in a somewhat airy location. Typically, they will have five to twenty bloom stalks with up to 30 to 40 flowers. The dry conditions we have incurred since January may have these tough little plants blooming slightly later but I have noticed that the bloom stalks are popping up every day. These beautiful gifts of the Everglades are amazingly prolific; if you look closely, you can see hundreds of these plants in a day. Native orchids of any species, of course, are protected and should not be harvested or disturbed for any personal use.

FLORIDA FLORA

In the Everglades area we see an abundance



of blooming bromeliads this time of year. This picture was taken along Janes Scenic Drive in the Fakahatchee Strand. Bromeliads are members of the pineapple family (*Bromeliaceae*) and are often called air plants. The ones native to Florida are epiphytes, growing attached to tree trunks and branches. Epiphytic bromeliads do not harm their host tree; they absorb the water and nutrients they need through their leaves from the air and from the rain that falls through the canopy and becomes enriched with nutrients along the way. They use their roots only to anchor themselves to the tree, not to absorb nutrients from it. Take a walk in the wild and enjoy the beauty that surrounds you.

Everglades National Park Requests Proposals for Visitor Services

On Friday, May 9, the National Park Service (NPS) released a prospectus for a concession contract that provides commercial visitor services at two locations in Everglades National Park. The prospectus combines two existing operations into a single draft contract. The operations, located at Flamingo and Gulf Coast Visitor Center in Everglades City, both provide boat tours, canoe rentals and retail sales. Services that will only be offered at the Flamingo location include skiff rentals, houseboat rentals, mobile food service, tiki bar, bicycle rentals and slip rentals. Combined annual gross revenue for both operations in 2006 was \$1,848,975.

The contract term for operations at Flamingo is five years, and the term at Gulf Coast is ten years. The contract will require a minimum franchise fee to be paid to the NPS. The minimum franchise fee will be 2% of gross revenue for the first 5 years of the contract and 5% of gross revenue for the second half of the contract.

Site visits were scheduled for May 28, at the Gulf Coast District in Everglades City, and May 29 at the Flamingo District of Everglades National Park. Hardcopies of the prospectus are available upon request for \$50. All contract offers must be received by Cherrie Brice, at the address above, no later than 4 p.m., on July 23, 2008.

Airboat/ORV Closure

Zone 4 airboat access within Big Cypress National Preserve is now closed due to low water conditions. May 23 began the 60-day recreational off-road vehicle (ORV) closure for this management unit within the Preserve. Pending water levels, it will re-open to ORV access by airboats on Sunday, July 22, 2008.

All other management units within the Preserve that allow for wheeled ORV access remain open until June 1. Beginning on June 2, these units will be closed for 60 days with access being re-opened on Aug 1.

The Recreational ORV Management Plan calls for a 60-day seasonal closure to allow a period free from resource pressures.
