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CITY COUNCIL REPORT

Mayor Sammy Hamilton said at the meeting on November 4 that he's "working 8 days a week" with FEMA, including taking late night phone calls. Eventually, we should have new sewer grinder pumps which will not be damaged by flooding. FEMA can help




damaged by flooding. FEMA can help with preventative measures as well as with repairs after a disaster.

He also said that the County will collect appliances on a limited number of days per month and that we should contact City Hall before putting them out. On a similar note, garden refuse should be cut up small to make it easier to handle.

Lt. Mark Milligan reported on the Sheriff's Office activities. Since the last meeting, there had been a vehicle burglary at Jungle Erv's. People playing soccer in the School baseball field were warned that they would be arrested if they continue. Deputies are looking at street signs to see if they are hard to read and need to be replaced.

During Public Comment, John M. Wilson welcomed the new grinder pumps. Gene Davidson said it was "good to be back home" and that he wanted to compliment the City workers for keeping the place looking so tidy ("The City looks great!"). He reminisced that he had been on the Council in the 1960s when Dr. Snyder, the Mayor, got the streets paved.

The next meeting is on Tuesday, December 2.

Part Time Resident Property Owners: Same as above plus Current Collier County Tax Statement or Deed or Current Closing Papers (current within 12 months); all names and addresses must match.

Mobile Home Owners: Must own the land the home is on. Tax paid on an attachment is not "real property" per the county ordinance and is not acceptable for permit.

Usually, this section highlights native Florida species; but there is

one beautiful and unusual palm in my vard that I want to share with our readers. It is called Veitchia spiralis which is native to the Vanuatu Islands in the South Pacific. The Veitchia genus is among the tallest and most beautiful palms in the world. It is named after James Veitch, a 19th century nurseryman from Devon in southwest England. He was a third generation horticulturist and under his guidance the Royal Exotic Nursery became the largest of its kind in Europe. Pictured here is the Veitchia spiralis (common name Kajewskia Palm). The trunks of the Veitchia spiralis are gray, their crown shaft deep green and the inflorescences (the cluster of flowers, or flower buds on the stems) light greenish white. The display of these inflorescences is what makes these palms so outstanding. Bees swarm around the buds, even before flowering, to capture the nectar of the flower. The genus is intolerant of cold. The spiralis species is from the lowland rain forest but will grow is south Florida where it is frost-free, warm and moist. In the Vanuatu islands, it is considered near extinction but can be seen at Fairchild Gardens in Miami and other south Florida areas.

<u>MEMORIES</u>

"Sweet Sixteen in Everglades City" by Barbara Hoffman Daniels

Just after my sixteenth birthday, there was a Coast Guard Base established in Everglades City. World War II had called for military bases to be established at the head of all navigable waterways in our Nation, and the Barron River was one as such having been dredged deep for supply boats that brought goods into the city before the Tamiami Trail was finished.

The base was established on and around the grounds of the Rod and Gun Club on the River. The whole perimeter was fenced in and off limits to civilians, as were the docks immediately in front.

Civilians even had to have photo I.D.'s taken in order to be able to board a boat to go out among the islands. That was an exciting fact that made the little town seem so important to our homeland security. It also brought some new families to town. Some of the Coast Guard seniors of higher rank were housed with their families in some cottages that used to be directly behind the Community Church

During that time we had U.S.O. dances on Saturday nights at the Community Center which was then down on Riverside Drive on the waterfront. We were always well chaperoned by senior citizens or teachers.

The small town library was equipped to be a recreation hall and we could go there any night until 9:00 p.m. and play card games, table tennis, book reading, record playing or just visit. The little town was jumping during that short time. Some of the teenagers even joined the C.A.P. (Civilian Air Patrol) which entailed taking watches all night from the balcony of the Court House. We were required to learn to tell the differences in the military planes of our Nation versus Germany's should it ever occur that one should infiltrate our night skies. Oh, we felt so important!

When it was all over in just a short few years and the base pulled out of the city, I think that we had lost around five of our young ladies to marriage and only a couple that I knew of to unexpected pregnancies. I guess that's not a bad average for a small town this size, having been used as a military base.

Did I find the love of my life during those times? Oh sure, only he disappeared along with the base. Oh, woe is me! Such is young love.

COUNTRY WATERWAYS

On this beautiful fall day, we are embarking on yet another leg of the Green River. When we first started exploring this waterway,

we had studied a map and thought we were ready to go on long excursions. We were surprised to find that a system of locks and dams used for riverboat traffic during the previous century, would impede our plans to travel across Kentucky via water. Undaunted, each trip bore a new adventure with promise of the unknown.

One would think that a river is just a waterway but paying close attention unveils nature at its best. Today, shortly after launching the johnboat, we start winding around the river's bends and I notice its uneven banks. High banks have deeper water at its edge and low banks we try to avoid because the water is shallow there. Many of the banks are natural seawalls of stone carved over the years by flooding and ebbing waters. On this leg we detour onto Bear Creek and encounter a bend with a huge boulder in the middle of it the size of a shed. It is decorated on top with the remains of two large fallen trees strategically crisscrossed as if placed there by giant hands.

Returning to the river, the scenery changes again. Some particularly high banks are adorned by curtains of ivy hanging over the water's edge from tall trees. The river is dense with fallen and dangerously leaning trees making the going an obstacle course. The changing fall weather has caused leaves to shed and blanket the river. I have been instructed to sit at the bow and watch closely for debris below the water so as to navigate safely.

This challenging portion behind us, we come to a clearing as if on a different river. Long tree shadows shade the way. A ripple of water cascades across descending stones in a faint waterfall on one of the banks. Further along, we find an area that allows us to dock and stretch our legs. Only this is no ordinary stop. We discover a cave with a natural spring. We envision this area being used as a dwelling by our nomadic ancestors. So beautiful and peaceful with the main essentials: protection from the elements and plenty of water. This being the highlight of our day, it is time to turn around and head back.

Everglades National Park is pleased to announce the release of the Environmental Assessment (EA) for the Pilot Spreader Swales Project. The EA analyzes four alternatives for a proposed pilot project to determine if spreader swales would increase water flow into Northeast Shark



River Slough in the park. The proposed pilot project is part of the Modified Water Deliveries Project (Mod Waters) intended to restore flows in Northeast Shark Slough as well as ecological balance in the park.

The project is a pilot because no conclusive study has been conducted that substantiates the benefits of swales. Therefore, the National Park Service, with the cooperation of the US Army Corp of Engineers has prepared an EA evaluating this project.

The public is encouraged to view the EA and submit comments. The comment period ends **December 9**.

SICK GATOR IN THE FAK



Friends of Fakahatchee member and swamp walk leader John Elting reports that on Saturday, November 8, he stepped on or very near an 8-foot alligator submerged in $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 feet of water. In all his experience, he would have expected it to react – thrash around and move away. However, this gator did nothing.

John contacted Kent Vliet at the University of Florida and was told that the gator was possibly suffering from a microplasma bacterial infection (breakdown of the cell walls) and was in severe pain in the joints with added cerebral fluid pressure. Apparently this disease is uncommon in the wild and is contagious.
