



## **SHERIFF'S REPORT**

Lt. Mark Milligan told the *Rapper* that several incidents had occurred in the area over the past month. On December 12, there was an armed burglary at a residence near Ochopee which he described as an "isolated case". A vacant house in Chokoloskee was disturbed at the end of December.

On December 24, the locked van of a hunter parked on Turner River Road was broken into and a rifle was stolen. Similarly, on January 3, a camera was taken from a locked vehicle near Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk. In both cases, the items were obvious temptations to the thieves – a warning not to leave valuables visible in your vehicle.

Sheriff Rambosk, who has visited Everglades City several times, was sworn in as the new County Sheriff on January 6.

Lt. Milligan mentioned that Bill McCrea, 81, an officer from 1955 to 1982 and member of the local Masonic lodge since 1955, passed away on January 3.



## **MAYOR'S REPORT**

Mayor Sammy Hamilton visited the Little Gator Clinic to welcome Dr. G.B. and Kathy Barnard and thanked them for the service they are generously providing *(see page 3)*.

The Mayor also met with Don York, president of the Shamrock Bank of Naples, who was here to get ready to open a new branch bank in City Hall. He said that he looks forward to doing business in the community.

There was no City Council meeting on January 6 because there was not a quorum.

## Recipe for Good Eating

It is traditional for many a Southerner to whip up a batch of hoppin' John, country ham, and cornbread on New Year's Eve. That's what my confederate, John Wilson, has every year. I, on the other hand, being a yankee of primarily German extraction from Cincinnati, have what else, but kraut, sauerkraut to be exact. The recipe includes opening cans of Silver Floss brand kraut (better than jars or bags), enveloping slabs of pork spareribs and extra water in a dutch oven, covering, then slow roasting at 325° for 3 or more hours. I am a purist, but some folks add caraway seeds or chopped apple, pork chops or German sausages. And you MUST have mashed potatoes on the side. Know why? # FLORIDA FLORA

Our native wildflowers are beautiful and important hosts to butterflies. When creating a butterfly garden, one must plan for the four distinct stages of the butterfly's life: egg, caterpillar (or larva), pupa (or chrysalis), and adult. Milkweed, often called "butterfly weed", grows in open fields and sandy dry gardens. It is fairly salt and draught tolerant, a prolific propagator flowering in the white to yellow-red color spectrum, and a most favored food source for the migrating monarch and year-round queen butterflies.

Also found in our area are the colorful Common Butterfly and the Gossamer-winged Attala, the "Buckeye", which are attracted to Spanish Needle, often regarded as an ugly weed and pulled from the garden. If you allow this wildflower to grow alongside other flowering plants, your garden will be visually enhanced as well as attractive to other varieties of butterflies.

In order to create a garden that attracts butterflies, it is wise to know which plants to grow under the specific conditions of your plot, such as the time of year for migrating or year-round butterfly species, soil, water, climate, sun, and natural propagation. Some wild flowers can be used for zero-scaping, needing very little care. *Gardening for Florida's Butterflies* by Pamela F. Traas and *Native Florida Plants* by Robert G. Haehle and Joan Brookwell are two books worth owning for lowmaintenance gardening.

Take a ride along Janes Scenic Drive where you'll find the Swamp Lily, pickerelweed and other wildflowers that like the soil and water of the subtropical swamp, or Wagon Wheel Road which has a large variety of seasonal prairie and marsh wildflowers, many of which will grow in your garden.

After the presentation, there was a Walking Tour of Historic Buildings led by Patty Huff. The exhibit about Plume Hunting will be in the Pauline Reeves Gallery at the front of the Museum for the rest of January.

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
The Friends of the Museum met on Wednesday, January 7, and elected new officers:

## **Short Field Landings**

Chuck Gretske, who organizes the monthly pancake breakfasts, arrived from Alaska a little late this year due to some northwest and Yukon-type weather. Chuck's float plane was turned upside down last year in the tornado that visited Everglades City so now he has a new (to him) Cessna that he uses for his Wings Ten Thousand Islands tours and trips to Key West. As a result of all this, the first of the season pancake breakfast missed November but opened in December at the Everglades airport. About 22 airplanes of

all ages and variety – including antiques, home-builts, and brand new Light Sport Aircraft – flew in for the event. In addition, about a dozen or so local citizens biked, drove, or hiked in for the free flapjacks and just 'plane' viewing.

These local airfields are where most commercial airline pilots first learn and develop their skills for eventually driving those 747's across the skies. We are very fortunate here in Everglades City to have our own airport and to have the Collier County Airport Authority provide funding for maintenance and operating costs.

With the FAA designation of X01, Everglades airport has the distinction of being the very first one chartered and continues to enhance the 'outpost' character of Everglades City. Mayor Sammy is ever watchful of the County responsibility and has maintained interest in getting the hurricane-destroyed hangars replaced and keeping our little airpark functioning for generations to come.



If you get a chance stop by for a visit and take a look at the arrivals log; especially the 'remarks' section. There you will find mostly rave comments about how pilots and passengers discovered Everglades City and how they spread the word to bring in more and more visitors. There were more than 75 airplane arrivals in just the month of December and our local economy most assuredly benefits in many ways. Fly-in visitors return with friends and

family for extended stays, dine in our restaurants, take an airboat tour, book a fishing trip, and, of course, take home lots of stone crabs. This past holiday season we counted at least 30 or more coolers full of crab claws flying out for Christmas and New Year's Eve celebrations.

The next flapjack flipflop will take place at the airport on **Saturday**, **January 24**. from 10:00 a.m. to noon. Come on down and see some beautiful little airplanes and get your flying buzz buzzing.

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
## MOTEL UPGRADED

The owners of Everglades City Motel, located on Collier Avenue next to the Backcountry Cafe, have just remodeled all of their 19 rooms. Although more than half of them have a seating area and kitchenette, every room has a refrigerator, a microwave, and a coffeemaker, in addition to a hair dryer, iron and ironing board. The bath facilities have all been upgraded and enlarged by eliminating the closet.

The rates are comparable to other rooms in town; January rates \$89.99; February and March \$109 for the standard room and \$119 room with kitchenette. During Seafood Festival weekend, the rooms will be a little higher at \$139. There is a No-Smoking & No-Pets policy. Other upgrades include cable TV and a wireless internet connection in each room.

The Everglades City Motel was built in the 1950s and was variously known as the Sportsman's Motel and the Illinois Motel (the owners were from that state). It is mentioned in a 1953 Chamber of Commerce brochure and in 1956 the room rate was \$6/night.

For many years it has catered to visiting fishermen and the new management says that, with the recent remodeling, the fishermen are very pleased with the upgrades and have commented positively on all the improvements.



## **VIP Report**

### **Gulf Coast Visitor Numbers**

How does the number of visitors to Everglades National Park, Everglades City during the last two weeks of December 2008 compare to those of 2007?

Before reading any further, guess. What would you expect? A busier tourist season or a disappointing one? Fewer Americans vacationing? More?

The economy has changed a lot since a year ago. The country, the world, is going through one of the worst recessions in history. Some economists are comparing it to the Great Depression of the 1930s. Unemployment rates are high.

If people lose their jobs, they don't buy. Christmas sales were five percent less than last year. If people don't buy, companies falter. Layoffs, bankruptcies, closings are regularly in the news.

The housing market has been a disaster. People are walking away from their houses and letting banks foreclose. Why? They owe more on the mortgages than they can afford. Home prices have been steadily falling. Many people owe more on their mortgages than they could sell their homes for.

The cost of living has increased, and the value of the American dollar has decreased. Anywhere in the world we go, whatever we buy, on the average, costs more than a year ago.

Large banks and brokerages houses have failed. Many Americans have watched their retirement funds evaporate.

One positive glimmer: gasoline prices nationally dropped dramatically to half as high as they were a year ago, \$1.70 vs. \$3.40 per gallon.

Given all the grim economic news for 2008, I expected a decrease in tourists here and possibly a steep drop. I am *so* pleased to report I was wrong. The numbers of visitors through the visitor center door speak for themselves:

	<u>2007</u>	2008	increase	
12/18-12/25	1,955	1,969	14	1%
12/25-12/31	3,998	4,965	967	24%

From December 18 through December 25, the number increased from 1,955 to 1,969, an increase of only 14 visitors, less than 1%, but *still* an increase.

After Christmas the number of vacationers usually dramatically increases. From December 26 through December 31 it jumped from 3,998 in 2007 to 4,965 in 2008, a difference of nearly a thousand people (967), a 24% increase.

The number of people camping in the back country of the Gulf Coast has also increased. In December 2007, 189 drew permits. In 2008 it jumped to 233, almost a 25% increase.

This good news is *such* a breath of fresh air. Ah-h-h-h!
