

Fishing Report

As I write this, another cold front is approaching. February can be cold

and windy, but it can also be nice and warm. When this happens, big tarpon can be caught in the backcountry and rivers. Although most large Snook are caught in back at this time of year, some big ones are taken out on the Gulf. "Chico" Fernandez, fishing with Captain Steve Huff, landed an 18 lb Snook this past week with a light fly rod. On days when water temperatures are low, Captain Houston Brown has been finding plenty of Mackerel and Trout. Captain Don Cochran has had no trouble getting Trout, Mackerel and Bluefish. Captain Tim Brady caught a limit of Trout and Black Drum using live shrimp. Snook and Redfish action will pick up next month. For now, most fishermen argue that if you want action try for Trout, Mackerel, Sheepshead and Pompano. Watch out for extra low water on new and full moon tides combined with strong northeast winds.

Capt. Bill Lindsay lives in Chokoloskee and has been fishing in the Everglades National Park for 27 years. In 1992 he was Master Angler of the MET Tournament.

FLAMINGO OPEN AGAIN

The National Park Service has announced that full facilities are available at Flamingo including fuel sales, Marina store, canoe rentals, and boat tours. For info, phone 695-3101.

COLD WAR RELIC ON VIEW

National Park Service has opened the historic Nike Hercules Missile Base HM-69 located near Homestead to the public for the first time since it was turned over to the park in 1979. The park is offering guided tours of one of the best preserved relics of the Cold War in Florida. This significant historical site is physically the best overall example of the Nation's missile defense system close to Cuba and remains virtually the same as it was when official use of the site was terminated in 1979. This Missile Base was built by the United States Army Corps of Engineers in 1963 at the height of the Cold War, immediately following the Cuban Missile Crisis of October, 1962.

The interpretive tours will be held every Saturday at 2:00 p.m. through March 28, 2009. The tours are free but park entrance fees apply. In order to join the tour, please reserve a space by signing up at the parks Ernest F. Coe Visitor Center, or by calling 305-242-7700.

VIP Report

Why Florida?

When relatives visited recently, they tried to understand why I like Florida, what it is about this place that makes it special to me, why I keep returning. I had a hard time explaining it. How do you capture how a culture different from your home can be enchanting?

The single biggest reason for me is how well the elderly are treated here. There's respectful consideration for the aged that I don't see as often at home in Massachusetts. The United States worships youth, but that's not so much the case here. Retired old folks, even if they're only snowbirds, here only for the winter, are welcomed. They contribute a lot to Florida's tourism driven economy, and they don't go unappreciated.

I find the elderly culture here is quite different from up north. There's robustness to it. It's routine to see whitehaired folks riding bicycles and often three-wheelers. Walkers abound. Tennis courts, swimming pools, golf courses, and shuffleboard courts teem with activity.

Here at the park's Gulf Coast Visitor Center we often have people in their 60s, 70s, 80s, and sometimes even 90s, canoeing, kayaking, motor boating, fishing and camping out in the 10,000 Islands. One group of elderly women spends as long as two weeks tenting on the islands. The youngest is 66, the oldest nearly 80. I find them an inspiration and wish everyone could be so in love with the outdoors, so in love with their lives. *(See "Paddling" article on page 10)*. In the 1960s President John Fitzgerald Kennedy

In the 1960s President John Fitzgerald Kennedy captured this kind of spirit. One of his favorite words was "vigor." Every plan he proposed, everything he asked people to do, he requested they do "with vigor." He gave it his Boston pronunciation – "vigah" – but he was always understood.

What I see in Florida more so than at home is enthusiasm for life such as President Kennedy embodied. That's ironic considering he came from Massachusetts. Even with its largest concentration of universities and colleges in the world, Boston can learn a thing or two from Florida.


MUSEUM NEWS

Recipe for Good Eating

Seafood Casserole by Sunny Burke



lb crabmeat
pieces celery, chopped
cup chopped green pepper
jar (20z) diced pimento pieces

lb cooked medium shrimp, cut in ½" pieces
medium onion, chopped fine
can (4oz) mushroom stems

1 cup mayonnaise ¹/₂ tsp. salt 1 cup milk dash Worcestershire sauce

1/4 cup dry bread crumbs

Cook rice. Combine crab, shrimp, celery, onion, pepper, mushroom, pimento. Combine mayo, milk, salt, Worcestershire sauce and stir into seafood mix. Stir in rice. Put in $9^{\circ}x13^{\circ}$ pan. Sprinkle with bread crumbs. Bake at 375° for 40 minutes. Serves 6.


BIBLE STUDY

A friend of mine has great courage. Six months ago her husband told her he wanted a divorce (a younger woman!), then she



found out a few weeks later that she had breast cancer. She's been undergoing chemotherapy since then and during the Christmas holidays her father passed away. She's been an inspiration to me. This is one of her recent notes that was posted on her website (reprinted with permission).

I needed to clear my head today and there is no better way than to go on a bike ride. The roads were pretty clear of snow so I ventured out for a 15-mile ride. The weather was cold and damp and about 5 miles before I got home I started thinking about my Dad and practicing my well-honed skill of cycling while crying. It works pretty well, the wind just blows the tears away from your eyes. Anyhow I was also thinking " man is it friggin' cold out and my feet are cold". Just then the clouds parted a little and this intense sun came out and seared its warmth right into my body. I had a very strong feeling that my Dad was with me just then. Then about 2 miles later, still riding along, I see something lying in the snow in the ditch. It's a child's 8 ball, you know the one that answers all of your questions? It's sitting with the #8 side straight up and I think "that is so weird that I have to check it out". I consider asking it a question but quickly decide against that but opt instead just to turn it over and see if it gives me some vague generalization about my life or my future ahead. I turn it over and watch the triangle right itself in the murky blue water and what does it say? " OUTLOOK GOOD"Right On!

PADDLING AGAIN ON THE WILDERNESS WATERWAY

Once again we have enjoyed the challenges and beauties of the Wilderness Waterway, thanks to the National Park Service and the kind people of Chokoloskee and Everglades City.

"We" are a group of mature women who like to paddle our own canoes and kayaks and camp in wild, lovely places. We gained a bit of notoriety last year in this yery publication when one canoe swamped in heavy Gulf swells, and several people camping on Mormon Key (including Jason Sine) rescued the two paddlers, the gear and the canoe. That hadn't happened to either paddler in 50 years (we are "mature"), and it certainly didn't happen this year.

Capt. Wright (Everglades Area Tours) efficiently transported 4 of us, our 2 canoes, and all our gear, to Broad River campsite (not Highland Beach, due to adverse winds of a cold front) for the start of the adventure. Next day, we explored the Nightmare for a couple of hours before going on to Highland Beach.

The wind was still strong after the front, so we had to "line" the canoes along the shore to a good campsite. Shelling is always good there, and we watched a bald eagle, sharks, porpoises and pilot whales, even took plaster casts of bobcat tracks.

After a cold front dries out the sky, the stargazing is good in the Everglades; we could see all the usual constellations, plus Scorpio in the south. The phosphorescent comb-jellies were less numerous than last year, but still fascinating.

A full moon rising on the 10th was a special sight from Darwin's Place, and we explored Gopher Key Creek nearby. Even a small motorboat can access this creek which is a treat for birdwatchers; we saw spoonbills, every kind of heron, ibises, redshouldered hawks and 'gators in all sizes. Walking the canoes across one of the flats in Chokoloskee Bay gave us a few surprises in the form of lazy stingrays and orange-tipped sea-hares in our path.

Coincidentally, all four of us learned in Girl Scouts how to paddle 10-12 miles in a day and make a comfortable camp for the night. Living on the chickees poses challenges of space and loss to the water, but fills ones sleep with a gentle kind of "surroundsound."

As usual, we found that fellow campers and paddlers were friendly and interesting, each with a story to tell, and ready to share tips, recipes and a helping hand. Thanks for the lovely weather all that week; we hope to see you next year!
