

NATIONAL PARK PLANS by Marya Repko

Our opinions were taken into account after the heated public meetings in the summer of 2007 when many locals voiced their opposition to some of the



alternatives in the first draft of the General Management Plan for Everglades National Park. There were over 1000 written comments! And, Everglades City Council passed a resolution that Alternative A (which advocated "no change") was the only one supportable.

The new document "Revised Preliminary Alternatives" deals only with Marine Waters (including the construction of a new Visitor Center in ECity and development in Flamingo).

The 2007 Alternatives had a strong emphasis on prohibiting or restricting motor boats. The 2009 Alternatives are much more friendly.

There are new suggestions about education and extra Wilderness Waterways. There is also a proviso that motor boats should use "common courtesy and respect for other recreationists".

ENP Newsletter #5 which details the four Alternatives is available online at <u>www.nps.gov/ever</u> or you can get a paper copy by visiting the Gulf Coast Ranger Station at the park or City Hall.

There will be a workshop at ECity School on **Tuesday**, **March 31**, from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. The deadline for written comments (which can also be sent by email) is **Friday**, **May 15**.



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On Short Approach

CCAA meeting - March 9, 2009

Permits for wetlands mitigation have been approved for the extension of the taxiway. The next step is to apply for funding from the FAA.

Bids for the construction of the new hangars have been received. The County budget office will take at least two months to process before the final selection is made due to notice posting and public hearings. Design bids have gone out for replacement of the law enforcement residential structure. Application will be made to FEMA for cost reimbursement after construction.

The Board of County Commissioners Airport Budget Workshop is scheduled for Friday, March 27, at 9AM at the BCC offices in Naples.



Exotic Visitors

Everglades airport continues to be a popular destination for many fliers at any time, not only during the monthly pancake breakfasts. For example, spotted last week were two Chinese CJ-6 airplanes arriving from Tampa.

The CJ-6 (Chuji Jiaolian-6 or ChuJiao-6) is the basic trainer aircraft designed and built by the Nanchang Aircraft Factory. The wings of the CJ-6 were revised to have prominent dihedral, but, like the Soviet Yak-18A redesign, the CJ-6 retained the 145hp M-11ER radial engine. In 1961, an improved CJ-6A gained approval and was produced from 1962 until 1965, using a 285hp Quzhou Huosai-6A (Chinese copy of the AI-14R) piston engine.

More than 2,000 examples are believed to have been produced, with tens of thousands of Peoples Liberation Army student pilots trained on the aircraft. CJ-6As were exported to nations such as Albania, Bangladesh, Cambodia, Tanzania and Zambia under the designation PT-6. An armed version, the CJ-6B, was produced between 1964 and 1966, possibly equipped with a 300hp HS-6D engine.

Recipe for Good Eating

Chicken Spinach Pilaf by Phill Lawry

- 1¹/₂ Cups Uncooked White Rice
- 2 Cans Chicken Broth
- 3 Chicken Bouillon Cubes

Stick Butter
Medium Onion Chopped
Pkg Frozen Chopped Spinach

Defrost Frozen Spinach, and pat out excess moisture with paper towels.

Meanwhile, back at the stove ...

Melt Butter in saucepan (DON'T BURN IT!)

Brown the White Rice in the Butter (DON'T BURN IT!)

Put in the Chopped Onion iIf you put the onion in first it will release too much moisture, and the rice won't brown). Add in the Chicken Broth. Crumble up the Bouillon Cubes and stir in. Plop in the thawed out Spinach.

Stir, cover, and simmer on low heat until rice is soft and fluffy, about 25 minutes (DON'T BURN IT!). When it looks like the rice is done to suit you, fluff with fork and serve.

Don't worry that it will come out too chickeney-flavored with the broth and bouillon cubes. It will be just right. Feel free to use home-made chicken stock and fresh-chopped spinach if you are a fanatic.

Off the Shelf - Book Review "An Everglades Providence" by Jack E. Davis reviewed by Marya Repko

We know about the life of Marjory Stoneman Douglas from her autobiography *Voice of the River* but author Jack Davis of the University of Florida has produced an academic study of not only her amazing career but the parallel environmental awareness that has taken place during Marjory's long life (she waas born in 1890 and lived in Florida from 1915 until 1998). Subtitled "Marjory Stoneman Douglas and the American Environmental Century", he traces her life as well as the changes she saw (and significantly influenced) in southern Florida.

The author spoke at the MSD Festival hosted by the Museum during February and signed copies are available there for sale. It's a large tome, filled with a wealth of information ...the book is a keeper for dipping into and going back to for reference.

I lived for just one summer out in Ochopee at a location known as "the Old Turner River Place" while waiting for my small houseboat to be re-located to a place in Copeland.

The "Turner River Place" has an interesting history of having been a place where the Caloosa Indians many years ago had used it as a camping place as they traveled through the river southward to the bays in the Ten Thousand Islands where they found a plentiful supply of clams and oysters as well as fish which were the main source of their foods. On these excursions they also traded their wares at the Old Smallwood Store on Chokoloskee Island. In later years the Indians of the Miccosukee and Seminole Tribes also used the place for the same purposes. There were the remnants of huge shell mounds from where they had opened their oysters and clams scattered about the area.

There were still a lot of the citrus, guava, grapefruit and two varieties of avocado trees at the time that I was there. Fish such as brim and bass were plentiful out back in the creek.

I believe that you could find out more information about the area at our Museum of the Everglades should you wish.

During the short time that I was there I got to know most of the members of a family of Seminole Indians. They were all very friendly except for one male member who was very quiet and elusive. I knew his name at the time but it now eludes me.

One day I was told that that particular Indian man had died and that he had been buried already and when I asked to learn more I was told that when an Indian dies that all of their earthly belongings were buried with them. And that is what makes this story so interesting because a few weeks later while watching my two young daughters play out in the front of the house, I looked up suddenly and there

coming down the quarter mile driveway, I saw this particular old Indian with his gig and "croaker"* sack that he always carried to put his fish in. He was very tall and thin in stature and his trousers were always too short. He wore an old fringed jacket over his Indian shirt and a wide flop brimmed hat. Just about every day he would come down that long path to pass the side of the house going to the creek in the back through the guava trees to catch his fish. I looked away for a second not thinking much about it until I remembered that he had died. Upon looking up again he was not there. This spooked me enough that I hurried the girls back onto the screen porch where I stood and pondered the situation. I even went down the path in back of the house so that I could tell whether or not he was down there. He was not. I watched for the rest of the day to see if he would come back by, but I never saw him again.

What?? Did he have a twin? Did someone steal his clothes? Or did I see a ghost? There was only one road into and out of there.

I later mentioned this phenomenon to one of the women in the tribe and she said to me very seriously that he must have left something that belonged to him down at the creek. I have thought about this many times since and wondered: are there ghosts among us?

*A "croaker" is a type of fish that makes a croaking sound from its swim bladder as it is pulled out onto dry land. Thus the name for the burlap bags that the Indians used.

TURNER RIVER TRIPS

The National Park Service is celebrating Florida Archeology Month with special boat trips to the Turner River on **Saturday & Sunday, March 28/29**.

The Turner River Complex is a prehistoric shell works site covering 30 acres. Smithsonian Anthropologist Ales Hrdlička, who visited the site in 1922, considered the Turner River Mounds to be "the most noteworthy group of shell heaps and mounds in the entire region" In 1955, William H. Sears, of the Florida State Museum, secured permission from the owners (Ted Smallwood's family) to conduct excavations at the site.

Motorized boat tours will leave at 1:00, 1:30, 3:00 & 3:30 pm and will make a thirty minute stop at the site. Visitors should arrive at least 15 minutes before departure.

The tours cost \$35 per adult (regular boat tour price). Space is limited to six persons per trip.

In addition to the motorized tours, there will also be a ranger-led canoe trip to the mounds. People can either bring their own canoe/kayak or rent one. Canoe rental is 26.50 (includes tax). Canoes can hold 2 or 3 people. Singles can pay for 1/2 of a canoe.

On Sunday, March 29, there will be a special boat tour that includes a stop and short walk on Sandfly Island, another important prehistoric mound site. This will be the 2:30 boat tour. This trip will accommodate 46 people. The tour costs \$26.50 (regular boat tour price).

NATIONAL PARK PLANS

Next Phase in Planning for Everglades National Park Revised Preliminary Alternatives for Marine Waters by Linda Friar, NPS Public Information Officer



During March and April Everglades National Park invites you to participate in one or all of seven public meetings to review and provide input on revised alternatives for managing the park's marine areas that include Florida Bay and its Gulf Coast waters including the Wilderness Waterway and Ten-thousand Islands. (Note that all of the information discussed here can be found at the park's web site, <u>www.nps.gov/ever</u>.)

The alternatives being presented are the next step in a comprehensive revision of the park General Management Plan (GMP). The GMP is a long-term plan that provides the park with guidance on how to manage the complex resources and visitor use in this 2500 square mile park. The new plan will replace the 1979 Master Plan. The current planning effort began in 2003 and is expected to be completed in 2011. Once completed the GMP becomes the basis of management decision making over the next 20 to 30 years,

All national parks are required by law to use have a GMP that has been developed with input from the public and is used to guide management decisions. In addition, the park planning process requires development and consideration of a range of alternatives including how these alternatives meet the mission of the park both in resource protection and visitor recreational opportunities. The planning process includes multiple opportunities for a broad range of visitors, stakeholders, and community leaders to provide input into this long range planning document. The GMP outlines the long term goals a park wants to achieve and articulates how it will accomplish those goals, based on the legislative authority that created the park.

The meetings in March and April will present management alternatives specifically for the marine areas of the park. These areas were initially presented as part of draft alternatives presented to the public in May 2007. In response to the high level of public interest in the marine resources of the park and concerns expressed on the management alternatives presented in May 2007, the park committed to conduct additional scientific analysis on prop scarring and boat use of the marine areas (completed in 2009 and available on the park website.) This new data along with the public comments gathered in 2007 public meetings has been incorporated into revised marine alternatives being presented now to allow for additional public input. Once the preferred marine alternative is selected it will be incorporated into a draft GMP, expected to be released for public review and comment in 2010 and finalized in 2011.

These four draft marine alternatives being presented now cover a range of management strategies that incorporate a set of common elements included in every alternative and a mix of management zones applied to specific marine areas to achieve a balance of protection and recreation in different areas of the park. A complete discussion on each of the alternatives and the differences in each is described in the GMP Newsletter #5 and the two scientific studies that can be found at the park's web site, <u>www.nps.gov/ever</u>. Follow the links to "Everglades National Park General Management Plan and "GMP Documents". Once the newsletter is accessed through the website, the public can provide comments online. The schedule and locations of all seven GMP meetings is also available in the Newsletter. Everglades City School will host the second meeting from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. on **Tuesday, March 31**. All meetings begin at 5:30 p.m. with informal discussions between the public and park staff. At 6 p.m. a formal park service presentation will be made followed by public comments.


FAK IN THE NEWS
