Farewell to Bob Carter

Only a week before he passed away on Easter Sunday, Bob Carter was feted by the community at a dinner on April 4 hosted by Everglades First Baptist Church.

Bob was much loved and a staunch supporter of First Baptist; a humble man who "never said a bad word about anyone or anything". He was reliable and diligent; one of those invaluable people who get things done in the background without fuss. "If somebody needed something, he would be the first guy there", said a neighbor. Other residents said that "he was very friendly with a great sense of humor" and "he was always the 'ready' person to do things".

At the dinner, Mayor Sammy Hamilton presented Bob with a framed certificate proclaiming April 4 as "Bob Carter Day". Among the reasons for this honor were that "it would have been Bob Carter who went up that mountain, who built the Ark". Bob also received a plaque from First Baptist for his many years of faith and for his devotion and service.

Robert Carter, Jr., was born in Paducah, Kentucky, on August 15, 1928, and worked as a tool & die maker for the Ford Motor Company near Detroit. After retirement in 1991, he and wife Jo headed south and discovered ECity on Christmas Eve. They made their home at the VR Corp near the bridge on Collier Avenue and became stalwart members of the park. Jo told the *Rapper* that Bob enjoyed fishing and "doing something for someone".

Bob leaves his wife Josephine M. Carter of 45 years and children Marilyn

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Barton (a seasonal resident in ECity), Evelyn Cabell of West Virginia, Nina Krupkin and Charles Riffle (both of Michigan) plus 8 grandchildren and 3 great-granddaughters.





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
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FLORIDA FLORA

Spanish Omlette

Maybe add a little oil if you think it needs it. Return potatoes to pan. Beat eggs in bowl and season to your taste. Add eggs to spuds, pepper onion mixture. Cook until kinda half set

Add grated cheese on top. Stick under broiler until cheese melted/golden brown (what you think you like).

MEMORIES

"Greek Sponge Boats in Everglades City" by Barbara Hoffman Daniels

One year around 1938, the Greek Sponge Boats had made their annual visit to our docks uptown on the Barron River and they docked at the west end of Broadway, which was their assigned location rather than the Guide Boat docks in front of the Rod & Gun Club.

When these big, clumsy-looking boats arrived in town you could smell them because of the sponges that were newly harvested and hung from the lines strung up and down from the tall masts. Definitely not a pleasant smell.

This time it seems that my father, who was a diesel engineer, was asked to work on one of the boat's engines which he agreed to do. I remember at the supper table that night him telling my mother about having been invited to have lunch with the crew where everyone was given a spoon and offered whatever was in one big pot which was set in the middle of all and all ate from it. It seems that my father graciously turned down the offer but thanked them just the same.

We had a good laugh about this event.

When these boats were in at the docks, my brother and a friend would climb the cocoanut trees and trade the cocoanuts to the Greek fishermen for a loaf of "hard tack" which was their home-made bread that would break your teeth, but it was tasty.

They would sometimes give us kids a sponge to take home to our parents but they were not highly appreciated because of the smell. We had to hang them on the clothes line for a month before they could be brought into the house

Our jail always saw a little action during those times because those "foreigners", as we called them, just could not seem to comply with our City laws and invariably would fight among themselves when they had had a few alcoholic beverages to celebrate being ashore.

As unpleasant as the odor from the boats and sponges was, we never-the-less always looked forward to their coming as it offered a little excitement in our small town.

Barbara Hoffman Daniels grew up in Everglades City. She lived for over thirty years in the Big Cypress where she had the experience of seeing what our animals are really like.


HELP KEEP SR-29 TIDY

Discounts at Parks

If you are planning to visit any National Parks and are 62 years old or over, you can get reduced fees if you apply for a Senior Pass which lasts your lifetime. There are also annual passes for families. You can get the passes at the Gulf Coast Ranger Station (or any NPS park).

Have you been "TWIC'ed"?

By now, most of our fishing captains in this area are familiar with TWIC (Transportation Worker Identification Credential).

If not, you may need to apply for a TWIC card. This program is the result of Congress directing the federal government to issue security credentials to individuals who hold Coast Guard licenses and/or those who have unescorted access to secure areas.

Captains of fishing vessels in the National Park will be required to present their cards to authorized personnel. The fee for the card is \$132.50 and is valid for 5 years. You will need to first make an appointment and bring documentation with you. The closest offices are located in Miami and Port Everglades.


