NEW STREET LIGHTS by Patricia Huff

At the September 5, 2008, City Council Meeting the Mayor announced that the Collier County MPO (Metropolitan Planning Organization) had decided to award the City funding for more street lighting.

It looks as if the city will be getting new lights on Collier Avenue as you come into town and around the corner to City Hall. The lights will be much higher with a single post and reflect out to each side of the median. The old historic 1920s street lamps that have adorned the city streets since the days of Barron Collier will be removed and re-located to other streets in town.

PANTHER FENCE

The Florida Department of Transportation has postponed the public workshop scheduled for Tuesday, June 2. This was to have given the public an opportunity to review a proposed "panther fence" which the Defenders of Wildlife are requesting to be constructed along U.S. 41 (Tamiami Trail) from Bass Road east for a little over 2 miles.

A Transportation Enhancement grant has been received to do a feasibility study to determine the impacts and other factors regarding the installation of a fence on both the north and the south side of the Trail.

There have been a number of vehicle incidences resulting in the death of panthers along this corridor, and the Defenders of Wildlife are seeking ways to prevent more deaths to this endangered animal.

In addition to the proposed fence, an underground crossing is also being discussed.

The workshop was to engage the public and receive feedback on this proposal. The FDOT will reschedule the meeting, probably in July, so watch the *Rapper* for more news.

Farewell to a Friend

E. Glenn Tucker, 64, passed away suddenly on May 24 after collapsing at his home in Marco Island. He was a partner in the law firm Rhodes, Tucker, & Garretson.

He was known and liked in Everglades City because he owned property here and was a genuinely nice person.

Mayor Sammy Hamilton said that Glenn was a longtime friend, the nicest man you could ever meet; he would help you whenever he could without any worry about money.

City Councilor Tammy Smallwood said that he would "step out of his way to help anyone" and that his passing was a great loss.

Bill Cull, president of the Captain's Table condo association said that Glenn had served with him for over 20 years and that "his friendship and advice were always available. He will be missed by all that had the pleasure to know him!"

Glenn was a Marco City Councilor and took part in a large number of other civic or professional activities there and throughout the County. He moved to Marco in 1978 and soon became involved in community affairs more than half his life ago.

He is survived by his wife Bonnie and four step-children. A service will be held on **Friday**, **May 29**, at Marco Presbyterian Church, 875 West Elkcam Circle. Gifts in his memory may be sent to the Marco Island YMCA Tennis Program, 101 Sand Hill Street, Marco Island, FL, 34145.



History of the Reach Out^{*} Thrift Shop

It's difficult to think about what we did before the Thrift Shop opened in 2002. Fran Tifft first started dreaming of a Thrift Shop about 10 years ago. Working closely with people in need, Fran together with Chris Ammerman (then President of Reach Out) and Helen Bryan (Project Manager) knew about families that would benefit from a low-priced local store.

The Thrift Shop started out in the back inner room of the Everglades Community Center. Plans were laid out. The late L.D. Isles built 2 x 4 shelves to hold donations that were received. In short time, the room couldn't hold all the donations ("items were jammed packed to the ceiling," Helen remembers). When the Seniors' lunchroom was no longer needed, the Thrift Shop was able to work out of the adjoining room three days a week when the room was not in use for other activities. Pastor Morris Dantin built two hanging portable dress racks which were very much needed to move clothes back and forth between rooms.

Eventually, the Thrift Shop was able to secure additional space when Gene Wooten so kindly allowed the store to operate out of his garage warehouse on South Copeland. With many volunteers cleaning out the warehouse, carpenters Jim Bryan and Ben Strunk enclosed the front area and built additional clothing racks and shelving (donated by Jim Webb). Community volunteers cleaned greasy floors, then painted. It would not have been possible without the cooperation of the Mayor and City staff to make the move.

After Hurricane Wilma flooded the warehouse in October 2005, and again with the cooperation of Mayor Hamilton providing the needed space, the Thrift Shop was back in operation at the Community Center; this time the move was permanent.

Fran often comments that our little Thrift Shop has exceeded all her expectations: the donations are plentiful (given by generous full and part time residents), the facility has the perfect location, and the volunteers have been tremendous. So many people are now involved in sorting and displaying the items for sale. Today both Helen Bryan and Fran Tifft manage the Thrift Shop.

Each volunteer has contributed so much in making the Thrift Shop successful; and, if items such as furniture are too large to keep, Reach Out helps coordinate the donation to someone in need.

One of the best benefits is that all the funds received from the sales go directly back to help individuals and families in the community.

Fishing Report

Big snook can be found on the edge of the Gulf and in the backcountry. These fish will hit top water plugs well during the

morning and late in the afternoon hours. During the middle of the day, go deep with jigs or at least cast into the shady areas under the mangroves. A lot of bait is washed down the rivers at this time of year. On the falling tide, tarpon will feed late in the day in these passes. Snapper and trout fishing is productive as long as you know where to find them. Tripletail fishing is worth it if the weather is calm. Mangrove shorelines and the edges of the flats are good places to hook redfish; just try to get in before those afternoon thunder storms. Offshore permit, grouper and snapper fishing on the shallow Gulf wrecks should remain strong.

BIG CYPRESS NEWS

We had the following press release from Big Cypress National Preserve:

Effective 4:30 pm on May 21, 2009 the ban on open fires in the backcountry is rescinded and the Bear Island Unit including Bear Island Campground are reopened for public recreational use.


Beginning on Monday, June 1, 2009 all units within the Preserve that allow for wheeled Off-Road Vehicle (ORV) access will be closed for 60 days with access being re-opened on Friday, July 31, 2009.

The Recreational Off-Road Vehicle Management Plan calls for a sixty-day seasonal closure to allow a period free from resource pressures related to ORV use. The off-road vehicle closure within Big Cypress National Preserve was first instituted in 2002. Landowners that hold special use permits to access their private properties within the Preserve will retain continued access to their property along approved routes.

As of Monday March 23, 2009 the Zone 4 airboat access within Big Cypress National Preserve has been closed due to low water conditions. The unit will remain closed for the mandatory 60 days or as soon as water levels allow the area to be opened following the 60 day closure. Due to continued low water levels the unit remains closed until further notice.

Zone 4 of the Stairsteps Unit of the Preserve allows for access via airboats only. The Bear Island, Turner River and Corn Dance Units, and Zones 2 and 3 of the Stairsteps Unit provide for access by specified, wheeled ORVs.

We've highlighted the Royal Poinciana in the past, but this year these trees with their spectacular color seem to have taken over this area. The brilliant "flamboyant" or "flame" trees are bright orange or red and a native of Madagascar while the more rare "yellow-gold" trees are native to Brazil. There are quite a few examples in our area and throughout South Florida. The Royal Poinciana will flower most of May and June with a better flowering display after a dry season - which may be the reason they seem so incredible this year. In the hot summer months the flowers fall and leave a colorful carpet on your lawn; the feathery leaves provide an umbrella of shade until the winter cold sets in. The Royal Poinciana may be grown from seeds after the long seed pod turns brown and falls from the tree. I try to collect them before we cut the grass and give away to those interested in growing one in their yard. In the Caribbean, the seed pods are used as a percussion instrument, the maraca.

OUCH!

The dreaded Deer Fly ("yellow fly") has been sneaking up and biting us since the rains came. A tip that was shared with us recently is to smear exposed skin with Vicks Vapor Rub An



skin with Vicks Vapor Rub. Apparently, it's one of the few things that they don't like.




