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

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


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Recipe for Good Eating

1 cup canned pumpkin 3/4 tsp salt ½ tsp ground cloves ½ tsp cinnamon


½ tsp nutmeg

HOUSEHOLD TIPS

I had some really good pork & cabbage "pot stickers" recently that I bought in the Asian grocery store in Towne Center mall on the Trail just south of Government Center in Naples. The store has everything – snacks, soups, sauces, fresh and frozen foods. I discovered "Shanghai Nuts", peanuts covered in a crispy garlic coating. I also took home some vegetarian dumplings that look pretty good. Report from Phill Lawry.

Clean woodwork and walls with a mixture of 1 cup white distilled vinegar, 1 cup baking soda, 1/2 cup ammonia and 1 gallon warm water. Wipe on with a sponge or damp (not wet) towel. This will also clean mildew off porch railings and outside doors (be careful not to drip on floor since it will bleach the surface).

TREES STOLEN!

Ten Thousand Islands Refuge

LOCAL HISTORY

The slash pine described in our Florida Flora column (see page 10) was logged in the Big Cypress during the 1940s and 1950s by the C. J. Jones Lumber Company. At the height of operations, there was the sawmill pictured above on the east side of SR-29 and the village of Jerome which housed the workers on the west side of the road.

When pine was found north of the Fakahatchee, Jones also cut there in cooperation with the Lee Tidewater Cypress Company who had laid track to the area to carry logs out.

The pine was logged out in the mid-1950s and the sawmill caught on fire as it was being cleaned up. The little Methodist chapel in Jerome was donated to the Baptist mission in Everglades and moved to its present location opposite the school.

Off the Shelf – Book Review "Florida Cowboys, Keepers of the Last Frontier" Photographs by Carlton Ward, Jr

This beautiful coffee-table book includes a volume of photographs taken by an eighth generation Floridian from a pioneering ranching family. And, it is a story book written by a variety of authors and divided into the following three sections: 1. Pioneer Heritage, including articles about America's First Cowman, Indian Cowboys, and the Cracker Trail. Susan Lykes Mueller writes about her family's cattle trade with Cuba. 2. Ranching Today covers our State's current ranches, including stories about Florida rodeos and grass-fed beef. 3. Common Ground discusses the environment, ranchlands conservation, water management and game species, among other topics.

Patrick D. Smith (author of A Land Remembered) wrote the Forward and Florida Commissioner of Agriculture Charles H. Bronson the Preface to the book. Ward's photography is spectacular and the stories interesting and informative. The format and style reminds me of Rob Storter's Crackers in the Glade. Instead of personal drawings, Carlton Ward brings the stories of the rancher and cattleman to life through his colorful photography. His work has been published in various journals including Smithsonian, Africa Geographic and Outdoor Photographer.

FLORIDA FLORA

South Florida Slash Pine (Pinus elliotti var. densa)

The South Florida Slash Pine is a dominant tree in the woods of this area. The Dade County variety "densa" has longer needles and smaller cones than other types of slash pine. With its long-lasting, dense wood, it was the primary wood used by Barron Collier when building many of our homes here in Everglades City. Because of their high resin content, slash pines have been used for railroad ties and pilings.

For landscaping, they need a lot of sun and should be planted at least 5 feet away from the canopy of other trees. It has been noted that these pines are very sensitive to foot traffic so do not plant them where you park, drive or use the lawn mowers. You may mulch with pine needles but keep them away from the base of the trunk to avoid rot. Slash pine will need water when you first plant them (several times a week) but after they are established, you will not need to water. This is a very drought-tolerant native tree for your yard.


