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## CITY COUNCIL REPORT by Marya Repko

Mayor Sammy Hamilton welcomed everyone to the New Year and said that he hoped to continue to bring us good news. He thanked householders for not putting out garden trash over the holiday and said that he was proud of how neat & tidy the City looked. He reported that he was going to meetings in Tallahassee on behalf of the City this week.

A proclamation was read and passed by Council to declare January 8 as "Deaconess Day" in recognition of Harriet Bedell's official Feast Day. 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# Fishing Report

As I write this the temperature is in the 40's. As far as I'm concerned, this is the kiss of death. Snook and tarpon fishing can't get more difficult. Some fish, however, can still be caught, especially if you soak shrimp in deep holes. Sheepshead move into shallow water at this time of year and are great to eat. Small black drum also feed well during cold snaps. Trout and redfish are still being caught, both in the backcountry and on the edge of the Gulf. Before this cold front came in, Captain Ned Small caught a nice snook and a "respectable" tarpon on fly tackle. Captain Becky Campbell has also been producing some nice fish on her charters. Captain Don Cochran was catching mackerel, snook and some cobia when he could get out to the shallow Gulf wrecks. On my last charter we released a 32" snook that hit a top water plug. As soon as it warms up a little, fishing will improve.

# FLORIDA FLORA

### Bald Cypress (Taxodium distichum)

We are featuring the wonders of our parks and preserves in this issue and it seems appropriate to highlight one of the most magnificent trees, the Bald Cypress. This time of year they have lost most of their needles (leaves) which is why they are named "bald". But in the spring and summer, the new growth on these trees are pale green and look so fresh and alive. They grow to at least 70 feet tall. On the Fakahatchee Boardwalk (Big Cypress Bend) you will find some of the largest Cypress and a reminder of how prolific they once were in our forest. The Bald Cypress have a large, straight trunk with reddish bark. The pointed "knees" can be seen surrounding them standing in the water. The Bald Cypress is very stable and strong against our high winds and hurricanes. Enjoy these native trees as you walk through our swamps.



# **VIP Report**

Another Season, Another Year by Shirley Leonard



Well, the holidays are over. What's to look forward to now? Another tourist season, of course!

Staff at the Everglades National Park's visitor center in Everglades City have noticed an uptick in the number of visitors. On Christmas Day there were 295. The day after had 766! Winter naturally brings an increase in tourists. The visitor center in December had a total of 7,203 visitors compared to June which had 3,027.

On December 26 about 300 people departed from boat ramps in the area to camp in The Ten Thousand Islands area of the park. For a couple of days all sites were filled to capacity and many would-be campers had to paddle to islands outside the park to camp.

Hopefully visitors to the park will also visit local businesses such as restaurants, lodgings, air boat tours, fishing guides and gift shops. All will welcome additional business, and we all hope 2010 will be a better year for economic growth than 2009 -locally, nationally, and worldwide.

This will be my third year as a volunteer for the park. I am one of approximately 140,000 volunteers nationwide. The National Park Service division that oversees its volunteers is the VIP program, short for Volunteers in Parks. Volunteer opportunities in National Parks cover a broad range of activities. Volunteers at Everglades work wherever help is needed and come from all walks of life. Many volunteers are retirees who have interests and expertise in all sorts of areas such as teaching, woodworking, boating, landscaping, canoeing, public speaking, nursing, kayaking, fishing, painting, birding and engineering. I, for example, worked 20+ years as a daily newspaper reporter. That makes writing this column a natural for me. It's something I enjoy.

# Antique Air Aficionados

The first commercial airline carried passengers from St Pete to Tampa in 1914, only 11 years after the Wright Brothers first flew! And, in 1923, the Ta-Miami Air Line started operations between Tampa and Miami, in the same year that construction of the road was begun across the Glades.

Air history goes on. In the 1930s Opa-Locka was opened as a Naval air base; Eastern and Pan Am were founded. Newspapers were flown to Sanibel by seaplane in the 1939 "Dawn Patrol". World War II training bases sprang up in Southern Florida's clement climate at Fort Myers, Buckingham, Clewiston, and Naples.

Bring back the old warriors and dare-devils!

That's exactly what the Antique Air Aficionados are trying to do on **Saturday**, **January 23**, when Everglades Airpark hosts a Fly-In from 10:00 a.m. to noon. You might see this PT-17 World War II training craft which appeared at an Everglades Fly-In last winter (photo thanks to Phill Lawry).

# **Off the Shelf – Winter Reading**

### **Building in Southern Florida** by Marya Repko

"To succeed in living in the tropics, settlers from the North must adapt themselves to new surroundings rather than attempt to change the surroundings to suit themselves." ... "green lawns do not belong in the tropics."

Two of the interesting early residents I've been reading about were biologists Charles Torrey Simpson (1846-1832) and John C. Gifford (1870-1947). Both were advocates of preserving native plants and fitting into the environment.

And, they both had definite ideas about how to build for tropical living, before the days of air conditioning and mosquito spraying.

Simpson, who moved to Lemon City (near Miami) in 1905, built his own house of Dade County pine. The living area was elevated above the ground on the second floor in case of flooding, a design that was considered strange at the time. There was a steep roof "which has never leaked seriously in the worst hurricane".

In contrast, Gifford built flat roofs and said that, in heavy storms, the wind blows the water off. He suggests using corrugated iron covered with a thin layer of concrete so that it is not hot and noisy. Rather than a large house, he clustered small buildings around a central patio.

Among the titles to search for in the library are *On Preserving Tropical Florida*, a collection of Gifford's essays printed in 1972, and *In Lower Florida Wilds* by Simpson in 1920 (which is also available as a PDF on <u>www.books.google.com</u>).




