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CITY COUNCIL REPORT

Mayor Sammy Hamilton said at the meeting on November 9 that he will send a letter to residents giving more detail about issues such as funding from South Florida Water Management District. He praised Big Cypress Basin director Clarence Tears who is retiring but will stay in touch with the City.

The Mayor recognized Monica Aranegui, district representative for Congressman Mario Diaz-Balart, who will continue to serve us when new Congressman David Riviera takes over in January.

The Mayor was pleased to announce that replicas of the old globe street lamps are being made and will be installed in places around the City where it is dark, such as near the school.

He reminded us about flu shots on November 17 (see page 3) which are less expensive at \$25 than they were last year.

Councilor Todd Johnson announced that Bob, the friendly UPS driver for this area, is in the hospital with heart problems but is doing well.

AIRPORT BOARD MEETING

The Airport Authority Advisory Board met in Everglades City Hall on



Monday, November 8, in Council Chambers. On the agenda was an update of the Everglades Airpark. Chairman Chris Curry stated that he had met with Mayor Sammy Hamilton two weeks ago at which time Mayor Hamilton confirmed that Everglades City wanted to take over the operation and maintenance of the Airpark.

Chairman Curry said he explained to the Mayor the administrative costs, the projects to be handled, and the matching funds (with Federal and State government grants) that would need to be supplied by Everglades City rather than Collier County if Everglades City is approved by the Federal Aviation Authority and the Board of County Commissioners (BCC). Neither the Airport Authority nor the BCC have indicated whether Everglades City should or should not take over the Everglades Airpark. The transfer will be considered after the City submits a business plan and financial statement for operation and maintenance of the Airpark in Everglades City.



Recipe for Good Eating

Thanksgiving Side Dish - Roasted Potatoes

- 5 pounds assorted baby potatoes, rinsed, dried, halved
- 2 large red onions, chopped
- 3/4 cup fresh sage leaves (torn from about 2 bunches), divided
- 2 tablespoons (1/4 stick) butter, melted

Coarse kosher salt

Preheat oven to 375°F. Cook bacon in large skillet until crisp, then drain on paper towel, reserving 4 tablespoons drippings from skillet.

Combine potatoes, onions, 1/2 cup torn sage leaves, melted butter, and reserved 4 tablespoons bacon drippings in very large bowl. Sprinkle with coarse salt and freshly ground black pepper. Toss to coat. Spread potato mixture evenly on baking sheet and roast for one hour, stirring occasionally.

Increase oven temperature to 400°F. Stir bacon into potato mixture and continue to roast until potatoes are tender and beginning to brown, about 15 minutes longer. Transfer mixture to large serving bowl. Season to taste with more coarse salt and freshly ground black pepper. Sprinkle with remaining torn sage leaves and serve. Enjoy your Thanksgiving Dinner!

If you don't want to bother with candied yams, you can still have the flavor: by dice up sweet potatoes into ½-inch cubes, boil them in a little water, drain when soft, and then mash them with butter, nutmeg, cinnamon, and brown sugar. They'll cook quickly when only in small pieces. You can put the mashed potatoes in a dish in the oven to keep warm.

SAWFISH RESEARCH

This year, the NOAA Fisheries Smalltooth Sawfish Abundance Survey captured and acoustically tagged a total of six juvenile smalltooth sawfish in southwest Florida. Three of these animals were tagged in Faka Union Bay in the Ten Thousand Islands National Wildlife Refuge, one was tagged in Mud Bay in Everglades National Park, and the other was tagged on the west-side of Chokoloskee Island. Scientists believe the low capture rate and lack of reported encounters this year is likely due to the unusually cold temperatures in January and February.

In cooperation with NOAA Fisheries, Florida State University's Coastal and Marine Laboratory installed 16 acoustic monitoring stations in Everglades National Park in March in order to monitor juvenile smalltooth sawfish movement. These stations record the acoustic tag number as the animal swims by and are anchored along Turner River, Hurddles Creek, Mud Bay and Lopez River. Each station is indicated with a float, PVC pole and a sign that explains their purpose. Scientists ask that you please stay clear of all acoustic monitoring stations.

In addition to downloading data collected on the acoustic monitoring stations, scientists attempted to relocate and track animals manually for up to 24 hours in September and October using a small boat and hydrophone. Unfortunately, no acoustically tagged animals were able to be relocated after release. Abundance monitoring, tagging, and tracking are slated to begin again in late February 2011.


As always, input and cooperation from the general public is valuable and needed. If you see or catch a smalltooth sawfish, please contact the National Sawfish Encounter Database at (352) 392-2360. Be prepared to give the date, time, and location of the encounter.

This research follows permits EVER-2010-SCI-007 and ESA-13330 and is funded through the NOAA Fisheries Southeast Regional Office in St. Petersburg, FL.

Glades Daze

November is "Manatee Awareness Month" as recently reported by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission and for a very good reason. Last week when my husband took me and some friends of ours out fishing on a beautiful fall day we saw more manatees than I have ever seen. I didn't count them all but many were feeding in large groups on the outside (in the Gulf). Since my husband was poling, there was no engine noise and we were literally right on top of them without realizing it. At one point the boat movement did frighten them and as ten or more swam away at the same time, there was a huge wake. Many times one or two of the manatees would break the surface with their snouts to say hello. What an incredible day watching these amazing mammals.


The FWC have the following comments regarding the safety of manatees:

"Florida manatees are on the move, seeking warm-water sites to spend the winter. That means boaters must be cautious and watch for Florida's official marine mammal and for changing speed zones on waterways. Manatees generally start traveling to warm water when the air temperature drops below 50 degrees or when the water temperature dips to 68 degrees. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) changes seasonal speed zone signs in mid-November on many waterways to accommodate manatee migration...boaters can help manatees have a safe migration by staying in marked channels, wearing polarized sunglasses to improve vision, obeying posted boat speed zones, using poles, paddles or trolling motors when close to manatees, and having someone help scan the water when under way.

Besides slowing down and following the FWC's recommendations, residents can help manatees survive by purchasing the manatee specialty license plate. The funds collected for these plates go directly into manatee research and conservation."

Off the Shelf – Book Review

A Brief History of Sanibel Island by Marya Repko

Once again Marya Repko has provided us with a "brief" but thorough documentation of the history of another area in South Florida. Sanibel Island has always attracted visitors from Florida and places afar but most people travel over the causeway to enjoy the beaches, shells and the natural beauty of "Ding" Darling Wildlife Refuge. Few seek out the origins of the captivating island just southwest of Ft. Myers. Yet it is steeped in history, from the early days of the Calusa Indians through the 1800's up until the causeway was opened in 1963.

One of my first experiences as a child visiting Florida in the 1950's was a trip when my father took me with my brother and sister to Sanibel Island. While he and my brother were off fishing, my sister and I were left (at the ages of 8 and 9) to explore the island. There were few rental houses on stilts and since we always traveled in August, I don't remember any other families around us that time of year. It was just scrub grass and long lonely sandy beaches with lots of shells. Marya takes me back to those days when there was primarily just "fishing, shelling and tourism." With the building of the causeway in 1963 and the island establishing itself as new city, many of the old time residents (including Virginia Klotz's family) moved away. The influx of day visitors and the building of condominiums changed the island's identity and culture. Those who stayed adopted a new comprehensive land use plan and worked towards maintaining the balance of nature and increased population.

FLORIDA FLORA

Tamerind (Tamarindus indica)

The Tamarind tree is native to tropical Africa but was adopted centuries ago in India and the South Pacific, spreading throughout the tropics in the 1700's. It is the official plant of Santa Clara, Cuba, and is part of the city's coat of arms. In South Florida this slow-growing massive tree is planted as a shade and fruit tree, reaching heights up to 100 feet. Being wind-resistant with strong branches and bright green feather-like leaves, the Tamarind tree does well in our climate. The bean-like curved fruit appears in December and can vary from 2 inches to 7 inches long with brown pods filled with juicy pulp drying to a sticky paste. The fruit will ripen in the spring through early summer and needs dry weather to produce. Beautiful pink flower buds appear in the summer before it becomes the graceful yellow flower with red streaks.

Young Tamarind trees may not survive very cold weather but even larger trees may be affected. It was reported that during the 1884 freeze, a large mature Tamarind in west Florida was killed but many survived the 1957-58 cold winter. Dr. Henry Nehrling who is famous for his gardens in Naples (now the Naples Zoo and Caribbean Gardens) had Tamarind trees damaged by freezes in his Gotha, Florida, gardens but sprouted again from the roots.

The Tamarind is used for many culinary purposes: pods cooked as seasoning with rice and fish; fruit enjoyed fresh (when fully ripened) or dehydrated; and the pulp used in chutneys and curry sauces. The leaves and flowers serve medicinal purposes as poultices for swollen joints and sprains with extracts used as antiseptics for various treatments. Even the bark of the Tamarind is also used for a variety of skin ailments.

You will really enjoy this attractive shade tree in your yard and the sweet fruit when ripened.


