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CITY COUNCIL REPORT

The first Council meeting after the summer break was held on August 2 and was brief. Mayor Sammy Hamilton said that the two good things which had happened to the City recently were the new building inspector Bernie Blackburn and the new water plant manager Jim Vaughn. Drilling of deeper wells (45 feet instead of the present 15 feet) will begin shortly.

Sgt Todd Taylor reported that it had been very quiet. The crime rate from January to August was almost 50% down on the same period last year.

Sue Gentry, Crime Prevention Officer, reminded us that it was National Night Out. She then summarized the CCSO activities over the summer: Build-a-Boat, Build-a-Chair, Hot Summer Nights, outings for Summer Camp, and the distribution of school supplies on August 5. Neighborhood Watch signs had been unveiled in Chokoloskee and Plantation Island earlier that day; another one was being formally dedicated in Copeland / Lee Cypress that evening, and the sign at the entrance to Everglades City would be unveiled soon. She said that there was great community support here and that some of the officers who came down to help with projects wished they could be posted to this area.

The Mayor thanked CCSO for their good work in the community and there was a round of applause for Sue.

The first public hearings for the millage and budget will be held on **Wednesday**, **September 7**, with the second hearing a week later on **Wednesday**, **September 14**.

Youngster were kept busy at the Chokoloskee Church of God Vacation Bible School which started August 1.

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
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Recipe for Good Eating

EMAIL FROM IRELAND, July 30th



Dear Friends & Family,

Today we've taken our first day off since we started biking around Ireland. When we arrived on July 13, my old friends from Vanderbilt took us to dinner in Howth, a small fishing village just east of Dublin. It was great seeing them again. Steve and I started our biking tour going south along the Wicklow mountain range to Redcross (camping out), Bunclody and then to the coastal region below Waterford where we took a ferry before biking to Tramore. We traveled on back roads and up and down some very steep hills, getting in shape for what was to come. The beauty of the homes and villages was outstanding with wildflowers growing along the roads; every home had a colorful garden with roses and potted plants. Different shades of green like patchwork in the pastures.

Western Cork along the coastal areas outside of Kinsale, Annestown, Clonakilty were incredibly beautiful; again lots of steep hills to test our legs (several times I had to walk as Steve continued on). The views were fantastic from the tops of the many coastal roads. Each day brought us more appreciation of the wonders of this island. The cattle are so healthy looking and tons of sheep. The people have been so friendly and go out of there way to give us directions and help in any way. The food is delicious with lots of international flavors in addition to good Irish home cooking. Besides camping, we have been staying at local B&B's and being treated to a full Irish breakfast. For lunch we usually stop at a small cafe or pub for homemade soup and a sandwich. We always seem to find a great little town or village to stop for the night, always with a great pub, Irish music (if we don't fall asleep too soon which we usually do from biking all day).

We headed to the Beara Peninsula which was Steve's favorite; incredible mountain roads, wonderful view of Bantry Bay on the south, then the rock formations on the north side. We circled the entire coastline that was absolutely stunning; some of the most outstanding we've ever seen. Lots of small villages that we could have stayed in for days. We stayed in Kenmare one night before heading up the mountain to Killarney. The day was foggy and misty so we missed a lot of the view from the top but it was a wonderful ride before heading out to the Dingle Peninsula which was perfect; lots of hikers and cyclists who were enjoying the scenery, especially the small Slea Head route along the cliffs. Again a wonderful B&B in a small village. Next day we was perfectly clear to go up and over Conner's Pass (the highest route in Ireland). The road is very narrow and steep so buses are not allowed. In some places the road was wide enough for only one car (much nicer on the seat of a bike); miles of downhill so it was the highlight of Dingle.

We took the ferry across the River Shannon and biked along the River up to Ennis and Portumna before going northwest to Galway. Last night and tonight we're in a special little village, Cong, in between two lakes. Ashford Castle and surrounding gardens and forest is nearby (our day off was to walk around the grounds of the castle which is a first class hotel now, once the home of the Guinness family but originally built in 1228). It's also a great fishing/hunting area with a crystal clear stream outside our B&B. Tomorrow and the rest of the week we'll bike around the Connemara area in Galway and eventually find our way back to Dublin before we fly home on the 9th of August.

We've enjoyed every minute of this year's biking adventure. Ireland and the Irish people have been wonderful.

Fishing Report by Captain Bill Lindsay

August is not my favorite time of year to fish. Afternoon thunderstorms and bugs make fishing a full day difficult.

However, fishing for Redfish can be excellent. On my last charter, we released 10 slot-size fish. Black Drum are also found in good numbers at this time of year. Fishing for small tarpon can also be very good. They can be found rolling in the Barron River or way back in the small creeks and bays. Trout fishing remains good and, if you want some action, put a strip of Ladyfish out for the big sharks that cruise around at this time of year. Snook fishing has been slow for me but I'm sure some nice ones have been caught and released. Permit fishing on the shallow wrecks in the Gulf can be good as long as the weather is calm. Grouper and Snapper in the Gulf is productive and a Cobia might swim up to the boat at any time. Not many anglers go out in August so on many days you have the whole area to yourself.

Capt. Bill Lindsay lives in Chokoloskee and has been fishing in the Everglades National Park for over 30 years. In 1992 he was Master Angler of the MET Tournament.

FWC News

Spiny lobster season runs from August 6 through March 31. Recreational fishers must have a saltwater fishing license and spiny lobster permit. The carapace length must be greater than 3 inches and the bag limit is six per person per day. The harvest is prohibited in National Park waters.

Fish kills at this time of year may be due to weather changes. To report them, call (800)-636-0511.

Hunters and hikers are asked to report any sick or emaciated deer they may see or any deer found dead from unknown causes as part of the CWD Watch by calling (866) 293-9282. For background on Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), see www.cwd-info.org.

Continued Success Locating & Tagging Juvenile Smalltooth Sawfish

The cooperative acoustic tagging project between the Florida State University's Coastal and Marine Laboratory and the NOAA Fisheries Service Panama City Laboratory has had much success in 2011. Researchers on the Smalltooth Sawfish Abundance Survey have captured and tagged 5 neonate and 20 small juvenile animals this year in the Ten Thousand Islands Backcountry Region. The abundance survey has been funded through 2012.

The acoustic tagging project is slated to continue through November 2011 in the backcountry waters of Everglades National Park from Turner River to Lopez River and inside Chokoloskee Bay. During this project, immature (less than 150 cm or 59 in) smalltooth sawfish will be fitted with acoustic transmitters in order to study movement patterns and habitat utilization. The tag is attached to the first dorsal fin.

In March, five small juvenile animals were caught in Everglades National Park. They were all under 30 inches and too small to tag with an acoustic transmitter. Smalltooth sawfish grow very fast in their first year of life. Data suggests that they grow up to 4 inches in one month. In April, four small juvenile smalltooth sawfish (all over 34 inches) were caught tagged in Mud Bay, Everglades National Park. In May, four more small juveniles (all over 35 inches) were captured in the park – 1 in Mud Bay and 3 near the boat ramp at Outdoor Resorts. In June, 2 small juveniles (both over 37 inches) were caught and tagged on the west-side of Hwy-29. In July, six small juveniles (all over 43 inches) were captured and tagged on the west-side of Hwy-29. As of July 30, there were 10 juvenile smalltooth sawfish tagged with acoustic tags swimming throughout the array. There are plans tag up to 10 more small juveniles this summer and early fall.

The acoustic station array was recently expanded from 16 to 32 receivers. Acoustic stations, which record the acoustic tag number as the individual animal swims by, are now be anchored on the east and west sides of Chokoloskee Island and along Turner River, Hurdles Creek, Mud Bay, Cross Bays, Crooked Creek, and the Lopez River. These stations consist of an acoustic receiver attached to a cinderblock and are marked with a single white float. Please stay clear of all acoustic stations. A map of station locations is located at the boat ramp at Outdoor Resorts on Chokoloskee Island.

In addition to using the acoustic array to monitor movements, a graduate student from the Florida State University has been actively tracking animals. Each acoustic tag emits an ultrasonic "ping" at a unique frequency. Using a hydrophone attached to a receiver and a kayak, she has been able to actively track (or follow) 5 animals for up to 28 hours. On her most recent trip in July, she actively tracked one animal over a 4 days span from July 27-30. Tracking animals in this manner adds fine-scale movement data to the larger-scale presence-absence data collected by the acoustic array.

Researchers with the Smalltooth Sawfish Abundance Survey will be back in Everglades City August 21-28.

If you see or encounter a smalltooth sawfish, please contact the National Sawfish Encounter Database at (352) 392-2360. Be prepared to give the date, time, and location of the encounter. Input and cooperation from the general public is greatly valued.

LOCAL HISTORY

MOSQUITOES!

We complain about the "swamp angels" but imagine what it was like in the days before bug repellant. Rob Storter, in his book *Crackers in the Glade*, recalls:

I have seen mosquitoes as bad as they could possible be, so bad it was impossible to fish at night. One time my brother George and Hub were fishing together, and Lem and I were fishing together. George and Hub went up Chatham Bend River to Chevelier Bay mullet fishing and the mosquitoes ran them out. They told Lem and me that there were lots of mullet in the bay, but it was impossible to fish there for the mosquitoes.

So Lem and I went up there. We made one strike and it looked like the mosquitoes would kill us before we could get up our nets. We just had to give up and get out of there.

There was no mosquito dope in the early days so the men would fill a bucket half full of dirt and black mangrove wood, then burn it. Sometimes they would put a rag in it and pat it down until it got to smoking good. These were called smudge pots. It would drive the "swamp angels" away.

Here's our first question from a reader: "Can you please explain bond ratings and why they're important? There's so much talk about this in the news."

Bonds allow companies and governments to borrow money. Bonds usually have specific terms; lenders are paid interest on principal repaid at a date in the future. Bond ratings are estimates of the likelihood that an investor will be paid on time.

Companies like *Moody's* and *Standard & Poor's* gather data on the financial strength of bond issuers and assign ratings. Bond issuers pay a fee to these companies to have their bonds rated. U.S. Treasury bonds as obligations of the federal government are assumed to be secure investments and currently have AAA ratings.

For government and corporate bonds the rating services evaluate the financial position of a country, state, city or company. They examine outstanding debt, growth rates, income sources (revenues) and spending. Another consideration is the overall condition of the economy. Comparisons are also made to similar offerings.

Moody's and **Standard & Poor's** are the most well-known rating services. They use a letter grade scale for their bond ratings. Moody's uses numbers (1, 2, or 3) with the letters while **Standard & Poor's** uses pluses and minuses. For example, Aaa1 would be **Moody's** highest rating, while AAA+ would be the highest given by the other service.

Presumably these ratings help investors determine how risky or safe a particular bond is. Junk bonds (BB or lower) have the lowest rating and those companies are typically facing financial difficulties. Traditionally the lower the rating the higher the interest rate the issuer would have to pay in order for investors to buy their bonds.

FLORIDA FLORA

Pitcher Plants Sarracenia

As a follow-up to the Florida Flora in the last issue of *The Rapper*, the other carnivorous plant growing in a pot under our tree is the more common ground-dwelling North American or "trumpet"



Pitcher plant which belongs to the genus *Sarracenia*. These are referred to "New World" pitcher plants and inhabit wet swamps and grassy areas.

The Sarracenia are threatened by development and drainage (it is estimated that almost 98% of their habitat has already been destroyed in the southeastern United States). With this Pitcher plant, the entire leaf forms the pitcher (tube) with a spoon-like structure at the tip secreting the nectar which attracts the insects. This genus is also different in that rainwater accumulates in the tube whereas the other genus has a cap protecting it from rainwater. Inside the tube, the insect is trapped by the slippery and waxy surface of the leaf. Also, downward pointing hairs make it impossible for the insect to escape. At the base digestive enzymes are present in the liquid which drowns its prey which is eventually digested.
