Smallwood Store Update

The Smallwood Store & Museum opened its doors for the first time in six months on October 16. The other advantages of remaining small is that the bank can decide itself about issues: loan policy, charges for debit card transactions, and good interest rates on checking accounts.

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
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Recipe for Good Eating Carrot Soup

2 TBS Butter 1 pkg (about 20) of Small Peeled Fresh Carrots

2 TBS Chopped Onions 1 tsp Grated Lemon Peel 1 TBS Chopped Ginger 2 cups Chicken Stock

½ tsp Minced Garlic Lemon juice, salt and pepper to taste

In a saucepan, melt butter and sauté onions. If you have leftover cooked carrots, use them or simmer fresh carrots for 20 minutes. In a food processor combine ginger, garlic, lemon peel and carrots. Pour mixture into saucepan with onions and add chicken stock; bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer until cooked through. Pour into blender and mix until smooth. Should be warm enough to pour into soup bowls. Squeeze a small amount of fresh lemon juice; add salt and pepper to taste.

Note: Ingredients may be increased/decreased according to your taste. Keep ginger fresh by storing in the freezer and shave off amount needed with a knife (rather than chopping).


Off the Shelf – Book Review "Guy LaBree,

Barefoot Artist of the Florida Seminoles" by Carol Mahler

Carol Mahler has taken an interesting approach to write about the Seminole Tribe. It is through the eyes of Guy LaBree, a well respected artist who grew up and attended school with several tribal families in the Dania area. In her interviews with the artist and his wife Pat she tells the story of dozens of his paintings which are beautifully illustrated in this historical book

Guy LaBree is one of the few white men who was accepted into the Seminole community to capture their history on canvas. He was commissioned to paint the way of life of the older tribal members to encourage the younger generation to seek answers to the stories that were being depicted in the art



work. Chairman James Billie wrote in the Forward: "Guy LaBree is a unique person in that he has lived with our people ... To this day, Guy far surpasses all well-known artists in painting the ways of the Seminole Indians."

In addition to learning about the Seminole Tribe, you discover Guy LaBree, the person, the artist, the musician, the storyteller, the husband, the father, and the man. He has had a fascinating life but his love of Florida, its culture, its wildlife and his true friendship (since his childhood) of the Seminoles is what makes this book so unique. There have been a lot of misunderstandings about tribal traditions. Through Guy LaBree's stories about his paintings, the myths have been clarified and a better understanding into the culture of our South Florida neighbors has been brought to light in Carol Mahler's book. Her format in writing down Guy LaBree's memories and stories about each painting makes this volume so entertaining and thorough in its interpretation of our land, and why we cherish nature and all that it has to offer. I believe anyone interested in Florida history would find this book a must read.

Fishing Report by Captain Bill Lindsay

As I write this, the first cold front of the year is moving down on us. Lots of fishermen like to fish just before the front arrives, before the wind picks up

out of the Northwest and after, when it blows out of the North. During the summer months, fishing in the middle of the day can be slow. During the cooler months, we often have our best fishing during the middle of the day when the sun warms the water up a little. In the last few weeks Snook fishing has improved and some nice fish have been taken in the backcountry by fishermen casting plugs. Most of the Snook seem to be in the backcountry; but on my last trip, I caught three slot-size fish in Rabbit Key Grasses. Redfishing has been great this year and should continue through November. It is not unusual to take as many as 20 nice Red's a day fishing the coves and points on the edge of the Gulf. Trout fishing can also be productive. In short, it's a nice time of year to fish.

FWC News

Four years after adopting Florida's first Gopher Tortoise Management Plan, the Florida FWC is asking the public to share its thoughts on improving conservation of the gopher tortoise, a state threatened species. Florida has exceeded the 10,000-acresper-year goal of restoring and managing gopher tortoise habitat. Additionally, more than 4,000 gopher tortoises were humanely relocated from sites slated for development. Loss of habitat is the main threat to the gopher tortoise's survival. FLORIDA FLORA

Needle Palm (Rapidophyllum hystrix)

This Florida native palm is found throughout the southeastern United States but is considered a rare find in its natural habitat. It is one of the smaller palms, hardly ever exceeding five feet. The Needle palm does well in both shady and partly sunny areas and is thought to be one of the most hardy of all native palms, enduring temperatures below zero in some locations. The flowers have small yellow or purple blooms, growing in clusters on a foot-long spike. The fruit is also purple. As the photo shows, the leaves are deeply divided, dark green on the top and silver on the bottom. The distinguishing feature, and where it derives its name, is the mass of long needles in the trunk base. The Needle Palm is very slow growing and would be a nice addition to your yard. Be sure to take care of the needles and location when planting.

LOCAL HISTORY



Historic Home

This pile of rubble was once the home of novelist Allan Eckert who received an Emmy Award for "Mutual of Omaha's Wild Kingdom" for which he wrote more than 225 episodes and who recently died in July at the age of 80.

In the 1950s the property was the site of The Everglades Lodge where the famous Rod & Gun Club Bavarian chef "Snooky" Senghaas lived. After the building was destroyed by Hurricane Donna in 1960, local realtor Paul Lees purchased the lot in 1969 and then sold it to the Eckert's.

Other owners were Bob and Judy Tuff of the former local newspaper *The Everglades Echo*, well-known community members Cheryl Henderson and Claudia Davenport, and Glenn and Bonnie Tucker.

In 2003 the Friends of the Museum of the Everglades published a book *Historic Buildings around Everglades City* to record the many homes and buildings and to bring awareness of our heritage. The book is available for purchase at the Museum of the Everglades.



Investment Insights

One of the largest costs investors face is taxes. While we can't control tax rates, we can try to anticipate the timing of certain transactions. First, determine if income has changed and if it needs to be accelerated or decelerated. Then see if you're taking advantage of funding qualified plans and IRA's. Also factor in Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) which may increase taxable income.

Next, decide if you need to realign your portfolio to better match your goals and risk tolerance. There may be capital gains and/or losses to be realized. For 2012 the ability to convert a traditional IRA to a Roth IRA exists, which historically was based on an adjusted gross income (AGI) level. That threshold is no longer in place. More people have the ability to look at the benefits of a Roth IRA.

Another consideration is cost-basis regulation changes. As of January 1, 2011, legislation requires broker/dealers, banks, custodians and transfer agents to capture and report detailed information on securities sales to the IRS. The legislation is complex and we're happy to provide explanations.

An estimated 700,000 to 1.5 million bobcats live in North America. In the far north the bobcat is replaced by the slightly larger Canadian lynx, which has longer legs, huge padded feet, and denser fur, all of which are helpful for surviving in the often snow-

covered boreal forests of northern Canada. The male bobcat commonly grows to 30 pounds; the largest ever recorded in the wild was 48.9 pounds. The bobcat is a game animal in Florida, trapped and hunted for its fine-quality fur. (*Photo by Alan Maltz*)

Unlike many of the world's cats, the bobcat population is not in trouble. In a few states, such as Ohio, Indiana, and New Jersey, the bobcat is considered endangered, but for the most part this feline is thriving. Because of protections now in place across North America, the bobcat is steadily returning to its entire original range.

Southwest Florida has a healthy bobcat population. Although most sightings occur at dawn and dusk, the bobcat can sometimes be spotted midday. Its fur pattern varies by region; there have even been 10 confirmed cases of melanistic (black) bobcats in Florida. Like most wild cats, the bobcat is a carnivore and operates as an adept ambush predator. It is capable of jumping yards into the air, sometimes plucking waterfowl right out of the sky in flight. During lean times it has been known to take down white-tailed deer weighing eight times more than does the bobcat. It kills innumerable rats, mice, raccoons, opossums, armadillos, birds, snakes, feral and domestic cats, and just about anything else that can supply the daily calories it requires for survival.

Only a handful of predators feed upon the bobcat. While bobcat kittens may be taken by coyotes, male bobcats, raccoons, and fox, adults need only to fear wolves, panthers, and large

alligators. The bobcat has been known to attack people, but in most cases it involves a mother attempting to protect her litter. There has never been a recorded fatal bobcat attack in North America. (Photo by Sandy Ramseth)



It breeds year-round, but tends to favor April through September. On average it has one litter per year, with one to six kittens per litter. The bobcat is not capable of being domesticated. It will readily injure itself if caged and will bite and scratch its handlers without warning.

Max Schultz, 76, passed away on October 18 at a Hospice Care Center with his family by his side. Max, with his wife Jean, has been spending the


