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#### CITY COUNCIL REPORT

At the meeting on March 6, Mayor Sammy Hamilton reported on his dealings with the DEP and SFWMD who have given the City another large grant. He commented on the attempts by home owners to roost bats to eat the mosquitoes and also hoped to see more butterflies and hummingbirds here. The baseball field behind Holy Family Catholic Church will now have a clay surface for the Little League games, thanks to Collier County Parks & Recreation. Finally, the Mayor welcomed County Commissioner Jim Coletta who praised the "great constituents" in the area.

Sgt. Todd Taylor of CCSO reported several small thefts in the center of the City on March 5. The items had been recovered and suspects are being questioned.

Marya Repko appeared on behalf of the Fireworks Committee. She said that a down payment had been made for our glorious display during the July 4th celebrations but more funds are needed. The Mayor and Council agreed that the City contribute \$2,500.

John M. Wilson again questioned the speed at which delivery trucks travel on Storter Avenue North. A letter has been written to one company and new signs "No Trucks or Buses" have been installed. Councilor Parker Oglesby reported that he stopped one truck to talk with the driver.

Council voted to renew the dock leases. The Mayor said the rates were not being raised but asked renters to please fix their docks.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday, April 3, at 5:30 p.m.

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


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# Recipe for Good Eating STRATA

This delicious breakfast casserole was served at Ruth Hefflefinger's home on March 7 for Ladies Coffee. Many of us requested the recipe so here it is. Thanks, Sue, very tasty!

#### Ingredients:

1 lb Pork sausage, cooked and crumbled

2 1/2 C Milk

2 C Fresh mushrooms, sliced

12 Eggs

1 lb Velveeta, cut into 1/2 in cubes

1/2 C Sliced green onions

1 Loaf bakery Italian bread, crust off, cut into 3/4 in cubes

(or 1 1/2 loaf sliced, crust cut off and quartered)

Brown sausage and drain. Mix bread, sausage, mushrooms, onion, and cheese and place in 9x13 pan. Beat milk and eggs and pour over rest. Refrigerate overnight. In morning heat oven to 350° and bake uncovered 40-45 min or until it puffs up and the top becomes golden. Let stand 10 min before serving. Serves 10-12 people. Make half for 4-6 guests.

## Off the Shelf - New Books "A Beckoning Wind" by John Dandola

Here's a detective story about Marco Island history - plus the obligatory contemporary murder. When Jeff and Kirsten visit her aunt they discover an ancient (Calusa?) artifact that he begins to research. Is that linked to the bashed body found on the golf course? The dialog is interspersed with prophetic dreams and a bit of gangland action but nothing blood-curdling.

The author, whose books are mostly set in Massachussetts, is a part-time resident on the island. He thanks Marco Island Historical Society members for their help and describes the delay that the new museum had in 2010 in getting displays from the County.

## Fishing Where the Wild Things Are

There aren't many places left in this country where you have a good chance of not seeing another boat for the day; but, like most things that are great, it takes some effort. The



effort for me was a road trip from Rhode Island to Miami to stay with a friend. Then waking up at 4:30 in the morning to drive the Tamiami Trail which runs across Florida. This is the liquid land that is what is left of this vast swamp that we know of as Everglades National Park, one of the most diverse ecosystems on the planet. The eighty mile drive from Miami takes you through some of the best largemouth bass fishing in the country. As you get closer to the coast you can start to taste the salt from the Gulf of Mexico mixing with the freshwater. You also start to see signs of the tides and the river currents converging. It's one of the few places that still has a primordial feel to it, and you realize quickly that out here you aren't the top of the food chain. Without a GPS you could spend several lifetimes trying to find your way back to the boat ramp. With an average water depth of only 2.5 feet for hundreds of miles you will be lucky to get back to the ramp without running aground. Fortunately our guide Capt. Bob Lemay had over 3 decades of running these backwaters in his shallow draft skiff. We launched at 6:30 a.m. and were treated to Mother Nature at her finest with this sunrise. After a 30 minute run we stopped at our first spot and within short order we had our first of many beautiful redfish in the boat. Fishing the Glades is a simple matter of casting a soft plastic plug or fly to "the tangles," as Capt. Bob called them--downed trees along the shore, drop-off or point. The complicated part was figuring out which of the millions of downed trees was the right spot. This is where over 30 years of trial and error helps to get you in fish. It was an amazing day with beautiful weather and lots of different species of fish willing to take our offerings. My friend Dave and I both got the back-county slam, snook, redfish and spotted trout along with a who's who of others including tons of jacks, ladyfish, snapper and juvenile Goliath groupers. Anyone who fishes has experienced how fast a day on the water goes by, and before I knew it we were back at the dock. It was one of the best days I have had on the water, and I can't wait to return to fish where the wild things are -- the Everglades.

## The Living Gulf Coast

Harns Marsh, a storm-water retention facility located at the headwaters of the Orange River in Lehigh Acres, is an unlikely

destination for naturalists and birders. It is not included in the South Florida Birding Trail,



though no one has informed the countless birds that frequent this large freshwater marsh of that omission. It offers no amenities, no interpretive center, not even any signs directing visitors to the marsh. Now under the jurisdiction of the East County Water Control District, Harns Marsh is slated to become a Lee County regional park, which will bring restrooms, picnic tables, and other amenities to this undiscovered treasure.

The site is roughly one square mile (578 acres). In 2007, some 182 acres along the north marsh were dredged and cleared of invasive plants, which improved water quality and wildlife viewing. Hiking and bicycling, but no motorized vehicles, are allowed on the four-mile sandy impoundment road encircling the marsh.

Scores of birds, snakes, snails, and small mammals are found here. Two species of particular interest are the snail kite (aka the Everglades kite) and the limpkin. Birders who might spend years trying to catch a glimpse of either of these species can cut their search short with a single visit to Harns Marsh. These hard-to-find birds are attracted by the tens of thousands of snails that live in the marsh, including both the native apple snail and the invasive island apple snail. The island apple snail (*Pomacea insularum*) is from South America and has, through accidental releases, invaded many of Florida's freshwater marshes. These enormous snails, many as large as a small apple, litter the edge of the marsh. Snail kites and limpkins are adapting to dining on these foreigners, which have also become an important source of food for turtles, great blue herons, alligators, and other animals.

Other sightings at Harns Marsh, especially during the winter months, might include redwing blackbirds, cowbirds, various migratory duck species, and sparrows. Sightings of sandhill cranes are common along the western edge of the marsh. Visiting the marsh is best just after dawn and before sunset. Be sure to bring bug spray and a hat, since areas of shade are in short supply. Harns Marsh is an undiscovered treasure in Lee County that hopefully, once made into a park, will get the recognition it deserves.

Author's note: On leap day, February 29<sup>th</sup>, of this year I had an opportunity to revisit Harns Marsh during the winter months, when most of the migratory waterfowl are feeding amongst the ponds and bulrushes. The bird count did not meet my expectations; it far, far exceeded them! Together, Molly (my wife) and I counted more than 1,000 birds. Those numbers included three eagles, four snail kites, three limpkins, hundreds upon hundreds of ducks, cranes, coots and wading birds. Harns Marsh is a true, Lee County wildlife treasure that, on a good day, compares well with J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge when it comes to our feathered friends.

#### LOCAL HISTORY

The Everglades Homes Tour on March 10 was enjoyed by over 150 people who had entry to up to 5 houses and 4 other buildings. #### **TAXING THINGS**

#### The early retirement option

Should you take early Social Security retirement when eligible, or should you wait until your full retirement age?

Well, like everything else in life – it depends. The Social Security Administration has charts that show the break-even point in years where you will have collected the amount equal to full retirement, but remember that at full retirement age your benefits do not increase to that level. Take a close look at your personal situation first.

Much depends on your health and ability to work. Waiting until full retirement age or later may not be an option if you're unable to work and if you don't have substantial savings to live on in the meanwhile.

Keep in mind that the reduced benefits you'd receive if you start collecting early may be even lower on an after-tax basis than you're expecting. If your annual income in retirement from all sources, including pension plans, exceeds the qualifying limit, you will owe income taxes on a portion of your benefits. You'll owe even more if your income exceeds the amount established for joint filers. More and more people will be subject to the tax since the income thresholds are not adjusted for inflation, unlike Social Security benefits, which are. Your benefits may be reduced even further because Medicare premiums, which are paid out of your Social Security check, have been rising faster than inflation.

If you take a job that pays more than the annual allowable amount in retirement while collecting early retirement benefits, your benefits will be reduced by \$1 for every \$2 earned above that threshold unless you are past your full retirement age, However, after you reach full retirement age, you will get an increase in your Social Security check to reflect the amount of benefits withheld while you were working. No matter how much you earn after full retirement age, you will not have any benefits withheld.

Social Security benefits are calculated based on your highest earning years. So if you've logged less than that you might want to work a few extra years before full retirement age to boost your benefits.


## SHERIFF'S REPORT

crefoot Johnson could out last a horse anytime. One time he was delivering the mail and came into a clearing; he ran upon a friend of his in a horse and buggy. The friend said "Get in and I'll give you a ride and you can rest your feet a minute." Johnson said "Thank you, think I will." He got into the buggy and after some small talk about where he was going, he said "Thanks, Friend, I got to be going now, I'm falling behind schedule and want to make my Sister's house in time for supper so I can save a board bill for the night." He jumped out and set his stride of 8 mph and soon was out of the friend's sight. Another story was told to me about him just plain wearing out his shoes and pitched them along the trail. He got home to Ft. Ogden and was told by his wife that there was a dance that night. Well, he sure liked to dance but didn't have any shoes; but that was OK he just took off down the wire road which is now SR 31. He set his 8 mph stride for the 30 mile walk to Ft. Myers, he always had a lard can or waterproof pouch he carried some food in for an emergency. (Not no energy bars or drinks like today). He got to the Calooshatchee River and crossed around Russell Park area putting his clothes in the lard can to keep them dry. On the south side of the river he redressed and found a store and woke up the owner who sold him a pair of shoes. Reversed his actions at the river and got home for a good old Hoedown. My Great-granddad Elias Britt Keen(e) told my Granddaddy, who also liked to play the fiddle and he and Granny would do the same thing later after they married in 1904. What are the signs of winter in the Everglades?

Winter is here again! The signs of changing seasons in south Florida can be hard to perceive, but if you take a closer look you will discover the beauty in a tropical winter.

The first signs begin with the birds. The Belted Kingfisher is a blue bird with a white band around his neck. His arrival around the end of August and beginning of September is an early indicator that the heat will soon be gone. You can see these small, crested-headed birds sitting on the power lines along waterways, or darting in the mangroves.

Another sign of winter is "dead trees" on the side of the road. Fortunately, those are not dead pine trees, but a deciduous conifer called the Bald Cypress. These cypress trees drop their needles in the winter to conserve energy when the water dries up. The needles are acidic and begin to break down the limestone bedrock, helping to make cypress domes and strands deeper for the following generations of cypress trees. When the needles (leaves) fall, it is a sure sign that the water is getting low and cool, dry air is on its way.

Some know winter is here when those "chilly" seventy-five degree days require us to wear long pants and a jacket. For those living in south Florida, the most prevalent sign of winter has to be all the license plates from Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, and Minnesota. It really is winter in south Florida when the snow birds arrive. South Florida inhabitants, both natural and human, welcome the signs of winter in the Everglades!
