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
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

Mission/Vision: By providing exceptional educational opportunities that motivate and engage each student, all students will complete school prepared for ongoing learning as well as community and global responsibilities. The School District of Collier County has 48 schools and in 2012-13 served a total student population of 43,793. There are 29 elementary schools, 10 middle schools, 8 high schools, and one PreK-thru-12 school (Everglades City School). There are also 12 Alternative School Programs.

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Off the Shelf Book Review

"The Longest Road" by Philip Caputo

The subtitle "Overland in Search of America, from Key West to the Arctic Ocean" depicts the journey of Pulitzer Prize winner Philip Caputo and his adventures along the back roads of the U.S., Canada and Alaska. Philip originally considered traveling coast to coast at the end of a 1996 hunting / fishing trip in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. He spotted an American flag at a school and reflected on how the Inupiat children pledged allegiance to the same flag as did the schoolchildren in Key West (many of them immigrants). Besides this similarity, he wondered what it was that Americans had in common, diverse as we are and representing every race on earth; what is it that keeps us united.

The official expedition began in Key West with Philip, his wife Leslie and their two dogs. From the Keys, they headed west along the Tamiami Trail to our part of the world. Not much is mentioned about our historic little Everglades City (except for the past). Many of the highlights of the book involve talking to the locals, learning about their culture and what's current. So, when they camped in their airstream at Outdoor Resorts in May of 2011, Philip heard about the developers Florida-Georgia Grove, LLC, and their fencing off of Mamie Street, denying access to the historic Smallwood Store and Museum.

Their trip continued north through Florida, traversing the small towns in the South, Midwest, the Rockies and up to the Pacific Northwest. It was a long journey, filled with stories of the boom and bust of various areas of our country, the farmers, the immigrants, the pioneers and the American people.

I found this book very interesting, especially since it reminded me of my own adventures with my husband when we bicycled through many of the same locations and countryside as Philip and his wife. Our experiences and impressions of the beauty of this great county and its people were very much the same.

The Longest Road is very well written, full of wit and some wisdom and a pleasure to read. It was just released on July 16 so is available at all bookstores.

Recipe for Good Eating

Blueberry Tart

Ingredients:

Crust: 1½ cups flour, 6 TBS butter, 2 TBS vegetable shortening,

1 TBS sugar, 3 TBS ice water

Glaze: 1 jar of apricot preserves (11-oz), ½ cup orange liqueur

Filling: 2 cups blueberries

Sauce: 2 cups fresh blueberries, ½ cup sugar with ½ tsp cornstarch added, ¼ cup

fresh lemon juice, 1 TBS red currant jelly, 1 tsp grated lemon peel

Topping: whipping cream

Blueberries are wonderful summer treats. When visiting my grandchildren in California, my son-in-law fixes a great tart that his mother used to make for him. The crust is made from scratch and the apricot glaze adds a special taste.

To make crust, combine flour, butter (cut into pieces), shortening and sugar. Mix well, add ice water and stir until it is coarse. Shape into ball and knead; dust with flour and wrap in wax paper. Refrigerate for one hour. When done, roll out dough into a 9-in circle. Place into tart pan (or pie plate) and press into bottom and up sides, trimming excess. Prick bottom of pastry with a fork and chill for one hour.

Heat oven to 400°. Line pastry with wax paper and fill with dried beans or rice. Bake 10 to 12 minutes until golden brown. Discard paper and beans (or rice) and let crust cool.

In a saucepan, combine 2 cups blueberries, sugar (mixed with cornstarch), lemon juice, jelly and lemon peel. Bring to a boil and stir for about 10 minutes until thickened. Cool completely, then transfer to a bowl and chill in refrigerator.

For the glaze, combine preserves and liqueur and puree in a blender. Brush a thin layer over the tart shell, spread 2 cups of blueberries filling on top, then add sauce on top. Chill again until it is set. Just before serving, add whipped cream. Seems like a lot of work but worth the effort! Enjoy!!

Popsicles

Nothing says Summertime like Popsicles. They come in every flavor imaginable and are even yummier when you make them yourself. With just a few ingredients and a little imagination you and your kids can make delicious homemade frozen treats to enjoy all Summer! Here is the recipe for a super simple watermelon Popsicle. Makes 8 Popsicles.

2 1/2 cups cubed seeded watermelon 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1/4 cup white sugar 1/2 cup fresh raspberries

- 1. Place the watermelon, lemon juice, sugar, and raspberries into a blender, and blend on High speed until the sugar has dissolved and the mixture is smooth.
- 2. Pour the mixture into ice pop molds, and insert sticks or handles. Freeze until firm, several hours or overnight.

Paper cups and wood sticks from the craft store work just as well if you don't have Popsicle molds. Just peel the paper away when ready to eat. Enjoy!!

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has reopened Banana Grove Road, the boat ramp entrance road and the campground at the Fisheating Creek Wildlife Management Area (WMA). These areas were temporarily closed because of high water levels at the WMA.

FWC seeks public input on south Florida deer management. Public meetings were held July 15-17 to discuss a project establishing deer management units throughout Florida. Living Gulf Coast

Belted Kingfisher (*Ceryle alcyon*) Other names: eastern belted kingfisher / Status: FL=stable to a slight decline, IUCN=LC / Life span: to 5 years / Length: 11-13.8 in. (28-35 cm) / Wingspan: 18.9-22.8 in. (48-58 cm) / Weight: 4.9-6 oz (140-170 g) / Nests: from northern Florida to the northern tier of North America from Alaska to Newfoundland / Found: All Counties, coastal, near coast, mainland / Months found: **JFMamjjASOND** (lower case indicates breeding season).



The distinctive loud and rattling call of the belted kingfisher generally announces its arrival or departure from a roosting site. A plunge diver that often hovers in the air studying its potential meal before diving, the kingfisher prefers freshwater to saltwater environments. This is a bird that has taken advantage of human activities and can readily be found along highways where drainage swales and ponds have been dredged. The kingfisher is often spotted sitting on a telephone pole or power line over these small bodies of water waiting for an errant minnow or tadpole to get close to the surface.

The belted kingfisher is one of only a handful of avian species in which the female is more brightly colored than the male. There are 93 different species of kingfishers worldwide, including the famous Australian kingfisher, the kookaburra. The best places to find these birds locally are around inland lakes or along the banks of the rivers and streams.

The kingfisher lives year round throughout most of the United States, but some do migrate south during the winter months. Its nests are robbed by grackles, various snakes, and tree-climbing mammals, while the adult is taken by alligators and falcons. The kingfisher is unusual in that, like the cliff swallow, it digs tunnels and makes cavities in riverbanks where it builds its nests and raises its offspring. It is adapting well to human-designed changes in the landscape, and despite some regional losses, it is fundamentally successful.

A Little Trip Back in Time

at Caxambus by Gary Pettit This article (the 4th) is reprinted in memory of Gary Pettit who passed away on April 22. My grandmother's home had screens on every window... my grandmother would remove the screens from the window and paint over the screen with a mixture of motor oil and turpentine. That smelly combination was helpful in keeping out the "no see ums" that could easily slip through an untreated screen. Then each morning I would help my grandmother remove the screens that were covered over with insects stuck to the mixture and scrub

the screens clean before setting them back

into the window for the next day. As a

child I just got used to the mosquitoes and

sand flies. As I recall it was just part of my

summer experience. We got used to it.

Sometimes we took a trip to Naples. I remember my grandfather's first car. It was a Model A Ford. A trip to Naples took my family an entire day to travel there, do our business and return home. A trip to Ft. Myers would necessitate an overnight stay as it would be impossible to go and return in the same day.

My grandmother had a second home in Ft. Myers. This was necessary when my father and uncle were young because the schools in Collier Co. were not accredited by the state. My grandmother would spend the school year in Ft. Myers with my dad and uncle. As soon as school was out in the spring, she and her sons would rejoin my grandfather at the fish camp for the summer. I attended school at Caxambus and my first and second grade teacher was Mrs. Otter, my favorite neighbor mentor.

During several of my summers, Mr. Otter asked me to help him build a wall terracing this mound with Lightning Whelks and shells to help drainage so that his gardens wouldn't wash down the hillsides during the heavy summer rains. I was about seven years old at this time. I felt very proud to be part of building these walls even if I just hauled and handed the Whelks to him to shove into the hillside. Mr. Otter would gather huge piles of large shells anytime he dug anywhere because the mound where the Otter's house stood was on top of a 1500 year old shell kitchen midden, or as we would describe a huge Indian landfill or dump of the shells of mollusks that they ate. One can imagine the tons of leftover shells from these earlier peoples who lived near this place.




FERNANDOA

across this very rare plant which is said to be one of the most beautiful trees in the world.



Eureka as told
by Capt. John
Morgan"

The schooner "Eureka" was built in 1898 by the Collier Brothers on Marco Island, Fl. She was skippered by my

Granddad Capt. Jack Collier, one of the youngest brothers. She was 65-ft. long, 18-ft. wide and drew 4-ft. of water. Her frames were natural crooks from Maderia, (Fl. Mahogany) Her planking was Georgia Pine. By natural crooks we mean tree limbs that are construed to the sides and bottom, built for the coastal trade between Key West and New Orleans, La. The cargo would mostly be fish and produce such as pineapples, tomatoes, etc. On her return trip she would be loaded with canned goods, hardware, furniture and sometimes passengers. The railroad came in and there was no more need for sail boats. The "Eureka" was sold to Capt. Ferguson Hall, an old friend of the family. Capt. Ferg installed a 75 horse power diesel engine and made several trips to Cuba and Honduras. He brought back crocodile hides and mahogany lumber. He modified her sailing rig by taking off her topmast and cutting off her bowsprit. He claimed she had too much sail area for the Caribbean, as it blows much harder and the seas are much bigger down there. The "Eureka" was once again active between Ft. Myers, Fl. and Key West, Fl. towing barrages to Key West for the Army during WWII. The barges were built in Ft. Myers by the Ship Building Company. By the end of the war the "Eureka" was sold to some Cubans. They took her down to Cuba and started a freight business there. Soon after that she was wrecked on a reef off the Cuban coast. The "Eureka" had a long and fruitful life of about fifty years. She was still a strong and sound vessel when she came to her death on that coral reef. These and many more stories are recorded by Capt. John Morgan in his book (My life on the Water). He was kind enough to let me share this one with you.
