CITY COUNCIL REPORT

Mayor Sammy Hamilton opened the meeting on October 6 by saying that Halloween is his favorite holiday and reminded us that the City will have a party for the community on **Saturday, October 31**, in McLeod Park. He later reported the latest news about the Chokoloskee Bridge: bids will open on October 26, the Board of County Commissioners will approve the contract on December 8, and construction is scheduled for spring of 2016. Completion should be within 640 calendar days after the start.

A proclamation was approved recognizing Red Ribbon Week (October 23-31) which reminds youngsters that drugs and alcohol are dangerous. Another proclamation recognizes Celebrate SAFE Communities (October 12).

Lt. Mark Milligan on behalf of Collier County Sheriff's Office mentioned the arrests of 18 people in the County on drug charges which he hopes will benefit the area. He reported several thefts and a fire on Spoonbill Avenue. Lt. Mark invited everyone to Celebrate SAFE Communities from 6:00 to 8:00 pm on Monday, October 12, in McLeod Park and said that Red Ribbon Week will start at the school on Friday, October 23.

The next City Council meeting will be on **Tuesday, November 3**, at 5:30 p.m. in City Hall.



"Diary of Sarah Catherine Dorrough McDanal 1879-1967"

When I was eleven years old, we moved to Middlesboro, Kentucky. Mr. Cunningham had built a furnace there; it lasted a year. They dug a mountain down to have a level place to put the furnace and

build a town. We lived on Prospect Hill and had 45 steps from the bottom to the top. I never played or visited children. By then, Ma did not spin or weave anymore. I had learned to crochet. I guess I made a thousand yards of the same little edge. There was always quilt pieces to cut; I was 10 years old then in 1889. Children could not start school until they were eight, so Pa got the neighbors together and hired a teacher. We had a class room in our house and I liked to study. At eleven years old, I studied Geography, English Arithmetic. It was an old blue back speller, Appelton's 5th reader and dictionary and we used a big double slate. That was the last schooling I got. I was smart in learning and for one thing, I was tired of crocheting and piecing quilts so I stuck to my books. In 1890 we moved to Mingo, Tennessee. Ma, Myra, Ester and Frank went on the train. Pa, Marvin and me walked 8 miles thru the snow, it was about 15 inches deep. We enjoyed it. This took us 'bout 5 hours-8 miles in 15 inch snow. No roads just railroad tracks to walk on between two mountains. A railroad and a creek in the valley. You hear of the wild days-there was the Hatfield and McCoy feud.

TAXING THINGS

Penalty Relief Due to Reasonable Cause

If you receive a notice of penalty from the IRS, first, check to see if the information is correct. If you can resolve an issue in your notice, there may be no penalty.

The IRS will consider any sound reason for failing to file, make a deposit, or pay tax when due, including:

- Fire, casualty, natural disaster or other disturbances
- Inability to obtain records
- Death, serious illness, incapacitation or unavoidable absence of the taxpayer or a member of the taxpayer's immediate family
- Other reason which establishes that you used all ordinary business care and prudence to meet your Federal tax obligations but were nevertheless unable to do so

Note: A lack of funds is not reasonable cause for failure to file or pay on time. However, the reasons for the lack of funds may meet reasonable cause criteria for the failure-to-pay penalty.

Facts Establishing Reasonable Cause:

- What happened and when did it happen?
- What facts and circumstances prevented you from filing or paying your tax during the period of time you did not file or pay your taxes timely?
- How did the facts and circumstances affect your ability to file or pay your taxes or perform your other day-to-day responsibilities?
- Once the facts and circumstances changed, what actions did you take to file or pay your taxes?
- In the case of a Corporation, Estate or Trust, did the affected person or a member of that individual's immediate family have sole authority to execute the return or make the deposit or payment?

Interest charged on a penalty will be reduced or removed when that penalty is reduced or removed. If an unpaid balance remains, interest will continue to accrue until the account is fully paid.

Fishing the Ten Thousand Islands in October

This is arguably one of the best months of the year here. The Redfish continue to bite well. Fishing for them on the outside Islands on the incoming tide is best. There are many

methods that work for these fish. You can use shrimp on a cork, or shrimp on the bottom. Jigs work really well; and if you use scented tails or tip with shrimp, it works that much better. Work your jig as slow as you can without hooking the bottom. You want to bounce it slightly off the bottom.

The Snook bite also continues to be really good. The best bite in the Islands has also been on the incoming tide. The same jig will work. But top water lures are a great way to get some action early in the morning. Work a top water lure along the shorelines or over shallow oyster bars as the tide rises. Fishing a DOA shrimp or Bait buster mullet along the edges of the mangroves once the tide gets up a little is a great way to cover an area. Work these lures with patience, not too fast. The back country Snook fishing should also pick up this month as water temps drop down.

Sea trout on the grass flats can be taken with jigs or popping cork rigs this month.

Tarpon are migrating back thru the area so it is a great month to catch yourself a grand slam here. Look for rolling fish offshore and in the river mouths. But they will be spread all thru the Islands this month as long as the weather holds. Whichever species you prefer, this is a great month. You can't beat the fall fishing!

Living Gulf Coast

Blue Crab (Callinectes sapidus) Nicknames:

Maryland blue crab / Status: FL=stable,

IUCN=NE / Life span: to 3 years / Length: 3-7 in. across the carapace (76-177 mm) / Weight: 8-14 oz (0.22-0.39 kg) / Reproduces: in the estuary of the backbay / Found: Throughout the inshore waters of SW Florida.



The official state crustacean of Maryland, the blue crab was once very abundant in the waters and inlets of the Chesapeake Bay. In recent years these crabs, along with horseshoe crabs and Chesapeake oysters, have decreased dramatically as a result of coastal pollution.

This prized commercial shellfish can be purchased fresh at several fish markets. During the harvest season the deeper waters are riddled with crab-trap markers. It's interesting to note that although it's a popular food from the Atlantic coast to Argentina, the blue crab is considered too small to bother with along the Pacific Coast of Central and South America and is left un-harvested. Hitch-hiking across the ocean in the ballast of commercial shipping vessels, the blue crab is considered an invasive species in the Baltic Sea, North Sea, Mediterranean, and the Black Sea where, when discovered, it is immediately eradicated. The blue crab is fed upon by humans, cownose rays, tarpon, permit, and sharks; immature crabs are speared by great blue herons and anhinga.

Stone Crab (Menippe mercenaria) Nicknames: mud crab, Florida



stone crab / Status: FL=stable, IUCN=LC / Life span: 7 to 8 years / Length: 3.5-4 in. (91-101 mm) / Weight: 1-1.5 lb (0.45-0.70 kg) / Reproduces: in the estuaries and nearshore waters of the gulf / Found: Throughout the inshore and near shore waters of SW Florida.

Long considered a Florida delicacy, the stone crab is highly sought after by seafood lovers. Literally tens of thousands of stone crab traps are put into the nearshore gulf waters from the Panhandle to the Florida Keys every season, which runs from October 15 to May 15. Stone crab, per pound, is the most expensive seafood served in the U.S.

The stone crab harvest is different from the blue crab in that the whole crab is never taken, only its claws, which constitute 50 percent of its body weight. The living animal is tossed back into the ocean, allowed to regenerate its lost claws over the next two to three years. The mortality rate of the de-clawed stone crabs is quite high, however, with studies indicating that as many as 47 percent of the crabs die when both claws are taken and 28 percent die after a single amputation. As high as these numbers are, they are still more sustainable than the blue crab fishery where the whole crab is taken.

The stone crabs are a popular food for night herons, bonnethead sharks, stingrays, and cow-nosed rays, as well as octopus. The stone crab feeds on detritus, carrion, algae, and marine mollusks, including oysters and scallops.

LOCAL HISTORY

Locals remember this building on Begonia Street as the fish house built by Lloyd "Barrel Head" House (Doug House's grandfather). Alma Jean House's parents, Walter and Beatrice Brown, owned and operated it for many years. Now, residents enjoy the seafood here at City Seafood.

Glenda Hancock's parents, Virgie and Wiley Dickerson (with their friend Bob Combs), purchased the building from the Brown's in 1964. Virgie grew up in Marco, married Wiley and moved to Naples where she worked on the docks of Kelly's Fish House, heading shrimp in season. Wiley worked at the Combs Fish House before they bought the fish house in Everglades City. After the first year (which was very successful) Bob Combs sold out to the Dickerson's. Virgie would do the bookwork and take in the fish whenever her husband was away. They purchased mullet, mackerel and pompano from the fishermen; then either Wiley or his son Wayne would haul the fish to Georgia, the East Coast and do long hauls to New York during run season; the roe they would ship to buyers from Japan. During season the hours would run into days with only a couple of hours sleep. They also had boats from Ft. Myers and N. Carolina that would bring in the shrimp.

Glenda remembers that everything her Mom cooked was her specialty, but when she made coconut and pumpkin pies, she always made four of each at a time! She always wanted to take the top floor off and turn it into a restaurant, serving fresh seafood (a first for the area).

Shortly after the park began enforcing new rules on fishing and the State stepped in to regulate the fishing industry, Wiley sold the business in 1979 to purchasers wishing to run crabs. Also, when he was diagnosed with cancer and unable to continue in the business, the Dickerson's moved to Estero.

Doug Brown (grandson of the Dickerson's) submitted this photo taken in 1989 when he was a Deputy here. He says "It is interesting that it has been made into a restaurant because that is always what my dad had envisioned it to be after the fishing industry began to fall off."

From Savannah's Eyes

For the past few weeks the Life South blood mobile has been parked near my class at Little Hall. I would always pass it, yet never stopped since I have a terrible fear of needles. Even when it comes to getting shots, my mother would have to hold my hand or sit next to me.



One day after getting out of class early, I was a bit shocked and interested at the sign outside of the mobile which said, "Donate today and save 3 lives." It was then that I knew I had to face my fear and donate. So I bravely stepped inside, shaking and light headed, as I looked to my right and saw students with needles in their arms. After filling out some paper work, the nurse then took me into a room to prick my finger to see my blood type. I sat down and propped my feet up on a comfy plush seat, as the nurses gave me a snack and apple juice so I wouldn't pass out. To my right I saw one of the nurses holding a long, skinny tube with a thick looking needle on one end and a medium bag on the other. This is when I started to freak out. I was very close to backing out and leaving, but I knew I needed to go through with it because I'm not a quitter. I was holding back tears as the nurse stuck it in my arm, not because it hurt but because I was VERY scared. After 20 minutes it was done and I donated blood. I left the mobile with a free shirt, more snacks, and satisfaction that I not only conquered my fear of needles but I also helped save 3 lives by doing something that took less than 30 minutes. So even if you're scared of needles or have a fear of blood, all it takes is a few minutes of bravery to help save someone's life.

FAKAHATCHEE STRAND BOARDWALK EXPANSION and more...



Phase I will be starting soon for the expansion of the Boardwalk on US41. Eventually, a new visitor center and other projects will be completed. Their Project Goals (in partnership with the Florida Park Service) are as follows:

- 1) Improve visitor safety by building a new arrival zone off the highway and new parking area complete with restrooms, picnic facilities, orientation signs, and viewing opportunities. Other improvements include a bridge over the canal paralleling the Tamiami Trail that will become a feature in itself and open up new areas of the park to the public.
- 2) Create the Fakahatchee's first ever interpretive pavilion. This will be on the far side of the canal and have a wraparound cracker style porch with expansive views of the surrounding prairie. Its contents will tell the story of the Fakahatchee and inspire visitors to explore further.
- 3) Link the new parking area, interpretive pavilion, and the original boardwalk site with a series of new ADA accessible trails and boardwalks, ensuring that all visitors will have the opportunity for number of loop walks and not have to enter and exit the same way. These new trails and boardwalks include:
- a low-level boardwalk across the salt marsh, with wheel stop edges, but no side railings to provide an uninterrupted view of the habitat.
- a "Canopy Walk" along the edge of the Strand that gradually rises to a 20' shaded observation platform with views over the wet prairie on one side and the forest on the other, before descending through the Strand,
- a crushed-shell path, overlook, and rain shelter with wildlife viewing opportunities around a newly accessible lake. Upgrade and widen the existing aging boardwalk that winds through a section of virgin cypress forest to an alligator hole and repopulate the route with native orchids and bromeliads propagated by the park to create a unique "Epiphyte Walk."
- 4) Build an outdoor classroom at the original boardwalk site for school programs.

Note: Work on the new parking area should start in the first quarter of 2016 and the bridge across the canal and low level boardwalk linking the new site to the original should be completed by the end of 2016. Panther Deaths

The remains of a 4-month-old uncollared male panther (UCFP249) were collected on September 22 on CR858 (1/4 mile west of County Line Rd)

22 on CR858 (1/4 mile west of County Line Rd) in Collier County, and the remains of a 2-3 year old uncollared male Florida panther (UCFP250) were recovered on September 28 on US41 just west of the Trail Lakes Campground. The cause of both deaths was collision with a vehicle. Both carcasses were sent to the FWC Wildlife Research Lab in Gainesville lab for complete necropsies. These were the 28th and the 29th Florida panther mortalities and the 19th and the 20th road mortalities for 2015.

In addition to the above two deaths, the remains of K432, a 13-mo-old female panther, were collected on September 30 from the northbound lane of I-75 at the 102 mile marker in Collier County, a half-mile west of CR951. The cause of death was vehicle collision. This is the 30th panther mortality and the 21st road mortality documented for 2015. K432 was one of three kittens of FP219 who was struck and killed very near this area 12 days prior on September 18. FP219's litter was handled at the den on September 22, 2014, when the kittens were 23 days old. One of the other siblings, K434, was removed from the wild to Zoo Miami when she was 11-weeks-old after getting separated from the rest of the family.


