
Interviews by Trenton Mr. Tribble

The snow was about a foot deep. I wrapped my baby in a blanket and walked about three miles to Ma and Pa's cabin. They were leaving the next morning not letting me know. The miners had



gone out on a strike. We tramped the hills and dug ginseng. We had to do something to live. John L. Lewis was a big union man; they were supposed to feed us. Bob went once and got a pound of meat and a little bag of flour and a pound of coffee. It would be a week before they came back. We made what we had to last us. Bob and Mother dug ginseng and divided it. They got about 2 pounds in two days. She dried her 2 pounds and got 12 dollars per pound. Bob sold his for 8 dollars a pound and came home with plenty of groceries. We had milk for the babies, Eagle Brand was all the kind of milk. The next day I packed us lunch and took the children and left his Ma at home. We got 4 pounds of ginseng after two days we had about 9 pounds to sell. His Mother split hers and put salt in it on the stove to dry it. We sold ours but when they examined hers they found out she had ruined it and brought it back home. She wanted part of ours and I told her "nothing doing".

Recipe for Good Eating Apple Crisp

Ingredients: 9" pie shell (unbaked)

Filling: ¾ cup packed light brown sugar

2 TBS cornstarch 1 tsp ground cinnamon

½ tsp each of freshly grated nutmeg, ground cardamon, and ground cloves

6 cups ½" sliced and peeled Granny Smith apples

Topping (mix all together with fingers):

½ unbleached all-purpose flour

½ cup rolled oats

1/3 cup packed light brown sugar

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp ground cinnamon

1/8 tsp baking soda

4 TBS cold unsalted butter, cut into small cubes

Preheat oven to 350° . Mix together sugar, cornstarch, cinnamon, nutmeg, cardamon and cloves until blended. Add apples and toss to coat. Pour the apple slices into the pie shell, including sugar and juices; then sprinkle topping evenly over the filling, leaving an inch border uncovered. Bake $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours or until juices are bubbling and the topping is lightly browned. Cool before cutting.

Note: My 9-yr-old granddaughter Alyssia and I made this recipe for our family Thanksgiving dinner in Nashville; very delicious and easy to make. She wanted me to include it in The Mullet Rapper for others to enjoy. Happy Holidays! Patty

TAXING THINGS

YEAR'S END WRAPUP

Amidst the holiday season activities and pleasantries, it's important to keep in mind a few real time necessities for the tax season.

If you are required to make estimated tax payments, don't forget to file your 1040-ES by January 15. You can make your payment online with IRS Direct Pay. Go to irs.gov and select the 'Pay Your Tax Bill' option.

For those lucky folks who turned 70 ½ years of age this year, remember that you must make a minimum withdrawal from your IRA account before December 31. There is a serious penalty (50%) imposed for failure to make the withdrawal. Your IRA finance institution can advise on the amount required.

And, just in case you have some great ideas about the income tax program, this year there is the opportunity to let the IRS know your thoughts. Do you have an idea that could help the IRS simplify reporting requirements, streamline procedures or shorten forms? Here's your chance to let the IRS know. Fill out Form 13285A, Reducing Tax Burden on America's Taxpayers, and send it in. The Taxpayer Burden Reduction website lists examples of how the IRS is working to reduce taxpayer burden:

Fishing The Ten Thousand Islands in December

Well, November certainly was a great month! Warm temps and more baitfish than I can ever remember seeing before. The fishing has

remained strong. We have experienced warmer than normal temps and some less than great water quality in different places. But, now that the temps have finally come down and the water temps have dropped, the fishing is changing.


Black Drum have shown up in good numbers, Snook fishing has picked up in the back country, Redfish are still around, Sea Trout are being caught and others such as Sheepshead, Mangrove Snapper are all available this month. The cooler weather is a nice change and the variety of fish you can catch makes for an exciting day of fishing. A jig tipped with shrimp will catch everything I mentioned and then some. Fishing will be good on the outside islands, in the rivers and in the back country. Tides, winds and water temps should dictate where you fish according to what you're after.

If you are just after a good day of action then catch an incoming tide on the outside and start fishing shorelines with the jig. You will locate plenty of action. The back country action can be better on the outgoing tide when water is lower. The rivers can also be good on the outgoing tides. A great time to catch a variety so get out and enjoy the fishing here. Capt. Mike Merritt

Panther Deaths

On October 31 FWC staff recovered the remains of a 4-month-old uncollared male



FWC panther staff recovered the remains of an 8-10 month old uncollared male Florida panther (UCFP254) at the intersection of Immokalee Road and Everglades Boulevard in Collier County on November 23. The cause of death was collision with a vehicle.

FWC staff recovered the remains of a 2.8-year-old male Florida panther (K387) on SR29 between the junctions Pollywog Road and SR78 in Glades County (north of the Caloosahatchee River). The cause of death was collision with a vehicle. K387 was a kitten of FP192 and was marked at her den in the Corn Dance Unit of Big Cypress National Preserve in February of 2013. K387 was killed 103km (65 miles) from the den site where he was marked. This is the 35th Florida panther mortality and 25th road mortality for 2015.

The total of 35 mortalities is a new record for mortalities in a year and 25 ties the record for road mortalities set in 2014. Please drive carefully in the southwest Florida rural area which is home to the Florida panther as well as other endangered wildlife.



Living Gulf Coast

Tripletail (*Lobotes surinamensis*) Other names: buoy fish, flasher, biajaca de la mar / Status: FL=stable, ICUN=NE / Life span: to 20 years /

Length: 14-42 in. (.35-1.1 m) / Weight: 3-8 lb (1.3-3.6 kg); Florida record: 40 lb 13 oz, IGFA: 42 lb 5 oz / Spawns: in the offshore waters / Found: Nearshore and inshore waters of SW Florida.

A primitive fish and the only member of its family, *Lobotidae*, the tripletail has some unusual habits, making it one of the easiest fish to catch in the Gulf of Mexico. It is called buoy fish for good reason: it has the unusual habit of hanging



around almost any floating or stationary object in the sea. Locally it is often targeted by anglers shortly after the stone-crab traps are set in mid-October every year. Anglers run the traps with a light tackle rod in hand and a live well filled with shrimp. Once they discover a basking buoy fish, they turn the boat around, head upwind, and drift down unto the unsuspecting fish. A fresh shrimp cast out with no sinker within a few feet of this predator cannot be turned down. Once hooked, the tripletail is a powerful adversary. It dives, runs, and flops up and out of the water like a 10-pound pancake. The larger ones tend to wrap the trap line and escape, but the smaller ones come home for dinner. A delicious eating fish, the tripletail, because it is so easy to catch, has been overharvested by local anglers and is now a rare catch. Twenty years ago the tripletail was so plentiful that almost every buoy held one or more fish. Today, an angler might run 200 traps before spotting one. Ten years ago there were no size or catch limits on tripletail, which didn't help the survival rate. Recently Florida Fish and Wildlife adopted both slot and take limits on tripletail. The tripletail eats small fish, shrimp, and crabs. It is often too large to be eaten by anything other than sharks and goliath grouper. A solitary wanderer, its range is worldwide in tropical waters.

FWC News

The recreational harvest season for snook closed on December 1 in Gulf state and federal waters (including Monroe County and Everglades National Park) and will remain closed through February 29, 2016, reopening to harvest March 1, 2016. Snook can continue to be caught and released during the closed season. This and other regular season closures are designed to help conserve the species during vulnerable times such as cold weather.

Atlantic state and federal waters (including Lake Okeechobee and the Kissimmee River) will close December 15 this year through January 31, 2016, reopening to harvest Feb. 1, 2016.

(Citharexylum fruticosum)

It has been said that "no yard in Florida should be without a Fiddlewood." It is considered to be one of the most beautiful of our native trees.

With its shrub-like appearance, many landscapers plant the Fiddlewood as a hedge, spacing the trees 8 feet apart along a property line.

These trees do well in the dry woodlands of south Florida, requiring part sun to part shade, and are extremely drought tolerant. Being a hearty tree, few insects or diseases seem to bother the Fiddlewood. Its oblong 5 inch leaves are a very glossy green on the top and dull green underneath.

The trunk can either be multistemmed or single. The bark is light brown and its hard wood has been used to make musical instruments (thus, the name "Fiddlewood").

One of the most attractive features of this beautiful tree is its blossoms which are small fragrant white flowers with 2 to 4 inch clusters, blooming from spring to fall. When not in bloom, the tree produces marble-like berries, fruit that is enjoyed by our native bees, butterflies and birds.

Overall, with little care, you will enjoy this nice Florida native with its fragrant blossoms.


30th Anniversary Gala for the Collier County Museums



BIG CYPRESS NEWS Water Restoration Project

A restoration project, known as the Ochopee Sheet Flow Restoration Plan in the Big Cypress National Preserve, will deliver hydrological benefits across a broad expanse of Big Cypress wetlands – 20 square miles in total – through the strategic placement of canal plugs, the installation of underground culverts and the removal of a mile-long levee. The regional project began in 2013 and will be completed in 2016 as part of the centennial celebration marking the 100th anniversary of the National Park Service.

Ribbon Cutting Ceremony PostponedA ribbon cutting ceremony was scheduled for the U.S. 41 &

SR/CR 951 Intersection Improvement Project on December 4 with speakers Commissioners Tim Nance, Donna Fiala, and Penny Taylor; Growth Management Department Head David Wilkison; and Transportation Engineering Division Director Jay Ahmad. Due to inclement weather, the ceremony has been postponed until further notice.

These projects were part of the Florida Department of Transportation Joint Agreement reimbursing the county for approximately \$14 million of the approximately \$20 million construction cost. The US41/951 project realigned the intersection to improve a skew that was a safety concern; it also added bike lanes, sidewalk, and a 10-foot shared use pathway on the east side of Collier Blvd. In addition, the project constructed Collier Area Transit bus stop enhancements both on north and southbound Collier Blvd. The SR951 Resurfacing Project milled and resurfaced the existing four-lane roadway, widened and paved the roadway shoulders, added designated bike lanes with pavement markings and signs, upgraded traffic signals at the East Naples Fire Station and at the Manatee Road intersection where CAT bus stop enhancements were added both northbound and southbound.


