Important Events That Helped Shape SW Florida History

April 8, 1923 - News heats up about 'lost' Tamiami trail blazers

It was a saga that drew news coverage across the country-- but with a much happier ending.

When 24 Southwest Florida men set out on April 4, 1923 to drive across the Everglades to Miami on an unpaved trail, newspapers reported they expected to complete the trip in three days. The men, mostly Fort Myers civic and business leaders, embarked upon the drive to publicize the need for state funding to pave the "Tamiami Trail" through the Everglades.

When the 10-car motorcade failed to arrive by April 6, Miami papers declared the group lost -- and began a week of stories documenting efforts to locate the group with unsuccessful search parties and airplane expeditions, mixed with speculation about likely hunger, battles with wild animals, and other dangers of the brutal Florida swamp.

In reality, the men always knew where they were and had assistance of Seminole guides familiar with the Everglades.

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

Recipe for Good Eating Sautéed Sea Trout with Dill & Capers

6 sea trout fillets, skin & bones removed 1/4 cup capers 1 Tablespoon fresh dill (can use seeds, but sprigs are better) Butter for sautéing

Fish seasonings: Garlic powder Black Pepper Juice of 1 lemon

Prepare fillets, rinse and pat dry. Garnish each fillet with garlic, pepper and lemon juice to taste (omit any of the ingredients you do not like). I use butter for this recipe...but you can substitute it with olive oil. Sauté the fillets on one side until partially cooked and turn. Add the capers and dill and sauté until completely cooked. White Crowned Pigeons Can Be Seen in Everglades City!

We are home to many beautiful birds that are native to Florida, and those that visit during the winter months. One year-around resident is a not-so-commonly-seen bird...the white crowned Pigeon. I have seen them on several occasions in the large banyan treetops along the Barron River in Everglades City (especially the one across from Paradise Island).

They like to feed on berries, so when the Banyans berries are abundant, keep

an eye out and you may see one! The best way to spot them is to look for the white contrasting head against their slate-grey bodies. They are related to doves and common pigeons, so their bodies are very similar in shape. They are strong and fast fliers, and will take long flights over water to reach their desired destination.

White Crowned Pigeons inhabit the Caribbean and into the very southern tip of Florida...including Everglades City! Flocks are usually seen flying swiftly overhead, or perching in treetops, feeding on berries in the trees.

In Florida, they breed most commonly during July and August and they will often nest in colonies. Male calls to attract female while perching erect, chest puffed out. In courtship, male struts and nods much like common pigeons. The nest site is usually on fork in horizontal branch, low (below 15') in mangroves or other shrubs and may be up to 30' above ground or over the water, or on ground on small islands. Their nests are a loosely-constructed platform of twigs, lined with grasses or other fine material. Keep an eye out for them this spring and summer and you may be lucky enough to catch a glimpse of one.

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Living Gulf Coast

Tarpon (Megalopsatlanticus)

Other names: silver king, silverfish / Status: FL=stable, IUCN=NE / Life span: to 55 years / Length: 45-90 in. (114-228 cm) / Weight: 50-150 lb

The tarpon—along with the snook, redfish, and seatrout is the most commonly sought-after fish in Southwest Florida.

These four fish form the backbone of many of the area's fishing tournaments, and catching all four in one day is considered an inshore grand slam. Of the four, the most difficult to hang onto is the magnificent silver king—the tarpon.



Every spring, beginning in late March with the warming of the gulf waters, the first schools of tarpon arrive from the south, some from as far away as the west coast of Africa.

Anglers, who have just recovered from last year's brawls, spool on fresh line, sharpen their circle hooks, and oil their reels in anticipation of fresh battles. Strictly a catch-andrelease sport, tarpon fishing is a major draw for anglers the world over. From Boca Grande Pass to Bonita Springs, fishing guides and amateurs alike try their hands at catching one of these powerful adversaries.

The tarpon does not fight like any other fish. Once firmly hooked, it literally explodes with energy. Tales have been told of green fish (a term used by anglers to describe a fish that's freshly hooked) jumping into boats, breaking ankles and legs, then jumping back out. Lines part, leaders break, knots fail, rods snap, and guides wince as the gears in their reels start to make that crunching sound familiar to anyone who has tangled with a tireless silver king.

Anglers use heavy tackle, with a minimum of 80-pound monofilament leader, 5/0 to 7/0 circle hooks and a variety of baits to hook the tarpon. Pinfish or greenback tossed in front of a school with a stout spinning outfit is a favorite, while bottom fishing with boat rods and cut mullet or catfish tails is another. There are dozens of different techniques to get a silver king to

bite, but it's when you finally touch the leader and release the fish that teaches you just how difficult catching one of these creatures can be.

By June the tarpon run starts to dissipate. By this time the fish can be found spawning in water 300 feet deep, due west of the passes it abandons. The larvae return to the estuaries on the incoming tides and hide in the safety of the gnarled roots of the red mangrove, waiting a year or more before venturing into deeper water. Two- to three-foot tarpon can sometimes be found along the spillways of the "Ding" Darling refuge.

The tarpon feeds on a wide variety of animals. In Boca Grande Pass it feasts on tiny pass crabs, each weighing less than an ounce, often consuming hundreds of crabs a day. Along the beaches the tarpon will crash into balled schools of glass minnows, charging through them with its mouth wide open, taking in 20 or 30 minnows at a time, and repeating this process for hours on end. Other favorite prey is striped mullet, catfish, stone and blue crabs, menhaden, greenbacks, threadfin herring, and shrimp. The tarpon is capable of surviving in the hot, oxygenpoor gulf waters because of a primitive lung that allows it to gulp air. This is the reason the tarpon can often be spotted rolling on the surface.

A host of predators take young tarpon: pelicans, herons, osprey, larger tarpon, and alligators. Only bigger sharks are capable of tackling a mature tarpon, weighing 50 pounds or more. Two sharks in particular are famous for following schools of tarpon; the great hammerhead and the bull shark. Many stories have been told about Old Hitler, the 12-foot-plus hammerhead that is rumored to haunt Boca Grande Pass. An equal measure of tall tales have been told about 10-foot-plus bull sharks biting hooked fish a few miles off of Tarpon Beach on Sanibel.

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TAXING THINGS

Can't Pay Taxes On Time? Here Are Some Tips

The IRS urges you to file on time even if you can't pay what you owe.

This saves you from potentially paying a penalty for a late filed return. Here is what to do if you can't pay all your taxes by the due date.

- 1. File on time and pay as much as you can. You can pay online, by phone, or by check or money order.
- 2. Get a loan or use a credit card to pay your tax. The interest and fees charged by a bank or credit card company may be less than IRS interest and penalties.
- 3. Use the Online Payment Agreement tool. You don't need to wait for IRS to send you a bill before you ask for a payment plan. The best way is to use the Online Payment Agreement tool on IRS.gov. You can also file Form 9465, Installment Agreement Request, with your tax return. You can even set up a direct debit agreement. With this type of payment plan, you won't have to write a check and mail it on time each month.
- 4. Don't ignore a tax bill. If you get a bill, don't ignore it. The IRS may take collection action if you ignore the bill. Contact the IRS right away to talk about your options. If you are suffering financial hardship, the IRS will work with you.

Remember to file on time. Pay as much as you can by the tax deadline and pay the rest as soon as you can.

As we celebrate 100 years of the National Park Service in 2016, we encourage everyone to take the challenge to the next level! The Centennial Triathlon Challenge is 100 miles for 100 years! 

Look out boaters – Manatees are on the move

Taking their cues from the warm spring weather, Florida manatees have begun leaving their winter retreats and heading north along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts and through inland waters. So if you're a boater enjoying spring days on the water, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) cautions you to look out for manatees and follow posted manatee zones.

From April 1 through Nov. 15, seasonal <u>manatee zones</u> require boaters to slow down in certain areas to prevent manatees from being struck by motorboats or personal watercraft.

FWC law enforcement officers will be on patrol in state waters to remind boaters of the seasonal manatee speed zones and will take enforcement actions when necessary. Manatee zones and maps are available at MyFWC.com/Manatee, where you can select "Protection Zones" for links to county maps.



"Our officers do their very best to support conservation of this species," said FWC Capt. Gary Klein. "We ask that boaters take notice of the zones and do their part as well by increasing their awareness of the possible presence of manatees."

Because manatees are large, slow-moving and difficult to detect when underwater, operators of boats and personal watercraft need to take basic steps to avoid causing injury to manatees:

- Wear polarized sunglasses to help spot manatees.
- Look for the large circles on the water, also known as manatee footprints, indicating the presence of a manatee below.
- Look for a snout sticking up out of the water.
- Follow posted manatee zones while boating.

The FWC also asks anyone seeing an injured, distressed, sick or dead manatee to call the agency's Wildlife Alert Hotline, <u>888-404-3922</u> (FWCC) or dial #FWC or *FWC on a cell phone.

You can watch manatees without disturbing them if you follow "Guidelines for protecting native wildlife – Florida Manatees," a brochure that includes tips for canoers, kayakers, paddle boarders, snorkelers and scuba divers. It's available at MyFWC.com/Manatees, click on "Boat, Personal Watercraft and Paddle-sport Operators" and then on "Paddle-sport Operators."

Support the FWC's manatee research, rescue and management efforts by purchasing a "Save the Manatee" Florida license plate at BuyaPlate.com, or by donating \$5 to receive an FWC manatee decal by going to MyFWC.com/Manatee and clicking on "Decals."
