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

"Each year we are impressed by the quality of our healthcare scholarship applicants, and we are fortunate to have this opportunity to support our future medical





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# OK. There's Something Fishy Going On Here


Local Artist Gives Personality to a New Kind of Fish!

### Recipe for Good Eating

# Fresh Mango Sorbet This is ridiculously easy!

#### SORBET RECIPE:

Cubed, fresh mangoes Simple syrup Lime juice to taste



#### SIMPLE SYRUP RECIPE:

Equal parts water and sugar (1 cup water, 1 cup sugar)

Place cubed mangoes into food processor and puree until smooth. Add simple syrup so that it almost covers mangoes in processor. Add lime juice to taste. Start with one tablespoon, taste and adjust as needed.

Pour mango puree into loaf pan, cover and freeze. Serve slightly softened with whipped cream (if desired). This recipe can also be poured into popsicle molds. If you prefer not to add the sugar, or if it is not needed because your mangoes are very sweet, simply add water and omit the sugar. It is really that easy, **and** a great way to use up your fresh fruit before it goes bad!

# Seaplanes Landing in Everglades City? It's a Possibility...

Collier County Airport Authority has agreed to pursue a study of the feasibility of establishing a seaplane landing area and ramp at the Everglades Airpark. The study will be fully financed by the county and any resulting project will be at no cost to Everglades City. Here are some of the findings of the preliminary study:

The preferred sea lane location and alignment (for takeoff and landing) was determined to be in Chokoloskee Bay west of and parallel to the existing paved landside runway at Everglades Airpark. Much of the surrounding airspace is already protected as a result of the existing hard surfaced runway. The placement of sea lane marker buoys would require additional approvals from the U.S. Coast Guard, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and may require a submerged lands lease from the State of Florida. Sea lane markers require periodic maintenance as well as United States Coast Guard (USCG) approval prior to installation. Therefore, given the presence of nautical traffic in the bay, regulatory and maintenance considerations, a marked sea lane is not a recommended option in this case.

However, due the uniqueness of the location, additional effort will be required to determine the actual or potential environmental impact and mitigate these impacts.

#### **Cost Estimates:**

**Total order of magnitude probable cost estimate: \$1.2 Million** Mayor Sammy has appointed Mike Klein, former chairman of the Collier County Airport Authority, to represent the City in monitoring and reporting to him on progress of this endeavor.

#### **Living Gulf Coast**

**Royal Palm** (*Roystonea elata, Roystonea regia*) Other names: none / Status: FL=stable, IUCN=NE / Life span: more than 100 years / Height: 50-90 ft. (15-27.4 m) /

Reproduces by producing a drupe and can propagate naturally on the islands / Found: Along McGregor Blvd and throughout the greater Everglades and Big Cypress National Preserve.

The name fits the tree perfectly, "Royal Palm." With a tall, stately trunk that resembles poured concrete while the canopy displays long, dark green palm fronds that rustle in the slightest breeze, this palm symbolizes the tropical nature of south Florida. Miami's Biscayne Boulevard and McGregor Boulevard in Ft. Myers are both lined with hundreds of these towering palms. The northern portion of McGregor, from College Parkway to the Edison Estate near downtown is the most beautiful boulevard in

Lee County, in large part due to the planting of hundreds of these magnificent palms that tower high above the roadway.

There are two species commonly found in Florida. The native species, *Roystonea elata*, can still be found at Collier Seminole State Park which is located on Highway 41. The Florida species differs only slightly from the more popular Cuban tree, *Roystonea regia*, in that its trunk tends to remain more symmetrical than the Cuban species over time.



Most of the trees along McGregor are Cuban royals.

Royals are salt tolerant and very well adapted to living with hurricanes. In major storms the royals utilize their "break-away" palm fronds, allowing the tree to avoid being uprooted by strong winds through the release of all of its foliage long before the storms powerful winds can topple the tree. The living bud remains safe inside the dark green cap of the royal, called the crown shaft and new fronds began appearing within weeks after the storm has passed.

Their fruit is covered in an edible exterior, known scientifically as a drupe, which is readily eaten by birds and other wildlife, with the internal seed passing unscathed through the digestive tract of the animals and dispersed accordingly. This method of propagation is fascinating in that primitive trees do not produce edible seeds, fruits and drupes. These adaptations came only after the arrival of land animals some 400 million years ago during the Devonian period. Today, this relationship is so entwined that most trees, palms, shrubs and plants, lacking birds, mammals and insects to pollinate and disseminate their seeds, would perish.

# My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock

July and August are great months for planting, but also great for getting things prepared for our prime gardening season and a good time to make sure the yard is prepared for a hurricane or severe storm. Here are some things you can do to get things ready:

Solarize: If you have garden beds that are simply growing weeds waiting for your winter garden, solarizing is a way to mitigate the weeds and get the soil better prepared for gardening season. First get rid of any growth in the beds by weed whacking or pulling the weeds. Till that matter into the soil and then completely moisten the garden bed. Finally, cover the area with clear plastic, and then secure the edges so the soil bakes through the rest of the summer. This serves a two-fold purpose. You enrich the soil with the broken down garden matter, and you snuff out any weeds by functionally baking them to death. When you unveil your garden bed in September, you will have a healthy, weed free starting point!

**Repot & Prune:** This is a great time of year to re-pot any root-bound plants or plants that are showing signs of failure to thrive. Use a good repotting medium that includes; compost, soil and a lightener like vermiculite. Choose a pot that will give your plant enough room to grow for another calendar year, and one with good drainage.

Most of our trees have completed their fruiting or blooming cycles by this time of year. This is when we can spot dead or dying branches, so it is time to remove them. Try to never leave a "stub" and trim back to the lateral branch. Leaving small stubs leaves the door open for pests like wood borers - so this is important. Removing these branches also speeds the healing process for the plants and makes room for the new growth. You should also look for and remove crossing and rubbing branches. These can cause weakness in the branch and "wounds" that do not heal which can affect a plant's overall health.

Hurricane Preparation: Yes, our plants need to be prepared too. Now is the time to look for branches that are weak, fractured or hanging too close to the house. Get rid of anything that is too close to windows. Coconut palms can hold extremely heavy crops of coconuts. This excess weight will easily bring a tree down in a severe storm. We lost one in Hurricane Andrew and during Wilma. The coconuts are also very heavy projectiles during storms that can cause severe damage to your home and your neighbors too. Most importantly, try not to leave too much clutter outside that will need to be stored in the event of a storm. This will only complicate your preparation, and may be something you cannot find time for as a storm approaches.

Her favorite places to walk or drive were through the Fakahatchee Strand (she served as Treasurer of the Friends group for several years) and special outings along Loop Road.

Vicky was my companion on our bi-weekly trips to Naples to see the most recent movies at Mercado and we always included a leisurely afternoon lunch at Masa (Mexican) Restaurant or other interesting places to eat. It was the end of January just prior to meeting for a show when Vicky collapsed in her car; I immediately called 911 for an ambulance to take her to the hospital. That was the day she learned she had congestive heart failure, endured surgery and the aftermath with additional complications. Since then I have missed her laughter, our conversations about world events, books we were reading and life in general. She had a brilliant mind with a combination of wit and wisdom.

Another regular annual outing was afternoon "tea at the Ritz" with other friends. We would get all dressed up and enjoy an afternoon of music, petite sandwiches, champagne and, of course, tea. In high season we would just meet at my house to celebrate "tea." Every year for Christmas Vicky would make calamondin liqueur from her ample supply of the fruit on her tree. # **Everglades National Park Wins Historic Preservation Grant-Our Votes Counted!**

Everglades National Park and the South Florida National Parks Trust (SFNPT) have won a \$250,000 historic preservation grant to restore the park's iconic Flamingo Visitor Center after a six-week national voting campaign.

The Partners in Preservation grant awarded by American Express and the National Trust for Historic Preservation will help to spur park efforts to revitalize the entire Flamingo district inside Everglades National Park.

The Flamingo Visitor Center was voted one of the top projects nationwide by the public during a "Vote Your Park" campaign organized by the National Trust, American Express and National Geographic to showcase preservation projects in national parks.

More than one million votes were cast online during the campaign. Everglades received 64,155 votes, the 7th highest total among the 20 participating national parks.

"We are grateful to everyone who supported Everglades National Park through this exciting campaign. The results are especially rewarding as this support corresponds with the 50th anniversary of the National Historic Preservation Act," said Superintendent Pedro Ramos of Everglades National Park.

The park will use the \$250,000 grant to repair the exterior of the visitor center, restore the surrounding landscape and improve the visitor experience in Flamingo while working toward the goal of opening a new visitor center inside the building.

With its distinctive breezeway and bright pink exterior, the Flamingo Visitor Center has served as a gateway to the Everglades and Florida Bay since the 1960s. The waterfront building was damaged in 2005 by back-to-back hurricanes and is now in dire need of repair.

Everglades National Park was one of 20 national parks competing for \$2 million in grant funding from the National Trust and American Express. Grants were awarded to the nine parks that received the most public votes during the Vote Your Park campaign. The grants celebrate the 100th anniversary of the National Park Service in 2016.

"We are thrilled with the response and support for Partners in Preservation: National Parks and are proud to be awarding \$2 million in grants to extraordinary sites that tell the story of our national park system and reflect the rich cultural resources within it," said Timothy J. #### **Preparation is Key to Crime Prevention**

In keeping with past off-season trends, Everglades City and the surrounding area has recently been experiencing a slight increase in burglaries and thefts. Currently, this victimization takes the form of burglaries to local businesses, thefts of boat motors and other fishing gear, thefts of golf carts, ATVs, and small equipment, and gasoline thefts. Your local sheriff's deputies understand that there are many issues that drive the current trend; including, basic depravity, the slower off-season economy, individuals who may have recently returned to the area from incarceration, and crime committed to feed drug habits.

The sheriff's office employs several traditional and non-traditional law enforcement strategies to prevent, detect, and intercept these crimes and the offenders who prey upon their own neighbors. The sheriff's office has been successful in some recent cases in apprehending suspects involved in recent crimes through the collection of valuable evidence, the obtaining of detailed witness statements, and the deputies' local knowledge of known offenders.

There have been other instances in which the arrest of a theft suspect was thwarted because the victim of the theft later refused to prosecute the offender because of historical area connections. While the decision to refuse prosecution is often the right of the victim, refusing to prosecute a known thief only serves to expose other area residents to additional victimization and loss of property.

There are many things that a property owner can do to assist in crime prevention efforts:

- •Upgrade physical security features on structures Install high resolution video surveillance system
- •Upgrade security lighting on structures
- •Record serial numbers of all equipment, boat motors, golf carts, and ATVs
- •Store frequently stolen equipment out of sight and in a secured area if possible
- •Call the sheriff's office dispatch center with all suspicious people and activity
