Holiday Cooking Safety Tips by Fire Chief Kingman Schuldt

As you plan your holiday menus don't forget about fire safety.

Did you know Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires? The number of home fires double on Thanksgiving and are elevated during holidays. So, let's add a pinch of fire safety to the menu. Keep these safety tips in mind as you prepare your holiday meals.

Turkey:

If you are roasting your turkey, make sure you set a timer. This way, you won't forget about the bird as you watch the parade or football.

If you are frying your turkey, use a fryer with thermostat controls. This will ensure the oil does not become over heated. Thaw your turkey completely. Ice on the bird will cause the oil to splatter.

Don't overfill the pot with oil. If you do, the oil will overflow when you add the turkey causing a fire hazard. Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the fryer. Also, always use the fryer outdoors. Stuffing and Potatoes:

Stand by your stove when you are boiling your potatoes or frying onions for stuffing. It is best to stay in the kitchen when you are frying, boiling or broiling. If you are in the kitchen, it is easier to catch spills or hazardous conditions before they become a fire.

Vegetables:

Keep the area around the stove clear of packaging, paper towels, and dish cloths; anything that can burn. Be sure to clean up any spills as they happen.

Be prepared. Keep a large pan lid or baking sheet handy in case you need to smother a pan fire. Turn pot handles towards the back of the stove so you don't bump them.

By following these safety tips, you will have a delicious and fire safe Thanksgiving holiday. Let the firefighters have dinner with their families, not yours.

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
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Small Town Taylor by Taylor Mayberry

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November Juvenile Smalltooth Sawfish Abundance Survey

In November, the NOAA Fisheries Service-Smalltooth Sawfish Research team conducted their bi-monthly sampling expedition in the coastal areas from Goodland to Crate Key, FL.

This was a very successful trip. The team captured, tagged and released four



larger sawfish. Among those captured, the team surgically implanted 10 and 5-year acoustic tags (the first group to do this on sawfish) in 4 animals. The largest individual was also tagged off Crate Key with a SPOT tag that provides GPS daily locations on where the animal is moving. All of this information will be extremely valuable in updating critical habitat information for larger juvenile sawfish.

Smalltooth sawfish are listed as Endangered under the Endangered Species Act and it is illegal to "take" (harass, harm, pursue, target, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, trap, or capture) this animal. The current core population is limited to waters off the coast of southwest Florida and incidental encounters between smalltooth sawfish and fishermen do occur. If you incidentally hook or net a smalltooth sawfish, please do not remove the animal from the water. Cut the line or gear as close to the animal as possible and release the animal immediately. Please exercise caution and never remove the saw.

If you see or accidentally catch a smalltooth sawfish, please report your encounter to 1-844-4SAWFISH.

All directed research is covered under permits EVER-2016-SCI-0016 and ESA-17787.

Recipes for Good Eating

Delicious Champagne Chicken

8 chicken cutlets

5 T butter and/or olive oil

2 T flour

1 to 1-1/2 c chicken broth

3/4 c light cream

3 T champagne mustard

Salt and pepper to taste



Dredge chicken in mixture of flour, salt and pepper. Brown the cutlets in butter and oil. Lower heat, remove chicken. Stir flour into drippings, slowly add broth, and stir constantly. Slowly add cream, stir, then stir in mustard and cook until sauce bubbles.

Option 1: Return chicken to pan, cover and simmer 10 minutes.

Option 2: Put chicken in baking pan, pour sauce over, cover with foil, and put in 300-degree oven for 20-30 minutes, until hot.

Serve over noodles or rice.



Fishing Gulf Coast

Fishing the Ten Thousand Islands in December.

Fishing has definitely changed with the cooler water temperatures. This month you will start catching different species such as Black Drum, Sheepshead, Spanish Mackerel, and Bluefish. Shrimp, shrimp! Fishing live shrimp will be your best bet for most fish this time of year!

Bigger Seatrout should be out on the grass flats and a popping cork and shrimp will do the trick. This will also you the get occasional Pompano doing the



same thing. You can also catch more Seatrout in the back country this month as they move up into the rivers.

Redfish will be more scattered and we catch a lot of smaller fish this time of year with some nice ones mixed in. The nice thing about using the shrimp for the Reds is that you will catch the Black Drum using the same method.

Fish along the shorelines on the incoming tide on the outside islands. If you're after some Snook action, then the back country is where you need to fish. They have moved into the back country and you can also catch them on live shrimp this time of year. Floating a shrimp along mangrove edges or free line a shrimp where the



current is pulling it near the structure or mangrove roots. They will be in heavy cover but will gladly dart out and eat a shrimp as it passes by.

D.O.A. CAL Tail

Fishing the deeper rock holes should produce the Sheepshead. Another good reason to fish shrimp is the variety of fish you will catch. It is not uncommon to catch 12 or more species in a day here. If you are using artificial lures to catch your fish, then a jig will be tops this month. This will work on the outside as well as the back country. I prefer root beer color in the back and white on the outside, but be sure to try different colors if the action is slow.

My favorite tails are the DOA Cal tails but the Gulps are also a good bet. And if you are snook fishing in the back, don't forget the DOA Shrimp. They work great for skipping baits back up under the mangroves. Get out and enjoy the winter bite this month! Good luck fishing!

Living Gulf Coast

The Lost Trail: Numerous access points throughout the 110-mile-long trail Website www.dep.state.fl.us/gwt/state/lakeotrail

The 110-mile Lake Okeechobee Scenic Trail, popularly known as the LOST trail, encircles the second-largest freshwater lake in the continental United States (Lake Michigan being the largest). The LOST Trail crosses five Florida counties—Hendry, Glades, Okeechobee, Martin, and Palm Beach. Most of the trail runs atop the Herbert Hoover Dike surrounding the lake, but long stretches have to be traversed along state and county highways. The longrange plan is to continue the LOST Trail entirely atop the 35-foot-

high dike, but erosion repairs, locks, and rivers canals and entering the Big "O" at different places make this a daunting task. It will likely decades before that dream comes to fruition.



The LOST trail is part of the Great Cross-Florida Hiking Trail (www.floridatrail.org) that runs from the Big Cypress National Preserve in southern Collier County to the Gulf Islands National Seashore in Pensacola. The best route for hikers is along the eastern shoreline of the lake, which avoids the 30-mile stretch in Glades County where access to the dike is impossible. Here the trail runs along State Highway 78, where the shoulder is wide enough, but the traffic, though never heavy, is fast.

The best way to experience the LOST Trail is by bicycle. The paved sections of the trail are long and straight and ideal for road bikers who like to pick up some speed, while the unpaved sections offer riders a challenge. A good interactive map is available from Palm Beach Bike Tours (www.Palmbeachbiketours.com/lake-okeechobee-scenic-traillost-map) and helps peddlers get a better understanding of what riding this trail involves.

The views from atop the dike are the bicyclist's reward. On one side is the rim canal, which surrounds much of the perimeter of Lake Okeechobee. Seldom more than 50 feet wide, the rim canal abounds with numerous limpkins, herons, egrets, ducks, alligators, gar, bass, bream, and dozens of different species of passerines such as red-winged blackbirds, warblers, and boat-tailed grackles. On the Lake "O" side of the dike, the views can be stunning. The lake is so wide that you cannot see across to the other side. Its shoreline abounds with birds and animals, including armadillos, raccoons, and river otters. Of course, there are also airboats, pontoon boats, bass boats, and everything in between roaring up and down the rim canal and the lake, accompanied by plenty of noise.

For the avid bicyclist, the LOST Trail is well worth the effort. It is unlike any other bike path in the state in that you are riding above your surroundings, be it rundown trailer parks, busy marinas, or endless fields of sugarcane.

Without Deep Lake, Everglades City May Have Never Been...And Without These Two Women, You May Have Never Seen a Snowy Egret!

The history of Everglades City and how it came to be is quite intriguing. Threaded into this history is the connection to Deep Lake and how it influenced Barron Collier to invest in and develop our (very special) area.

As you make your way to Everglades City, Deep Lake is located just off Highway 29 (nine miles south of Interstate 75 and eight miles north of Highway 41.). Deep Lake is what is known as a "solution hole". Solution holes are often found in hardwood hammocks like Big Cypress.

Deep Lake is one of only five naturally occurring solution holes in Florida. When the rainy season gets underway, solution holes fill with water, while some, like Deep Lake, never dry out. This creates a layer of natural protection from fires and also an oasis for numerous species of wildlife. Solution holes are created over time as limestone erodes from weathering and dissolution. The dissolution, or erosion, takes place as mildly acidic rainwater mixes with organic acids produced by decaying leaves from the hammock canopy that create low pH "solution" that eats away at the

limestone causing the hole to deepen over time. In the case of Deep Lake, this process has been going on for over 6000 years and the Lake is now ~96 feet deep and over 300 feet wide.

Many people are familiar with the Deep Lake prison that was closed, sold and is now operating as Altaire's Gun Range (where the most recent Lion's Club Turkey Shoot was held). Originally, this site was the location of a packaging company built to process the



citrus from a grove that was established at Deep Lake by a man named Walter Langford.

Walter Langford came to Fort Myers with his parents when he was just six years old. His father was a cattle farmer (and doctor). After graduating from Stetson University, Walter joined the family business. While still a very young man, Langford met John Roach, president of the Chicago Traction Company. They eventually went into business together and developed the area around Deep Lake into an extensive marsh grapefruit grove during the late 1800's. It became such a thriving operation, that they constructed a narrow-



gauge railroad from the groves down to what is now Everglades City so that they could ship their produce. Walter Langford married Carrie Watson on July 21, 1898. Carrie Watson was the daughter of Edgar Watson (of Killing Mr. Watson

fame). Walter Langford died in 1920 at the age of 47. Carrie Watson Langford died in 1961.

It was Langford's successful business model that caught the interest of Barron Collier. Eventually, Langford sold the grove operation to Barron Collier, and soon after, Collier founded the *Deep Lake Seedless Grapefruit Company*. The fruit grown here

was eventually transported by the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad from Deep Lake to Everglades City, and then on to areas throughout the country. It was the citrus business that first established Everglades City as the primary seat of power in Collier County.

Collier built a beautiful plantation around Deep Lake and he used the property to host lavish parties with numerous socialites like William Hearst, Henry Ford, and William Wrigley (of chewing gum fame). This brought southwest Florida into national prominence.

This was also during the height of the Plume (feather) Trade in

the late 1800's to early 1900's, when socialites would be seen around Deep Lake wearing the highly sought after feathers of many of our wading birds, especially snowy egrets and herons. Some women even



wore complete birds stuffed and mounted on their hats during this time. Because of the commercial success of Langford and Collier, more and more people came here and discovered that the 10,000 Islands area was home to the highly sought after bird plumes.

It was once believed that the birds here were so abundant that it would be impossible to hunt them into extinction. However, by the early 1900's this is precisely where we were. Our snowy egrets and herons were on the brink. Because the most highly sought after plumes were the gossamer wisps prominent during breeding season, birds were often hunted at the rookeries with only adults taken, leaving chicks to die in the nests, thus wiping out generations in one days "work". (Any readers who have had the good fortune to visit our nearby rookeries know how easily the birds are approached while nesting).

By 1886 there were approximately 50 North American bird species being hunted for their feathers to support the demand centered in social circles, with London and Paris being the biggest consumers in the trade. The impact eventually became obvious and it was two Boston socialites who changed the way history may have been written (with the potential extinction of the snowy egret, the number one target of the trade).

Harriet Hemenway and her cousin Minna Hall were very disturbed by the mass destruction of such beautiful creatures and campaigned to bring awareness to how sensitive the population of these birds were to such uncontrolled slaughter-for mere hat adornment. They vociferously boycotted the plume trade which eventually resulted in the National Audubon's passage of the Migratory Bird Act first approved by congress on March 4, 1913. This law outlawed market hunting and forbade interstate transport of birds.

I am ever so grateful to these pioneers. If Walter Langford never planted that first grapefruit tree, Barron Collier may not have developed our little Everglades paradise. And, if Harriet and Minna weren't so forward thinking and passionate, none of us would be able to enjoy the beautiful birds that dot the mangroves in our island paradise. Thank you, Walter, Barron, Harriet and Minna for making this all possible.

This program will be held monthly on 12/3, 1/21, 2/10 and 3/25. The event provides visitors the opportunity to experience some of the darkest skies east of the Rocky Mountains. STAR TREKKER REPORT Reported by Chris Herlovich

December 4-17 – Geminids. Unlike most other meteor showers, the Geminids are associated not with a comet but with an asteroid: the 3200 Phaethon. The asteroid takes about 1.4 years to orbit around the Sun. The Geminids are considered to be one of the more spectacular meteor shower during a year, with the possibility of sighting around 120 meteors per hour at its peak.

In 2016, the Geminids are expected to peak on the night of December 13 and early morning hours of December 14. A Full Moon will make viewing conditions difficult.


