Christmas Tree Fire Safety Tips

With the holiday season now in full swing it is an opportune time to remind everyone of these three home holiday fire hazards:

1. Electrical problems cause one of every three home Christmas tree fires.
2. Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious. On average, one of every 31 reported home Christmas tree fires results in a death compared to an average of one death per 144 total reported home fires.
3. A heat source too close to the tree causes one in every four of Christmas tree fires.



It takes less than 30 seconds for a dry tree to engulf a room in flames. To minimize risk, buy a fresh tree with intact needles, get a fresh cut on the trunk, and water it every day. A well-watered tree is almost impossible to ignite. Keep the tree away from heat sources, such as a fireplace or radiator, and out of traffic patterns. If you're using live garlands and other greenery, keep them at least three feet away from heating sources.

No matter how well the tree is watered, it will start to dry out after about four weeks, so take it down after the holidays. Artificial trees don't pose much of a fire hazard; just make sure yours is flame-retardant.

Recipes for Good Eating

Fresh Zucchini-Bean Salad

- 2 zucchini, small to medium
- 2 Roma tomatoes
- 2 (15 ounce) cans great northern beans 1/2 large red onion
- 1/4 cup fresh basil
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/3 cup white vinegar
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 teaspoons dry mustard
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Pepper to taste



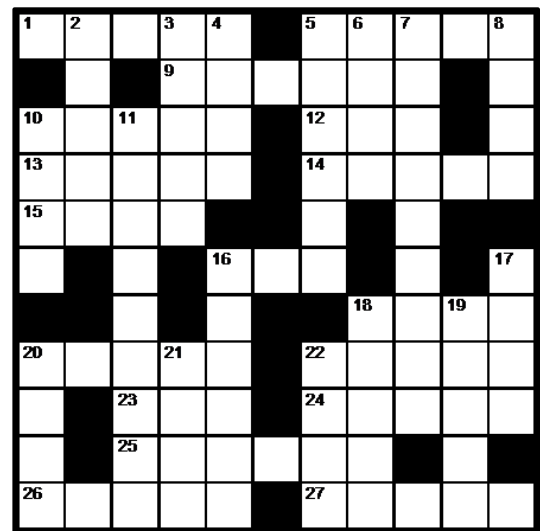
This is a perfect salad for any occasion! Rinse beans in colander and place in a large bowl. Dice zucchini and onion, place in bowl with beans. Seed the tomatoes, dice and add to beans and veggies. Finely chop basil and add to other ingredients. Whisk oil, vinegar, lemon juice, mustard salt and pepper. You can also blend in a food processor or mix with a hand-held blender. Pour dressing over the other ingredients and mix gently. Serve or refrigerate until serving time.

The Muscular System

By Dr. John Martin

We have over 300 muscles in our bodies. The actual number varies just a little from person to person, and from reference to reference. Some muscles merge together with other muscles and then one can be referred to as one or two (sometimes more). Muscles are named for where they are (e.g. subscapularis), what they look like (e.g. rhomboids, deltoid, biceps, triceps), how many there are (e.g. quadriceps), what they do (e.g. levator scapulae), where they reach (e.g. brachioradialis), or for no good reason (e.g. psoas).

Muscles always pull. They never push. Pushing motions are achieved through the incorporation of various levers, and the fact that most muscles (voluntary or striated) cross over a joint. Involuntary muscles include smooth muscle and then there is cardiac muscle. Smooth muscles work mostly without our conscious thought as in most of our digestive tract and in glands within our endocrine and reproductive systems. Cardiac muscle is self-stimulating. At a healthy 72 beats per minute, that's over 100,000 beats per day! Good thing it doesn't require our having to continuously think about it - when we fall asleep - who's keeping watch?

One of the more interesting muscles is the diaphragm, an umbrella-shaped muscle underneath the lungs that is responsible for most of your breathing activity. This is one muscle that you have some conscious control over. It has a mixed supply of nerves that allows for regular breathing and for occasional breath holding.

The digestive tract from the top to the bottom has a continuous supply of (smooth) muscles that move our food along the digestive, absorptive, and elimination journey in the body.

Except for the cardiac muscle, muscles depend on the nervous system to tell each one what to do and when to do it. Some muscles work as primary (or secondary) movers. Others move the body in the opposite direction. Protagonists usually accomplish flexion. Antagonists do extension. Stabilizers assist both movements.

Smooth organ muscles usually move the organ's contents along in a rhythmic, peristalsis motion or along inside a tube-like structure or vessel. Arteries have an inner lining of smooth muscle to assist in transporting blood from the heart and lungs, back out into all parts of the body.

The inner structure of muscle is made up of two major proteins, actin and myosin. With the right amount and coordination of glucose (blood sugar), oxygen, and calcium (influenced still by a myriad of additional minerals and other nutrients) the protein molecules move toward one another and bring the ends together (called contraction).

The smaller fibers of protein are organized into fibers, fibrils, fiber bundles and muscle bellies. There are points along the longitudinal axis of the (striated) muscle bellies that when strained or otherwise stimulated by a noxious focus, can become "trigger points". These points most often coincide with Acupuncture meridian points and can be utilized in various therapies to prevent injury, hasten rehabilitation, and even enhance performance.

Numerous conditions and substances diminish or destroy the structure and physiology of muscles, especially the mitochondria. Lack of activity can lead to muscle wasting (atrophy). Tips for better nutrition and healing techniques to develop and maintain healthy muscles will be covered in future articles. Next time - *The Nervous System*.



Living Gulf Coast

Sandwich Tern (*Sterna sandvicensis*) Other names: Cabot's tern / Status: FL=uncommon but stable, IUCN=LC / Life span: to 22 years / Length: 13.4-17.7 in. (34-45 cm) / Wingspan: 33.1-35.4 in. (84-90 cm) / Weight: 6.3-10.6 oz (180-300 g) / Nests: along the Atlantic coastline during the summer / Found: Migratory, found only during the winter months in Southwest Florida



Smaller than the royal tern, this bird is a far less common find than its larger cousin. The sandwich tern prefers to go farther out to sea than the royal and plunges from far greater heights. It feeds predominantly on fish, shrimp, and small squid.

Strictly a winter visitor, the sandwich tern returns each summer to the barrier islands of the Northeast. There, it nests in large colonies with hundreds, sometimes thousands, of other gulls and terns. The noise, odor, and commotion of these nesting sites can be quite chaotic. Parent terns appear to be able to find their offspring by their calls. The sandwich tern is monogamous.

Ninety-plus years ago, the sandwich tern was sometimes harvested by market hunters with punt guns, greatly reducing the population. The bird was more common in Florida in the 1800s, then declined dramatically, but now is increasing in numbers throughout the state. Its only real threat at this time is the loss of suitable nesting sites.

Forster's Tern (*Sterna forsteri*) Other names: none / Status: FL=stable but declining in some Midwest states, and in many states, is now considered a species of special concern, IUCN=LC / Life span: up to 15 years / Length: 13-14.2 in. (33-36 cm) / Wingspan: 29-33 in. (73-83 cm) / Weight: 4.6-6.7 oz (130-190 g) / Nests: in the upper Midwest and lower central provinces of Canada / Found: Only in the winter throughout coastal Southwest Florida.

The Forster's tern is one of four terns that are fairly common here during the winter months (the others being the royal, sandwich, and least). The only one not mentioned here is the Caspian tern, which is the largest tern but quite rare on the islands. Unlike the other terns, the Forster's tern ranges no farther south than Central America.



A small bird with a deeply forked tail, the Forster's tern is, like most terns, a plunge diver. It sometimes can be seen hovering above a school of minnows and then dropping onto them and either picking them off the surface or completely submerging itself.

The Forster's tern forms loosely knit colonies with other terns when nesting. It lays its eggs in unusual floating nests. Large carp have learned to capsize the nests and eat either the eggs or the chicks. The adult Forster's tern is preyed upon by falcons. The Forster's tern also suffers from loss of suitable habitat resulting from the draining of wetlands in the wheat fields where they nest in the summer.

My Little Slice of Paradise

When people refer to the "Everglades" they are typically referring to the "river of grass," a term that was coined by Marjory Stoneman Douglas. What she was describing is the sheet flow of water that slowly moves from the Kissimmee Valley area eventually making its way into the Gulf of Mexico near Florida Bay.

Florida, in comparison to most states, is quite flat, but it is not level. The highest point of Florida is around the Kissimmee Valley, just north of Lake Okeechobee where the elevation reaches as high as 150 feet. As you move south, for the most part, the grade reduces by about 2 inches per mile. This is what helps move the water from the Kissimmee Valley region towards Florida Bay, and the flow is very gradual.

The Florida rainy season runs from May to October. Annually, Florida will experience from 50 to 60 inches of rain, with most of it occurring during the 5-month rainy season. Each year the cycle is different, and some years are far wetter (or drier) than others. In times of much rain, the sheet flow is quite constant. When there is much less rain there is less water moving south, and some areas previously saturated may even dry up.



Another major influence of the sheet flow is development. Historically, the sheet flow moved freely from north to south and east and west. The Everglades was also two times the size it is now and there were far fewer impediments to the flow. When the roadways like US 41 and Alligator Alley were constructed, it literally stopped the flow in some areas and redirected in others. Eventually, bridges and pipes were added in areas along these highways to help get the water moving again, albeit unnaturally.

Today, there are still man-made (intentional or unintentional) blockages of the flow that compartmentalize the water so that it no longer flows freely like the way nature intended. What this causes is for the water to be too high at some times of the year in certain places and too low in others. We also have major agricultural influences from fertilizers used in farming that infiltrate the water supply causing higher concentrations of nitrogen, sulfur, mercury and pesticides.

"There must be progress, certainly. But we must ask ourselves what kind of progress we want, and what price we want to pay for it. If, in the name of progress, we want to destroy everything beautiful in our world, and contaminate the air we breathe, and the water we drink, then we are in trouble." Marjory Stoneman Douglas

When water with these high concentrations of unnatural chemicals make its way into the sheet flow, and eventually Florida Bay, bad things happen. We have seen huge increases in the amounts of contaminated algae in these areas. This depletes the amount of oxygen in the water causing fish and corals to suffocate. These contaminates also thread through the entire food chain affecting numerous species including manatees, dolphins and turtles.

The abnormal concentration of water (either too much or too little) also influences other wildlife. Wood storks, Ibis and Roseate Spoonbills rely on marshlands to feed. Storks rely on the natural "draw down" of water in the 'glades to successfully breed. The draw down occurs from the natural evaporation that takes place from the heating of the day. Also, increased growth in vegetation adds to this natural draw down. Draw down shrinks the size of a pool which concentrates the available prey. This makes it easier for storks to hunt, which inspires them to breed.

When water is artificially released from Lake Okeechobee and flooded into the Everglades, this can dramatically, and immediately, affect the water level and pool concentrations and subsequently, throw everything off. The opposite is also true. If we deny the flow of water, the cycle is broken. You can see the effects of this in the Eastern Everglades just west of Broward County (Weston was the Everglades when I was a kid, I used to fish there!) where there are areas devoid of marsh, clearly no longer "in the flow".

In February, we will honor Marjorie Stoneham Douglas in the Everglades area during the 13th annual MSD Festival (see p. 10). This very forward thinking, selfless lady knew how special Everglades were and how sensitive they are to environmental changes, especially those made by humans. Fortunately, we are (finally) aware of the impact our actions can have on the Everglades. We can all thank Marjory, for she knew this way before anyone else did...it just took the rest of us more time to catch up. *"The Everglades is a test. Start Prepping Now for a Faster Tax Refund

As 2016 comes to an end, it triggers tax statements from banks and other institutions. The deadline for these statements to be sent to you is January 31st so start looking for them in your mailbox!

The fastest way to get a refund is to be ready well before the April 15th deadline. A great way to start preparing is to write out the list below of the most common documents (there are others you may need, so check with your accountant), tape it to the front of a folder, and as you receive them, check them off once you put them in this folder.

This type of system will help keep your organized and ready to file early, or at least on time.

You can also put this system in place from the start of the new year. Make a folder or large envelope for each type of receipt you generally need for your taxes. As you incur expenses, put those receipts in the folders. This will make next year much easier and you won't forget about expenses that could have saved you money! A more comprehensive list can be downloaded from TurboTax.com. Just search for the Tax Preparation List. Here is the basic list:

2016 Sets Record for Panther Deaths



Sadly, 2016 will go down in infamy as the deadliest year (to date) for vehicle caused panther deaths. The new record is now 32 — and the year is not quite over yet.

In December, there have been 2 deaths caused by vehicles. Biologists found the run-over carcass of a 2-year-old female panther on State Road 29 in Collier County, 2 miles north of County Road 858 on December 6, and the carcass of a 4-month-old kitten in Lee County on December 8th. According to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, both were hit by vehicles in the roadway.

Death-by-vehicle is not uncommon for panthers. In 2012, a new record for road kills was set with 19. Two years later, in 2014, that record was broken and a new one established at 25 kills. Last year, that record was shattered when 30 were killed.

The increased number of deaths is believed to be a result of an increase in the panther population with a corresponding decrease in territory. It is estimated that there are between 100 and 180 adult panthers living in Florida.

Please use caution when driving in the Everglades area. Panthers are most active at dusk and dawn and are known to enter into roadways while hunting in their territories.

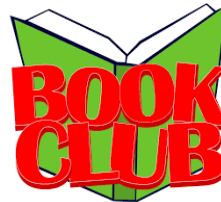


January 3, 4 - Quadrantids Meteor Shower: The Quadrantids is an above average shower, with up to 40 meteors per hour at its peak. It is thought to be produced by dust grains left behind by an extinct comet known as 2003 EH1, which was discovered in 2003. The shower runs annually from January 1-5. It peaks this year on the night of the 3rd and morning of the 4th. The second quarter moon will block out all but the brightest meteors this year, but it could still be a good show if you are patient. Best viewing will be from a dark location after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Bootes, but can appear anywhere in the sky.
