He vocalized his support for the City during his visit and also echoed support for the City's quest to obtain the grant monies needed to build a new sewer and wastewater facility that can handle not only the City's population, but eventually one that could bring Chokoloskee, Plantation, and Big Cypress online as well.

MARCH 2020 MEETING

There were several interesting topics discussed at the March City Council Meeting.

Mayor Grimm acknowledged his meeting with the Senator commenting that it was a productive meeting.

Fire Chief Caleb Morris announced that the fire department will hold a CPR information class on Saturday, March 7 at 1 pm at the Community Church.

The council voted to approve the dock leases for another 6 month interval. The council set a date for a workshop to discuss commercial docks. That meeting will be held on April 7th at 5:30 pm, preceding the council meeting at 7 pm.

A resolution to remove several Everglades Isle parcels from the NFIP (FEMA) map unanimously passed. There are parcels in the park that have chickee huts that violate current FEMA floodplain building requirements. The City will forward the request to FEMA for their input. If they approve it, it would allow the parcels to stay as they are without affecting the City's FEMA rating.

The FEMA rating affects everyone because it is used to calculate homeowner flood insurance rates

Should FEMA grant the City's request, the ongoing issue would be closer to a resolution.

The council approved the first reading of a resolution that would provide an overlay defining RV Park, V.R. Corp's setback requirements. This overlay would essentially grandfather in the current usage at the park as "conforming" as per the park overlay.

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

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A Message from Fire Chief Kingman Schultz



According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, drug overdose

deaths continue to increase in the United States. From 1999 to 2017, more than 702,000 people have died from a drug overdose and two out of three drug overdose deaths involve an opioid.

In response to the nationwide opioid epidemic, funding has been made available through the Florida Department of Health (DOH) for emergency opioid antagonists.

DOH has established the Helping Emergency Responders Obtain Support (HEROS) Program for the purpose of acquiring emergency opioid antagonists for agencies that employ emergency responders.

The purpose of this program is to reduce the number of drug/opioid overdose-related deaths and adverse events by providing emergency responders with the appropriate pharmaceutical resources to address this crisis.

The Greater Naples Fire Rescue District has recently received its third award of Naloxone (Narcan) from the HEROS Program to help the first responders stand ready for these types of incidents. Previous awards allowed the District to equip all front line fire engines with this life saving drug. Now, all life safety inspection vehicles and staff support personnel will also be equipped to address incidents of drug overdose.

Opioid Overdose & the Law

According to the Coalition Against Prescription Drug Abuse there are specific signs to look for if you suspect someone may have overdosed on opioid drugs.

"Overdose with opiate drugs causes sedation (sleepiness), low blood pressure, slowed heart rate, and slowed breathing. Pinpoint pupils, where the black centers of the eyes become smaller than normal, are common in opiate overdose. However, if other drugs are taken at the same time as the opiates, they may counteract this effect on the pupils."

A serious risk is that opioid overdose can cause a person to stop breathing. If you suspect someone has taken a drug overdose, call 911. You will not be arrested.

The law states that any person who seeks medical assistance in good faith for a person who is currently overdosing shall not be charged, arrested or prosecuted for a drug violation if the evidence for such criminal proceedings would be based on seeking and receiving such medical assistance.

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Loosened Regulations Are A Threat to Wading Birds By Kathy Brock



Birds, without question, are my favorite species of wild animal. I am sure this adoration started as I was growing up in south Florida. In my childhood, much of Hollywood was still rural or just transitioning towards Hence, the wildlife was abundant. development. Especially the birds. It was then that I learned to really appreciate them.

Later, I would catalog when I'd see birds arrive on migration and then leave. I've always love taking pictures of birds too. And here in the 10,000 Islands, we have a bounty of birds, including the incredible Roseate Spoonbill.

Roseate Spoonbills are wary of humans. Actually, they are wary of anything that is not something that is natural in their environment. When things go awry in their breeding habitats, their breeding numbers are drastically lower.

For example, when a marked channel was placed by a rookery that was a long standing roseate breeding ground, breeding success plummeted. When boats would pass, the birds would leave their nests. Crows learned this behavior and would rob the nests, taking the chicks or breaking the eggs to eat them. Once the channel was relocated, the birds again successfully bred. Tragedy averted.

Water levels affect the breeding cycle too. When water is held back then released in greater than normal volume, breeding areas can become too flooded (for that season of the year) which makes ponds larger and deeper, making it more difficult for them to feed. Smaller ponds are more concentrated and better suited when feeding hungry young.

Earlier this year, more stringent permitting regulations protecting U.S. wetlands were replaced with much looser regulations, and in some cases, permitting is no longer required at all to dump pollutants into the earth.

According to an article on Audobon.com, "Lakes, steady-flowing streams, and other major water bodies remain protected under the new rule. However, the changes mean a permit is no longer needed to drain or discharge pollution into ephemeral streams—those that flow only after precipitation. The same goes for wetlands and ponds that don't directly abut or have a regular surface connection to a larger, protected water body."

Why would we want to allow *anyone* to discharge pollutants into the earth? That is just passing on a nightmare to the next generation. Of course it is easier for businesses. They can now just dump as needed costing them nothing...but costing us much, much more.

Toxins in the earth can reach the water supply. They pollute breeding birds populations, land animals and anything else in the area. Pollutants move. They cause illness. Pollutants don't stay within an ownership boundary. What you dump here ends up over there.

We have a history of disrespecting nature...and the results are often ugly. Hopefully, those using the new loopholes will be monitored so that future generations are not left cleaning up a nightmare justified by increased profits.

Adventures of The Saltwater Cowboy – "When You Can" By Jon Edward Edwards

The sun was high in the Southwest Florida sky when I banked into the last turn of the narrow backwater creek a little bit too hot. Turning hard to port, the flat bottomed aluminum boat nearly skipped into the mangroves. Quickly I backed off the throttle, regained control, then accelerated into the rest of the turn. From the slender creek I was spit out into an open expansive familiar bay, one in between Goodland and Chokoloskee.

Upon reaching my spot, I spun the boat one hundred and eighty degrees and idled back into an incoming tide inundated with bait being ushered in by a stout southwest wind. I shut down the engine and gently laid the anchor over the bow as not to make any noise. Yet, I forgot to take into account the ten-foot length of chain attached to it. "Ddddddddd," rattling and clanging all the way down it went. Two roseate spoonbills were spooked out of a cluster of deadwood. Unbelievable.

The wind had been blowing out of the West for days, churning up the Gulf and making a mess out of the backcountry, limiting my choices of spots to try. But here I was – this was a time when I could fish. Little did I know that I was on the cusp of the greatest sixty minutes of backwater angling of my life.

I played out enough anchor line so that I was positioned just a cast away from the edge of two troughs that converged at an unassuming mangrove point. I could feel the braided line spin under a light thumb as I fired the foul smelling, one-quarter-ounce jig head complete with a soft plastic shad imitation, dark in color, towards the point. The jig fell into the trough and I gave it a couple of bounces. BOUNCE, BOUNCE. STOP. Instinctively, I gave the rod a swift jerk only to have embedded it into a pile of oyster shells. Dang it! Not first cast...I grabbed the line directly in front of the reel with my left hand and pulled out about half an arms length until it was fairly taut but not so much as to dig the hook any deeper. Quickly letting go of the line I snapped it back down. "Snap, Snap," I repeated the process until the reverberation traveled through the long expanse of fluorocarbon leader and all the way to the hook, pushing out the other side.

One jig hop away from the averted set-back and, "Pow!" Something hit it with intent to inflict grievous bodily harm - no half measures; it was violent. A wide bucket mouth busted through the surface followed by an expanse of silver and black sinew that danced across the water. I rolled my wrists over and turned the big snook's head back down, lessening the chances of having a hook thrown. For several minutes we fought until I horsed the big Soap Fish along the side of the boat, popped the lure out of its rough mouth, and watched it swim off.


The bite was fast and furious for the better part of the next sixty minutes. The snook were biting, the trout were biting, the redfish were biting; everything was biting. I'm not sure how many fish, or species of fish, I ended up catching during that window of time. Had the conditions not been what they were would I have ended up there at the time that I was? Probably not. Would the comedy of errors that I had been "blessed" with normally have resulted in not getting a bite? Most likely.

As dusk drew near and I prepared the skiff for flight something my grandfather told me came to mind. An adage that now carried a certain gravitas. When asked when was the best time to go fishing he replied, "When you can."

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
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My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock Coronavirus. Panic Doesn't Help. Information Does

The coronavirus is on the tip of everyone's tongues. I have been bombarded by numerous email chains that are filled with hyperbole and inaccuracies sure to instill fear in even the most evenly minded people. As I am playing my morning solitaire game on my smartphone, the ads I am being served are for respirators and masks. Capitalism at work!

A threat does exist. A virus is out there and there are still many unanswered questions. However, some information is becoming clearer, and it is not all dire. This virus will not wipe humanity off the map!

What is this virus? According to the Wall Street Journal, "This virus belongs to a family of viruses known as coronaviruses. Named for the crown-like spikes on their surfaces, they infect mostly bats, pigs and small mammals. But they mutate easily and can jump from animals to humans, and from one human to another. In recent years, they have become a growing player in infectious-disease outbreaks world-wide.

The name is derived from the shape of the organism which looks like a crown on top. There are seven strains of coronavirus known to infect humans. SARS and MERS from past outbreaks are also coronaviruses. They all infect the respiratory system to varying degrees.

The sick and elderly are at greatest risk. Having said that, the sick and elderly are at the greatest risk from all infections, including influenza.

Researchers say that the disease is transmitted in water droplets from sneezing and coughing and on contaminated surfaces. Avoiding people exhibiting respiratory infection symptoms is always a good idea. Washing hands with warm water and soap (for 20 seconds) frequently is highly recommended. You can also use alcohol based hand sanitizers.

But don't stop there! With all of the hoopla about washing hands, there are other transmission points that need to be considered.

The cellphone. We handle our cellphones constantly. If you are washing your hands and not sanitizing your phone, each time you pick it back up you are coming into contact with germs (or worse) again. It is a germ magnet.

Briefcase handles and steering wheels. These are two surfaces we touch frequently. Are we sanitizing them? I know I was not as often as I should but I am now.

If you are traveling, don't forget about your luggage handles. These gather everything you are coming into contact with at the airport...give them a good wipe-down with Purell or hand sanitizer before you leave the public

If you are sick, stay home. Going into public when you are sick potentially exposes others to your illness...whatever it may be. Chronically ill people can become severely ill from a simple cold. Staying home is best until the worst of your illness is over (when the sneezing and coughing stop).

Cough into your shirt if possible, at a minimum cough into your sleeve or a handkerchief (if anyone uses those anymore!).

The good coming out of all of this is that it reminds us that practicing good hygiene is never a bad idea! We don't need to go crazy, we just need to remind ourselves what we may have overlooked for a while.

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



Living Gulf Coast by Charles Sobczak The Unexpected Beauty of Harns Marsh

Harns Marsh, a storm-water retention facility located at the headwaters of the Orange River in Lehigh Acres, is an unlikely destination for naturalists and birders. It is not included in the South Florida Birding Trail, though no one has informed the countless birds that frequent this large

freshwater marsh of that omission. It offers no amenities, no interpretive center, not even any signs directing visitors to the marsh. Now under the jurisdiction of the East County Water Control District, Harns Marsh is slated to become a Lee County regional park, which will bring restrooms, picnic tables, and other amenities to this undiscovered treasure.



The site is roughly one square mile (578 acres). In 2007, some 182 acres along the north marsh were dredged and cleared of invasive plants, which improved water quality and wildlife viewing. Hiking and bicycling, but no motorized vehicles, are allowed on the four-mile sandy impoundment road encircling the marsh.



Scores of birds, snakes, snails, and small mammals are found here. Two species of particular interest are the snail kite (aka the Everglades kite) and the limpkin. Birders who might spend years trying to catch a glimpse of either of these species can cut their search short with a single visit to Harns Marsh. These hard-to-find birds are attracted by the tens of thousands of snails that live in the marsh, including both

the native apple snail and the invasive island apple snail. The island apple snail (Pomacea insularum) is from South America and has, through accidental releases, invaded many of Florida's freshwater marshes. These enormous snails, many as large as a small apple, litter the edge of the marsh. Snail kites and limpkins are adapting to dining on these foreigners, which have also become an important source of food for turtles, great blue herons, alligators, and other animals.

Other sightings at Harns Marsh, especially during the winter months, might include redwing blackbirds, cowbirds, various migratory duck species, and sparrows. Sightings of sandhill cranes are common along the western edge of the marsh. Visiting the marsh is best just after dawn and before sunset. Be sure to bring bug spray and a hat, since areas of shade are in short supply. Harns Marsh is an undiscovered treasure in Lee County that hopefully, once made into a park, will get the recognition it deserves.

Taxing Things by Mike Klein Updates for filing 2019 returns

Credit for other Dependents: A taxpayer can claim this credit if they can claim the person as a dependent. Taxpayers can use the credit for other dependents in addition to the child and dependent care credit and the earned income credit. They cannot use the dependent to claim the child tax credit or additional child tax credit

The maximum credit amount is \$500 for each dependent who meets certain conditions: Dependents who are age 17 or older, and who have individual taxpayer identification numbers. Dependent parents or other qualifying relatives supported by the taxpayer, and those living with the taxpayer who aren't related to the taxpayer.

Individual tax provisions extended: Deduction for above-the-line qualified tuition and related expenses claimed on Form 8917, Tuition and Fees Deduction, and for mortgage insurance premiums treated as qualified residence interest. Deduction for unreimbursed medical and dental expenses as the floor was lowered to 7.5% of adjusted gross income. Credit for nonbusiness energy property claimed on Form 5695, Residential Energy Credits, Income exclusion for canceled debt for qualified principal residence indebtedness where the taxpayer defaulted on a mortgage that they took out to buy, build or substantially improve their main home.

Business Expenses: These proposed regulations address the elimination of the deduction for expenditures related to entertainment, amusement or recreation activities and provide guidance to determine whether an activity is considered to be entertainment.
