

Please come out and help us pick up any of the leftover trash from the storm and the reconstruction taking place throughout our communities. We need volunteers on land and by boat!


Volunteers will receive T-shirts, gloves and trash bags and lots of love from their fellow volunteers.

Hook 'em In the Glades Fishing Tournament a BIG Success! by Coach Jill Whitcomb



Everglades City School is the smallest PreK-12 public school in the state of Florida with a student population of 196 students. We have a fantastic Booster Club that helps provide uniforms and equipment to our student athletes each year, but there are many other expenses that fall upon the school. Last January 2017, I was appointed the activities coordinator at Everglades City School. When I learned that we constantly had to do

fundraisers to help pay for operating expense such as umpires, referees, team entry fees, equipment rental for off campus facilities, and other such expenses, I decided to have one big fundraising event to raise money.

I wanted to start planning on upgrading needed equipment in the near future. Expensive expenditures such as our scorer's table and padded chairs for sports teams are in desperate need of being replaced when funds become available. We also wanted to look at purchasing banners to hang in our gym to honor sports accomplishments. These are just a few of the items I wanted to begin planning to purchase or replace. Although these items don't seem like much, for a small school like ours, these items are all long term planning items.

I planned the fishing fundraiser for Oct. 14, 2017, then Hurricane Irma hit! The devastation to our school and community was tremendous! We lost all our softball & baseball equipment, a large portion of PE equipment, our gym, music room, and art room. The school lost all chances of any revenue because we were unable to host home games. Our Booster Club lost their ability to raise funds because there were no concessions. With almost 40% of our student population displaced, the need for funds was even greater than anticipated.

This fishing fundraiser is unique for many reasons. First, it takes place in one of the most beautiful parts of Florida, Everglades City and the 10,000 Islands. Next, it was marketed as a family friendly event to benefit our school. The adult prizes were donated by our very own world renowned, Clyde Butcher! We had both adult and junior angler divisions. We had 38 boats sign up with over 120 anglers of which 38 were youth! The captains meeting was held at a local restaurant, Camellia Street Grill, which sustained major damage in the hurricane! This fundraiser not only helped raise funds for our athletic department, but also helped bring people to our community and local businesses that are continuing to work through the recovery

process. Hook'em in the Glades was not just about our school after Irma, it was about the healing process that our community continues to work through.

Planning for the 2nd Annual Hook'em in the Glades is already underway! We look forward to many years of great fellowship, fishing, and fundraising!


by Mike the Tax Guy Things to Remember When Considering Early Withdrawals from Retirement Plans

Many taxpayers may need to take out money early from their Individual Retirement Account or retirement plan. Doing so, however, can trigger an additional tax on early withdrawals. They would owe this tax on top of other income tax they may have to pay. Here are a few key points to know:

- ♦ Early withdrawals. An early withdrawal is taking a distribution from an IRA or retirement plan before reaching age 59½.
- ♦ Additional tax. Taxpayers who took early withdrawals from an IRA or retirement plan must report them when they file their tax return. They may owe income tax on the amount plus an additional 10 percent tax if it was an early withdrawal.
- ♦ Nontaxable withdrawals. The additional 10 percent tax doesn't apply to nontaxable withdrawals, such as contributions that taxpayers paid tax on before they put them into the plan.
- ♦ **Rollover.** A rollover happens when someone takes cash or other assets from one plan and puts it in another plan. They normally have 60 days to complete a rollover to make it tax-free.
- Exceptions. There are many exceptions to the additional 10-percent tax. Some of the rules for retirement plans are different from the rules for IRAs.
- **Disaster Relief.** Participants in certain disaster areas may have relief from the 10-percent early withdrawal tax on early withdrawals from their retirement accounts; this applies directly to Everglades City and other hurricane disaster losses.

My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock

Spring is here and that means our primary growing season is approaching. In our area of SW Florida, we sustained significant damage from the flooding and winds brought in by Hurricane Irma. Obviously, this impacted our homes...but it also did quite a number on the landscaping.



Now is a good time to go out and get things ready to thrive over the summer months. A good place to start is to look for damaged limbs and branches and remove any that are not healthy. Cut them back to the main (lateral) branch and do not leave a small "stub". It is also a good time to prune back anything that is overgrown, so get that out of the way as well.

The rains will start soon so that means it is a good time to plant any new shrubs or trees. You will want to find plants that are salt tolerant and tolerant of wet conditions that do not drain well. A good guide is to look around to see what is still thriving in our area and copy that! Many plants will not do well in our soggy conditions during the summer, and others will die if or when they get inundated with salty water.

You can expect the landscaping to get wet again with saltwater when we get the spring tides in the next few months. Recall that two weeks after Irma we got a pretty high spring tide that brought in quite a bit of salt water. That pretty much wiped out anything that was still hanging on by a thread after Irma.

- The roots of salt-tolerant plants are adapted to salt concentrations that would quickly destroy the root hairs on most plants
- The leaves of these plants have specialized cells that pump salt out of the plant tissues and onto the leaf surfaces, where it is washed off by rain

Another consideration is putting plants in planter boxes. This is what I have done, and all of our trees survived the flooding because they were elevated in this way. (We lost our Gumbo Limbo but not due to water, Irma just ripped it right out of the ground and deposited it elsewhere!)

There are many types of planters you can build. We used lawn timbers from Home Depot or Lowes and then lined the inside with tar paper and plastic before adding the soil. This helps slow any wood rot by keeping the soil directly off of the lumber.

When you add soil, use a good mix of potting mix and cow manure. You can get both of these at the garden center. This gives your plants a good, nutrient-rich start and you will see a difference in the growth and productivity of them.

If you are planting trees, make sure you consider how large they will be and judge the size of the box you will need accordingly. The roots will spread out and down, so you will want a large enough box to accommodate the size of the mature plant.

These planters are also great for vegetable gardens and annual flowers! The flood actually helped get rid of unwanted weeds in the ones I use for this and it did not impede the production in the vegetables at all this season.



Chances of Close Encounters Between Florida Manatees and Boaters Increase in the Spring



For manatees, it is the season when they leave their winter refuges and travel along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts and through inland waters. For boaters, it is a critical time to be on

the lookout for manatees to avoid colliding with these large aquatic mammals.

"Spring is a great time to go boating in Florida, but manatees are out there too. Please watch out for them," said Ron Mezich, who heads the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) manatee management program.

From April 1 through Nov. 15, seasonal manatee zones require boaters to slow down in certain areas to prevent manatees from being struck by motorboats or personal watercrafts. FWC law enforcement officers are on patrol in state waters to remind boaters of the seasonal manatee speed zones and take enforcement actions when appropriate.

Perhaps most famous for its loud, familiar call, killdeeahdeedee, the killdeer's scientific name aptly describes its behavior: vociferous, meaning loud and vocal. Often found in pastures and open fields, the killdeer is a fairly large plover that frequents uplands, as well as beaches. Larger than the Wilson's plover, the killdeer is most easily recognized by its

double-banded neck and its distinctive call.

One of the most successful of all plovers, the killdeer is an example of an animal that not only has learned to adapt to the ways of man, but also flourishes in any number of urban or suburban environments. It nests in baseball fields, gravel rooftops, railroad yards, and scores of similarly unlikely locations. Because of this adaptation, the killdeer is prone to pesticide poisoning, and traffic and window collisions, among a host of other metropolitan dangers. Despite some losses, the killdeer population continues to expand its range, reaching all the way from the northern fringe of Chile to British Columbia.

The killdeer's diet consists almost entirely of insects, but it will also take small crustaceans and an occasional seed. It is a solitary nester and will feign a broken wing if you approach too near to its nesting locale. Its tiny chicks rely completely on camouflage to survive to adulthood.

(28-35 cm) / Wingspan: 18.9-22.8 in. (48-58 cm) / Weight: 4.9-6 oz (140-170 g) / Nests: from northern Florida to the northern tier of North America from Alaska to Newfoundland / Found: All Counties, coastal, near coast, mainland / Months found: JFMamjjASOND (lower case indicates breeding and nesting season).



The distinctive loud and rattling call of the belted kingfisher generally announces its arrival or departure from a roosting site. A plunge diver that often hovers in the air studying its potential meal before diving, the kingfisher prefers freshwater to saltwater environments. This is a bird that has taken advantage of human activities and can readily be found along highways where drainage swales and ponds have been dredged. The kingfisher

is often spotted sitting on a telephone pole or power line over these small bodies of water waiting for an errant minnow or tadpole to get close to the surface.

The belted kingfisher is one of only a handful of avian species in which the female is more brightly colored than the male. There are 93 different species of kingfishers worldwide, including the famous Australian kingfisher, the kookaburra. The best places to find these birds locally are around inland lakes or along the banks of the rivers and streams.

The kingfisher lives year round throughout most of the United States, but some do migrate south during the winter months. Its nests are robbed by grackles, various snakes, and tree-climbing mammals, while the adult is taken by alligators and falcons. The kingfisher is unusual in that, like the cliff swallow, it digs tunnels and makes cavities in riverbanks where it builds its nests and raises its offspring. It is adapting well to human-designed changes in the landscape, and despite some regional losses, it is fundamentally successful.

It's Springtime and That Means it's Bat Maternity Season in SW Florida!

you have bats roosting in your attic, eaves or chimney spaces, now is the time to give them an eviction notice. Bat maternity season begins 15 and runs through August 15. Exclusions bat colonies must be completed before the season starts.

"During bat maternity season, bats gather to give birth and raise their young," said Terry Doonan, a Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation

Commission (FWC)

biologist and mammal conservation coordinator. "The season lasts until the young bats can fly and feed themselves. In Florida, this occurs from mid-April through mid-August for most bat species."

Bat exclusions are illegal during this maternity season to prevent young bats that cannot yet fly from being trapped inside structures and dying.

Florida is home to 13 resident bat species, including threatened species such as the Florida bonneted bat. Some bat species roost in artificial structures, including buildings and houses. Although it is illegal to harm or kill bats in Florida, guidelines have been developed allowing for the legal exclusion of bats outside of the maternity season.

Exclusion guidelines on how to remove bats from buildings can be found at MyFWC.com/Bats.Materials and methods to exclude bats can affect the success of that process. For more information on how to conduct a bat exclusion, watch this YouTube video: <u>How to Get Bats Out of a Building</u>. Further details on how to conduct a legal bat exclusion can be found at Bat Conservation International.

Bats are beneficial to people and are an important part of the ecosystem. The state's native bats help keep insect populations under control, with the average bat eating hundreds of insects a night. In addition to the benefit of keeping mosquitoes and other insects at bay for residents enjoying the outdoors, the value of insect suppression by bats to U.S. agriculture has been estimated to be in the billions of dollars.

There are several ways that Florida residents and visitors can help bats:

- •Preserve natural roost sites, including trees with cavities and peeling bark. Dead fronds left on palms can also provide roosting spots for bats.
- Put up a bat house.

Report any unusual bat behavior to: MyFWC.com/BatMortality. Please note that bats can carry rabies. Although infected bats may not become aggressive, like any other wild animal, they can bite to defend themselves if handled. Don't touch or go near any wild animal, especially one that's not acting normally. For more information about rabies, visit the Florida Department of Health website at FloridaHealth.gov.

Water Tribe Everglades Challenge Boat Race is in the Books!

The Everglades Challenge is an unsupported, expedition style adventure race for kayaks, canoes, and small boats. The distance is roughly 300 nautical miles depending which course is selected. There is a time limit of 8 days or less....and it is considered a dangerous expedition.



The boater's safety and well-being are completely up to them. Unsupported means that there are no safety boats or support crews to help boaters during the race. Boaters are not allowed to have a support crew follow or meet them during the race. However, it is OK to have family or friends meet at the official checkpoints, but they cannot provide anything other emotional support.

Expedition style means that boaters must carry the same type of equipment and supplies that they would carry on a major expedition lasting 4 weeks or more. Camping equipment, food, water, safety, communication, etc. is required.

Although this is a race, many participants are more interested in cruising and

adventure. Whether the boater is a cruiser or racer is up to them. Just getting to the starting line is a major accomplishment and only about 40% of starters are able to finish. The boater should be an expert kayaker and/or sailor before ever considering this challenge.

There were 92 entries and 72 of those entered finished the race within the 8 day period.

The first place vessel, a small sailboat, finished the race in 1 day, 13 hours, 40 minutes. The last vessel to finish was a kayak coming in at 7 days, 5 hours and 30 minutes. Congratulations to everyone who participated and to those that finished the race.


