Wearing a Mask Outside of the Home is Now Recommended by the CDC Here's How to Wear a Cloth Face Covering—And Make One Too

The Centers for Disease Control (www.cdc.gov) is now recommending that we use cloth face coverings (masks) when going into public. Especially to places like the grocery store where you may not be able to avoid others. Here is what's most important:

Cloth face coverings should—

- fit snugly but comfortably against the side of the face
- be secured with ties or ear loops
- include multiple layers of fabric
- allow for breathing without restriction
- be able to be laundered and machine dried without damage or change to shape

CDC on Homemade Cloth Face Coverings and other Questions & Answers:

CDC also advises the use of simple cloth face coverings to slow the spread of the virus and help people who may have the virus and do not know it from transmitting it to others. Cloth face coverings fashioned from household items or made at home from common materials at low cost can be used as an additional, voluntary public health measure.

Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.

The cloth face coverings recommended are not surgical masks or N-95 respirators. Those are critical supplies that must continue to be reserved for healthcare workers and other medical first responders, as recommended by current CDC guidance.

Should cloth face coverings be washed or otherwise cleaned regularly? How regularly?

Yes. They should be routinely washed depending on the frequency of use.

How does one safely sterilize/clean a cloth face covering?


A washing machine should suffice in properly washing a face covering.

How does one safely remove a used cloth face covering?

Individuals should be careful not to touch their eyes, nose, and mouth when removing their face covering and wash hands immediately after removing.

Here's how to make a mask out of a bandana with no sewing required:








Fold bandana in half

about 6 inches apart.

Resources (Pet Food) Available in Collier County for Pet Owners in Need Due to COVID-19

The local non-profit organization, For the Love of Cats, and the East Naples Community Park is hosting Grab and Go pet food pantries on Tuesdays, from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m., beginning Tuesday, April 14. The pet food pantries will take place through the duration of the Safer at Home order.

The COVID-19 pandemic has created financial difficulties for many Collier County residents. Some pets suffer and are abandoned when their owners lose the ability to care for them. The goal of pet food pantries is to keep pets in their homes.

"We can't stand by and see pets abandoned for lack of food. Our furry friends are too valuable, and their love can be lifesaving. We have to help them stay with their families," said Jan Rich, Founder of For the Love of Cats.

For the Love of Cats also **provides cat and dog food** to Our Daily Bread, the local food pantry on Marco Island. For the Love of Cats and Collier County Domestic Animal Services (DAS) are also assisting the Saving Grace Pet Food Bank in Naples. All pet food donations made to DAS that are not used in the shelter are donated to Saving Grace.

The Saving Grace Pet Food Bank attends Harry Chapin Food Bank events to distribute pet food. They will be at the Golden Gate Community Center, 4701 Golden Gate Parkway, Naples, FL 34116, on Wednesday, April 29 from 10 a.m. to noon.

For residents in Immokalee, SNIP Collier will be at the Benison Center every Saturday in April from 10 a.m. to noon. The Benison Center is located at 815 E. Main Street, Immokalee, FL 34142.

For the Love of Cats is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization in Marco Island, FL, dedicated to saving the lives of abandoned cats and kittens in the community. They are an animal welfare group operating through donations from the public since 2002.

Saving Grace Pet Food Bank is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization whose mission is to provide food for pets in times of hardship, so their owners can keep the promise that they made to love and care for them forever.

Talking to Children About Covid-19

Children can become scared or confused about the information they hear about Covid-19. Consistent information will help ease anxiety and make it easier for children to process the information. Controlling where they get information can help. Be aware that many internet sites post unconfirmed information that may not be what you want your children to read.

Below are some recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) on what to discuss and how to discuss the Coronavirus with children.

♦ Remain calm and reassuring.

Remember that children will react to both what you say and how you say it. They will pick up cues from the conversations you have with them and with others.

♦ Make yourself available to listen and to talk.

Make time to talk. Be sure children know they can come to you when they have questions.

- ♦ Avoid language that might blame others and lead to stigma. Remember that viruses can make anyone sick, regardless of a person's race or ethnicity. Avoid making assumptions about who might have COVID-19.
- ♦ Pay attention to what children see or hear on television, radio, or online.

Consider reducing the amount of screen time focused on COVID-19. *Too much information on one topic can lead to anxiety.*

♦ Provide information that is honest and accurate.

Give children information that is truthful and appropriate for the age and developmental level of the child.

- ♦ Talk to children about how some stories on COVID-19 on the Internet and social media may be based on rumors and inaccurate information.
- ♦ Teach children everyday actions to reduce the spread of germs.
- ♦ Remind children to stay away from people who are coughing or sneezing or sick.
- ♦ Remind them to cough or sneeze into a tissue or their elbow, then throw the tissue into the trash.
- ♦ Discuss any new actions that may be taken at school to help protect children and school staff.(e.g., increased handwashing, cancellation of events or activities)

♦ Get children into a handwashing habit.

Teach them to wash their hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after blowing their nose, coughing, or sneezing; going to the bathroom; and before eating or preparing food.

♦ If soap and water are not available, teach them to use hand sanitizer.

Hand sanitizer should contain at least 60% alcohol. Supervise young children when they use hand sanitizer to prevent swallowing alcohol, especially in schools and child care facilities.

Here is Why it Has Been So Hazy the Last Few Days... Silver King Wildfire Burning in Big Cypress National Preserve

Ochopee – The Silver King Fire was detected on April 9 at 2:30 PM. The wildfire is in the northeast corner of the preserve. The fire is located 5 miles north of I-75 at mile marker 55 just west of the L -28 Interceptor Canal.

As of 4-12-20, the Silver King Wildfire is estimated to be approximately 350 acres and is burning primarily in cypress and pine with little direct access.

25 personnel, three buggies, two UTVs, and two helicopters are assigned to the fire. Ground crews began direct tactics on the south line using aerial support from one of the assigned helicopters.

These resources are staffed with personnel from the National Park Service, Fish & Wildlife Service, and the Seminole Tribe of Florida. Resources will be managed appropriately until this fire is contained to its smallest possible size while also maintaining our ability to respond to other fire starts.

After firefighter and public safety, protecting and minimizing impacts to the Sanctuary community and minimizing impacts to I-75 and the Preserve boundary are our priorities.

Currently, there are no expected smoke impacts to I-75 due to southerly winds and there are no closures in the area.



SYMPTOMS

Reported illnesses have ranged from mild symptoms to severe illness and death for confirmed COVID-19 cases.

- Dry Cough

When you sign up with Alert Collier you can enter up to five addresses within the County boundaries that you would like to receive emergency alerts about. Enter your home, work, relative, school or any other address that's important to you. Should an alert be issued for that location, you will receive a notification.

You can sign up with your cell phone to receive calls and/or text messages, your email address(es), home phone, business phone and hearing impaired device. Consumer Alert: Beware of Coronavirus Scams

Tallahassee, Fla. - CFO Patronis and Commissioner Weigel Floridians to know that scammers are preying on Floridians' fears COVID-19, surrounding taking advantage of unsuspecting victims while emotions are high and there is a sense of urgency surrounding this public health crisis. The Florida Office of Financial Regulation (OFR) is encouraging Floridians to remain vigilant while taking steps to protect themselves from scams.

During this time, scammers may rely on various tactics to steal your personal financial information. Fraudsters may use legitimate looking or sounding emails, texts, social media posts and websites, hoping victims will click on links so they can steal your personal identifying information and money. Be especially careful about announcements requesting you submit your application to receive government financial aid.

Here are some simple steps that you can take to protect yourself:

- ♦ Make sure all of your electronic devices have the latest security software and updates.
- ♦ Protect your accounts with multifactor authentication so your accounts are harder to access if your username and password are stolen.
- ◆Don't click on any email, text or electronic communication that is unsolicited even if you know the sender scammers often already know your contacts and may mimic their email addresses to trick you.
- ◆Don't click on a link for a website you can't independently verify as legitimate.
- ◆Don't click on a link for a website requesting you to validate your user name, password, or personal information. Call your credit card companies, financial institutions, and service providers directly for confirmation of their need to update your records.
- ♦ Only use trusted sources, like legitimate government websites for upto-date, fact-based information about COVID-19.

Before making any financial decisions, verify that you're working with a licensed professional, ask questions, do your homework and contact OFR to report financial fraud or suspicious activity at (850) 487-9687 or online, www.flofr.com.

There is nothing "normal" about today. Not one aspect of any of our lives is what it was before "the virus".

If you are not a morning person, try this as a "cocktail hour" chat. It is a great way to relax and enjoy the conversation doing something you would normally do together.

For more casual relationships, a regular text or email to check in is a great way to stay in contact.

As we venture into the "new normal" in the coming months, we will need to adapt our routines to include more people, albeit while we are physically apart.

Rather than "social distancing" many are referring to it as "physical distancing" as we do want to maintain our social contacts while at a physical distance.

Staying socially connected is especially important for kids as they develop. Parents can set up play-date video chats, group games and other activities via chats.

Staying connected helps us stay positive. We can be socially and spiritually connected while at a safe physical distance, something that may be our "new normal".
