Taxing Things by Mike Klein Tax Day is April 17th. If You're Not Ready, You Can File an Extension!



Due to the devastating effects of Hurricane Irma many folks in Everglades City are still not prepared to file their 2017 Income

Tax return. Lost records, disrupted postal service, employee records availability, and job related losses, among other difficulties; have contributed in one way or another to a very burdensome tax filing season. If you have not yet filed you can file for an automatic extension of time.

There are three ways to request an automatic extension of time to file a U.S. individual income tax return.

- ► You can pay all or part of your estimated income tax due and indicate that the payment is for an extension using Direct Pay, the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System, or using a credit or debit card.
- ► You can file Form 4868 electronically by accessing IRS e-file using your home computer or by using a tax professional who uses e-file.
- ► You can file a paper Form 4868 and enclose payment of your estimate of tax due.

You must file the extension by the regular tax due date April 17th. Under the extension your 2017 income tax filing date will be October 15, 2018.

Collier County Superintendent Honored as 2017 Lavan Dukes District Leader of the Year

At a meeting of the State Board of Education on March 27th, Commissioner of Education Pam Stewart named Collier County Superintendent Dr. Kamela Patton the 2017 Lavan Dukes District Data Leader of the Year. As a result of Dr. Patton's leadership over the last six years, Collier County Public Schools has made tremendous progress through a data-driven focus on continuous improvement.



"Dr. Kamela Patton's techniques are a great example of the way data can be used to help teachers and administrators provide students with the best education experience possible, and Collier County students are benefitting greatly," said Commissioner of Education Pam Stewart. "What I appreciate most is the fact that she has opened her doors and offered other districts the opportunity to learn about the student-focused strategies that have worked in Collier County so they too

can help students reach their full potential. It is truly an honor to recognize Dr. Patton today, and I look forward to witnessing her ongoing success."

Of the 67 school districts, Collier's district grades ranking has risen to 5th in 2017 from 33rd in 2011. Through strategic and systematic monitoring to ensure students' needs are met, the "A"-rated district has also experienced a 15.7 percent increase in its high school graduation rate, from 72.5 percent in 2010-11 to 88.2 percent in 2016-17.

Upon her arrival, Dr. Patton introduced "Data Dialogues," which are collaborative and targeted conversations between school and district leaders that have resulted in tremendous gains. Three times per year, following state and local benchmark assessments, school leaders analyze and reflect upon data. This allows school leaders, teachers, students and parents to review the data and determine the best approaches to maximize student impact.

During her tenure, Dr. Patton has implemented the Naviance College and Career Readiness platform for grades 6-12, which includes a Family Connection platform that helps students research colleges, scholarships, careers and more. In addition, she has implemented recruitment, retention and professional development systems to create a strong administrator pool for those aspiring to be instructional leaders.

The Lavan Dukes District Data Leader of the Year Program highlights the critical role district superintendents play in supporting and encouraging the use of data to improve students' college and career readiness. The award is named after Lavan Dukes to honor longtime Department of Education employee Garnet Lavan Dukes for his numerous contributions to public education on both the state and national levels.



My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock

For the Mockingbird, this is Shangri-La

Springtime means baby birds. Almost every bird around us now is either nest-building, brooding eggs or raising babies. We are fortunate to have a nest of mockingbirds in our backyard to watch as they grow.

The parents picked a perfect nesting spot, deep inside of a Vanda orchid basket. It is the perfect little woven nest. A week and a half ago, we saw 3 little bluish and brown



speckled eggs. The female broods the eggs for approximately 10 days.

They hatched on March 24th, and on the morning of the 30th we took the photo (left) of the 6-day old babies.

The adult pair share in the feeding and guarding of the chicks. Both forage and bring

food back and forth the entire day. They are monogamous and will stay with each other throughout their lifetime.

I will say that this pair has it pretty easy. In our yard, we have 5 bird baths, so fresh water is no effort at all for them. It is there whenever they want it.

The tomato garden provides a quick meal at any time. The adults love the tomatoes and eat them throughout the day. The rotting tomatoes attract insects, and that is what the parents feed the chicks. They need not leave the immediate area for food or water, it's right in front of them.

The adults guard the nest and their food sources pretty much the entire day. When we let the dogs out, they divebomb the dogs to try to drive them away from the nest. If we walk too close, they let us know they are not happy. That is about the extent of this pairs daily grind.

I imagine the male was quite proud of himself when he landed this spot. In fact, he must be quite a stud. First, he "won" the territory. The territory fighting was going on all February. Then he got the "girl". The guy with the waterfront digs landed the pretty girl. He is the envy of the rest of the mockingbird world around here. He is lucky and he knows it.

That is true for most of the local nature. How fortunate to be the offspring of an Everglades City mockingbird, flycatcher or cardinal. They could be from Maine and imprinted to migrate to Florida or Texas each winter. Those poor birds have to fly almost 1600 miles to escape bad weather, then return home for a roundtrip total of 3200 miles! Our local mockingbirds get to fly around here all year...no migration necessary!

Being born in SW Florida must be like a winning the lottery when you are a bird. Of course there are perils. We have the big, bad Great Horned Owls that are training their baby right now. That pair raised the owlet on the light post by the fire station. I imagine the owlet is pretty hungry so the mockingbirds do have some daily stress.

The Everglades area also has its share of snakes, raccoons, opossums, hawks and insects. I guess each is a potential threat to our mockingbird family...so my suggestion that life was too easy for them isn't quite accurate.


BUT, let's face it. Whether you are a bird, other creature or a human, being here is really special. Beautiful sunrises, beautiful sunsets and all that nature has to offer. We too can go out and forage...and come back with a fish for dinner! The more I think about it, I think we won the lottery. I got the guy, and the waterfront home. That's me. The really lucky one!

メメメメメメメメメメメメメ メメメメメメメ Recipes for Good Eating by Kathy Brock Super Easy, Fresh Pickled Beets X Ingredients: 4 cups cooked & sliced fresh beets, about 4 beets 1/8 cup sugar (or to taste) 1 large, sweet onion sliced 32 ounces Kraft Zesty Italian Dressing (enough to cover all of the beets & onions) Directions: Peel and slice fresh raw beets and place in large saucepan. Cover with water and bring to a boil. Turn down heat to a slow boil and let cook until tender. Cool and drain and set aside. Mix Zesty Italian dressing & sugar together. If you like it a bit more tart, you can add additional apple cider vinegar to your taste. In a large glass container that seals, add a layer of beets then onion and do this until the container is full. Pour liquid mixture over the beets and onions and put in the refrigerator for a week or longer. The longer it sits the better it gets. Our family loves the pickled onions so you may want to add extras if you are "onion people" too. By the way, the greens of beets can be prepared like spinach and served with a little butter, salt and pepper! ***********

The Museum of the Everglades' 20th Birthday

April 28, 2018, marks the 90th anniversary of the opening of the Tamiami Trail and the 20th Birthday of the Museum of the Everglades!



The Tamiami Trail (from Tampa to Miami) was a brilliant engineering feat, conquering the once impenetrable Everglades and

stands out as a picturesque link between the two coasts of Florida. Barron Gift Collier invested much of his personal wealth in building the Tamiami Trail, a gigantic project to link Florida's east and west coast with a continuous highway across the Everglades. The road was completed and opened to traffic on April 26, 1928.

Establishing a museum was the dream of the Everglades Women's Club which eventually evolved into the Friends of the



Museum of the Everglades, under the leadership of the late Pauline Reeves, for whom the museum's front gallery is named. The Museum of the Everglades was opened 20

years ago on the 70th anniversary of the Trail. We will also be commemorating the 65th Anniversary of the incorporation of the City of Everglades City in 1953 and the 95th Anniversary of the establishment of Collier County in 1923.

The celebrations will start at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 28, at the Museum of the Everglades, located at 105 West Broadway in Everglades City, Florida. Festivities will include a parade, live music, food, and fun for all the family as well as a walking tour of historic buildings and the "old timers" storytelling. This event is free and open to the public.

The longest known cottonmouth specimen was taken from the Dismal Swamp of Virginia and measured 74 inches.

The Florida average is half of that, at approximately 36 inches. Highly aquatic and an exceptional swimmer, the cottonmouth prefers the numerous swamps, marshes, and wetlands found throughout the Southwest Florida landscape. It is fairly commonly seen at the Audubon Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary and Big Cypress National Wildlife Preserve in Collier County and Myakka River State Park in Sarasota County.

In these black waters, the cottonmouth is a skilled predator, feeding on an array of animals. It has been known to feed on banded water snakes, mud snakes, fish, frogs, salamanders, sirens, lizards, turtles, baby alligators, birds, small mammals, insects, crayfish, snails, and even bats. Because its diet is so varied, it is sometimes referred to as being omni-carnivorous.

When approached, it is not as aggressive as the rattlesnake, and sadly, many similar-looking



banded water snakes are killed every year in a lamentable example of mistaken identity. Fatal cottonmouth bites are far rarer than those of rattlesnakes, both because of the smaller size of the snake and the fact that the cottonmouth is generally found in wet environments avoided by humans.

The venom of a cottonmouth is similar in composition to that of a rattlesnake. It is rich with tissue-destructive enzymes and causes extensive bleeding. Immediate emergency medical attention is mandatory. It is preyed upon by kingsnakes, which are virtually immune to the cottonmouth's venom, great horned owls, opossums, alligators, snapping turtles, and great blue herons.

SNOOK SEASON IS OPEN

Fishing in the 10,000 Islands with Capt. Mike Merritt

April should bring us some better weather and therefore some better fishing. We are all tired of the wind and not knowing what direction it will be every other day! More stable weather patterns should occur this month allowing the fish to get in steady feeding patterns. What this means for you is that you can fish the same areas more

than just one day in a row and expect good results.

If you're live bait fishing there should be plenty around this month. Snook, Reds and Seatrout all love Pilchards. You will be able to catch all 3 on the outside in the islands this month. If you can pick your days this month try an incoming tide in the morning and target the snook up close to the islands and points using live baits either on a cork or using a knocker rig. What you use will depend on the amount of current you have. I prefer using Owner light wire hooks. My clients lose less fish this way. Once hooked these allow for mistakes without losing the fish.

You may be able to sight fish this month for these same Snook. You will see them move in the shallows on the incoming tide. They are getting in position to feed on the bait that comes in with the tide. I like using a 3/8 oz. jig for this. In really shallow water I will sometimes go as light as a 1/8 oz. I use the DOA Cal Tails but there are a lot of good plastics out there. Accurate casting is the key, just remember to lead the fish and work the bait so it's in his path and if they are feeding you will gets strikes.

The Seatrout have been biting good on the flats when you can fish them. This month should allow for more flats fishing. We are also catching some nice Seatrout in rock holes and even on some wrecks. The usual popping cork and shrimp will work. I am catching plenty on a jig right now too. This should continue all month.

Catching Reds this month will be the toughest challenge. There are still plenty around but it has not been consistent. There are Reds on the outside and also in the back country. We have been catching some nice size fish but we just have to work a little harder. Live bait, live shrimp or a jig tipped with shrimp have all been working. Incoming tide is definitely your best bet for these. Fishing out as far as 100 ft. from some of the shorelines will produce. Moving in closer as the tide rises all the way up to the roots. Once the tide gets up too high they will be harder to catch due to the fact they are in those roots feeding.

Of course, if it's Tarpon you are after this is a good month for them also. Rolling fish will be seen in the rivers, out off the deep points and offshore along the edges. Artificials work great on these fish and red and white lures are an old time favorite that still produce.

Offshore fishing is also heating up this month. Permit and Cobia are both offshore and you may see a couple or may just see hundreds. It's a great month to mix it up and catch a variety of fish. So get out and enjoy some great weather and some great fishing to go with it!

Living With Alligators a Reality (and Necessity) in Florida

The American alligator is a conservation success story. Florida has a healthy and stable alligator population, which is estimated at 1.3 million alligators of every size. They are an important part of Florida's wetlands, but should be regarded with caution and respect.

Alligators become more active and visible during spring when temperatures rise and their metabolism increases. Although serious injuries caused by alligators are rare in Florida, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) recommends taking precautions when having fun in and around the water. Alligators inhabit all 67 counties in Florida and can be found anywhere there is standing water. Reduce the chances of conflicts with alligators by swimming only in designated swimming areas during daylight hours. Also keep pets on a leash and away from the

Because alligators control their body temperature by basking in the sun, they may be easily observed. However, the FWC urges people to keep their distance if they see one. And never feed alligators because it is dangerous and illegal.

The FWC places the highest priority on public safety and administers a <u>Statewide Nuisance Alligator Program</u> to address complaints concerning specific alligators. People concerned about an alligator should call the FWC's toll-free Nuisance Alligator Hotline at <u>866-FWC-GATOR</u> (392-4286). SNAP uses contracted nuisance alligator trappers throughout the state to remove alligators 4 feet in length or greater that are believed to pose a threat to people, pets or property. The FWC also works diligently to keep Floridians and visitors informed, including providing advice about <u>Living with Alligators</u> at <u>MyFWC.com/Alligator</u>.

Good News! 2017 Was a Great Breeding Year for Birds in the Everglades

Finally some really good news! After a decade of sub-par breeding numbers, 2017 turned out to be a very good year for the birds of the Everglades.

Shortly after Hurricane Irma, it was feared that breeding numbers would plummet due to high water in the 'Glades. However, this did not turn out to be true in all areas.

According to an article published in the Naples Daily News from data taken from South Florida Water Management Districts annual wading bird report, White Ibis, Wood Storks, Great Egrets, and other wading birds recorded some of the best numbers in over a decade.

It remains to be seen how long-lasting the increased higher breeding numbers will hold. It also is important to note that while the birds did well in the refuge of Everglades National Park and in a handful of water conservation areas immediately north of it, they still struggled in their ancient breeding grounds, in the disappearing shallow wetlands near the Big Corkscrew Swamp and coasts of southern Florida, according to the report.


"It's important not to read too much into one -year population jumps or drops," said Mark Cook, the water district's lead scientist, who helped put together the report. But last year's numbers compared to 10- and 20-year averages are a sign for hope, Cook said.

"It shows us ecologists that if we can get the water right in one year and see this kind of rebound then we can restore the system," he said. "I do not think it's too far-fetched to say we could recover a good portion of those birds that were historically here, with the right hydrological conditions. Even though the system is about half the size it was, I think it's possible.

Audubon has detailed records dating back to the late 19th century, so there is excellent knowledge of historic bird populations. "They're really the only group of organisms that we have good records from the early 20th century and even late 19th century," he said. "We know where they nested and how many of each species there were. So unlike everything else, we really know what we're aiming for."

Monitors counted 46,248 wading bird nests in the 2017 season, between December 2016 and July 2017. That's up from the 26,676 found in 2016 and above the 10-year annual average of

It also marks the best year since 2009, the highwater mark for the population since restoration efforts began.
