Due to Covid Concerns, No Seafood Festival For Fist Time in 51 Years But the Fest Will be Back in 2022

During the September Everglades City Council meeting, out of an abundance of caution, the council members agreed that with the uncertainty of Covid-19, holding an event that historically attracts crowds of people in a venue with no way to practice social distancing, would be too great a risk for the city and area residents, and for the organizer who must make arrangements months in advance without knowing what future conditions may be.

The event's organizer was also in attendance. The Everglades Betterment Association president, Carol Foss, stated that it is unfortunate to have to cancel the festival and she knows that people will be disappointed. However she added that she'd "love to" proceed with the festival in 2022, and everyone agreed that Everglades City will, once again, have the annual festival, but not until February 2022.

The annual Everglades Seafood Festival supports several local charitable organizations that rely on the revenue from the festival, and other events, to help area residents who need the help.

New water plan for S. Florida is Good News for Everglades National Park By Antonia Florio Science Communications Liaison, Everglades National Park

We have some good news to share. Everglades National Park is about to get more, clean fresh water, particularly in the dry season. In fact, the distribution of fresh water all across southern Florida is about to change for the better with a new plan born from the collaboration of government agencies, including the National Park Service, tribal nations and stakeholder groups.

Known as the Combined Operational Plan, this set of rules will guide water delivery across South Florida. As of August 28, 2020, water managers will use this playbook to decide where, when, and how much water to distribute. And unlike previous water plans, this new set of rules will base water management decisions on the availability of water north of the park.

The Combined Operational Plan is because of completed Everglades Restoration projects that built the infrastructure needed to move water. For example, recently raised parts of Tamiami Trail allow more water to flow into Everglades National Park. Then, giant structures known as seepage walls were put into the ground to keep the water in the park and prevent it from flooding nearby communities. Projects such as these allow us to now move more water south towards the park, while making sure surrounding urban areas and farms do not flood.

I recently interviewed Jed Redwine, an Ecologist at Everglades National Park, who has been working on the new plan for the past three years. He talked to me about what the Combined Operational Plan means for the average South Floridian and why he's so excited about the future of Everglades National Park.

Almost a hundred years ago, in 1922, Barron Collier embarked on the challenge of establishing a modern city with all the necessary amenities and by 1928 his vision was realized with a new County

Courthouse, Bank Building, and a business district with sidewalks and beautiful landscaping.

Now, thanks to volunteers who have been working on the project for over a year, we have a new Bicycle Pedestrian Master Plan which will include an extension of the sidewalk in front of City Hall down Broadway to the Barron River and around the Circle to the Everglades Community Church.

Also included are proposed bike lanes during different phases of the Master Plan. One proposed improvement resurfaces and restripes CR29 from the bridge in Everglades City to the Bridge in Chokoloskee, from two 11 foot lanes to one 15 foot vehicle lane and one 7 foot bike lane. This phase will be funded by Collier County.

Please take a moment and look over the Bike Ped Master Plan online at https://visitevergladescity.com/bpmp/. A printed copy is also available at City Hall. The plan will be presented and discussed during the October 6th City Council meeting at 7 pm which you can join via zoom or in person.

planning and executing great lessons.





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Fishing the 10,000 Islands Captain Mike Merritt's September Report

Well, the Redfish bite is in full swing! We are catching lots of Redfish and most are 24"-27" fish. This should continue all the way thru October and into November. More fish should continue to show up and the fun should continue!

The Reds can be caught on a variety of baits and lures. Anything fished on the bottom will produce the fastest results. Shrimp are always a good bet for Reds and can be purchased locally at several locations. Popping corks also work and can help the fish locate your baits when used properly. These can also be purchased where you buy your shrimp. Help support your local businesses and pick up your gear from a local shop!

Snook season is open and there are lots of fish around. The majority of what is being caught are undersized fish but there are plenty of slot size Snook to be caught! Live baits are getting lots of action, but the lures are working too. I have been catching them on a variety of lures from Mirrolures, Rapalas, Jigs, to DOA's. We were catching some nice fish on topwater lures also. This bite has been best early in the morning.

The Tarpon have also been here all summer in large numbers. I have had a lot of clients catch their first Tarpon this year while we were Snook fishing. A lot of small Tarpon are roaming the shorelines. These fish are 30"-40" fish and make for lots of fun! One thing is for sure right now, and that is the fact the fishing is great!

There seems to be a higher volume of boats on the water these days and some of them do not have any manners or etiquette, There are certain things we have always done around here and people from other areas don't seem to follow the same rules. Sometimes I think there should be a class on fishing etiquette before putting your boat in. I think the simple rule is don't do what you wouldn't want others to do to you. So, knowing there are always those disrespectful boaters make sure you keep your cool! Things have changed and hopefully they learn. Have fun and enjoy the bite! Fall is headed our way and things will change again. Good luck fishing! Capt. Mike Merritt

SNOOK SLOT SIZES & HARVEST ZONES

The harvest season for Snook reopened on September 1st for locations south of Gordon Pass in Collier County.

The season will remain closed for harvest north of the Pass into Hernando/ Pasco county as that region recovers from the effects of Red Tide.

Snook harvest is permitted in the Everglades City/ Chokoloskee area. Anglers must possess a saltwater fishing license and snook stamp.

The fish have a slot limit. Snook must not be less than 28" or more than 33". There is a limit of 1 fish per day with a zero captain and crew-for-hire limit.

Snook are frequently caught near the mangroves where there is moving water.

Many anglers will use live bait and some prefer artificial lures.

There are multiple bait shops in our area that can advise you on the proper baits to use. If you prefer to go on an adventure with a professional guide, check out the website www.visitevergladescity.com.





Can you briefly explain what the Combined Operational Plan does?

The Combined Operational Plan (COP) defines the rules for how we move water in response to rainfall across Everglades National Park and the area located just north of the park called Water Conservation Area 3. We implementing COP now because we recently completed many flood management infrastructure projects [canals, levees, and structures] that allow us to better manage flooding. Now we can operate the water management system in a way that creates better outcomes for the environment while still protecting people's homes, farms, and businesses from flooding.

How does a person who lives in South Florida benefit from the Combined Operational Plan?

There are many ways the average person will benefit. The agricultural community in the Redlands area of Miami will receive better flood protection. COP will also reduce the risk of saltwater intrusion, particularly in the South Dade wells that deliver fresh water to the Florida Keys. This will help maintain the water supply for people living in both Miami-Dade and Monroe Counties. The new water plan will create a healthier Everglades, which will in turn create more recreational opportunities. It will drive economic activity by bringing more tourists to the area. Residents of southern Florida will be able to experience a healthier Everglades National Park that will look more similar to the way it was before the 20th century, with more fish and wading birds present.

So what exactly will change on August 28th when the plan is officially implemented?

We've been testing the new infrastructure since 2015, and as a result we have a pretty good idea of how to move water when there's a lot of it available. Right now, we are in the wet season and the Everglades ecosystem has a lot of water, so we won't see much change since we have already adopted many of the COP operations for wet conditions.

My Little Slice of Paradise By Kathy Brock

I have had the good fortune of experiencing two completely different "worlds". I was born and raised in Southeast Florida, but bought a home in the Everglades when I was 34. Now, at 60, I can say I know both scenarios equally well. Captain Merritt's article mentions that many new boaters have come here since the pandemic. Many are from the east coast, just like I was back in 1994.

Experience and perspective can really help us when we encounter new people! You see, on the east coast, there are so many people, you can never, ever go out in your boat without seeing other people—all of the time. A lot of them!

Here, we can go out and see a few or no others for many hours. We look at someone encroaching on our space as an intrusion. It's rude, and it's unacceptable.

If you go boating in Dade, Broward and Palm Beach county, there is no such unwritten rule per se, you have to share your space, and just barge in if you want to enjoy the beach, boating, etc. It's a way of life for the most part.

It really is such a stark contrast. Those of us who live in the Everglades area see others, but we can also reach isolated places where it's just us. I can tell you that growing up there I had no concept of such isolation until I came here, so I completely understand why some of our visitors "don't get it." Frankly, it's because they cannot. They have never experienced what we call "normal".

There is nothing that can replace experience. No matter how intelligent someone is. I do not care how educated they may be. Absolutely nothing is equivalent to the knowledge you gain through experiencing something for yourself.

I am not giving everyone a pass, nor am I saying I like it when people barge in. All I am saying is to many folks that is *their normal*, so they are not being intentionally "rude" they are just doing what *they* have to do while living in the world they come from.
