If Your Home Was Damaged by Hurricane Irma, and it Was Uninhabitable for A Period of Time, You Can Apply With Collier County for Property Tax Relief... Here's How!!

If your home was severely damaged by the hurricane you will want to pay attention!

Collier County is accepting applications from homeowners to offer relief in the form of a reduction on, or a complete rebate of, your property taxes. Here is the information from the county website on how to apply:

- 1) If you had MAJOR structural damage to your home please fill out the HURRICANE IRMA DAMAGE REPORT and submit it to our office along with any documentation such as insurance/repair estimates, permit applications, photos, etc.
- 2) Additionally, if you have a homestead exemption and were unable to live in your home for 30 days or more during 2017 you may be eligible for a property tax rebate. Please fill out form DR-463 (Application for abatement of taxes for homesteaded residential improvements) and return it to our office by March 1, 2019, along with all necessary supporting documentation.

You can download both forms at https://swflgo.com/property-tax-waiver-form/. When you complete the forms, email them to the county at this address: webinfo@collierappraiser.com. Make sure you follow directions and get all information to them by March 1, 2019. Try to get the information to them as soon as possible!

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The Day Everything Changed in Our Little SW Florida Paradise September 10, 2017

Hurricane Irma made landfall in SWFL on September 10th, 2017. In the days leading up to the storm, hurricane models changed from an east coast landfall to a Keys landfall, then it pretty much zeroed in on a location somewhere between Everglades City and Marco Island. That is when my heart sank.

As we watched the weather channel non-stop, the conversation turned to storm surge, and the experts all started weighing in. Some suggested it would be as high as 15 feet. Others said it would be 10' or less. All agreed it would happen. That is when we knew things would be different when we returned to the area we love and call home after evacuating 2 days before the storm hit.

We rode out the storm in my family home in Hollywood which is located 5 miles inland on a sand dune known as the pine island ridge (10 foot above sea level!). As the storm neared, we were not thinking about Hollywood, we were focused in on Everglades City and what may be happening there.

How high would the water get? Would it be like Hurricane Wilma? Would our home and our neighbors homes still be there? What would become of our little city?

When the storm passed, we surveyed the damage in Hollywood which was limited to tree damage, fence damage and a minor roof problem...which we viewed as, "no problem." I called Dottie to see when we could come back to Everglades City. Then we packed the cooler, chlorine and a squeegee and headed west on I-75. We were told by friends the water was high. We saw pictures that showed some homes with water up to the windows but we still did not understand the full impact...yet.

As we made our way over the little bridge into Everglades City it didn't look that bad. We thought we may have dodged a bullet, but what we saw on the outside, was not representative of what was on the inside. The full impact became more and more evident with each passing day as the piles of trash, furniture and personal belongings grew to mountainous proportions.

Unless you have been through a flood before, it is hard to understand what it does to a home and all of your belongings. One inch of water in a home can cause immense damage. Everglades City took on 9 feet of water. That meant homes not on stilts all got wet, all 75 of them. All of the local businesses were damaged, and even buildings on stilts sustained substantial damage.

Unlike Marco Island that had mounds of tree limbs and roof damage, Everglades City, Chokoloskee and Plantation Island had mountains of furniture, clothing, appliances and everything else in a home ruined. All of it slimy, muddied and unsalvageable.

As I rode around on my bicycle in the days immediately after "Irmageddon," an intense sadness would come over me. Now I realize that I was in a funk. The task ahead seemed so overwhelming, almost endless. Where do you begin, and when will we ever reach the end? And, we were one of the lucky ones. Our damage was limited to our downstairs, where we have some major appliances, our items in storage, and our tools. Our landscaping and everyone else's was destroyed too. It was severe, but we were able to stay in our home throughout repairs.

So many of our neighbors lost everything, including the ability to stay home and ride out their "funk" in familiar surroundings. Even today, many of our neighbors are still displaced in other areas or in temporary housing in trailers as they await repairs.

However, our little City's future is bright. Things damaged beyond repair are being torn down to be rebuilt. Repairable buildings are being renovated, and new projects to revitalize the area are on the horizon. On the outside, things look pretty-much back to normal, that is until you look inside the many homes still stripped to the studs.

Today as I write this, tropical storm Gordon is raining on us. But we are fine, albeit wet. There is much to be thankful for. The Stone Crab Fleet is readying for October 15th. Our tourism businesses are busy, and our waters are free of Red Tide and Blue-Green Algae, so fishing has been great. The reason we all came here in the first place is still what it was before September 10th, 2017...after we dug out, threw it out, and then dried out. #EvergladesCityStrong



Smalltooth Sawfish: On the Road to Recovery

The U.S. Smalltooth Sawfish Recovery Team recently released a video which looks at smalltooth sawfish recovery in the United States, 15 years after its listing under the Endangered Species Act. To watch the video visit https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=NSRWUjVU3e8&feature=youtu.be

The video is themed around the "road" to recovery and starts with an aerial drive down US 1 into Florida City where Keys visitors are now welcomed by a billboard promoting sawfish conservation. The billboard highlights three key concepts of sawfish conservation: respect, release, and report.

Viewers are given a brief description of smalltooth sawfish biology, the habitats where they live, and why the population decreased to the point that it needs protection under the Endangered Species Act. The video then introduces the smalltooth sawfish recovery implementation team developed by NOAA Fisheries to aid in recovering this species.



"Our Smalltooth Sawfish Recovery Implementation Team (photo left) is comprised of a number of partners from both federal and state government, non-government organizations, universities, and the fishing industry. Each year we get together to review what we've learned through our research in the previous year and set goals for the upcoming year," states team member Tonya Wiley of Havenworth Coastal Conservation.

Gregg Poulakis of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission spoke about the progress of the team since its inception, stating, "when the recovery team came into existence

shortly after the species was listed under the Endangered Species Act, we knew very little about the species. Basically, any question that we asked, or anyone would ask, about the biology or ecology of the species didn't have an answer, so we had a lot of priorities initially, and over the last 15 years we've learned a lot."

The video progresses by briefly discussing current research on this endangered species before introducing team member and professional charter captain, Charlie Phillips of Hope Fishing Adventures. Charlie explains why he volunteered to become part of the team, "I'm an Everglades National Park permitted captain myself, and the sawfish is the heart of the Everglades. I mean it embodies the area that I fish, so having an opportunity for people to interact correctly with that endangered species is very important and trying to share that with as many people as I can...is why I'm here." Charlie's account as a recreational angler segues into the safe release guidance that the team has developed and continues to promote. Should an angler catch a sawfish, our guidance is to leave the sawfish in the water, cut the line as close to the hook as possible, release the sawfish quickly, and report to us the information about the encounter.

The video details what a recovered population of smalltooth sawfish in the U.S. might look like. While there is some uncertainty, John Carlson of NOAA Fisheries' Southeast Fisheries Science Center states, "... sawfish historically were found in areas from North Carolina to the Gulf of Mexico so what we should see as the population recovers, is that abundance trends are increasing as well as seeing individuals in some of those historic areas."

With the evidence to date, the team thinks endangered smalltooth sawfish are on the path to recovery. "Based on the species current status and its life history characteristics, the smalltooth sawfish population is not likely to fully recover for at least 40 to 50 years," concludes Adam Brame, the Sawfish Recovery Coordinator for NOAA Fisheries. "We are seeing signs of progress, however, and due to these modest improvements, we're cautiously optimistic that the smalltooth sawfish is indeed on the road to recovery."



My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock It's Just My Opinion...

Over the last year, SW Florida has struggled to get back to "normal." Many of our neighbors to the north of us have been recovering nicely from the hurricane - only to get slapped by the effects of Red Tide and blue-green algae. Thankfully, we've been fortunate...so far. Sometimes it just isn't so easy down here in

There has been a lot of progress over the last 12 months. There are signs of recovery everywhere. You see it in Naples. You see it in Marco Island. You see it here in and around Everglades City. The surrounding landscape has recovered very well. Our lawns and trees are coming back. Unfortunately, for some of our residential and business structures, recovery has not been so easy. Many of our buildings were severely damaged. Some beyond

It's exciting to see so many new projects, but it is also a bit scary to me at the same time. My hope is that we can strike a balance between building anew and preservation.

What makes our area so special is its *uniqueness*. We are not like other places that have fancier buildings, more people, and more creature comforts. But isn't that why we live here...or why you visit here?

After the storm, I know I was in a funk. Seeing it all like it was-was depressing! When we are sad or depressed or emotional, psychologists will tell you that it is best to wait before making major decisions. Take the tree out or try to save it? Knock it down or renovate? Stay or move?

I'll bet most of us that dealt with Irma firsthand had at least one of those questions to answer. And, immediately following the storm the answers for me would've been; 1) take it out, 2) knock it down, and 3) move.

Today, I would have the exact opposite answers having had time to (emotionally and domestically) recover. As a city and, more importantly as a community, I believe it is prudent to think the same way. A lot can change after a catastrophic event. Many other cities who have been through a similar devastation are not at all the same 10 years later...for multiple reasons. Some are better 10 years later, and some are not.

One reality is that there will be an influx of money, and new people with that money, looking for an advantageous opportunity. That is the intelligent thing to do. There are many ways Everglades City can grow. We can become a "new city" or we can become a better version of the City we were...the City we are. That is what we should be deciding, watching and guiding as citizens. How are we going to grow? But most importantly, how do we want to grow?

It is not inconceivable for us to become a "tiny Marco Island" where concrete replaces wood, fancy replaces shabby chic, and jet skis zoom up and down the Barron River. We better be paying close attention.

One thing for sure is that we cannot compete with Marco or Naples for creature comforts...but we blow them away on "creatures" ...and that is why our visitors come here, and that's why we live here. We are unique, and we like it that way.

Some of our historic buildings are being demolished, on the chopping block or moth-balled. So many of the small "cracker homes" are in trouble. Some of the changes are necessary, some are inevitable. It's better if we can anticipate what they may be.

We need new businesses and more housing for sure. But we don't need just "any" business or just "any" housing. What we end up with will define our city for years to come and impact each and every one of us. Will we be a better version of Historic Everglades City, or will Everglades City be History?

The current City Charter and land development code (LDC) fail to address this growth issue. If we act now by adding language into the LDC and City Charter to protect our city by helping it grow in accordance with our shared goals and not someone else's, we are far more likely to be satisfied with the outcome for years to come.

Island Life Recipes



New Book Highlights Ochopee

Get it Now as a Great Holiday Gift The Story of the Smallest Post Office as told to Maria Stone



It may be a popular tourist stop now but the Ochopee Post Office is a symbol of growth in southwest Florida and of the resilience pioneers.

Before the little building became the "Smallest Post Office in the United States" 1953 after a in disastrous fire burned down the general store, it was a shed in

the thriving tomato farm in Ochopee on the Tamiami Trail, the road linking Tampa to Miami which opened in 1928.

This book recalls the memories of the founding Gaunt family plus their friends and neighbors. There are also reports of more recent times when Evelyn Shealy served the community as postmaster, Jerri Fish drove 123 miles each day to deliver the mail, and Mama Hokie hung out her BEER WORMS

The farm is gone now but the Post Office has survived hurricanes from Donna in 1960 to Irma in 2017 when it was the only fullservice postal facility in the area.

These stories were recorded by the late Maria Stone, author of many "written oral histories" that are invaluable to historians. They are reprinted with new material and photos in this edition to celebrate the 65th Anniversary of Ochopee Post Office.

Amidst the pizzas, ice cream, hot dogs, and surrey rentals, a naturalist might be quick to dismiss Lakes Regional Park as more of a family recreational park than a place to commune with nature. The truth is, plenty of nature is to be found along the many trails that wind through this attractive park. The wide variety of wildlife and bird species that inhabit this 279-acre oasis have earned it a place on the Florida Fish and Wildlife's South Florida Birding Trail.



The park is situated on land that was a large gravel and limestone quarry during the 1960s. After the quarry was abandoned, ground and surface water filled in the excavations, creating the 158-acre lake that now gives the park its name. The water depth ranges from a few inches along the shore to more than 20 feet in places. Lee County purchased the site in 1978 and

officially opened the park on April 21, 1984. In 1991 the park added a fragrance garden, which over the years has evolved into a botanical garden that includes exotic trees, flowers, and cacti. Butterflies abound in this area of the park, and identification signs help amateur entomologists identify the numerous species found throughout the gardens.

Birders will find Lakes Regional Park a surprising treasure of species. Wading birds such as great egrets, herons, and occasionally wood storks congregate along the lakeshore. This is one of the rare places where you can spot three different species of ibis in one day: common white ibis, glossy ibis, and the exotic scarlet ibis (these are escaped from zoos). The fragrance garden attracts dozens of species of migratory warblers, vireos, and assorted sparrows during the spring and fall migrations. Cowbirds, blackbirds, boat-tailed grackles, and other urban species can be found throughout the park year-round. Active rookeries on several of the islands found in the lake present unique opportunities for photographers with good telephoto lenses to shoot hungry nestlings and anxious, feeding parents. The birding is so consistent throughout the year that Lakes Regional Park has volunteers who participate in bird counts for both the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the National Audubon Society.

Of course, the recreational value of the park should not be overlooked. The Railroad Museum of South Florida is located here and offers displays of model trains, historical information on the early regional railroads, and much more. The nearby playground has a full-size replica locomotive for the kids to play on, and an eighth-size scale railroad train takes children and parents alike on a 1.4-mile ride along a 7.5-inch-wide track for a nominal fee. A restored Baldwin Locomotive known as the ACL #143 (Atlantic Coast Line) and its coal tender sit across from the museum. The machine was built in Philadelphia in 1905 and officially retired in 1959.

Along the northern edge of the property two water parks offer welcome relief from the Florida sun for children of all ages. A rock-climbing wall and several playgrounds also help to keep the youngsters busy throughout the day. Visitors can rent bikes, double surreys, choppers, quad-sports, and scooters. Boat rentals include kayaks, canoes, pedal boats, and hydro-bikes. The park rents out several pavilions of varying sizes for private parties, weddings and special events. Fishing is allowed in the lakes, but a freshwater license is required. Swimming is prohibited because of the alligators that thrive in the lakes.

The 2.5 miles of hiking and biking trails that wind through the backwoods offer a more subdued environment where nature lovers can take in the wildlife or relax under the shade of a sprawling live oak. Most of the exotic vegetation has been removed, and, except for the botanical gardens, the park is well on its way to returning to native vegetation. Lakes Regional Park has a little something for everyone, and in the midst of the nearby Wal-Marts and Lowe's superstores, this park is a welcome respite from the urban landscape that surrounds it.

FWC Makes Snook, Redfish Temporarily Catch-and-Release Only In Areas Affected by Red Tide

Everglades City & Chokoloskee ARE NOT Affected

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has temporarily made snook and redfish catch-and-release only from the northernmost point of Anna Maria Island in Manatee County to Gordon Pass in Collier County. This was done through an Executive Order in response to the naturally-occurring red tide bloom in southwest Florida and is in effect until the next FWC Commission meeting, which starts Sept. 26.

"I support Executive Director Eric Sutton's decision to implement the Executive Order as we continue to manage this world-class fishery for future generations," said FWC Chairman Bo Rivard. "We will continue working with our partners and will evaluate next steps at our Commission meeting the end of September."

Sutton has spent significant time in the areas most impacted by naturally-occurring red tide. He and staff will continue to work with local communities and partners as the FWC manages this issue to ensure recovery of the fisheries.

"We've seen the devastation to the redfish and snook populations in southwest Florida, and we support the catch-and-release initiative taken by FWC," said Brian Gorski, Executive Director of Coastal Conservation Association Florida. "In working with the FWC on this initiative, we've heard support from members and guides throughout the state who also understand the need for such a change, to ensure that generations to come can enjoy the thrill of catching one of these iconic species."

Regulations outside of those counties remain unchanged, including the Sept. 1 snook season opening that occurs in other Gulf and Atlantic state waters.

The Museum of the Everglades will be showing "Shark River" starring Steve Cochran on Friday, September 14th as the next








