The stone crab fleet came out in force, the residents and visitors gathered, and even the congressman for the 25th district, Mario Diaz -Balart, showed up.

Last year's event was subdued, taking place only weeks after Hurricane Irma ravaged the area. This time, the only threatening weather was a few rain clouds and a light sprinkling...then the sun broke out and the festivities began.

The live music was great as always with Mitch Mitchell & partner providing tunes for the crowd.

The kids (and adults!) had a blast during the "frog race" even though many of the reptiles did not fully cooperate.

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Superintendent Pedro Ramos Responds to Rapper Article

An article that appeared in the "My Slice of Paradise" column in the September 8th edition of *The Mullet Rapper* that addressed the National Park Service's intention to enforce an entrance fee and require an online boaters course, caught the attention of Pedro Ramos, superintendent for Everglades and Dry Tortugas National Park.

Mr. Ramos contacted me to explain the park's intention and how they will roll out the new rules over time.

According to Mr. Ramos, the intention of the online boater safety course, which will be offered free of charge, is to educate boaters about the unique waters in and around Everglades National Park, to keep the boater safe, and to help protect the sensitive environment. The online course will be an opportunity to introduce boaters to the intricacies of the area and help teach them the uniqueness of the area.

The implementation of the entry fee to Everglades National Park was also discussed. My article questioned the method that will be used to collect the entry fee since the boaters launch at multiple boat ramps, all privately owned, and that a central point for entry does not exist like in most other parks.

The superintendent explained that boaters will have the option of paying at the visitors center or paying online using their mobile phone or laptop computer.

He went on to explain that implementation would take place over a period of time and law enforcement officers (Rangers) for the park would be instructed to issue warnings in the beginning, and continue to do so until it was widely believed that the public was fully aware of the requirements.

The Park will use a PR campaign to make the public aware of the changes.

Implementation will require the cooperation of local establishments to help distribute information as it relates to park boating rules and entry fees for visitors and residents alike.

Lastly, the superintendent pointed out that the old visitors center had been torn down in preparation for the building of a new center expected to be completed within 24 months.

We appreciate that Mr. Ramos took his time to explain the Park's intention and future plans so that we can clarify the rules for our readers.

Area Icon Passes Away Dorothy "Mama Dot" Weeks is Gone at 93 (See Obituary on page 11)



Dorothy "Mama Dot" Weeks was born January 19, 1925 in Greenwich New York. Mama Dot met her husband in Staten Island and in a few weeks they were married and moved to South Florida. Ivan, Dot's

husband was from Marco Island family of 10 children.

Mama Dot and Ivan's first home was a lighter boat where they raised their four children on the Barron River. Her husband was fisherman. Mama Dot got her own 4 cylinder- motor and a fishing boat so she could fish too. She sold her fish to Everglades City Fish house close to what is now Camilla Street Grill

Her 4 children attended Everglades City School. Her husband Ivan died of a heart attack while fishing. She wanted to stay in Everglades City and Baron Collier offered her a space in back of the Sundries store that



became a luncheonette serving food.

She would get up at 4am and make the breakfast for the crabbers before they left for the day. She was well known for her hamburgers and cheeseburgers. She also served the movie stars that came in for the movies filmed in Everglades City and the surrounding area such as "Gone Fishin". She reported learning how to cook from her husband. She was to be charged \$200.00 for rent but it was never collected by Collier.

Mama Dot Weeks will be missed but her legacy will live on in our hearts, and in our memories, for generations to come.



A Message from Fire-Chief Kingman Schuldt

The last week of August, the District took delivery of two new fire apparatus.

2018 Emergency One Typhoon Rescue Pumpers are equipped with a 400 hp motor, 1,250 gpm water pump, 810 water tank and 40-gallon foam cells.

In all, the District will receive five identical fire apparatus over the next few After in-servicing the units and training is provided to the members, the apparatus will be placed in-service at fire stations 22, 23, 70, and 71. The fifth unit, Engine 25 was purchased with Impact Fees and will be housed at Station 25 which is expected to open mid- 2019. This facility is being constructed as part of Collier County's EMS expansion efforts and will be located on Lords Way near the Motor Park.

The Fire District has been afforded the opportunity to joint-staff this facility alongside our County EMS partners. This is yet another example of the great working partnership the Fire District and Collier County maintain in order to provide our residents with the best possible life safety

The Buddy Bench

The Buddy Bench is a simple idea to foster friendship on the playground during recess. Experts say that including kids who are alone at recess or lunch can also help students feel accepted at school. We have two Buddy Benches installed. One is on the playground and another

in the courtyard area where students play at lunch.

One of the many great things about this program is simply students helping students. Peer support is a critical factor in combatting bullying and fostering kindness to create a school community. Our hope is that this Buddy Bench can help to build empathy, tolerance and teach inclusiveness. In addition, the Buddy Bench will act as a reminder to be kind to one another. Our goal is that eventually no children use the Buddy



Bench; it becomes a symbol that we are all buddies. It complements our school-wide approach to developing a positive social culture.

The basic concept of the bench is simple: A student who wants someone to play with goes to the bench; other students notice the student on the bench and invite him/her to play; student on bench accepts. Of course, life is not always this simple. That is why students will be taught a few rules.

Students will learn all about the "Buddy Bench" in their classrooms, with the school counselor leading the discussion. The conversation will include what the Buddy Bench is, why we have it, and how to use the Buddy Bench.

The first tournament was scheduled last year in September...to only be postponed by Hurricane Irma. Undeterred, they held the event later in the year and held it in September again this year.


This time, the weather cooperated and the tournament grew to an impressive 31 boats in the September 2018 event. Funds from last year's event helped pay for the beautiful scorer's table and other equipment. The department even had a little left over as reserves when this school year started.

This year's event hosted local anglers and some from as far away as Miami and Fort Myers. The Whitcomb's have set a goal of 50 boats for next year and plan to add some additional categories for the competition.

Finding a major sponsor is high on the wish list, and it shouldn't be too difficult given the success of the event so far, and the proximity of the tournament to the 10,000 Islands which are considered to be an angler's paradise.

When I asked the couple if they planned on staying, they both stated that they absolutely love the school and the area and plan on staying until they retire at some future, undetermined date.

I hope that is many years down the line so that our area's children can continue to blossom and reach new goals with the help of our very own dynamic teaching duo, Jill & John Whitcomb.

Island Life Recipes

Calley Anderson's Sweet Potato Pie

Ingredients
4 medium sweet potatoes-baked
1/2 stick butter, softened
1/4 cup sugar
3/4 cup brown sugar
2 eggs, beaten
1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1/8 teaspoon ground allspice
1/2 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup evaporated milk
1 unbaked pie crust
Maple whipped cream for the topping (see below)

Directions: Mash the sweet potatoes and set aside. Blend the butter, sugar and dry goods, then add the eggs. Blend well. Mix into the potatoes and add the evaporated milk. Pour into the unbaked pie shell and cover the sades of the grout with fail so it describ them. Poles et 250% for 1 hours or and add the evaporated milk. Pour into the unbaked pie shell and cover the edges of the crust with foil so it doesn't burn. Bake at 350° for 1 hour or until toothpick comes out clean.

Maple Whipped Cream: 1 cup of heavy whipping cream, 1/4 cup of confectioners' sugar, 2 tablespoons of pure maple syrup. Whip until soft peaks form. Mix in a pre-chilled (in the freezer) bowl.



The new agreement had been in the works for a while and has been approved by the DEP. The new contract recognizes that much has been accomplished in the past year, and is beneficial to the city from a cash flow perspective. It is also recognizes the knowledge and capabilities of city employees Lloyd Beatty and Gordon Forbes, who are very familiar about the operation of the city's facilities.

National Park Service Seeks Public Comments on Plan to Protect Species of **Concern on Southeast US Coastlines**

The National Park Service (NPS) is seeking public comments regional on а environmental assessment that examines options for protecting shorebirds, sea turtles and beach mice from the threat of depredation at NPS units in the Southeast Region.

Many NPS southeast coastal parks have habitats that support species of concern, including parks in Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Puerto Rico, South Carolina, and the US Virgin Islands. Some parks need a strategy to better protect species of concern, which includes both federally listed threatened and endangered species and state listed species, from predators. Some examples of these listed species of concern include snowy and piping plover shorebirds, loggerhead sea turtle, green sea turtle, Kemp's Ridley sea turtle, leatherback sea turtle, southeastern beach mouse, and Perdido Key beach mouse.

Species of concern using coastal and dune habitats are especially vulnerable during their respective breeding seasons, generally falling between April and October. Once the regional environmental assessment complete, affected parks may implement assessed actions after preparing site-specific

The public is invited to submit comments on the environmental assessment through October 26, 2018. American Crow (Corvus brachyrhynchos) Other names: southern crow, cawin' crow, corn crow / Status: FL = stable, IUCN = LC / Length: 15.7-20.9 in. (40-53 cm) / Wingspan: 33.5-39.4 in. (85-100 cm) / Weight: 11.1-21.9 oz (316-620 g) / Life span: to 14 years (note: one captive crow lived to be 59 years old!) / Nests: in mainland SW Florida / Found: AC, coastal,

The only place where the American crow is uncommon is along the coast, where it is often replaced by the fish crow, a slightly smaller but similar species. On the mainland and near-coastal regions the American crow can be found just about anywhere. It is commonly found along highways where it feeds on roadkill, from deer to dragonflies. It is a regular at garbage dumps, dumpsters, and residential garbage cans where it pick through our refuse looking for scraps of food, potato chips, and everything in between.

The crow is extremely opportunistic and intelligent. It has been observed not only using tools, but also fabricating them. For example, the crow has been seen pulling the leaves off of small twigs, then inserting these stripped twigs into holes in fence posts in search of termites and ants. It knows which day the trash is put out and shows up accordingly. Native Americans held crows in high esteem. They recognized this bird's intelligence and based many of their myths and tales on the crow.

Once considered an agricultural pest, the crow is now widely seen as mitigating some crop damage by eating the insects that destroy the wheat and corn fields.

The crow is similar to the Florida scrub jay in that it is a cooperative breeder. The fledglings remain with their extended families for several years to help raise future broods. Flocks of crows, called murders, have been known to reach 2 million birds. When these extended families chance upon a resting great horned owl or a perching hawk, they exhibit another interesting behavior called "mobbing," harassing the owl or raptor until it leaves the area. Birders can be alerted to a well-hidden roosting owl by paying attention to this avian behavior.

Recently the American crow population has been decimated by the West Nile virus. The crow appears to be the most vulnerable species to this form of encephalitis. To date, more then 45 percent of the North American crow population has died from this pathogen. That's more than 25 million birds. For the moment this pandemic appears to be subsiding, but there are regions in the U.S. where the crow has virtually vanished from the landscape.

The adult crow has quite a few predators, including owls and Cooper's and redshouldered hawks. Its nests are often raided by raccoons and squirrels. No crow-on-crow predation has ever been observed. In past decades bounties placed on killing crows by state and local governments accounted for considerable mortality in crows, but most of these have been repealed or discontinued.

The fish crow, although slightly smaller, is all but impossible to discern from the American crow. The American crow is almost never found along the coastline, however, so the chances are that any crow you see along the coast is a fish crow. One distinctive difference between the two birds is the call; the fish crow is famous for its nearly constant cah, uh-uh.

The fish crow is unique in that it is one of very few birds endemic to North America. It does not have the range of the American crow, extending only as far north as Rhode Island, while the American crow's range extends all the way to the Northwest Territories. The American crow far outnumbers the fish crow. Unlike its cousin, however, the fish crow does not appear to be as vulnerable to the West Nile virus, which in some regions has decimated American crow populations.

A highly adaptable bird, the fish crow feeds on garbage, eggs, insects, carrion, ticks from livestock, various berries, and some fruit. Like all crows, jays, and ravens, the fish crow appears to be capable of learned behaviors. The fish crow, for example, has learned to pick up a mollusk, fly high above a rock pile or highway and release it, breaking the shellfish

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open so the bird can feed on it. While not quite at the same level as the tool-using green heron, it is a fascinating example of avian intelligence.

Huge flocks of fish crows, called murders, roost on islands in and around St. Petersburg and Tampa where they number in the thousands. The fish crow has adapted well to the habits of Homo sapiens and because of that is expanding its range throughout North America.

There have been a lot of Redfish being caught but the reports I here from a lot of Captains is there are a lot of small fish everywhere. This bodes well for the future but the bigger fish should be here this month!



The outside islands is where you will want to target these fish and the entire coast should have them! Live bait, live shrimp, or jigs will be a good bet in October. Snook fishing has remained really good and there have been fish of every size. We have caught Snook up to 41" this past month and there are also places where you can catch 50 fish in the 12"-18" range if you want. It's always good to see the small fish in such abundance! This fishing will continue all thru the month of October. The Snook bite is also on the outside islands and you will catch them and the Reds in the same places. The same baits that take the Reds will catch the Snook but also some top water action in the morning will produce some quality fish.

The islands are also still holding lots of Tarpon if this is your preference. These fish have been feeding aggressively and will hit a variety of lures. Or they may just ignore everything you throw at them. That's Tarpon for you! They are fun to chase and the size of the fish right now makes for some short fights which is always good.



Whatever you choose to go after this month will provide you with some great action. Even the Seatrout fishing on the grass flats is still going strong. Pompano are also being caught on these same flats. Bluefish and Mackerel have already shown up, and you just never know what is going to bite on the flats! Get in on the fun and enjoy our fall! Regional News A New Concern for Some Florida Beachgoers. Now, New Algae Shows Up

The 2018 calendar year has been a tough 9 months for beachgoers. First, the Southwest coast had to deal with Red Tide, then the bluegreen algae from Lake Okeechobee showed up in Lee County, now parts of Northern Collier County are reporting that there is a different algae causing the water to look brown and murky...and Sanibel has a new one too.

What's causing it in Naples? a nontoxic diatom, called Cylindrotheca. Scientists at FGCU explained that the brown color is from the diatom and it's more than likely winning the battle for nutrients in the water.

This naturally occurring organism competes with the Karena brevis (that causes Red Tide) and gobbles up the nutrients in the water making it tougher for Karena brevis to survive.

Unfortunately, it too saps the oxygen from the water causing some marine species to suffocate, die and wash up on shore.

Although it is not a respiratory danger or a health hazard to humans, it is an olfactory nuisance as the smell of decaying marine life is not pleasant!

The water on Sanibel Island's Bowman's Beach also has been discolored by a bloom of yet another microorganism, a dinoflagellate like the one that causes red tide called Peridinium, but this organism is also nontoxic.

The classification of this group of organisms is disputed. Historically, botanists have placed them in the algal division Pyrrophyta or Pyrrophycophyta, and zoologists have claimed them as members of the protozoan order Dinoflagellida. Although they are often considered to be algae in the division Dinoflagellata, this placement is controversial because organisms these have unique nuclei and significantly larger genomes than other eukaryotic algae. (Britannica.com)

Not to be outdone, the east coast of Florida is also experiencing Red Tide. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission said in a press release that it had detected "low medium concentrations of naturally occurring red tide" in water samples taken Sunday off the coast of Palm Beach County.

Kelly Richmond, a spokeswoman with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, told the South Florida Sun Sentinel, "It can be transported around the Gulf as coastal waters move with winds and currents. It can make it into the Atlantic Ocean and has been carried as far north as Delaware."

The Palm Beach County release said of 57 occurrences of red tide in the Gulf of Mexico since 1953, eight have made their way to the east coast in the area of Palm Beach County. All eight originated in the gulf and were carried by currents to the east coast, according to the press release.

The Naturalist Led Tram Tour and Swamp Walk begins Tuesday, Nov. 6 at 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. This \$60 adventure is offered on most Tuesdays during the season.

Collier County Supervisor of Elections Begins First Mailing of Vote-by-Mail Ballots for the 2018 General Election

The Last Day to Request a Mail-in Ballot is October 31st



The Collier County Supervisor Elections office will send its first mailing of requested Vote-by -Mail ballots domestic voters on Tuesday, October 2, for the upcoming General Election on November 6.

Voters may submit requests online

at www.CollierVotes.com under the "Vote-by-Mail" tab. Requests can also be made by calling the Supervisor of Elections office at (239)252-VOTE. By law, ballots cannot be forwarded.

The deadline for voters to request a ballot to be delivered by mail for this election is 5 p.m. on October 31. Voted ballots must be physically returned (not just postmarked) to the Supervisor of Elections by 7 p.m. on Election Day, November 6. The United States Postal Service recommends that voters mail their voted ballots one week before the due date to account for any unforeseen events such as weather issues and to allow for timely receipt and processing by the elections office.

The voter's signature is required on the outside of the ballot return envelope. The signature on the returned ballot envelope will be compared to the signature on file with the Supervisor of Elections office. Voters can learn more about updating their signature by contacting our office at (239)252-VOTE.

Voters who receive a ballot in the mail and decide to vote in person should bring their marked or unmarked ballot to their polling location so it can be cancelled.

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
