The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program educates volunteers about disaster preparedness for the hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. CERT offers a consistent, nationwide approach to volunteer training and organization that professional responders can rely on during disaster situations, which allows them to focus on more complex tasks. Through CERT, the capabilities to prepare for, respond to and recover from disasters is built and enhanced.

Since 1993, CERT has impacted communities across the country, building essentials skills and capabilities to prepare for and respond to any disaster. There are now CERT programs in all 50 states, including many tribal nations and U.S. territories; each unique to its community but all essential to building a Culture of Preparedness.

The CERT program was designed as a grassroots initiative and specifically structured so that the local and state program managers have the flexibility to form their programs in the way that best suits their communities.

CERT volunteers are trained to respond safely, responsibly, and effectively to emergency situations, but they can also support their communities during non-emergency events as well.

Please join us to learn how you can be a part of the CERT solution in our area. The training is free and attending the discussion does not obligate you to anything.

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### OUR AMAZING BODIES – By Dr. John Martin A Healthier Gut = A Healthier You

In recent issues of the *Rapper* we have broached the subject of the importance of developing and maintaining a healthy "gut flora" or "microbiome". One's microbiome refers to the proper and healthy balance of beneficial bacteria and yeast (hundreds of millions of individual microorganisms) that live in our digestive tract. Various new studies have proven over and over again, that a healthy balance of digestive tract micro-organisms, and therefore a healthier digestive tract environment, contributes well to our health in many important ways. It has been emphasized in the literature more recently that a healthy GUT is not only important, but VITAL to our BRAIN health. That includes our children growing and developing to their full potential mentally and emotionally, and the degree of risk each of us might face as aging adults – that being the onset of various forms of dementia.

As holistic practitioners, our team looks at the more complete makeup of the individual that presents with some health problem or challenge, rather than simply masking the disease with some symptom reducing program. To quote a fellow from around these parts that had a few really good ideas in his time "The doctor of the future will give no medicine, but will interest the patient in the human frame, nutrition, and the cause and prevention of disease." Thomas Edison.

We pursue an effort that builds health rather than just fights disease. The human body was designed to be a self-healing organism, with AMAZING capabilities, given the right environment. Some of that right environment is readily available, some of it is getting just a little harder to secure. Once we have a better idea of what we really need, i.e. how the body really works, and (relearn perhaps) how to feed it right, the choices we make toward building health become more recognizable and desired. To quote a contemporary "It's (much) easier to build a healthy child than it is to fix a sick adult." ~Dr. Cade Copeland.

Another local doctor who served the SW Florida community for several decades and was the first to bring Arevida medicine to Naples, Dr. David Pulmutter, has developed a Whole Life Program that is being shared globally, even through PBS – Public Television. Dr. Pulmutter readily admits that up until just a few years ago it was very difficult to help those with diminishing brain function while limited to the pharmaceutical drugs available through the greater part of his career. This new paradigm shift in medical thinking is largely contributing to the "Blue Zones" programs where food choices and lifestyles are being adopted in communities around the country and the world where many more people might well live to be 100 years old as a common experience. Many practitioners, holistic and allopathic alike, are now celebrating the great strides being made in the fields of neurology, immunology, and endocrinology among others through better understanding of the paramount importance of our food choices.

An old adage reads: "You only have worry about what you eat just three times in your life — when you're young, when you're middle-aged, and when you're old." That age range probably catches most of us. But I think it mainly implies that as we grow to maturity and older, our nutritional requirements change. And they do, but not as much as we might think. The basics are still the basics. And our choices need to be based on good science, not profit margin.

As we age, that is, grow into adulthood from our youth, we usually become a bit more influential in the choices and purchases of our groceries. We choose food to acquire and eventually consume with a greater degree of independence than when we were younger and we pretty much accepted and consumed what adults provided for us. Young people are notorious for poor selection and consumption of low grade foods. Mostly out of not knowing any better. And maybe just a little sense of rebellion and/or expressing a degree of that new found independence. Older people begin to lose their teeth and/or purchasing power (or both) when on fixed incomes. And many communities have no readily available, fresh, wholesome, and healthy food sources. Some of these areas are even referred to as "Nutrition Deserts".

Many in these communities become dependent upon a more convenient source of food stuffs than conscious of real food sources. Food is born, or it sprouts. Everything else has been altered or outright manufactured and leaves our, and our children's bodies, wanting for quality nutrition. Your diet is what you eat. Nutrition is what you get from what you eat.

That said, let's explore some of our food choices... next time...in the Rapper.

## **Evaluate Your Medicare Benefits for Free in Collier County**

Free, local service helps in reviewing your Medicare plan options for 2019. One-on-one counseling available at dropin events on several dates at different locations.



Medicare can be a daunting subject for most people, and the Open Enrollment Period only runs from Oct. 15, 2018, through Dec. 7, 2018. Fortunately, experts from the SHINE (Serving Health Insurance Needs of Elders) are available to provide free, unbiased, one-on-one counseling. Medicare beneficiaries can lean on these valuable local experts for advice.

SHINE is a program of the Florida Department of Elder Affairs and is operated

locally through the Area Agency on Aging for Southwest Florida (AAASWFL). Specially-trained SHINE counselors help educate and empower Medicare beneficiaries, their families, and caregivers to understand their health care options so they can make the best decisions for their individual needs.

SHINE will offer several opportunities for drop-in Medicare counseling in Collier County during the open enrollment period. Drop-in counseling will be offered on a first-come, first-served basis at the following open enrollment events, which are open to the public, with no appointments needed.

Counselors will be on site from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Beneficiaries are asked to bring their Medicare card and a list of prescription drugs with dosage.

The SHINE mission is to provide free and unbiased information about Medicare and Medicaid for beneficiaries, their families, and caregivers. SHINE also educates beneficiaries to protect, detect, and report potential errors, fraud, and abuse with their Medicare coverage.

SHINE counseling is also available by appointment year-round in Collier County. To receive help from SHINE, individuals may call to schedule appointments at designated SHINE counseling sites, attend enrollment events in their local communities, or arrange to speak with a trained SHINE counselor at 1-866-413-5337 (866-41-ELDER) For a listing of SHINE counseling sites and enrollment events, please visit www.floridashine.org.



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### Cycle Tours through the Everglades Join Us for the Loop Road Ride Nov. 11th!

One of the all-time great bike rides in south Florida is located in three separate counties: Collier, Monroe and

Loop Road, located south of the Tamiami Trail, has an interesting history in itself but the beauty of the environment is one of its outstanding features.

We should see lots of wildlife as we bicycle through this off-road rural area 17 miles east of Everglades City. Plan to meet and park at 9:00 a.m. at Monroe Station and we'll cycle a little over two miles to the Gator Hook Hiking Trail. As we continue along this gravel lane, we'll pass by the southernmost point of the 1,400-mile long Florida National Scenic Trail.

There are many culvert crossings in this area where we should find alligators to photograph. At 16.5 miles we will reach the paved section of Loop Road where we will turn around and travel back to Monroe Station, a total trip of 33 miles. ### My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock It's Just My Opinion...

Everything in life is relative to your personal experiences. Down here in SWFL last year we were left reeling from Hurricane Irma. Our homes and businesses were battered and then flooded out by the rising waters. The aftermath was a mucky, dirty mess. Flooding is just a horrible, destructive thing.

Last week the panhandle of Florida was hammered by Hurricane Michael. Unlike us, they are not protected by barrier islands or surrounded by mangroves. There the ocean lashed the homes; the winds were clocked at 155 MPH and where the northeast quadrant hit there was nothing left. It was flattened. Block homes were knocked off their foundations and other homes blew away like match sticks.

There are 19 dead and several people missing in its path. Michael made Irma look like a bad thunderstorm, and Irma was a disaster for our area.

This reinforces the adage that there is always someone worse off. My mother always used to tell me this. When you would start feeling sorry for yourself, she would remind you of what others may be going through. Isn't that so true?

A year and a few months removed, and we are still not back to "normal". Perhaps we never will be, and what we have now is our "new normal"? Today, things are looking much better here. Our crab fleet is intact, they are bringing in stone crabs, the tourists are returning to our area and things appear to be what they once were...but they are not.

Once something catastrophic happens, things are never quite the same. They can look and feel the same, but they are not. Here we are losing many of our old, historic buildings. It is such a sad

New building codes and the elimination of the "grandfathering in" of old structures makes it almost impossible for people to feasibly keep an older structure versus building anew...unless they can "self-insure" which is a very small percent of the population? One of the biggest problems is getting affordable insurance, and the insurers are saying, "no" to older buildings? Is that a good thing?

On the surface it appears to be sound because older structures were more vulnerable...but what will the coastline look like up and down the country if this becomes the mandate? The Carolinas just experienced severe flooding, Florida has its history and Texas is not far behind. Insurance underwriters have zero reason to look for ways for us to preserve history. **Zero**. Their sole focus is on mitigating their own risk...meaning tear it down and rebuild it stronger. But each time something bad happens...they keep moving the mark.

Some of our most historic sites on the eastern seaboard are on the chopping block and there doesn't seem to be a way to save them...or is there? We must find a balance so that we do not become a homogenous, sterile country with no historic sites to visit. Why can't we keep an older building? Should the insurance companies not recognize the social and historical significance of such sites? I think they could. But they won't if it is up to them to decide because they are profit motivated machines focused on reducing their risk and increasing their profits and that will always spell "new building".

It is up to us to preserve the things important to us, and up to us to find ways to do it. If there is pressure from the voter to do something it may actually get done, maybe. Of course, if something is demolished and nothing is left rebuilding is the only way. But here and in the Carolinas, many structures survived...it is the contents that did not. Many historic sites cannot meet the building codes of today. This is true across our great country. We should look for creative ways to salvage our history while at the same time improve the building codes for our new developments and major renovations. Failing to recognize the significance of history is never a good idea. History teaches us. History guides us. We need to respect it and find a happy balance before it's too

### Local History on TV!

Smallwood's Store to be Featured on the Travel Channel Sunday, October 21, 10 pm

One of our areas pieces of history will be featured in an upcoming episode of "The Most Terrifying Places in America" on the Travel Channel. The episode, titled "Restless Dead" is scheduled to air on October 21st at 10 pm (eastern).

Established in 1906 by Ted Smallwood, this historic site served as a trading post in a remote and isolated area. Here, settlers traded hides, furs, and farm produce in exchange for providing the goods required to

Ted Smallwood's Store was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1974, it remained opened until 1982.

When the doors were shut, 90% of the original goods remained in the store. In 1990 Ted's granddaughter reopened the store as a museum and today it serves as a time capsule of Florida pioneer history.

The center section of the building remains as Ted would have known it. The hide room has been turned into exhibit space, telling the history of Southwest Florida's pioneers.



The original building has survived 6 hurricanes, the most recent in 2017 when Hurricane Irma lashed the area.

Although the building took a beating, the museum is still standing and is open to the public every day from 11 am to 5 pm,

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### Living Gulf Coast by Charles Sobczak

**Lettered Olive** (*Oliva sayana*) Other names: olives, golden olive / Status: FL=stable, IUCN=NE / Life span: n/a / Length: 2-2.5 in. (5-6.5 cm) / Weight: n/a / Reproduces in the nearshore waters / Found: Throughout the beaches of Southwest Florida / Status: uncommon.



The best location to find a living lettered or golden olive is along the beaches and near the sandy bottoms of the passes and shoals. Named for its dark surface markings that vaguely resemble blurry cuneiform writing, this shell is a highly prized find. Although it might appear that the olives you find at a shell shop have been mechanically polished, this process is done by the shellfish itself. When moving, the fleshy mantle of the live animals extends around the outside of the shell to protect it. This constant rubbing of the outer surface, coupled with the tiny fragments of sand and grit between the shell and the living organism, serve to polish the shell over time.

The far more uncommon golden olive, which is a color variant of the lettered olive, can also be found along the surf line. If the water is calm enough, you can track either of them by following their trail through the soft sand. It is in this surf zone where they feed on coquinas, small clams and other shellfish. Olives, like many gastropods, are carnivores. Because they are so attractive, the Calusa as well as many Native American tribes, used lettered olives to make jewelry and other decorative objects. A handful of birds are able to take and eat olives as are stingrays, sharks and other predatory gastropods.

**Apple Murex** (Chicoreus pomum) Other names: none / Status: FL=stable, IUCN=NE / Life span: to 5 years / Length: 2-4.5 in. (5-11.5 cm) / Weight: n/a / Spawns in the nearshore waters / Found: Along the beaches of Southwest Florida / Status: common.



Ranging from North Carolina to Brazil, the apple murex is one of the most abundant murex shells found in Florida and the West Indies. It feeds predominately on the common Eastern oyster, boring almost perfectly round holes into its shells. Given a thick enough oyster, this slow drilling may take the apple murex weeks to complete but this pales in comparison with some species of South Pacific drills. Scientists have now determined that some small drills, dining on much larger and thicker clams and oysters, may take up to eight months to drill through the shell and into the soft, edible parts of the animal! Imagine waiting more than six months, without appetizers, for your dinner.

Although this is a fairly common shell to find washed up along the beach, it is nowhere near as easy to find alive. Look for it beyond the surf zone, preferably with a mask and snorkel, in water from three to ten feet. Finding one will probably be more related to water clarity than to any other factor.

The apple murex is preyed upon by other carnivorous gastropods, including other murex species. In is also eaten by rays and sharks.

### Regional News FWC Wants Your Opinion

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is requesting public input as staff improve rules for nonnative species. The potential changes will affect rules related to the importation of high-risk species and include possible additions to the Prohibited Species list. Staff will also work on clarifying language in existing rules.

To view the Executive Order, visit MyFWC.com and click on "About," then "Executive Orders."

Invasive species are animals not native to Florida that cause economic or environmental harm or pose a threat to human safety. More than 500 nonnative species have been reported in Florida. Eighty percent of these have been introduced via the live animal trade with more than 150 established in Florida, meaning they are reproducing in the wild.

The public can help the FWC control nonnative invasive wildlife by reporting sightings to the FWC's Exotic Species Hotline at 888-IveGot1 (888-483-4681), online at IVEGOT1.org or by using the free smartphone app IVEGOT1.

### **Bears More Active This Time of Year**

In fall, Florida black bear activity increases as bears begin a natural process of putting on fat for the winter. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) reminds people to be BearWise to help prevent conflicts with Florida's largest land mammal.

To be prepared for winter, bears require around **20,000 calories a day** and will eat anything that's convenient. It is important to take some precautionary steps to discourage bears from coming too close.

To keep bears wild and away from your home (or campsite), follow these simple tips:

- ♦ Secure household garbage in a sturdy shed, garage or a wildlife-resistant container.
- ♦ Put household garbage out on the morning of pickup rather than the night before.
- Secure commercial garbage in bear-resistant dumpsters.
- ♦ Protect gardens, bee yards, compost and livestock with electric fencing.
- ♦ Encourage your homeowner's association or local government to institute ordinances to require trash be secured from bears.
- ◆Feed pets indoors or bring in dishes after feeding.
- ♦ Clean grills and store them in a secure place.
- ◆Remove wildlife feeders or make them bear-

resistant.

♦ Pick ripe fruit from trees and remove fallen fruit from the ground.


