The History About "Thanksgiving"

As children, many of us were taught that the pilgrims and native Americans got together in Plymouth, Massachusetts, had a feast together which became known as Thanksgiving.



That is a very simplistic, and not completely accurate, summary of what events actually led to the holiday we celebrate each year.

In 1620, the Mayflower brought the Pilgrims to Plymouth, MA where they set up a colony. Historical records show that in 1621, the Pilgrims did get together with the Wampanoag tribe to celebrate a successful harvest with a three-day celebration. It is this celebration from which our present celebration is derived.

Sometime in the early 1830's New Englanders started referring to that period in time special "Thanksgiving". And, it wasn't until 1863 that Abraham Lincoln declared Thanksgiving an official holiday.

Interestingly, no turkey or pie was served at this celebration. Instead, archives indicate the

Wampanoag Tribe brought 5 deer and the Pilgrims provided the bounty from their harvest. There is evidence that wild fowl was a part of the feast as duck, goose and turkey were all abundant in the area. However, there is no specific reference to suggest that turkey was

Historical accounts show that cornmeal, pumpkin, succotash and cranberries were on the menu. Sweet potatoes were not as they were not grown in North America at that time. Similarly, ovens were not yet invented meaning pie making was not possible. Another common misconception is that the Pilgrims extended an invitation to the Native Americans for helping them reap the harvest. The truth of how they all ended up feasting together is unknown.

So, why all the discrepancies? It seems as if two points in history have been merged by combining the "feast" in the 1620's with the more traditional celebrations in the 1860's to complete the concept of the feast-driven ritual we celebrate today. Now that we have all of these details out of the way...let's eat turkey, pie, and all the fixings!

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Fishing in the 10,000 Islands With Captain Mike Merritt



Fishing this time of year has just changed with recent weather fronts. The high winds and cooler temps have caused things to change. The outside islands were full of baits of all kinds, and that is changing too. Extreme low tides with the N.E. winds have allowed a lot of fresh water to pour out of the backcountry. This has also changed the dynamics of fishing right now. So, with all these changes fishing can be tough.

There are still plenty of Snook around and if you can't get live bait, and they are taking jigs just fine. Live shrimp will also catch plenty. We are catching them on the outside islands and in the backcountry. The main thing for success right now is moving water.

Redfish are still biting on the outside but this has slowed down some. We should start finding more Reds in the backcountry. Try shrimp on a cork or a jig tipped with shrimp.

Trout fishing is actually getting better and should continue as waters get colder. These are being caught on the bars around the islands and close to the rivers and passes. Popping corks and shrimp are a sure bet. Jigs will catch plenty. Incoming tide seems best but high outgoing also works.

There have been a lot of changes in weather, water temps, tides, and winds so if your not sure what to do try casting a jig with your favorite tail and you will surely find some action! ~Good luck fishing! Capt. Mike Merritt

GARBAGE & YARD WASTE PICKUP ABC's Here is What Waste Management Is Looking For In Collier County & Everglades City

Sometimes it gets put out but not picked up. Why? Well, there are very specific rules when it comes to garbage and yard waste and if we don't follow them, they may not pick it up.

As of October 2005, yard waste is no longer collected in plastic bags. Plastic bags are fine for household garbage placed in the green trash cans.

Yard waste must be prepared for collection by either:

- Placing in personal containers no larger than 45 gallons, weighing no more than 50 pounds when filled.
- ♦ Placing in paper bags/sacks.
- ♦ Tying in bundles no longer than four feet in length.
- No branches thicker than four inches in diameter.
- ♦ No more than ten (10) bundles or containers.
- ♦ No Plastic Bags.

There will be NO collection services of any kind trash, recycling, bulky items or yard waste - on the following holidays: Fourth of July, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day.

If your regular collection day falls on any of these holidays, collection will be made on your next regularly scheduled collection day.

Regular collection services will occur on all other holidays (e.g., Memorial Day, Labor Day, New Years Day, etc.) Customer Service phone lines - (239) 252-2380 - are open on all other holidays from 8:00 A.M. - 2:00 P.M.

\$25,000 Reward for Information

No Arrests Yet For Illegally Poached Smalltooth Sawfish Dumped Along Canal in Everglades City Tipsters Can Remain Anonymous

NOAA officials seek information from anyone who may have details about 7 smalltooth dumped along the causeway from Everglades City to Chokoloskee, and are offering a reward up to \$20,000 for information leading to a criminal conviction or the assessment of a civil penalty.

The Center for Biological Diversity announced an additional \$5,000 reward, increasing the overall reward to \$25,000.

Smalltooth sawfish were added on the Endangered Species List in 2003. Killing a sawfish is a Class-A misdemeanor, punishable by up to a year in prison and a fine of up to \$100,000.

December is Stargazing Time in SWFL

Geminids Meteor Shower Peak: December 13 & 14



SWFL's typically clear December nights make it one of our finest months for stargazing.

According to the American Meteor Society which was founded in 1911, "the

Geminids are usually the strongest meteor shower of the year and meteor enthusiasts are certain to circle December 13 and 14 on their calendars. This is the one major shower that provides good activity prior to midnight as the constellation of Gemini is well placed from 22:00 onward. The Geminids are often bright and intensely colored. Due to their medium-slow velocity, persistent trains are not usually seen. These meteors are also seen in the southern hemisphere, but only during the middle of the night and at a reduced rate."

The peak days will be December 13 & 14 where the moon will only be at 1 percent. This will deliver a dark night...now we need the weather-forecasters to deliver a couple of clear nights!



Tracking Panthers in SWFL

Florida Panthers are on the Endangered Species list with fewer than 120 to 130 remaining in the wild.

Florida panthers live about 12 years. They often succumb to other disease before reaching that milestone due to the small number of cats, and subsequent, small genetic pool.

The panther mating season is November through March. During this time they roam more and may venture onto roadways at dawn and dusk when they are most active.

So far in 2020, there have been 18 reported panther deaths. This is down significantly from 2019 when there were 26 for the same time span. The reduction is likely due to reduced travel related to the pandemic. Please use caution when driving in wooded areas especially at times when panthers are most active.

Granulated sugar for tops



Directions: In one bowl, mix powdered sugar, butter, egg, vanilla and almond extract. In a the other bowl, mix flour, baking soda, and cream of tartar. Blend the flour mixture in with the other ingredients. Cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours. Next, divide into at least 2 balls and roll onto parchment paper until about 1/4 inch thick. Cut into shapes. You can use a drinking glass dipped into flour so it wont stick. Sprinkle with granulated sugar. Arrange onto lightly greased cookie sheets.

Bake at 375° for about 8 minutes. Watch them carefully so the bottoms to burn! This will make about 50 2 inch cookies. You can use colored sugar for Christmas! *I often omit the almond extract. Both styles are good!
