A Message From Fire Chief Kingman Schuldt

This week 42 Greater Naples firefighters were presented the prestigious Phoenix Award by Collier County

EMS and Medical Director Dr. Tober. This award is presented to emergency responders who resuscitate a patient in cardiac arrest. Êmergency Paramedics, Medical Technicians, law enforcement officers, life guards, and telecommunications operators from Collier County received awards during the ceremony.

The "Phoenix" was a mythological bird who died and rose renewed from its own ashes. Collier County EMS has adopted the Phoenix Award to recognize persons from Collier County first responders who contributed to the successful resuscitation of a victim of cardiac arrest. These patients were clinically dead, with no heartbeat or breathing, and brought back to life through the highly trained efforts of these responders.

Just this morning I held my monthly Fully Involved community meeting; a time for residents, business operators, and visitors to meet directly with the Fire Chief to learn about District operations, meet staff, and address any questions they may have regarding the organization. 

SAWFISH NEWS by Tonya Wiley, Havenworth Coastal Conservation Man Pleads Guilty to Killing A Sawfish, Awaits Sentencing



According to a press release issued by the Middle District of Florida U.S. Attorney's Office*, Chad Ponce pleaded guilty on November 1, 2019 to killing an endangered smalltooth sawfish. The commercial shrimp fisherman from Jacksonville was seen removing the rostrum from a live 12-foot smalltooth sawfish with a power saw aboard his fishing vessel off the coast of Ponte Vedra, Florida on July 18, 2018. The case was investigated by the National Oceanic and

Atmospheric Administration and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and is being prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Jay Taylor. Ponce faces a maximum penalty of one year in federal prison and a \$50,000 fine.

Sawfish are shark-like rays named for their saw-shaped snouts (rostra). Smalltooth sawfish were once found in coastal waters from Texas to North Carolina; however, fishing mortality and habitat loss led to dramatic reductions in both their numbers and range. Now they are regularly found only in southwest Florida, especially in Everglades National Park. Because of these declines NOAA Fisheries listed the smalltooth sawfish as "Endangered" under the Endangered Species Act (ESA) in 2003.

Adam Brame, the Sawfish Recovery Coordinator for NOAA Fisheries, stated that because of the protections afforded by the ESA, it is illegal to target, harm, harass, or handle sawfish in any way. While it is technically illegal to catch a sawfish except with a research permit or in a fishery where incidental take has been authorized, captures do occur while fishing for other species. Mortality from incidental captures in both commercial and recreational fisheries is an ongoing threat to this endangered species. It's the responsibility of all fishers to follow guidance to quickly and safely release without harm all sawfish caught while fishing. Never remove the rostrum as sawfish use it for detecting and catching food. In addition to being illegal, removal of the rostrum severely limits the ability of the sawfish to find enough food to survive, and could result in death from starvation.

The number one rule to remember when releasing a sawfish is to leave it in the water at all times. Do not lift it out of the water onto your boat or a pier, and do not drag it onto shore. Simply cut the line as close to the hook as is safely possible. Brame adds that because of the ESA protections it is illegal to possess a sawfish; removing it from the water is considered possession and is a clear violation of the law. Sawfish are powerful animals that can whip their saw very quickly which can cause serious injury to the angler and the sawfish. Never use a gaff on a sawfish you have caught and never remove the rostrum. These guidelines ensure the safety of both the sawfish and the angler.

Mishandling and the purposeful injury or killing of captured sawfish is both illegal and detrimental to the recovery of the population. The sawfish in this case was among the northernmost sightings along the Atlantic coast in the past few years. A sawfish the size of the one killed was likely around eight years old and just reaching sexual maturity. The removal of it from the population prevented it from reproducing and contributing to the recovery of smalltooth sawfish in the United States.



My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock

I have a plant problem. I just cannot grow enough of them. There always seems to be something else that I do not have growing that I would like to. I guess I am a compulsive gardener, if there is such a thing.

The gardening bug bit me when I was in my teens. At my High School we had a horticulture class. It was one of the few classes I enjoyed attending at the time.

Our growing specialty was tomatoes and herbs. I recall how the teacher was very specific in her instructions on how to plant, when to plant and what to expect.

My parents, and, especially my dad, also loved to grow things. They concentrated on fruit trees...and that passion did not escape me either.

Fast forward too many years to admit, and I am growing most of the things I was exposed to as a child. Tomatoes, herbs, beans and peppers, avocado, starfruit, dragon fruit, black sapote, and several types of citrus.

Here our choice of plants has centered around which ones seem least susceptible to pests. I absolutely hate to use any type of pesticide. To me, that seems counterintuitive. Growing fresh foods to eat...and spraying them with something you shouldn't ingest. Yes, I know what we buy at the stores are probably sprayed...and yes, I eat them. But at home I try to let nature take care of it when at all possible.

This year much of our annual garden started on its own. If you read my column regularly, you may recall that last year I reported on how much healthier my volunteer plants were versus the store bought starts.

This year they started popping up in August...and we let them grow, and grow they did.

The tomatoes (all cherry types) are 7 to 8 foot tall...and covered with tomatoes. The two types of basil we grow are prolific and spreading nicely on their own. Our peppers are all holdovers from last year...and producing very well.

The only crop we actually planted anew are the purple pole beans (that turn green as soon as you cook them), and they are going like gang-busters.

So far, the whitefly has been very light. We have used nothing but Dawn dish soap and water, and that was 2 months back. I also spray water under the leaves when I water...the pests do not like that!

Now, none of this means that the bugs won't eventually come, but for now things are looking pretty good. We really do get a significant amount of produce from our gardens. We get more than we can eat, so we share it with friends.

The wet soil can be a challenge at times so we use raised beds to mitigate that issue, and that has worked very well for us. It also makes maintenance easier...no bending needed when weeding!

The best part of gardening for me is the satisfaction of knowing we grew it from a tiny little seed and it produced something we can eat that tastes better than what we can buy at the stores. The work it requires is not for everyone, but it is not as time consuming as you may think. It can be very relaxing, in fact. And, the effort rewards you...

You do not need to start a large garden. A small 2' x 2' square is enough to plant many herbs you can use in the kitchen. You can also use well-drained containers for almost anything, and those are very easy to maintain. I have a warning, though. Once the garden-bug bites you...it may not let go! Happy Growing!

Roasted Sweet Potato & Butternut Squash Salad By Elaine Middelstaedt

2 pounds sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into ¹/₂ inch cubes (6 cups) 2 pounds butternut squash, peeled and cut into ¹/₂ cubes (6 cups) olive oil spray

- $\hat{\mathbf{x}}$ 1 bunch scallions, sliced (about 1 cup)
- 1 cup snipped fresh parsley
- 🔆 1 cup walnuts,1 cup fresh cranberries
- 2 teaspoons olive oil, 3 tablespoons orange juice
- 2 tbs pure maple syrup, 2 tbs balsamic vinegar
- $\hat{\mathbf{x}}$ 1 tsp ground ginger, 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- \times 1/8 tsp ground nutmeg, 1/2 tsp salt (or to taste)

Look out, Florida: Manatees are on the Move! by FWC

November is Manatee Awareness Month, and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation



Commission (FWC) is reminding the public to slow down and look out for these large aquatic mammals. As cooler weather

comes to the Sunshine State, manatees begin to migrate to warmer waters. During this time of year, many of Florida's over 7,000 manatees will be on the move.

Warm-water habitats, like Florida's springs, are critical to the survival of manatees during the winter because they can't tolerate water temperatures lower than 68 degrees for extended periods of time. Remember, disturbing manatees at warm-water sites may cause them to leave those areas at a time when it is critical for them to remain there.

"Manatees are more vulnerable in the winter months and it's important not to disturb them, especially at warm-water sites," said Ron Mezich, who leads the FWC's Imperiled Species Management Section. "Getting too close to manatees can cause them to leave these critical areas at a time when it is important for them to stay in warm water habitats."

Boaters can make a big difference for manatees by following guidelines and obeying manatee protection zones marked by waterway signs. Maps of manatee protection zones in your area and information about cold weather seasonal zone changes are available online at MyFWC.com/Manatee by clicking on "Rules/Data and Maps."

How can you help manatees?

•Wear polarized sunglasses to spot them moving, grazing and resting in the water. Keep a lookout for the circular "footprints" or ripples they leave on the surface of the water.

♦ Follow posted manatee zones.

Observe manatees from a distance to limit disturbance. Disturbing manatees at their warm-water sites may cause them to leave these areas during the winter.

◆Report injured, entangled, orphaned or dead manatees to the FWC's Wildlife Alert Hotline: 888-404-FWCC (3922), #FWC or *FWC on your cellphone or text Tip@MyFWC.com.

"10,000 Islands Christmas" Jon Edward Edwards

I could smell the ripeness of the exposed marine life as I began to stir – the scent of marine borers, alive and decaying matter mixed. Christmas morning didn't bring hot cocoa and a warm fire. Not this year; this year it brought a low tide and a favorable forecast. There was anticipation but not from gifts awaiting under the tree but from fish awaiting under the mangrove roots.

The wind had been 10-15 knots out of the west for the last two days, churning up Barfield Bay like margaritas in a blender, choppy and unpredictable. I jumped the 17' Maverick tunnel hull up on plane and rode the chop, standing up at the helm. The water slipped over the gunnel each time I fell out of rhythm yet the cool sting of the salt water spray felt fresh and invigorating as opposed to harsh and punishing.

Upon reaching the end of the no wake zone in Goodland it occurred to me that I had recognized and obeyed the "Slow Speed Manatee Zones," an act I had previously disregarded. How could I have forgotten standing before a judge in a federal court room in Fort Myers after receiving a fourth violation? "How does a West Indian Manatee know where it's safe and where it isn't?" I pleaded. The judge didn't think much of my argument.

I banked around Tripod Key and began the backwater route that served as the mental illusion for the "relaxation techniques" I had learned at marriage counseling several years earlier. They didn't help one bit with my marriage, but it had always worked to ease my mind during stressful times. I imagine every point and every turn I pass along the way. "I can navigate these waters blindfolded," I would often claim. Could that statement be a bit of an exaggeration? Possibly, be that as it may, I can navigate these waters in the dark with the occasional shine of a light no problem. The meandering mangrove route is forever ingrained in my mind.

Buttonwood Bay is my favorite spot in all the 10,000 islands. Buttonwood is dangerously shallow at low tide with jagged oyster bars lurking around every turn. Not knowing their locations could easily result in ripping out a lower unit. Good luck if that happens because no one is coming; I speak from experience.

Fishermen are creatures of habit and I began my pattern at the same spot where I always had, a spot I named simply, The Oyster Bar. I quietly unfastened and released the trolling motor, easing it down into the tannic water. I began trolling parallel to the bar making calculated casts as close as possible without getting hung on the rough shells. My lure fell into an eddy created by two adjoining oyster points – "Bang! Hello Mr. Redfish."

Pushing a button on a lanyard around my neck, I engaged the Power Pole, a shallow water anchor. I could hear the buzz of the mechanism and a crunch as the fiberglass rod was shoved into the broken-up oyster shells and detritus that had flowed from the everglades for thousands of years. I was then fixed in place, free to work the area thoroughly.

There was a deep point on the west side that, at times, held big gator speckled trout. With a strong flick of the wrist I made a long side armed cast out across the point and let my jig sink to the bottom before making slow twitches of the rod tip. On my second cast I felt the tale tell slight bump of a speckled trout taking the bait. I swept the rod to the side as to not jerk the hook out the fish's soft mouth. Sure enough, the specs were there and hungry.

The sky had begun to redden but I had one more spot to try. I hope I have enough water to get out, I thought as I pulled the trolling motor up, ran down the wide gunnels, and jumped down onto the bench seat. The trim was set just right and with speed the Maverick danced on top of a light chop that had formed in the bay. A few seconds later I cut the engine and hurried to the bow, snatching my bait caster along the way. I could see activity as the boat rode its own wake, coasting towards the mouth of Whitney River. I tossed the jig up current and let it fall, sweeping past the point of the river mouth. "Bang!" The big red nearly jerked the rod out of my hand. After several minutes I horsed the fish alongside the boat, popped the jig out of its mouth, and boxed it. A perfect way to end a perfect day.

The sun had fallen lower on the horizon, the sky resembled the tin roof on an ancient barn, rusted red. The bay had calmed, reflecting the same color off of the water, making it difficult to distinguish surface from sky. One swift punch of the throttle and I began the journey back in the fading light. The evening was still and calm, the air crisp, and the water glass. There was no movement in the trees, no ripple of nervous bait, not a soul for miles.... I caught the blurred reflection of a "Slow Speed Manatee Zone" as I bypassed Goodland, speeding through the Everglades, in the dark.

Snook Harvest Season Closes Dec. 1st In Gulf State & Federal Waters by FWC

The recreational harvest season for snook closes Dec. 1 in Gulf state and federal waters, including Monroe County and Everglades National Park, and will remain closed through Feb. 29, 2020, reopening to harvest March 1, 2020. Anglers may continue to catch and release snook during the closed season.



Snook remains catch-and-release only in state waters from the Hernando/Pasco county line through Gordon Pass in Collier County (includes Tampa Bay and Hillsborough County) through May 31, 2020, in response to the impacts of red tide. Snook also has a regular season closure that runs May 1 through Aug. 31. At its February meeting, the FWC anticipates discussing whether to reopen snook harvest in this area on March 1. Comment on this and other red-tide-related issues at MyFWC.com/SaltwaterComments.

Regular season closures are designed to help conserve the species during vulnerable times such as cold weather. Atlantic state and federal waters, including Lake Okeechobee and the Kissimmee River, will be closed Dec. 15 through Jan. 31, 2020, reopening to harvest Feb. 1, 2020.



Bill Captain Miller of Plantation Island passed away on November 4^{th} Captain Miller loved everything about the 10,000 islands. He loved the native birds and the alligators, but most of all he

loved fishing.

Bill was a very successful fishing guide. More often than not, when someone fished with Bill, they would become his long-time friends.
