A Message from Fire-Chief Kingman Schuldt

I am pleased to report that the Greater Naples Strike Team of firefighters that deployed to the panhandle has returned home safely. I am extremely proud of our personnel and other Collier County first responders who offered to stand in the gap for those dealing with the aftermath of Hurricane Michael.

On October 23rd the Collier County Commission recognized Greater Naples Fire Rescue Lieutenant/PM Kevin Nelmes for his accomplishments as a 2018 Greater Naples Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Public Service Award for Fire Safety. Serving the community for more than 20 years, Lieutenant Nelmes has demonstrated selfless professional service. His experience with private security, the intelligence community, and his specialization with sensitive missions makes him a key player in our public service community. He is a dedicated advocate and agent for change in anti-human trafficking efforts abroad and has proven to go above and beyond his duties as a first responder.

This month the District had the pleasure of presenting the Germain Honda dealership with a few tokens of our appreciation for use of their old facility on Davis Blvd. for valuable fire rescue training. This acquired structure provided significant training opportunities to our firefighters to sharpen their skills in areas such as search and rescue, collapse, and fire operations. The site, set to be demolished, provided the District the opportunity to host countywide and regional training events including other fire rescue agencies from Collier, Broward, and Miami-Dade counties as well as our recent Cohort of eight international firefighters. The District was able to utilize the facility for three months and included a large-scale multi-discipline mass casualty incident where all county first responders were invited to participate. 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SAWFISH NEWS by Tonya Wiley, Havenworth Coastal Conservation History of Sawfish in the United States

Their odd appearance and awesome size made them a prized catch for recreational fishermen. Their unique elongated, blade-like snouts, studded with teeth on both sides, were often kept as trophies. Net fishermen on the other hand considered them a nuisance because of the damage they would cause to their gear.

Two species of sawfish were once found in the U.S.: the largetooth sawfish, *Pristis pristis*, and the smalltooth sawfish, *Pristis pectinata*. The largetooth sawfish was found throughout the Gulf of Mexico but was more common in western Gulf waters of Texas and Mexico. The smalltooth sawfish ranged from Texas to North Carolina and was most plentiful in the eastern Gulf waters of Florida. Both sawfish species were considered "abundant" and "common" in the early 1900's. Numerous postcards, photographs, and newspaper articles from that era bear the scene of fishermen hauling in countless sawfish to boats, docks, and beaches across the country.

Unfortunately, the largetooth sawfish has not been seen in the United States since the last confirmed record in 1961 in Texas. The smalltooth sawfish has fared better and still remains in U.S. waters, though at greatly reduced numbers and geographic range. Today the smalltooth sawfish is found predominately in southwest Florida, notably including Everglades National Park (ENP). The vast expanse of natural habitat within ENP, and limited fishing pressure, likely served as a refuge for sawfish as the population was under constant pressure.

What happened to these grand fish? What caused them to vanish from much of our coastal waters? The decline was due to a combination of three primary factors: (1) overfishing, (2) low reproductive potential, and (3) habitat loss.

Fishing mortality contributed significantly to the decline of sawfish in the U.S. Many sawfish caught recreationally were landed and displayed for photographs. Others were killed as anglers removed their saws for trophies. Commercial fishermen killed sawfish to save their gear, not wanting to cut their valuable nets to remove captured sawfish. And sawfish were over-exploited for a variety of other reasons. Their meat was used for food, their skin for leather, and their liver oil used in lamps and as a source of vitamin A. Their fins are valued for shark fin soup, their rostral teeth used as artificial spurs in cock-fighting, their cartilage ground-up for traditional medicines, and their saws sold as curios and ceremonial weapons.

The reproductive strategy of sawfish doesn't help them withstand these threats. Sawfish bear live young, take many years to reach sexual maturity, and produce very few offspring per reproductive cycle. This doesn't allow sawfish to replenish the population very quickly. This was especially problematic historically as they were being removed far more quickly than they were able to reproduce. And it's why now it is crucial to keep fishing mortality low in order to recover this endangered species.

Born at about 2 feet in length, juvenile sawfish rely on very shallow, coastal and estuarine waters close to shore for ample food and safety from predators, such as sharks, during the first years of their life. However, these shallow coastal waters are the same areas that have been converted to waterfront development. Now much of the natural shoreline vegetation has been developed into seawalls, beaches, marinas, roads, canals, and docks. Therefore, the natural vegetation and shallow habitats previously used by sawfish as important protective nursery areas have been greatly reduced in quantity and all but eliminated in some areas.

Due to the dramatic decline of the sawfish populations the smalltooth sawfish was classified as Endangered in 2003, making it the first fully marine fish and first elasmobranch (sharks, skates, and rays) protected by the Endangered Species Act. The largetooth sawfish was listed as Endangered in 2011. Will sawfish in the United States recover? Unfortunately, the largetooth sawfish is probably locally extinct and gone for good from U.S. waters. The smalltooth sawfish just might make a comeback; the population is already showing promising signs following protective measures.

One of the best methods of monitoring the population as it recovers is the use of public sawfish encounters. If you catch or see a sawfish take a quick photograph of it, estimate its size, note your location, and share the information with scientists. The details of your sightings or catches help to track recovery progress. You can share your information by calling 1-844-4-SAWFISH (1-844-472-9347) or emailing sawfish@myfwc.com. Information about historic catches or the location of any old sawfish saws is also appreciated.

Remember, due to their protected status it is illegal to target, harm, harass, or handle sawfish in any way. The number one rule to remember when handling and releasing a sawfish is to leave it in the water at all times. Do not lift it out of the water on to your boat or a pier, and do not drag it on shore.

Garbage Pickup 101—The Ins & Outs of Local Service

As our winter residents are making their way back to the area, it's a good time to review the dos and don'ts of our local trash pickup service. We placed a call into Waste Management to ask some questions and get some (needed) guidance...and here's what we found out:

Garbage Roll Carts, Curbside Containers, Recycling Roll Carts, Recycling Bins, Yard Trash/Biomass Containers, and any non-containerized waste appropriate for Curbside collection should be placed Curbside prior to 6:00 a.m. on the scheduled collection. Such containers and materials shall be placed at least three (3) feet from mailboxes or other obstacles. The scheduled pick up days in our area are Monday (garbage, green roll cart) and Thursday (garbage & recycle pickup).

Residential Customers may use heavy-duty plastic bags for excess Garbage or Rubbish.

Cardboard placed in a Recycling Roll Cart or Recycling Bin shall be flattened and, if necessary, cut to a size to fit into the Recycling Roll Cart without binding or preventing the release of the recycling during collection. Cardboard may also be stacked and placed outside the Recycling Cart or Recycling Bin, any cardboard so stacked must be cut to a maximum size of 3 ft. x 3 ft. Residential Customers may use heavyduty clear plastic bags for excess recyclables.

Discarded materials from small household repairs, renovations or projects may be placed in a Garbage Roll Cart. No other Commercial and Demolition (C&D) Debris shall be placed at the Curbside. C&D generated by the property owner or tenant that cannot be contained within a Roll Cart shall be transported by the property owner or tenant to an approved county facility for disposal. C&D Debris generated on Residential Real Property by a licensed builder or contractor shall be removed by the builder or contractor.

Yard debris can be put into the Roll Carts or must be tied together in 4 ft sections and placed at the curbside.


Here's Some Really Good Garbage News

Carnestown weigh station which has been tough to find open recently...will be open every Saturday from 9 am to 3:30 pm starting on December 1st.

It's important that we use the station so that they are motivated to keep it open for us. This is where you can bring anything that doesn't get collected by the regular service like, over-flow garbage and large amounts of yard debris, old paint, construction material and yard waste.

Yard waste is only picked up if it fits into the roll cart or if you tie it into 4 ft sections. If you have large piles of yard debris, Waste Management will not pick up with the regular service and will leave a green tag on the pile instructing you what to do.




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Cycle Tours through the Everglades Join Us for the Loop Road Ride Nov. 11th!

One of the all-time great bike rides in south Florida is located in three separate counties: Collier, Monroe and

Loop Road, located south of the Tamiami Trail, has an interesting history in itself but the beauty of the environment is one of its outstanding features.

We should see lots of wildlife as we bicycle through this off-road rural area 17 miles east of Everglades City. Plan to meet and park at 9:00 a.m. at Monroe Station and we'll cycle a little over two miles to the Gator Hook Hiking Trail. As we continue along this gravel lane, we'll pass by the southernmost point of the 1,400-mile long Florida National Scenic Trail.

There are many culvert crossings in this area where we should find alligators to photograph. At 16.5 miles we will reach the paved section of Loop Road where we will turn around and travel back to Monroe Station, a total trip of 33 miles. It's Garden Time in SW Florida

Fall is a great time of year in SW Florida. The temperatures are cooling down and gardening season is here.

We have been planting a vegetable garden at our home in Everglades City for about 8 years now. We have had some great success stories, and also some not-so-great outcomes. I will share some of our discoveries here.

The spiraling whitefly is really bad right now. This is a pest from South America that has set up all over south Florida. Some plants are very susceptible, some are not. Tomatoes do really well. I have the best luck with the small cherry tomatoes. They are not finicky about our warm temps and you can still get a good fruit set in a warm spell. Whiteflies leave them alone (so far!).

Peppers did really well for us for 2 years and then the whitefly moved in. They are hard to control unless you use toxic chemicals...so out came the peppers (no more jalapeno poppers!).

Herbs all seem resistant. We grow basil, mint, chives, dill, sage and rosemary and they all do really well with no sign of infestation.

Beans are resistant to whitefly...but they will get attacked by spider mites. I use water to control them by spraying under the leaves...and they do well here.

Radishes are super easy and grow quickly. If you want to start with something easy...radishes are a great way to get things going.

No matter what you plant, enjoy it. There is nothing better than going outside to pick something to eat for a meal.

Brush each slice with olive oil on both sides. Place onto a cookie sheet 🗶 or low sided baking pans lined with parchment paper. Sprinkle garlic powder and black pepper on the tops and place into a 350° oven, uncovered, for about 40 minutes...until the tops are slightly browned. Serve hot with butter.

With a range that spans five continents, the black-crowned night-heron is one of the most widespread herons in the world. A beautifully fashioned bird, the night-heron is a favorite of many photographers. Similar to the yellowcrowned night-heron, which is far more commonly seen, this attractive bird can be seen along the riprap in the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge, as well as in the Ten Thousand Islands region. It is seldom seen along the beaches.

Although it generally hunts at night, during the nesting season it may also be


observed feeding during the day. Like the equally successful cattle egret, the night-heron feeds on a wide assortment of creatures including frogs, rodents, snakes, crabs, and young birds, as well as plant material and eggs. That being said, fish is their primary forage. The adult black-crowned night-heron does not distinguish between its own young and those from other nests and will occasionally brood chicks not its own.

Found only in North and South America, the yellow-crowned night-heron is virtually identical in size to its close relative, the blackcrowned night-heron, but has less than onethird the life span. The easiest way to tell the two birds apart is by the large, yellowish tuft of feathers on the yellow-crowned heron, making it appear to have a punk-style haircut. Its wings are also much more variegated than the solid gray wings of the black-crowned

The yellow-crowned heron tends to feed more often during daylight hours and does not have as diverse a diet as its cousin. As its nicknames imply, the yellow-crowned nightheron specializes in eating crabs. A curious habit of this bird is that it carefully removes all the legs on a captured crab before eating. It is monogamous and tends to nest in small colonies of other yellow-crowned nightherons. Snakes and other birds prey on its

eggs, and alligators and bobcats take the adult bird. Its population is stable, but it suffers from habitat loss resulting from the drainage of wetlands and coastal development.

Fishing in the 10,000 Islands by Capt. Mike Merritt

Fishing has remained really good this past month. Snook fishing on the outside was as good as it gets, and so far has continued to be hot. As the waters continue to cool down there

will be more fish in the back country, but the outside islands should continue to produce action all month.



With all the bait fish there are - the fish will stay as long as the bait fish do. Live bait fishing has produced plenty of fish but jigs, and even top water lures, have caught their share this month. Moving water is key to getting a good bite and if you find areas where the Snook can ambush the baits in the current your chances for Snook action go way up.

The Redfish bite never really happened like it usually does in the fall. We have caught some nice Reds but never really found the large schools that should have been here. There were also plenty of smaller fish caught but not sure what kept the schools of bigger fish from showing up.

I think maybe the Red Tide that was all along the coast might have prevented those schools from migrating in. But, that's just my opinion as I am not sure. I just know they did not show up. We hope they come late! Better late than never!

Other fish being caught are Seatrout and Snapper. There are still Tarpon being caught as we landed a 60lb. fish today as I am writing this. We have been catching Goliath Grouper inshore too, and of course all the others like Jacks, and Ladyfish.


The offshore fishing has also been good with the live bait producing Snook, Cobia, Goliath Grouper and Permit, all of them are being caught out there.

November should bring some cooler water temps so things will change gradually this month. Black Drum should show up and maybe the Reds will come with them! This will add another species to target. Sheepshead will also show up if the water temps drop enough to bring them in.

This month is a great time so get on the water and enjoy the fishing. Lots to choose from and mild weather makes for great days on the water.

Regional News **FWC Reminds Residents in Panther Country to Take Steps to Protect Small Livestock**



Because of recent incidents of taking Florida panthers livestock and pets in Golden Gates Estates in Collier County, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) advising residents in the area

to take the necessary precautions to properly shelter animals such as goats, sheep, calves, pigs, donkeys and chickens.

The best way for people to protect small livestock is to keep them in a secure fenced enclosure with a roof, especially at night," said FWC panther team leader Darrell Land. "We encourage people who live in panther country to take the necessary steps to protect their animals from being taken by a panther or other predators such as bears, bobcats and coyotes."

Similar safety measures should be taken to protect pets like dogs and cats by keeping them indoors at night or in an outdoor panther-

The FWC is investigating and monitoring depredations on multiple miniature horses. Biologists have documented that panthers have killed two miniature horses and a pony in recent weeks.

People can learn more about living in panther country from the brochure, A guide to living with Florida Panthers. This resource reminds people, for instance, not to feed deer or other wildlife around their homes since that can attract panthers looking for prey.

Panther Deaths Up in 2018



Panther deaths are up in 2018 from 2017 statistics and the most common cause vehicle accident.

So far in 2018, 26 panthers have been recovered by Sixteen of deceased panthers were male

and 10 females.

Eleven of the panthers were recovered in Collier County and the rest in Lee and Hendry Counties.

Panthers are most active at dusk and dawn. Please be very careful on rural roads like SR 29 at this time of year where visibility can be reduced due to foggy conditions. Panthers are most common in SW Florida parks and eastern reaches of the west coast counties.

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
