Everglades City is Developing a New Comprehensive Plan
Here are the Details From the Special Meeting on March 24th

The City of Everglades City has been working from a Comprehensive Plan that was adopted in 1990 and updated in 1993. In short, the City's plan is outdated.

What is a Comprehensive Plan? A Comprehensive Plan is both a direction-setting document, and a legally enforceable document.

The Comprehensive Plan must also be consistent with the Land Development Code (LDC). Once the Comprehensive Plan is changed, the LDC must also change to achieve that consistency.

How does a Comprehensive Plan effect businesses and residents? The comprehensive plan, also known as a general plan, master plan or land-use plan, is a document designed to guide the future actions of a community.

This includes guidance on how to make decisions on public and private land development proposals, the expenditure of public funds, cooperative efforts and issues of pressing concern, such as historic preservation or the rehabilitation of older neighborhood areas. Most plans are written to provide direction for future activities over a 10 to 20-year period after plan adoption.

In other words, this is very important to Everglades City business and property owners as these decisions will have a direct impact on you and our community.

The City of Everglades City is doing this so that their Comprehensive Plan is more current. Typically, municipalities review these plan every 5 years, ten years at the latest. This is a very over-due process but it is one that comes with some risk for those of us who live and work here as now is the time decisions will be made that could change some aspects codes, zoning and growth within the City.

Why now? The City is in the process of obtaining grants for things like the new sewer and wastewater plant. To qualify for those grants, the City must have a current Comprehensive plan.

Everglades City was awarded a grant to hire a firm to help write the Comprehensive Plan. The 2-hour long meeting at City Hall also included ZOOM video conferencing participants, including Ken Metcalf, a certified City Planner from the firm Stearns, Weaver, Miller (see: https://www.stearnsweaver.com/attorneys/kenneth-metcalf/). Mr. Metcalf is the consultant that has been hired to direct this process.

Other things that will be considered in this plan include actions that will be taken after the completion of a Sea Level Rise Vulnerability Evaluation. The firm will analyze our vulnerability to flooding (spoiler alert: we are vulnerable), and how to address that issue with building codes.

Other important decisions and changes could be made regarding Zoning, Density, Historic Preservation, Growth and uses of public land.

An important aspect of this process is surveying the community so that we have an opportunity to communicate any of our concerns to the City and Planner. The survey will be available at City Hall in Lisa's office (where you pay the water bill), and on the City website https://www.cityofeverglades.org/public-notices.

For anyone who cannot get to City Hall or print the forms on the website, I am putting the survey on **page 6**. You can answer the questions on page 6 and on your own paper as needed. Handwritten is fine as long as it is legible.

Remember, you may state any concerns or ideas that you might have in addition to the questions on the survey. The most important thing to do is participate and send in your responses. The future of our area is being planned. If you have ideas about the future of our community now is the time to act. Please take the survey on page 6!



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Nesting Season is Here! Submitted by FWC

Each spring and summer, thousands of sea turtles, shorebirds and seabirds nest on Florida's beaches. Because our state's shorelines are critical for sea turtle and waterbird nesting, beachgoers can make a big difference in helping them. Biologists note that some of the most important things people can do to help nesting sea turtles and waterbirds are to give them space, minimize disturbances and keep beaches clean and dark.



Sea turtles typically return to nest in March along Florida's southeast Atlantic coast from Brevard County south to Broward County, while nesting begins on Gulf Coast or north Florida beaches in April or May. Around this same time, many shorebird and seabird species nest directly on beaches across the state where their eggs and chicks are well camouflaged in the sand. Colonies of wading birds, such as herons, will typically nest on mangrove islands off the coast.


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Sometimes people say the darndest things By Pastor Bob Wallace



Have you ever had the problem of trying to explain something to someone who didn't quite understand what you were trying to tell them? They just gave you a funny blank look.

Well don't worry. There's nothing wrong with you. It happens to a lot of people all of the time.

Misunderstandings are a part of life. The secret is how to clear them up.

Someone said to me recently, "I just don't understand what you're saying to me."

Did I take offense?

No.

And there's no need for you to take offense either.

The problem may lie in the words you're using to express your thoughts. Or maybe you're just not clear in your own mind about what you're trying to say. The result is, your words come out of your mouth all muddled and your thoughts are mixed up.

So, what do you do?



Well, you certainly don't get mad! There are a lot worse things in life than getting frustrated because you aren't making yourself perfectly clear. Wars have been started over misunderstandings. And a lot of personal relationships have been shattered.

The best thing to do when someone tells you they don't understand is to have that person say back to you what they thought they just heard you say. If they do

that, and you hear how they interpreted your words, then you will have the chance to retell what you wanted to say in the first place.

However, if what you said is not clearly expressed the first time, and your hearer cannot repeat what you said, then stop. Take a few minutes. Re-think what you wanted to say, and then say it again. What you say the second time is ofttimes better expressed than what

you said the first time.
Writers use this method. It's called editing.

Their thoughts often tumble forth and are put onto a blank page without giving much aforethought. That's why writers need a lot of editing before they are printed and published.

The same hold true with spoken words. Speakers should always be editing their thoughts before they are spoken. Once words leave a person's mouth they can never be recovered.

Just look around you and listen to how others express themselves. Do you like what you hear?

Would you change what they are saying and how they are saying it?

Does the same hold true for you?

Would another person change what you say and how you say it?

Try to express yourself carefully by using precise and exact words for your thoughts so no one will have trouble understanding what you say.

Then, next time someone says, "Did I hear you right?" you can take comfort in the thought that they did hear you correctly. You meant exactly what you said.

And there's no doubt about it!

That's when meaningful conversation begins.

Marsh Rabbit (Sylvilagus palustris) Other names: marsh hare / Status: FL=stable statewide but endangered in the Lower Keys, IUCN=LC / Length: 17 in (43 cm) / Height: n/a / Weight: 2.2-2.6 lb. (1-1.2 kg) / Life span: to 7 years / Reproduces: in abandoned burrows of gopher tortoises and armadillos or in dense thickets / Found: AC, coastal, near coast, mainland / Reproduces: year round / Months found: JFMAMJJASOND, marsh rabbits can breed all year round.



Commonly seen eating grass and other vegetation along trails and roadways, the marsh rabbit is the bread and butter of many of Florida's predators, especially bobcats, hawks, and owls. Although a member of the cottontail family, the marsh rabbit does not have a fluffy white tail. It has smaller ears than the cottontail and prefers wetter environments. The marsh rabbit will actually swim across tidal passes to inhabit other barrier

islands. It ranges all the way north to Virginia and west to Alabama.

The marsh rabbit is a strict herbivore and eats a wide variety of vegetation. It is a game animal in Florida, as it is in most of its range. Because a subspecies, Sylvilagus palustris hefneri (named after Hugh Hefner of Playboy fame), located in the lower Florida Keys, is endangered, the marsh rabbit is not hunted south of the Everglades.

It would be easy to think that the marsh rabbit is also prone to roadkill, but in fact it is rare to see one hit by an automobile. Like the white-tailed deer, the marsh rabbit appears to be adapting to the automobile. Its primary cause of mortality is predation, including being taken by alligators when swimming.

Here's What's Happening At The Museum of Everglades

First opened in 1927 as a commercial laundry, the building that now houses Museum of the Everglades is one of the historic structures still standing as a testament to the town's time as a once-bustling center of business and the region's first County seat.

The Museum of the Everglades is open Tuesday—Saturday from 9am to 4 pm.

The Island Life Recipes

Exceptionally Delicious Baked Pineapple by Sally Heflebower

Ingredients:

2-20 oz cans of crushed pineapple*

1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

2 cups white sugar*

1 cup butter, softened

8 eggs

10 slices of white bread (can substitute rolls or hotdog/hamburger buns), torn into pieces, about 8 cups



Directions:

Cream together butter and 1 cup of the sugar. Beat in eggs one at a time. Stir in cinnamon, add torn bread and crushed pineapple into mixture. Put in a $9 \times 13 \times 2$ baking dish. Bake at 350° for approximately 1 hour. It should be bubbly and slightly browned.

*I used fresh pineapple. To do this, cut up the pineapple into very small pieces and mix it with 1 cup of the sugar, 1/2 cup of water and let it stand for about 30 minutes. You can also prepare the pineapple the day before using the same method above, and continue on with the recipe as shown. *This is exceptionally delicious!*

Then, one day he stopped returning to Hollywood telling me he was no longer comfortable there and he moved to E-City permanently. At the time I found that statement curious. How could you be "uncomfortable" in a place you spent over 60 years in? Now, I understand.

Although there are some things I miss, like my dear friend and neighbor, Emily, the city itself not so much.

The few things I still have a connection to, like the sports teams I grew up following, I still follow! But the building I called "home" for over 41 years is not something I yearn for. I am "home". Small, well, tiny, suits me. Being in a place where we all know each other's names is comforting. Seeing the teams of volunteers working together for a common cause is heartwarming and it keeps your eyes on the important stuff...the little things.

As world events and national headlines push more and more calamity, don't forget to find your happy place and stay focused on the little things that make your life "your life".

I am so thankful for the fateful day in March of 1993 that we found our home...it just took us a few years to retire and get here permanently.
