Everglades City Proclaims May Drowning Prevention Month

At the April City Council meeting, the Collier Sheriff's Office Youth Relations Bureau and "Stewie" took center stage to discuss the importance of water safety as the hot summer months approach.

Collier County is one of few counties in the state to report no deaths due to accidental drowning in 2018.

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), drowning is the second leading cause of death for children ages 1 to 14, and number one in children under five. In the United States, approximately 750 children drown each year, 375 of whom do so within 25 yards of a parent or adult.

Florida ranks fourth in accidental drowning deaths in the US.

About Stewie



On January 1, 1989, a 21-month old toddler lost his life in a drowning accident. This sparked his parents to pledge that they would do everything in their power to prevent this tragedy from striking other families, since drowning is leading the cause of accidental death children under five.

In 1990, that toddler's parents, Kim and Stew Leonard, founded the **Stew Leonard III Water Safety Foundation** in memory of their son. Since this time, the Foundation has raised more than \$2 million dollars to go towards water safety awareness and education, including lifeguard training and providing 10,000 free or low-cost swimming lessons to children every year.

Help Prevent Accidental Drownings. Warning Signs are Not What You Think (some excerpts from Slate.com)

When TV or the movies portray a drowning victim, no matter the age, we are shown a vision of someone with arms flailing and yelling for help.

However, this is only in the movies. In real life, a drowning victim rarely shows such obvious signs. 10% of parents could be looking at their child in the water drowning and may not even know it.

Knowing what to look for may help you avert the number one cause of accidental death in children 4 and under, and the number two cause of accidental deaths in children up to 14. These warning signs appeared in a blog post on slate.com:

- ◆Except in rare circumstances, drowning people are physiologically unable to call out for help.
- ♦ Drowning people's mouths alternately sink below and reappear above the surface of the water. The mouths of drowning people are not above the surface of the water long enough for them to exhale, inhale, and call out for help. When the drowning people's mouths are above the surface, they exhale and inhale quickly as their mouths start to sink below the surface
- ♦ Drowning people cannot wave for help. Nature instinctively forces them to extend their arms laterally and press down on the water's surface. Pressing down on the surface of the water permits drowning people to leverage their bodies so they can lift their mouths out of the water to breathe.
- ♦ Throughout the Instinctive Drowning Response, drowning people cannot voluntarily control their arm movements. Physiologically, drowning people who are struggling on the surface of the water cannot stop drowning and perform voluntary movements such as waving for help, moving toward a rescuer, or reaching out for a piece of rescue equipment.
- ♦ From beginning to end of the Instinctive Drowning Response people's bodies remain upright in the water, with no evidence of a supporting kick. Unless rescued by a trained lifeguard, these drowning people can only struggle on the surface of the water from 20 to 60 seconds before submersion occurs."



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LCEC Continues to Remove Osprey Nests In Everglades City Latest One Removed Has Been Active For Over a 25 Years Maybe They Should Look at What TECO Energy in Tampa is Doing? by Kathy Brock

For over a 25 years residents and visitors have watched the antics of a mature nesting pair of osprey in their nest along the Barron River just north of Steve and Patty Huff's home. This week a LCEC crew came and removed the nest in what has become routine in our little city that is home to many shore birds, wading birds and osprey.

LCEC has an "avian protection plan" and claims to look for solutions to both protect their equipment and the birds. Total removal is a solution, but aren't their other factors that should be considered as well? Is there not some type of compromise where we can keep the nests that are on some structures and not others? This particular nest was on the very top of the pole with no interference with the wires. The birds are confused and the residents are angered. There must be a better solution!

Osprey choose power poles because they are the best suited location for them in their eyes. You see, osprey will choose a nest with a 360° view over a tree location every time. Why? Because osprey chicks are one of the favorite foods of many hawks, eagles and great horned owls. Predation is reduced dramatically when osprey nests are on structures with an unimpeded view...and they know it. A power pole is the perfect location in their eyes.

Power companies all along the eastern seaboard have been dealing with nesting birds for decades. They have learned that simply removing a nest will do nothing to deter the birds from returning again and again.

In Florida where the birds are fairly common, many power companies have looked for ways to protect their power supply, and protect the birds. TECO Energy in the Tampa area is one such company.

In a May 2015 article published in the Tampa Tribune, columnist Andy Warrener spoke with TECO about their program. "We were seeing a number of bird-related outages," TECO spokeswoman Cherie Jacobs said. "So we brainstormed and came up with a solution to protect our equipment and the animals."

TECO's Avian Protection Program helps the company identify at-risk species of birds,



documents birds that use high-risk electric equipment for nesting, recommends appropriate equipment retrofits to minimize electrocution risk and develops bird-friendly surveys within the service territory.

TECO and Duke Energy have stepped in to build nesting platforms. TECO has built more than 30 platforms in Hillsborough and Polk Counties since 2004. Duke has constructed nine platforms in Pinellas County along with 59 deterrent mechanisms since January 2013.

Duke Energy builds most of the platforms in Pinellas County. TECO platforms are made of composite material and look like wooden pallets on top of lighting poles. Duke uses a platform that looks like a satellite dish on top of their poles. Walker predicts that by the end of the year, these organizations will have combined to spend \$100,000 on urban osprey management.

Osprey nests are protected and one must obtain a permit to remove nests in Florida. Osprey were on the verge of extinction in the 60's & 70's when DDT infiltrated the food chain. The birds eggs were so fragile simply sitting on them to incubate them would crush the eggs which essentially halted reproduction. Scientists made the connection, and DDT was banned from use in the US (I am quite sure DDT was not good for Humans either...but that is an article for another time). Fortunately, the osprey population has recovered and we are/were enjoying them very much again in Everglades City.

There must be a way that LCEC could work with the community to make strategic placements for nest platforms within the city? The birds will come back, and frankly, we want them back. They add to our city's charm. They are one of our native birds. They are only doing what they are driven to do...find a home, find a mate and have a family.

Bicycling in South Florida by Patty Huff

A hundred years ago the population in Florida was less than 1 million (about the population of Jacksonville today). Now our state ranks 3rd in the country with over 21.5 million residents! We all love living here with our fantastic weather and variety of outdoor activities, the same amenities that attract the millions of tourists who come to enjoy Collier County. Somehow we all have to find a way to live and travel together. The more people on the road, the higher the danger for cyclists; a never ending compromise to "share the road."

April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month and May is National Bicycle Month which provides each of us an opportunity to become more involved in spreading the word about safety. Florida Bicycle Association works diligently to improve our current safety record, working with other organizations, communicating our position with legislators, and educating the public (both motorists and cyclists) about the rules of the road and how we can all work together to improve safety for everyone.

What you can do to help:

- 1) If you are not a member of the Florida Bicycle Association, join now: https://floridabicycle.org/membership-and-sponsorship/.
- 2) If you are a member, tell your friends about FBA and ask them to join. Explain the benefits and the importance of speaking with one united voice through FBA.
- 3) Stay in contact with representatives at the local, county and state level and explain the importance of Complete Streets. In September 2014, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) adopted the Statewide Complete Streets Policy (Topic No. 000-625-017-a). Complete Streets serves the transportation needs of all users, including pedestrians, bicyclists, transit riders, motorists, and freight handlers. A transportation system based on Complete Streets principles can help to promote safety, quality of life, and economic development.
- 4) Stay informed about future road plans in our area. Get involved with our local Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) by attending meetings and staying in touch with our Everglades City representatives: Elaine Middelstaedt (MPO), Tammie Pernas (Citizens Advisory Committee), Tim Brock (Technical Advisory Committee) and Dayna Fendrick (Bicycle / Pedestrian Advisory Committee).
- 5) Attend the Everglades City Bicycle / Pedestrian Committee meetings on the last Friday of each month at 3:00 pm in the downstairs conference room of City Hall.
- 6) Always be courteous and respectful when communicating the concerns and safety needs of bicyclists.
- 7) Everglades City is a walkable/bicycle friendly community with little traffic and low speed limits. Ride your bike and have fun! We all have had wonderful memories while riding: the feeling of freedom, good exercise, the sounds of the birds, in addition to the friendly people we meet while walking or biking. We have the privilege of getting on a bicycle year round with our phenomenal south Florida weather. With the exhilaration of the wind in your face and the road beneath your wheels, it's important to be able to ride safely. The bicycle is famous for being the most efficient manpowered means of transportation the human race has yet invented, not only for the thrill of getting there but the wellbeing it provides. Enjoy the ride and act now to help us make south Florida a safer place to ride!



My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock

This year was our third consecutive year planting vegetables in raised beds in Everglades City. Each year, we try different things and learn more, and then incorporate our findings into next year's garden for a better result.

This year we had dried seeds from last year's crops and we also purchased starter plants at local stores.

In addition to planting seeds and starter plants, the gardens also sprouted numerous volunteer plants that came up in multiple locations.

Our most prolific crops have been tomatoes, jalapeno peppers, banana peppers and green beans that are purple but turn green as soon as you cook them.

Here is what we have learned: Tomatoes from the seed of last year's plants that we planted this year grew stronger and healthier than any of the store bought plants. In fact, when our seeds first spouted we felt they were still so small in October that we ought to buy larger plants so we could get the crop going...but the garden sowed seeds outperformed the store bought plants 100% of the time. Those plants grew faster and out-produced store bought plants. Interestingly, volunteer plants that came up on their own out-performed all plants. Tomato plants that got partial late afternoon shade out-performed those in locations that received sun all day.

White flies have been a problem all year. The most vulnerable plants have been the beans. However, the flies did not show up until after the beans produced several great crops with some leftover to freeze for future use.

Keeping seeds for your next crop is easy and it saves money! Always let tomatoes mature completely on the vines before picking them for their seeds. Squeeze the seeds from the tomatoes into a fine mesh strainer and rinse with water to remove any fruit pulp. Invert the strainer onto a paper towel and let the seeds dry on it. Do not put seeds (of any kind) in air tight, plastic bags. I just fold up my paper towels and tape them together with the seeds on them. I then label them with the date and what type of plant it is from. When you are ready to plant next season, the seeds will easily lift off of the paper towels. Mailing envelopes are excellent to hold seeds too.

For beans, let the beans you are using for seed dry on the vine. I will then open up the pods and put the seeds in an envelope for next year. I have found that the germination rate is much higher when you let them fully mature and dry outside on the vine. Our bean seeds sprouted almost 100% of the time. I have plenty of seeds to share!

When you plant the following year, change the location of your plants from previous years. Rotating your crops makes for a more productive garden. Different plants use up different nutrients in the soil. Continually using the same soil for the same crop will deplete the soil resulting in inferior crops. We also augment the soil each fall with cow manure and low nitrogen, organic fertilizers.

Using high amounts of nitrogen will make your plants very lush...but not very productive. It also attracts the pests. We learned this the hard way!

Peppers take quite a while to get going, but when they do the plants will last for up to 2 full years. We had jalapeno pepper plants that produced for over 2 years before declining. This year's peppers are going strong and they appear to be on track for another year of production. So far, no whiteflies on the peppers or late tomatoes.

Lastly, raised beds are essential. Superior drainage and no bending is the way to go! Enjoy the outdoors!

Island Life Recipes White Bean Summer Salad

Ingredients:

×

2 cans great northern beans, rinsed and drained 2 plum or Compari tomatoes, diced & seeded 1 or 2 small to medium zucchini, diced 1/2 red onion, chopped

₩ Dressing:

1/4 cup olive oil 1/3 cup white wine vinegar 2 Tablespoons lemon juice

1 tsp. dry mustard

1/2 tsp. salt

1 tsp dried basil (or 1/4 cup fresh basil, chopped fine)

1/4 tsp black pepper, or to taste

Mix ingredients together and set aside. Prepare dressing in a jar or bowl with a cover. Close lid and mix well. Pour dressing over ingredients and chill in the refrigerator for a few hours. Serve chilled. This is an excellent side dish with any meat or with a sandwich for lunchtime. You can also try other beans or use two types of beans as a variation. Enjoy!



Area Parks Boating or Paddling the Wilderness Waterway? Visit ENP First!

The Gulf Coast Visitor Center in Everglades National Park (ENP) is "information central" for boaters or paddlers who plan to travel the Wilderness Waterway. The iconic water trail extends 99 miles through twisting, challenging, and beautiful channels among the coastal mangrove islands from Everglades City to Flamingo at the tip of the Florida Peninsula.

The Wilderness Waterway is one of America's great wilderness experiences. Canoeists and kayakers typically allow 5-8 days to complete the route. Shorter "loop" trips are also an option.

It takes careful planning to make a safe transit. The trail is not marked--you must find your way with a nautical chart and compass. And there's no fresh water along the route, so paddlers must carry all their water.

Drop by the Visitor Center in Everglades City for a trip planning guide and info on routes and conditions. Note that you MUST obtain a backcountry permit at the Gulf Coast or Flamingo station before you go; permits are required for overnight stays at Waterway campsites.

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Living Gulf Coast by Charles Sobczak

Dragonflies (Family Aeschnidae) Other names: mosquito hawk, darner, devil's darning needle / Status: FL=common / Life span: 7 months to 1 year, depending on the species / Length: 2-4 in. (50-101 mm) / Reproduces in standing water such as small ponds and larger residential lakes / Found: Throughout Southwest Florida



At certain times of the year, especially in the spring and early summer, massive swarms of these aerial insects will appear in upland areas such as the Bailey Tract of "Ding" Darling Wildlife Sanctuary. Literally thousands of dragonflies can be seen at once, dashing about feeding on a mass emergence of prey (commonly called "a hatch") well into twilight.

The color and pattern variations of this beautiful insect are nothing short of astounding, in many ways rivaling the sheer beauty of butterflies. They range from iridescent blue to a deep, scarlet red, to pink, and gold to jet black. Their names are equally diverse; the Emperor, Keeled

Skimmer, Azure Hawker, Roseate Skimmer and Green Darner. Watching them pursue and capture their prey, which ranges from mosquitos, moths, bees and flies, is enthralling. They are one of the most adroit flying insects in the world, capable of sharp turns, instant ascents and descents and stunning agility. Adult dragonflies are capable of propelling themselves in six directions: upward, downward, forward, backward and side to side. Only the hummingbird rivals them in flying prowess.

Worldwide, there are currently more than 6,500 species of dragonflies. Most of them live in the tropical and subtropical regions of the planet, but there are some 425 species that reside in North America. While no one has an accurate number of how many dragonfly species reside in Southwest Florida, the number is probably in the dozens.

Considered beneficial for their ability to feast on mosquitoes and biting flies, the dragonfly is revered for its swiftness and agility by the Native Americans. In Japan dragonflies symbolize "martial success." Japanese children catch large dragonflies as a game, using a thin thread or hair attached to a very small pebble. When they toss the tiny pebble up into the air, the dragonflies mistake it for prey, become entangled in the hair and fall back down to earth with the weight of the stone. The



children then release them and toss the stone again, continuing the game. The jeweler Louis Comfort Tiffany used dragonflies as a motif for stained glass, with his dragonfly lamp being the most famous of all of his artistic creations.

Birds of prey, including the swallowtail kite, are known to feed on dragonflies. Their nymphs are heavily preyed upon by frogs, fish and even immature alligators. Look for them flying about over grasslands and open areas in southwest Florida. Dragonflies have three life stages; egg, aquatic larvae or nymph and adult. Eggs are laid in calm fresh waters where the nymphs are voracious eaters. They can live in this stage for months to 3 years depending on the climate. In warm climates, the lifespan of the adult dragonfly is approximately 4 to 7 months.

Snook Season Closing May 1st

Attention anglers! Snook season is closing on May 1st and is not scheduled to reopen again until September 1st.

During the closed season, it is illegal to harvest snook of any size.



From Tampa Bay to Gordon Pass in Collier County, snook and redfish harvest has remained closed due to the lasting effects from red tide. However, south of the pass, harvesting is permitted. Water conditions have improved all over Florida and FWC reports no active red tide on the Gulf or Atlantic coasts off of the State.

Out of the Everglades City / Chokoloskee area, anglers have reported numerous excellent days of fishing for snook and redfish, with several fish being taken in the legal slot for harvest.

Many fish "under the slot" have been reported as well...which is a good sign for future harvest seasons.

Snook spawning season is from April to October with the most active months being July and August. Snook can live up to 20 years and grow to weigh over 50 pounds.

Snook is considered one of the best food and game fish in southwest Florida. It's lightly flavored, flaky meat, is delicious when cooked in almost any manner. Since 1957 it has been illegal to sell snook commercially, to protect the population from over-fishing.

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Regional News Mexico Beach Rebuilds, Rebuffs Developers

On October 10, 2018 Hurricane Michael and its category 4 winds lashed the panhandle of Florida. Ground zero was the small waterfront community of Mexico Beach.

The storm ravaged the town of old Florida homes that were built before tighter building codes were enacted after earlier hurricanes devastated other Florida towns.

Of the 1,692 homes or condos in the town, 809 were either destroyed or severely damaged.

As soon as clean up started, developers swooped in to try and buy up as much land as possible to eventually redevelop the city in their vision.

Not so fast said Mayor Al Cathey. Refusing to change zoning to accommodate what the developers hoped for, the town, and the remaining residents, were spared what could have been a complete makeover of this sleepy little Gulf Coast town.

Today, residents are rebuilding. They are in the earlier stages, much like we were in 2018.

To stave off outsiders from taking over, and to keep corporate America at bay, residents have adopted a credo of trying to sell to locals first, if selling is what they must do.



Some would look at this and suggest that it could have been a "lost opportunity" for Mexico Beach to become a better version of its previous self. But when you look closer, you see the genius in their move to protect their unique town. Changing Mexico Beach into another cookie-cutter community does nothing but further homogenize the Florida coast.

Uniqueness is increasingly rare as investor groups snap up land, develop it and suck the money out of the community...and move on to the next opportunity.

About the Fakahatchee Strand

The Fakahatchee Strand Preserve State Park is perhaps the best example of a subtropical, strand swamp in the United States. The Fakahatchee Strand is a linear swamp forest, approximately twenty miles long by five miles wide and oriented from north to south. The Strand harbors one of the largest concentrations and diversity of native orchids in North America, and supports numerous rare and endangered animal species. It is also one of the core areas of the current range of the Florida Panther.

The Strand's 85,000 acres are part of the main drainage slough of the Big Cypress Swamp. The Fakahatchee Strand is linked hydrologically to the Everglades system and is particularly important to the estuarine ecosystem of the Ten Thousand Islands area.

Local News Another Panther Killed in Collier County

So far, 2019 has been a deadly year for the Florida Panther. As of April 16th, nine panthers have been killed in Southwest Florida.

Of the nine, six have been male and three have been females. Seven of the deaths were caused by vehicle accidents, one by intraspecific aggression and the other is unknown.

Panthers are one of two native big cats native to Florida. The bobcat is smaller than a panther and much more widely dispersed.

There are approximately 150 to 230 panthers left in Florida and they are on the endangered species list.

It is unlawful to harm, harass them in any way.

Panthers are most active at dusk and dawn when visibility is low. They travel great distances and do cross roadways in rural areas of the state.

To minimize the possibility of a negative encounter with at panther, please pay close attention while driving especially during their most active hours. If you see a deceased or injured panther, report online at myfwc.com or call 888-404-FWCC (888-404-3922). Cellular phone users can also call *FWC or #FWC, or send a text to Tip@MyFWC.com.
