#### New Everglades National Park Rules Being Enforced. Here Are the Requirements for Boaters Details by Scott Brunner

Effective January 10, 2019 boaters are required to have a **park pass** to enter the Everglades National Park on the gulf coast in a vessel or vehicle. This requirement is being waived for an undetermined period and the rangers are being asked to educate and inform us of the new rules as they do our normal boat checks in the park. I was checked in Lane Cove recently and this was exactly what happened.

Boaters are also required to take an Everglades Boater Education Course, which upon successfully scoring 80% or more on the exam, you will be issued a "Everglades National Park Boaters Permit" which you must have to operate a boat in the park. This permit is good for 12 months and it appears we must retake the assessment quiz every 12 months and obtain a new permit. This course is currently free. I have seen conflicting information that it may cost \$50 in the future or that it may remain free.

The park rangers are now writing tickets for boaters in the park who have not completed the Everglades Boater Education Course. Here are the links for the park pass and boater education course:

#### Copeland Resident Robert Hickok Dies of Head Injury on Fishing Vessel off of Marco Island

Robert Hickok. 54. longtime resident of Copeland, Florida was commercial fishing aboard the vessel "No Bitchin" for grouper for about a week. On March 18th, crewmember а radioed the Coast Guard that there was trouble

on board, and the U.S. Coast Guard headed towards the vessel.

When they boarded the vessel, the Coast Guard found Robert Hickok unresponsive with severe trauma on his skull and determined that he had expired from his injuries.

Robert Hickok is well known in his hometown Copeland and in nearby towns Everglades City, Chokoloskee and Plantation.

In many of his photos there is a fishing pole nearby. Fishing was his passion and he was even known to take his own pole with him on commercial vessels to get some of his own fishing in when his workday was done.

In the tight Copeland community of just over 200, the news of his passing hit the community hard where many of his extended family members and friends reside.

Robert Hickok had 8 children, an older brother, two younger sisters and one younger brother as well as many grandchildren. Many members of his family live in the Copeland area, while others live in various places across Florida and out of state.

#### A Message From Greater Naples Fire Chief **Kingman Schuldt**

You may notice increased smoke conditions throughout our community. This is a result

of many prescribed fires in our nearby State and Federal lands in the eastern portions of the county.

Prescribed fire is one of the most versatile and cost-effective tools land managers use. Prescribed fire is used to reduce hazardous fuel buildups, thus providing increased protection to people, their homes and the forest. Other uses include disease control in young pines, wildlife habitat improvement, range management, preservation of endangered plant and animal species and the maintenance of fire-dependent ecosystems.

The Florida Forest Service through the Forest Protection Bureau oversees one of the most active prescribed fire programs in the country. In an average year the Florida Forest Service will issue approximately 88,000 authorizations allowing landowners and agencies to prescribe burn an average of over 2.1 million acres each year.

Burning in Florida is governed by Florida Statutes Chapter 590 and Florida Administrative Code Chapter 5I-2. Local governing agencies may also have rules or regulations for burning, so please check with them and your local Florida Forest Service office for additional information.

#### SAWFISH NEWS by Tonya Wiley, Havenworth Coastal Conservation

Entanglement of marine species in lines, fishing gear, and other debris is a problem seen with unfortunate regularity in the southeastern United States. This includes Endangered Species Act-listed species such as North Atlantic right whales, giant manta rays, sturgeon, turtles, and smalltooth sawfish. Each species is susceptible to entanglement based on their physical attributes but none more so than sawfish.

The toothed rostrum of the smalltooth sawfish could be considered one of the most unique morphological traits in any species. Yet this feature has also directly led to the species' decline. Sawfish are rays that generally swim along the sediment surface where marine debris can accumulate. The toothy rostrum is easily entangled in any debris the sawfish encounters, which can lead to injury, deformation, or death by suffocation or starvation. Sawfish entangled in a variety of man-made items including dock lines, trap lines, nets (gill nets, cast nets, trawls, etc.), fishing lines, pvc pipes, coffee cans, dog toys, and elastic bands have been reported. While strides have been made in recent years to raise awareness about sawfish entanglement, this threat continues to affect the species.

Historically, a number of commercial fisheries incidentally captured smalltooth sawfish in the southeastern United States, though none more prominent than inshore gillnet fisheries. Because juvenile sawfish rely on shallow inshore waters as nursery habitat, gillnet fisheries for mullet in these same areas resulted in extensive incidental capture of sawfish. Once entangled, the toothed rostrum was difficult to remove from nets so often these fish were simply killed as bycatch. The 1995 gillnet ban in the state waters of Florida has been instrumental in reducing the number of sawfish killed by this gear. However, illegal use of gillnets still results in mortality of sawfish.



Recently two sawfish entanglements have been highlighted on social media. In late 2018, the National Park Service reported a sawfish entanglement in Biscayne Bay (see National Park https:// www.fisheries.noaa.gov/feature-story/saving -endangered-sawfish). In this instance a sawfish was trailing lines from a lobster pot. Excessive entanglement can affect mobility, feeding, and thus overall fitness. If unattended, these entangled animals are likely to perish. Fortunately, park rangers were able to secure the lines, and remove

them from the sawfish.

In a separate event, the National Park Service responded to a tip that an illegal gillnet was found in the waters of Everglades National Park near Chokoloskee, Florida. Upon retrieval of the net, law enforcement discovered a dead sawfish. This example illustrates just how deadly these nets can be to this endangered species. Law enforcement is still investigating this case and has requested that anyone with information to please contact 305-242-7741.

It is a shared responsibility of all outdoor enthusiasts to keep our waters free of trash and debris, which could result in entanglement. Next time you're out on the water, do your part to pick up any trash or debris, and if you ever encounter a sawfish please let us know by calling 1-844-4SAWFISH.

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#### My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock

If you listen, someone is always touting a "new program" designed to improve upon the standard. I typically look at these "newbies" with a yawn but being open-minded I will always listen.

A few weeks back, I met with the principal of Everglades City School, James Ragusa. He invited me to come to the school to learn about a new program they are considering for the kids. As our readers know, the Mullet Rapper is a supporter of the school and we donated over \$4700 to the school last year.

I met with Principal Ragusa, Athletic Director/Activities Director Jill Whitcomb, Councilman Tim Smith, and other school staff members. They told me about the program that the school has been researching called, the Leader in Me.

The program is based on Franklin Covey's 7 Principles of Highly Effective People. I was introduced to this philosophy in my professional life...and it does work. Now they had my attention.

What excites me about this is that it is not a one-year blip in a child's educational experience that is forgotten soon after they leave the classroom. It is a culture shift. It is a new way of doing things from the day you walk into the school until the day you leave and through the rest of your life. It is about student empowerment.

"This approach empowers educators with effective practices and tools to teach LEADERSHIP to every student, create a CULTURE of student empowerment, and align systems to drive results in ACADEMICS."

In short, it creates a culture where the students feel respected and worthy. It gives them a sense of empowerment by making the students a part of the system, not simply a by-product of it. What's more, the same principles they learn during their school years are the same principles they will use to fuel their after-school success. These are the same principles used all over the globe by Fortune 500 businesses.

I was impressed in the meeting and even more impressed after reading more about the program online and watching the videos on www.leaderinme.org. I spoke to Jill to see if the athletic department would be negatively affected if I redirected the donations from the Mullet Rapper, that historically went to the athletic department, towards the Leader in Me program. I found out that because of the success of the annual fishing tournament, the athletic department is in great shape (thanks to Ms. Whitcomb) for the foreseeable future.

On page 5, Principal Ragusa explains the program in a bit more detail. He also asks for the community's support. The program is not free but it is very reasonable, but there are no funds available to the school from the county for it although they do embrace it. What you must also understand is that the budget from which a school must operate is directly related to student population. Our student population is very, very small resulting in (frankly) a budget that is barely adequate at best.

But our students are worth it. Their future depends on it. Today's students are tomorrow's leaders in business and in the community and beyond.

I am 100% behind the school's efforts and will support them in any way I can. I will demonstrate my support by pledging the sales of the print edition of the Mullet Rapper and the proceeds from our annual plant sale towards the Leader in Me program. Go Gators!



#### Area Parks Everglades Adventure! Paddle Sandfly Island

One of the best ways to experience the coastal mangrove zone in Everglades National Park is by canoe or kayak. Drop by the Gulf Coast Visitor Center for information on planning a day trip to Sandfly Island just across Chokoloskee Bay.

Bring your own paddle craft, or rent from one of the outfitters in Everglades City. Be sure to check the tides and wind before you go. On your paddle across the bay, you're likely to see pelicans and other seabirds. A close encounter with a dolphin, manatee, or sea turtle is also possible.

The dock at Sandfly Island is easy to find. Bring a picnic lunch and take a walk on the mile-long trail around the island. Interpretive signage introduces you to tropical plants, as well as the Calusa Indians who lived here 2,000 years ago and the settlers who farmed tomatoes in the early 1900s.

The Everglades National Park Gulf Coast Station is located at 815 Oyster Bar Lane, Everglades City. The Visitor Center is open daily from 8 AM to 4:30 PM.

#### The Women of the Everglades

**By: Antonia Florio, Science Communications Liaison, Everglades National Park** March is Women's History Month. And here in Everglades National Park, we owe a lot to women. After all, women first led the effort to preserve this special place back in the early 1900s.

Female conservationists and scientists have continued that legacy as caretakers and defenders of the park. Here, we highlight just a few women who have made Everglades National Park what it is today.

Women laid the foundation for Everglades National Park. Women's clubs in South Florida were influential in the creation of Royal Palm State Park, which later became the nucleus for Everglades National Park.

The Florida Federation of Women's Clubs, and particularly the Preservation Committee chairwoman, **May Mann Jennings**, began campaigning for the creation of Royal Palm State Park in 1905. It took 10 years, but finally in 1915, the park was signed into law. At the official dedication ceremony on Nov. 23, 1916, May Jennings committed Royal Palm State Park to "the people of Florida and their children forever."

The creation of a state park in South Florida made people more aware that the Everglades was special and should be protected. And it was women who accomplished this, before they even won the right to vote in the United States.

Everglades National Park owes a lot to **Marjory Stoneman Douglas** who started advocating for the Everglades in the early 1920s. She joined the Everglades Tropical Park Association to enhance the cause to create a national park in South Florida.

Her early work became the blueprint for her celebrated book, The Everglades: River of Grass, published in 1947, the same year Everglades National Park was established. It has become the definitive description of the natural treasure she fought so hard to protect. Through her writing, Douglas successfully rallied people to protect this unique South Florida ecosystem. Douglas advocated for the Everglades up until her death in 1998.

**Betty Robertson** always made birds a part of her life and translated that love to others. "Everything in the yard, she studied," Sally Robertson, Betty's daughter said.

Robertson wound up in the Everglades because her husband, Bill, got a job in the park working in fire ecology. She met Bill in graduate school. She was studying for her masters in ornithology, and he was getting a PhD.

Because birds would also be a part of her life, she found a way to study them here. She and her husband studied the sooty tern seabirds in Dry Tortugas from the late 1950s until their death. Robertson's work led to the discovery that sooty terns migrate from Dry Tortugas across the Atlantic to the African coast. The birds come back to Dry Tortugas when they are about 3 years old to nest.

**Caryl Alarcon** works behinds the scenes making sure we can see the Everglades. "I'm a visual person so when you're talking about a project, I want to see it," she said.

Alarcon was drawn to geography because it provided a full picture of the story. "Geography allowed me to see people and places moving through landscapes through time," she said. Shortly after obtaining a masters in geography, she was offered a job as a Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Specialist at Everglades National Park.

When asked about what keeps her in South Florida, she doesn't hesitate in her response: Florida Bay and her job. So, it's not surprising that her favorite project was doing an inventory of the Florida Bay channel markers.

"We were out on the Bay for a whole year," she said. "The project helped me better understand the resources we are protecting, and how hard everyone at the park works in their jobs every day. It gave me a lot of respect for my colleagues."

Jean Seavey and her husband Rick couldn't stay away from the Everglades. "We came down to the park for the first time in 1967, on a honeymoon trip a few years late," Seavey said.

They would come back and visit when they could, and then officially moved here in the 1980s after they retired. But when they returned in 1984, they noticed that Royal Palm hammock was now choked with an invasive plant called shoebutton ardisia. Seavey and her husband were horrified. They made it their priority to rid the hammock of invasive ardisia. They worked with the University of Miami to trace how the invasive plant's seeds spread in the park. They also worked with other volunteers to remove it from the Royal Palm Hammock. Their hard work paid off. Royal Palm became largely free from invasive ardisia and native plants returned.

The Seavey's have just one request for the park service: "We hope the Park Service will remember our work and not let shoebutton ardisia ever regain a foothold in its precious hammocks."

As we can see, women first led the cause to create Everglades National Park, and they're still here making sure it's in good shape for future generations to enjoy.

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#### **Collier County Votes To Limit Residential Rentals Affecting Unincorporated Collier** Areas

The Collier County Commission passed a resolution 4-1 to put a limit on rentals after receiving some complaints by residents.

This ruling will affect only unincorporated Collier County areas, Cities (like Everglades City) have their own ordinances and are governed by those rules.

The ruling will put a minimum 6 month rental term for any residential home not in a "tourist district" designated in Unincorporated Collier County.

Supporters of the bill are happy because they say they are tired of the constant coming and going of people in their neighborhoods.

Detractors say it will only benefit hotels and encourage visitors to go to Lee County instead because many visitors who come for winter season prefer a home or condo, and will not want to stay in a motel or hotel for that length of time.

According to a county staff report, there are some 14,650 vacation rental listings in Collier alone. Many of the listings are on multiple websites, with the highest concentration of them in areas such as Naples Park, Pelican Bay, Pelican Marsh, Park Shore and downtown Naples.

Some municipalities do have limitations on rentals but a state law passed in 2011 prohibited counties and other local governments from regulating vacation rentals. However, those with rules before June 1, 2011, such as Collier, were considered to be "grandfathered," allowing them to keep their current regulations in place.

In 2014, the Florida Legislature agreed to tweak state law to allow local governments to pass more limited regulations, but they still can't ban or restrict how often vacation rentals are used.

Under state law, Collier County Attorney Jeff Klatzkow said there's no way to adjust the county's rules to limit rentals by the week, month or day, instead of using the more strict standard of less than six months outlined in the land development code. If they adjust the law in the land development code, they would lose the grandfather clause altogether opening Collier up to seasonal rentals (legally).

The County's rules were adopted many years ago, when county officials never contemplated such services as Airbnb and VRBO.

Vacation rentals generated more than \$8 million in tourist taxes for the county last fiscal year. Jack Wert, the county's tourism director, said it's too early to tell what kind of impact the county commission's decision will have on his budget - or the ability to market the destination year-round.

Ghostrider Tram Tours of the park are from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The naturalist led tours are offered for \$25 per person most Thursdays in April and are named for the famous ghost orchid found in the park.

The Naturalist Led Tram Tour and Swamp Walks are from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. This \$60 excursion takes visitors into knee-high water and is offered on most Tuesdays during the season.

About the Fakahatchee Strand The Fakahatchee Strand Preserve State Park is perhaps the best example of a subtropical, strand swamp in the United States. The Fakahatchee Strand is a linear swamp forest, approximately twenty miles long by five miles wide and oriented from north to south. The Strand harbors one of the largest concentrations and diversity of native orchids in North America, and supports numerous rare and endangered animal species. It is also one of the core areas of the current range of the Florida Panther.

The Strand's 85,000 acres are part of the main drainage slough of the Big Cypress Swamp. The Fakahatchee Strand is linked hydrologically to the Everglades system and is particularly important to the estuarine ecosystem of the Ten Thousand Islands area.

There are so many bird species one can see in Everglades City. In March we met a couple from England who stay in Everglades

City each winter, Alec & Angie McSkimming.

Each year when they visit, they go on bird-watching excursions. They stopped at my house when they noticed our hummingbird feeders and we began talking about birds and what birds they had seen on their visit this year.

During their stay, they documented 39 different species in Everglades City and 119 others around South Florida. One they did not see is the white crowned pigeon.

In my 25+ years here, I have seen one two times. Two years ago and again on March 23rd. As luck would have it, it was perched in my Norfolk pine and my camera was handy...and he cooperated.

Maybe next year Alec & Angie will get to see one!

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**TAXING THINGS** by Mike the Tax Guy

As we get closer to the **April 15th filing date** for income tax and if you have not yet gotten all your information, you can file for an automatic extension to file. This will allow for more time to file up until October 15th 2019.

The request for extension of time Form 4868 which can be filed electronically or mailed.

An extension to file is not an extension to pay any tax due. If you think you will owe tax you can make periodic payments prior to the October deadline. There are a few ways to go about this:

Address with payment enclosed:

Internal Revenue Service

P.O. Box 1214

Charlotte, NC 28201-1214

Include Form 1040V, payment voucher and follow the instructions for what to write on the check.

If you are filing a Form 4868

and you are not enclosing a payment, then use this address:

Department of the Treasury

Internal Revenue Service

Austin, TX 73301-0002

Payments are usually due April 15, June 15, and September 15.

You can choose to have direct withdrawal from your checking account.

Even if you are unsure whether you owe or what the total would be, it's a good idea to make some payments since the late payment penalty is based on a percentage of the balance due.

And, of course, if you overpay you will get a refund.
