Glades Building Under Contract, New Café Expected to Open

The Glades Building which was once the home of Glades Realty and Sweet Mayberry's Café has been sold.

The buyers are Craig and Bonnie Woodward, longtime residents of Marco Island and longtime homeowners in Everglades City.

The Woodwards spend weekends and any other days they can in their Everglades City home and they became interested in the property when the building was put up for sale.

The building is in dire need of renovations after several years of neglect. The couple plans on renovating the exterior, the interior and redesigning the landscaping. The goal is to have the business open in time for the winter season.

Since the closing of Mayberry's there has been a need for another small café to serve the locals and visitors in our area.

Their current plan is to open a breakfast and lunch café. One of their daughters and grandchildren will relocate to the area full time to run the business and oversee operations.

We are very happy to learn that the building will be undergoing some much needed TLC. We look forward to spending a few afternoons sipping coffee at the Glades Building again.

Everglades City May 2019 City Council Meeting Highlights



There were some interesting moments during the City Council meeting held on May 7th.

Collier County Sheriff Officer Lt. Adam Hall reported that there was one Part 1 Burglary in town (breaking & entering, ransacking property) in the month of April. During the month, the department sent 340 extra patrols, had 28 traffic stops, 6 details and 6 public assists. There were 4 "suspicious incident" reports.

Fire Chief Kingman Schuldt reported that funding for the I-75 based fire station was finally approved after

several attempts and 7 months of lobbying in Tallahassee. The budget was approved at \$1.4 million per year, which is less than the \$1.6 million requested. The department must also contribute 10% (\$140,000) of their own funds for the station, but the Chief expressed relief that the funding is finally in place to keep the station open. Had funding not been secured, the team in Everglades City would have been responsible for calls on 75 in Collier County increasing response time on the highway and potentially in Everglades City, Chokoloskee and surrounding areas. We are thankful Chief Schuldt was able to get the job done!

Deb Logan, Executive Director of the Southwest FL Blue Zones Project in Collier County gave a presentation about bringing Blue Zones to Everglades City and the surrounding areas. Blue Zones promotes healthy eating by encouraging restaurants to add healthy options on their menus and encourages people to get outdoors and get moving. All participation is optional and there are no obligations if you do choose to participate. Blue Zones has helped Collier County become one of the top 10 healthiest places to live in America.

The contract with Century Link for the controversial tower replacement / potential tower relocation was also on the agenda. The much-debated topic that has frustrated many residents was unanimously approved as a replacement back in the center of town despite the fact that one year is still remaining on the current contract.

The City saw no reason to continue looking at other location options. During the discussion Councilman Tim Smith stated that "he does not even notice it anymore". No member of the Council opposed a new tower being erected in the center of town and voted to execute a new contract now (for 45 years) rather than wait until the existing contract expires in just over one year. The City will receive \$2000 per month and a \$10,000 lump payment to go towards attempting to mask the large structure with landscaping that will be surrounded by a tall chain-link fence in the town circle.

Assistant City Attorney Zach Lombardo provided an update the City's effort to obtain a grant to help fund the construction of a new sewer plant. The city was not successful in their efforts to obtain funding despite traveling to Tallahassee to make their case. Lombardo stated that the City will now focus on applying for other grants made available for areas impacted by Hurricane Irma.

In other news, Lombardo said the City is awaiting a response regarding the lawsuit with Violia (the former company that managed the sewer and waste water system). The two sides do not agree on what the City actually owes the company which is the basis of the lawsuit. US Water is the now the firm the City is using for the management of the sewer and waste water plant.

A Workshop will be held on May 21 at 6:30 pm to discuss the street lights. A Planning & Zoning meeting will be held on May 21 at 7 pm. The next City Council meeting will be held on June 4th at 7 pm.



A Message by Fire Chief Kingman Schuldt

May 5-11 was National Hurricane Preparedness Week. According to initial

hurricane predictions from hurricane experts, the 2019 season is expected to be slightly above average with a total of 14 named storms predicted, seven of which are expected to be hurricanes.

Florida is one of the most impacted states from hurricanes. In fact, the entire state is susceptible to hurricane damage. Because hurricanes can impact a large area in a variety of ways, it's important to determine the risks based on where you live. Determine today what types of wind and water hazards could happen where you live, and start preparing now.

It's important to take appropriate preparedness action. Have an emergency plan long before any storm threatens our community. Hurricane season runs from June 1-November 30 with the most active part of the season typically in late August & September. However, hurricanes have wreaked havoc as early as June and as late as November. Be sure to constantly monitor the latest weather information throughout this upcoming hurricane season.

Here are a few tips to prepare ahead of hurricane season:

Know your zone: Find out if you live in area hurricane evacuation contacting Collier County Emergency Management.

Put together a basic emergency kit: Check emergency equipment, such as flashlights, generators and storm shutters.

Write or review your family emergency plan: Before an emergency happens, sit down with your family or close friends and decide how you will get in contact with each other, where you will go, and what you will do in an emergency. Keep a copy of this plan in your emergency supplies kit or another safe place where you can access it in the event of a disaster. Start at the ready.gov emergency plan web page.

Review your insurance policies: Review your insurance policies to ensure that you have adequate coverage for your home and personal property.

Understand National Weather Service forecast products, especially the meaning of NWS watches and warnings.




From the Lens of Trenton Mayberry "Air plant on Driftwood"

My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock

I love being outside working in the garden. For most of my life I have been a garden person. I find tinkering in the garden relaxing. It is a way to lessen stress and forget about all of the other noise in life, that is, most of the time.

Recently (like right now!) I had a bit of a garden setback. I broke one of the rules in gardening, wearing gloves. I am pretty diligent about wearing them. I know the risks of getting cut or picking up some kind of infection from the dirt. But sometimes it is inconvenient and I break my own rule...and now I am paying for it with some kind of nasty funk on my finger. I will be heading to my third doctor appointment in one week to try to get it under control.

Everything around us has some good and not so good bacteria in it or on it. The soil is full of different types of bacteria and fungi. Animal waste, stagnant water, and different strains of strep virus all live in the dirt, and most of the time, our bodies can fight off whatever is in there. Most of the time.

If you have open cuts or punctures it can allow the bacteria or fungus in and then it starts it rapidly spreading. The reason bacteria and fungi spread so quickly is because the cells replicate, meaning 2 becomes 4 which becomes 8, then 16, and so on. Of course when you are working outside, getting cut or punctured by a plant is very common, which is why gloves are so important.



Hopefully, what I have is something they can treat once it is properly diagnosed. There is no way to be absolutely certain about when or how it happened, so I can provide little insight. But do know I was gardening, it showed up and here I am waiting on my next appointment.

I am guilty of breaking more than one rule of gardening too. When you do get cut or punctured, you really should immediately clean it out and apply some type of antibacterial ointment on it. Of course, I did not do this either. I have been cut hundreds of times and have rarely sprang into action to clean the wound and apply ointment to it. I will usually do this after I am done with my gardening chores.

The last time I went through something like this it was over two decades ago. Twenty years has a way of softening your response to things. I grew complacent because I was fortunate that nothing bad happened as a result of my failure to protect myself. Now I am back in full protect

It's sad that it often takes something bad to change a behavior. You would think just knowing that something could happen that you'd take the cautious route. Not me. I have been lucky, not smart. New day, new perspective!

So today, I pledge my allegiance to gloves. Not cotton gloves, the ones with water repellent rubber. I will never minimize the importance of them again (I hope!). I will wear them even when it is hot, and I vow to go inside to clean my wounds as they happen. I even have a new slogan, MAWGA. Make America Wear Gloves Again!

2 yellow squash, sliced


1/4 cup butter (half stick)



Living Gulf Coast by Charles Sobczak

Lubber Grasshopper (Romalea guttata) Other names: eastern lubber / Status: FL=thriving / Life span: n/a / Length: 1.5-4 in. (38-101 mm) / Reproduces in the under story of uplands habitat, the immature lubbers look much like crickets / Found: Throughout SW Florida

This large, unmistakable grasshopper is brightly colored for good reason. Like many other poisonous, venomous or toxic animals, the lubber

grasshopper proudly displays its bright colors as a warning to birds, snakes and other predators that it is inedible. This is the reason why these large, flightless grasshoppers are so easy to spot. When threatened, they quickly raise their wings defiantly and bubble out a



poisonous froth. The can also shunt poisons from the toxic plants they eat, making them anything but a tasty snack.

Lubbers are herbivores, dining on various leaves, berries and grasses. The immature lubber is black with yellow markings and looks very similar to an oversized cricket. The primary cause of lubber mortality does not come from the outside, but from within. Lubbers appear to be especially vulnerable to parasites that consume the grasshopper from the inside out. The loggerhead shrike, a predatory passerine bird in

Florida, has learned to impale lubbers on barbed wire fences or other spikes and wait until their poisons dry out before dining on them. Look for large lubbers in the late summer and fall in dry, inland habitats.

There are more than a dozen species of other grasshoppers in SW Florida and scores of species in Florida, and more than 11,000 species worldwide. They are commonly eaten in Mexico, Africa and China. The most notorious of this species are locusts, whose massive swarms decimate crops in the Sahal of Africa as well as throughout Central and South America.

Velvet Ant (Family Mutillidae) Other names: cow killer, cow ant, red velvet ant / Status: FL=stable / Life span: 50 to 60 days, varies with different species / Length: 0.5-0.75 in. (12-19 mm) / Reproduces by means of parasitic behavior on bee and wasp larvae / Found: UA, IW.

The velvet ant is not an ant at all. It is a wasp, and only the females are wingless. A



male velvet ant looks far more like a traditional wasp than does the female. In fact the two sexes can vary so much visually, that unless they are caught in the act of mating, most people would never consider them to be part of the same species. The scientific term for this is called sexual dimorphism.

The female velvet ant is covered in a heavily textured hair-like material that grows out of an extremely tough exoskeleton. The reason for this insect version of armor plating is that she is a parasitic insect. The female velvet ant lays her

egg on the mature larva of both bees and wasps, and because she is constantly invading hornet and bees nests, she can be stung repeatedly in her attempts to propagate. When her eggs hatch the larvae kills and eats the host pupa.

There are more than 5,000 species of this flightless wasp worldwide, with more than 400 in North America alone. They are not common on the islands but can be spotted crossing shell roads or along the bike paths where they look like oversized red and black ants. Velvet ants are not aggressive but will deliver a nasty sting if provoked. They are taken by birds, lizards and snakes but because their sting is quite nasty, not as often as more defenseless insects. *Photo of lubber grasshoppers by Hung V Do*

Well, I got back from my lodge in Brazil April 30th. I started fishing on May 2nd and have been out everyday since

The Snook fishing has been great! Big fish are coming out of the backcountry and feeding around the islands. Bait has been plentiful and the fish are fat.



Top water lures in the morning makes for some exciting action. But a jig is also producing some nice fish. Of course, live baits are working

too.

Tarpon are still around and some of the fish we are catching are 150 lbs. They are on the outside also, and the incoming tide seems best. Tarpon are being caught on a variety of lures and bait, from buck tails to live crabs.

Reds are still biting but they are not as plentiful as they were before I left for Brazil. I have been catching a few good sized fish but mostly small 16"-17" fish. It is nice to see all the undersize fish.

Seatrout are also still on the grass flats but with all the winds still blowing it is hard to fish for them most days. We are also catching Trout on the bars and in some deeper holes while Snook fishing. The weather is great and I am enjoying the bite!

Rains are starting and things will continue to change. If you not sure what to fish right now, cast a jig!

About the Fakahatchee Strand

The Fakahatchee Strand Preserve State Park is perhaps the best example of a subtropical, strand swamp in the United States. The Fakahatchee Strand is a linear swamp forest, approximately twenty miles long by five miles wide and oriented from north to south. The Strand harbors one of the largest concentrations and diversity of native orchids in North America, and supports numerous rare and endangered animal species. It is also one of the core areas of the current range of the Florida Panther.

The Strand's 85,000 acres are part of the main drainage slough of the Big Cypress Swamp. The Fakahatchee Strand is linked hydrologically to the Everglades system and is particularly important to the estuarine ecosystem of the Ten Thousand Islands area.

Taxing Things by Mike "the Tax Guy" Klein Record Keeping for Small Businesses

Small business owners should keep good records. Whether they cut hair or cut lawns, keeping good records is an important part of running a successful business.

Here are some questions and answers to help business owners understand the ins and outs of good record keeping.

Why should business owners keep records? Good records will help:

Monitor the progress of their business, prepare financial statements, identify income sources, keep track of expenses, prepare tax returns and support items reported on tax returns

What kinds of records should owners keep? Small business owners may choose any record keeping system that fits their business. They should choose one that clearly shows income and expenses. Except in a few cases, the law does not require special kinds of records.

How should businesses record transactions? A good record keeping system includes a summary of all business transactions. These are usually kept in books called journals and ledgers, which business owners can buy at an office supply store. All requirements that apply to hard copy books and records also apply to electronic business records.

What is the burden of proof? The responsibility to validate information on tax returns is known as the burden of proof. Small business owners must be able to prove expenses to deduct them.

How long should businesses keep employment records? Business owners should keep all records of employment taxes for at least four years, and they should keep tax records for three years.
