Everglades City School Got an "A" Rating What does that Really Mean? By Kathy Brock

Now that it is official, it would be a good time to better understand it. What does an "A" grade actually mean for Everglades City School? How did our small school achieve this ranking for the first time in the grading system's 20-year history?

According to the website www.stateimpact.org. "The Florida Department of Education has a formula for grading schools. Every year the state gives each public K-12 school an A through F letter grade." For kindergarten through middle school, school letter grades are based on a schools FCAT scores. But for high schools, there is a new formula. Only 50 percent of a high schools grade comes from FCAT results.

Here's the breakdown of how high schools are measured:

- There are a total of 1600 points a high school can earn.
- ♦ 800 points: come from a schools FCAT scores
- ♦ 300 points: come from graduation rates
- ♦ 200 points: come from college readiness, which is measured by SAT results
- ♦ 175 points: come from student participation in college-level classes, like Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), and Dual Enrollment where students can earn actual college credit as well as high school credit. As well as Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) courses.
- ♦ 125 points: come from performance in college-level courses, meaning whether students earn college-credit for the college-level courses they enroll in.

To try and understand the system's impact on the quality of education is a bit more difficult. Florida is one of only 15 states to use such a rating system. Proponents point out that the grading system provides some type of measurement as to a school's progress. Is there improvement? What are the problem areas? This is what the grade is supposed to highlight.

Critics point out that the school grades are almost in perfect alignment with socioeconomic status. Florida's household median income (HHI) is \$50,000. In school districts where the HHI exceeds \$50,000, the average school grade is an A. In districts where the HHI falls below \$38,800, the average grade slips to a C.

Schools like Everglades City School can really feel the pinch because of small school population too.

In the case of high school rating where graduation rate is tied to the school grade, a small class size makes each students performance critical to the overall grade. In a graduating class of 10 students, each student represents 10% of the overall score. Compare that with a school of 1000 students (where 100 students would represent 10%) and it is easy to see how our small size makes it difficult to sustain.

Me, I admit that I am not a big fan of "grading" the schools—I see little upside in calling a school out for a struggling student body, but I will also admit it feels good to know ours got an A, regardless of the criteria used. I cannot see how labeling a school an "F" is fair to students or the staff. An honor student at an F school feels shame for something they have zero control over. It cannot be motivating for staff either. It just seems counter-intuitive. But, it is the system we use for now in Florida.

Currently, Florida is one of 15 States to participate in this annual school-grading ritual...and our little, tiny school is finally able to take a bow and appreciate what last year's class was able to do...against the odds... and only 2 years removed from the devastating impact from Hurricane Irma.. The bottom line is that we are proud of our kids and very appreciative of the dedicated staff that greets them each morning. Thank you for making us all very proud!



A Message From Fire Chief Kingman Schuldt

Did you know that an estimated 500,000 pets are year affected each fires? Did you also know that

pets can sometimes contribute to the start of a fire that could result in injuries of pets and even family members?

July 15 is recognized each year nationally as Pet Fire Safety Day to help bring awareness and provide education to pet owners on how to reduce the risk of losing their beloved pet in a fire or pets causing a catastrophic fire. Here are some safety tips to keep in mind for your furry loved ones:

- ◆ Keep pets away from cooking equipment. Remove stove knobs or cover them before leaving home.
- ♦ Keep candles and lamps out of the path of pets and their tails. Investing in flameless candles can add further protection.
- ♦ Keep pets from chewing on cords or
- ♦Do not use space heaters or other electrical heating devices in a room where pets have access.
- ♦ Secure young pets in a crate or behind a
- ♦ Place your pet's crate near an entrance to make it easier for firefighters to rescue them in a fire.
- ♦ Include your pet in your family's emergency disaster plan.

Here is How to Keep Pets Safe In the Event of a Fire

- ◆ Keep your dog's collar on at all times and place leashes near the door so first responders can use them to lead pets to
- ♦ If you live in a fire-prone area or are concerned about a fire potentially starting, consider installing monitored smoke detectors so firefighters will be notified of and can respond to a fire even if you're
- ♦ Have an emergency plan and practice routes of escape with your dog. Include all members of the family in this plan. Make sure they know what to do and where to go.
- ♦ Make an emergency kit that you can easily grab on the way out. Pack a leash, medication, and any immediate needs your family and dog might have for the next few days.

Golf Cart Rules 101

The First Thing To Know is that the Rules are Different in Different Communities Chokoloskee & Plantation's Rules Differ from Everglades City

Well, *The MULLET RAPPER'S* first attempt to celebrate Chokoloskee & Plantation getting approved as "golf cart" communities went a little off course (pun intended). It seems the rules are a bit different in Chokoloskee & Plantation, which are governed by the rules set forth by Collier County. Everglades City has its own set of rules as an independent municipality. We reached out to Sgt. Adam Hall of the Collier County Sheriff's Office to

clarify what the rules are and how we can all expect to see them enforced. Here is what we found out...

Minimum Age: The minimum age for an unlicensed driver to operate a Golf Cart in Chokoloskee and Plantation is 15. In Everglades City it is 14.

Hours you can operate a Golf Cart: In Chokoloskee & Plantation, you can only use the cart during the daylight hours, you cannot use the cart at night. In Everglades City, you may operate the cart anytime of day providing your golf cart has headlights, brake lights, directional signals, reflectivity on the sides of the cart, and a windshield. However, in Everglades City, you must be at least 18 years of age to operate a golf cart after sunset.

Where to use them: Golf carts may only be operated on county roads and streets on Chokoloskee and Plantation Islands, with exception of Plantation Pky. from approximately 850 feet north of Spoonbill Ave to CR29 and also on CR29 from approximately 1120 feet north of Demere Ln north to end of County Maintenance (approximately 2750 feet south of Plantation Pkwy). Signs have been installed in both areas to show people where they are and are not allowed to operate a golf cart. In Everglades City you must not drive a golf cart on CR 29 (Collier Ave).

Number of Occupants: The number of occupants in any golf cart operated by an unlicensed driver must not exceed the number of seats on the golf cart and none of the occupants are permitted to stand on the golf cart while it is in motion.



Unlicensed Drivers: In Chokoloskee & Plantation, before a golf cart can be operated by an unlicensed driver, the owner must first purchase and maintain liability insurance insuring against personal injury and property damage. In Everglades City, it is recommended that operators of golf carts have insurance.

If you are still unclear about the rules in your community, read the ordinances. Below there is a link. You can also reach out to the Collier Sheriff's Office with any questions.

A Message From Everglades City School Principal Cheryl Allison






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Storm Takes Down Bat House Animals Saved With Quick Action

My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock

The USA Today and locally, the Naples News recently published an article on how dogs are being used in medical testing by the Veterans Administration for various health issues veterans may face. As the daughter of a WWII veteran, and daughter-in-law of a man I never met because he died as a result of medical problems related to the Viet Nam war, I am very sensitive to veterans causes...but this story took me by surprise.

Animal testing has been a hot topic for decades. My article in the January 12th, 2019 edition outlined my thoughts about the monkey farms in Florida...specifically, what these primates are bred for (medical testing) and the risks they could present to our state.

However, reading the very graphic descriptions of the tests being performed on dogs left me thinking that there must be a better way. I want to preface my comments by saying that I understand if you or someone you know could benefit by such research, your opinion may be different. However, by the VA's own admission, the last time any medical breakthrough came about because of testing on dogs was in 1960...so that is a lot of time and a lot of testing in between resulting in nothing at all.

Yes. I am more sensitive to this because I have had a dog 90% of my life...only during a few college years have I been "dogless". I know how sensitive they are. I know how fearful they can be. They are truly domesticated, meaning they rely on us...because we bred them to. They are referred to as "man's best friend". But, we sure don't always return the affection...

Whenever a person, business, government has a goal, and makes public the goal (lower taxes, better jobs, medical discovery, etc.) you cannot ONLY measure the achievement of the goal. The path we use to get there matters.

We need to make sure that we are not slowly and surely eroding our humanity and our empathy in the name of "achievement". Even if something good eventually comes from an action or actions, if a path of destruction is left in its wake, we lose far more than we gain. We lose our humanity.

Placing a pacemaker in a dog, then placing him on a treadmill...while tweaking the pacemaker causes terrible pain to the animal. Deliberately severing the spinal column to "test the coughing reflex" is not something that makes me feel all warm and fuzzy and patriotic. Is this the only way this can be tested? One thing that gave me some peace was knowing the animals are euthanized shortly after the very painful process. At least their suffering stops at some point.

I do understand how someone afflicted by paralysis would want testing to take place that could potentially help them. Looking back several decades will show that testing of all kinds was commonplace. However, when many of the details about the tests were revealed publicly, there was outrage because much of it was beyond our comprehension. It was outrageous!

Our history as a nation on this subject is very sketchy. In the drive for discovery we have shown that we do not always take the moral high-ground. Sometimes we veer off -course to save money or save time or to spike profits.

We need to keep these issues in front of the public so we are aware of what is going on behind closed doors, and make adjustments to get us back on track...

1/2 cup crushed walnuts





Preheat oven to 350°. Melt butter in 13 x 9 x 2 pan. Combine crumbs and sugar and mix with butter. Press mixture into the bottom evenly. Pour the can of sweetened condensed milk evenly over crumb mix. Spread chocolate chips, nuts and coconut on top of milk. With your hands, gently press it down so they come into contact with the milk. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes. Let cool completely and cut into bars. You can also use butterscotch chips, different nuts, or Reese's Pieces. It's an easy base recipe to make whatever you want!

Stargazing in the Everglades Meteor Showers Light Up the Sky On July 28th and in August

July 28th, Delta Aquarids Meteor Shower - The Delta Aquarids are an annual meteor shower that will peak on July 28th of this year. At its peak, the shower is known to produce up to 20 meteors per hour. The radiate for this shower is within the constellation Aquarius, so your best viewing will be 30° - 40° away from that spot. This allows you to see the long meteor trails streak across the sky. The Delta Aquarids are known to stretch out for days, even weeks before and after the peak, so if you miss the crescendo, be sure to look for the Delta Aquarids in the days afterward.

August 13th, Perseids Meteor Shower - The Perseids are arguably one of the best meteor showers to see in 2019. The Perseids are comprised of dust particles from the Comet Swift-Tuttle that shoot through the sky at up to 60 meteors per hour, especially at its peak after midnight on August 13th. Although the radiant is within the constellation Perseus, it is possible for meteors to shoot through any part of the night sky. Because the Perseids Meteor Shower produces a lot of bright meteors, this a opportunity for budding photographers to capture a meteor shower, as long you are in a dark sky location (Note: Everglades City & Chokoloskee recognized dark sky locations!).



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Taxing Things by Mike the Tax Guy THE TAX-EXEMPT APPLICATION PROCESS



Organizations that want to apply for tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the tax code use a Form 1023-series application. Here are some things

organizations should know to help them understand the process:

The application must be complete. It must also include the user fee.

There are a few types of organizations that do not need to apply for 501(c)(3) status to be tax-exempt. These are churches and their integrated auxiliaries, and also public charities whose annual gross receipts are normally less than \$5,000.

An employer identification number is an organization's account number with the IRS and is required for the organization to apply for tax exempt status. Every tax-exempt organization, including a church, should have an EIN regardless of whether the organization has employees. After getting an EIN, the organization must include it on the application. Organizations may get an EIN by calling 1-800-829-4933 or by applying online.

Generally, an organization that is required to apply for recognition of exemption must notify the IRS within 27 months from the date it was formed.

When the IRS determines an organization qualifies for exemption under Section 501(c)(3), it will also be classified as a foundation, unless the organization meets the requirements to be treated as a public charity.

A charitable organization must make certain documents available to the public. These include its approved application for recognition of exemption with all supporting documents and its last three annual information returns.

The organization must provide copies of these documents upon request. The organization may charge a reasonable fee for reproduction and copying costs. Organizations that fail to comply may face penalties.




The swallow-tailed kite, like the magnificent frigate bird, is an impressive bird to witness in flight. In fact, you are most likely to spot and identify this bird when it is soaring high above. With its pure white body, large black-tipped wings and deeply forked black tail, this bird resembles an enormous, snowy barn swallow.

Unlike most of the migratory birds that arrive in Florida, the swallowtailed kite comes up from Central and South America during the

summer. In effect, Florida is its northern breeding grounds. Once a common nesting

habitat loss through most of its former North American range.



There is a small resident nesting population at Corkscrew Swamp on the mainland, and more than likely some of the birds found flying over Lee County originate from there. They predominantly eat flying insects including dragonflies, bees, and beetles but while in flight will also pick off snakes, crickets, cicadas, and small birds from the canopy top. A skilled flyer, the swallow-tailed kite can turn its tail feathers almost 90 degrees, allowing it to make sharp turns and quick dives. Its only long-term threat is habitat loss, although some efforts are under way to reintroduce the kite into its former northernmost ranges.

Author's Note: Over the past several years Sanibel and Captiva Islands have witnessed a steady increase in the resident swallowtailed kite population, as has much of southwest Florida. They can be found almost daily

effortlessly above the Sanibel Post Office or along San-Cap Road. There are several confirmed nesting sites currently established on the island and we seem to have a permanent kite population here on the islands. Once extremely rare throughout all the barrier islands of Florida, this migrant from South America has rebounded to the point where we can enjoy watching this charismatic bird on a regular basis.

Vermont has its leafpeepers. Munich has Oktoberfest. Here in South Florida, we celebrate the fall season with swamp walks in the

Big Cypress National Preserve. Join us on October 26 & 27 at Clyde Butcher's Big Cypress Gallery and take a walk on the wild side!

Clyde and Niki Butcher host a fall festival at their Big Cypress Gallery in October every year. As part of the fun, special swamp walks behind the gallery are available for the brave (and not-so-brave) at heart.

The walks are \$50 per person (kids 17-and-under are free, no tickets required) with 100% of the proceeds supporting the Swamp Water and Me Program (SWAMP) in Big Cypress National Preserve. SWAMP is an outdoor science education program that introduces thousands of 6th-grade students from Collier County to the Big Cypress every year on school field trips.

Walks are offered both days in the morning and afternoon. Sign up to arrive between 9 AM and 12 noon for a morning walk, or between 12 noon and 3 PM for an afternoon walk, and you'll be assigned to the next available walk when you arrive on Saturday or Sunday. Walks will leave every half hour, rain-or-shine.



What to know: Be prepared to get wet. The walks are approximately 2-hours long and water levels may be waist deep in places with submerged obstacles and uneven terrain. Wear closed-toe shoes, clothes that can get wet and/or muddy (long pants, a long-sleeved shirt, and shoes with laces that will stay on your feet), and bring some dry clothes to change into after your walk. Children must be over 48 inches tall for the standard 2-hour walk. We will have special walks that are less strenuous for families with young children.

Here We Go Again.. S. American Thrips Seen as a Possible Way to Control Invasive Brazilian Pepper Trees

In late June in Florida, a group of scientists released about 1000 thrips (small insects) that feast on the, very difficult to control, Brazilian Pepper tree.

Throughout our history it seems we see the same movie playing out over and over again...

We create a problem and then we try to come up with a solution, and often that solution comes with a laundry list of other problems *it causes*, but not this time, say scientists.

Brazilian pepper is a hearty, leafy green shrub or small tree that produces thousands of red berries birds love. The seeds pass through the birds undigested spreading the plant's seeds in their feces.

The plant also sends suckers off of the roots so there is a double-whammy in the proliferation of the trees.

With progress in eradication slow and expensive, enter science! The thrips, their scientific name is Pseudophilothrips ichini, eat only the Brazilian pepper (Much like a monarch only eats milkweed), and they prefer the tips which interferes with the plant's ability to flower (seed).

The researchers are confident that the bugs won't turn to another plant if and when all of the Brazilian Peppers are gone so the risk is viewed as minimal to non-existent.

The critical hurdle is what's called a starvation test. Only insects that prefer to starve rather than eat a plant other than Brazilian pepper were considered. This thrip passed with flying colors.

Up to this point all tests have been performed in quarantine but now is a new phase where the federal government has issued a permit to allow for the release of this insect in Florida. The next phase is to see how it establishes, and whether it is good and hungry and doing its job when it's out there. Let's keep our fingers crossed!

Sea Turtle Hatchlings Emerging, Females Still Laying Eggs

Loggerhead turtles are the predominant turtles seen nesting in Southwest Florida. They make their way ashore from May to August.

Eggs incubate for approximately 60 days. Some females were seen as early as late April this year meaning those eggs, and those from early May, are now ready to emerge.

Most often, the young will do this at night, but sometimes beachgoers get a special show with the nestlings emerging from their nest during daylight hours.

Night lights on the beaches cause much confusion for the hatchlings. They are drawn to the light at night. For this reason, shore lights are restricted during nesting season.

If you see a nest of hatchlings or a nesting female, please to not disturb them in any way. If you see hatchlings at night, flash photography can also lead them astray.

Enjoy our beautiful sea turtles, but please do so from a respectful distance. Their survival depends upon our care and cooperation.

Florida Ranks Last in Mental Healthcare Spending

If you consider mental health critically important to the wellbeing of our children and our state, then you may want to start a letter writing campaign.

In a series put out by the News Press and Naples Daily News, it was pointed out that Florida has no mental health czar, and no agency that is looking at the problem.

What's more, Florida spends the least per day per person (\$36) than any other state in the country. Last. Only Puerto Rico has fewer resources going towards mental healthcare, with their spending at \$20 per day per person.

The problem is so far reaching reporters found that children in crisis under the State's Baker Act often have to wait several days and travel several hours to obtain sufficient care.

Southwest Florida is one of the oldest areas in the State demographically however, there is a lack of children's treatment providers, programs and funding.

In a Forbes report from 2010, the Naples/ Marco Island area ranked as the number one area for wealthy retirees and Fortune 500 executives. The area ranked third in the country for per-capita income (2010 Census).

It is true that the area was once thought of as only a "retirement" community. But that is no longer the case. Young families moved in and the area is much more diverse than it was only a decade ago.

It is time for Florida and Collier County to catch up with the changing population and allocate the necessary resources to help these children in need.

Early intervention can mean the difference between an temporary mental heath setback or an entire lifetime of mental health issues.
