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New Land Acquisition in EC

The recent land acquisition of over 11,000 acres in the Green Heart of the Everglades area which encompass Everglades City raises both hopes and concerns in our community. While preserving this natural wonder is crucial, there are valid worries within our community about the potential impacts.

In the 1970s, Big Cypress and Florida Panther National Wildlife Refuges (NWR) were established. However, the mineral rights were excluded from the original acquisition due to insufficient funding for the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF). The Collier Companies retain the ability to extract oil from the land, and acquiring these mineral rights is essential to permanently safeguarding the Green Heart of the Greater Everglades, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. This acquisition is crucial for preserving diverse wildlife, including the Florida Black Bear, Gopher Tortoise, American Crocodile, wading birds, and Florida Panthers, while also addressing urban development impacts and emphasizing our commitment to long-term sustainability.

On one hand, there's a sense of relief that there will never be oil drilling in the preserve and preserving the Everglades ensures that our ecosystem remains intact for future generations.

However, some draw parallels to the past when Big Cypress became a preserve, leading to the cessation of tour company operations. They fear a potential repeat of history and the loss of livelihoods and their rich heritage passed down through generations.

So, we're in this "wait-and-see" mode, curious and hopeful about how all this will shake out for our community. Here's to hoping it's a win-win that keeps the Everglades and our community flourishing!



Bio Blitz! The Bio Blitz takes place on a series of seven different dates. Those interested in volunteering may participate in as many, or as few, Blitzes as they would like. What is a Bio Blitz, you ask? Great question! 


concludes, you are encouraged to remain and enjoy the park at your leisure.



Port Dupont by Lila Zuck



Port DuPont wasn't just a turnaround in the road in 1927, it was known to be "a model industry city of Florida," the base of operations for the construction of an engineering wonder ... the Tamiami Trail.

Selected a century ago by Barron G. Collier for its proximity to the Tamiami Trail and accessibility to the Barron River, Port DuPont was the well-oiled engine that kept eleven dredges operational at all times as they inched forward through a stratus of limestone conglomerate laid down during the Pleistocene era after Florida emerged from the ocean.

Beneath the swampy surface, this layer became so hard, nearing the texture of granite in places and flint in others, that the only way to break through was by blasting. The dredge moved the blasted material, some pieces weighing over a ton, onto a spoil bank, where crews broke it up and compacted it to form the roadbed.

"Sufficient money, excellent men and superb machinery," as noted by Chief Engineer D. Graham Copeland, "made it possible to complete the portion of the Tamiami Trail through Collier County. This stupendous undertaking may be summed up in the words Quick, Quiet, Quality."

Before 1922, when the first few shops were built, a sugar mill at Port DuPont produced from nine to ten thousand gallons of syrup each winter from Everglades-grown cane. It was also the site of a packing house for citrus brought by supply train from the Deep Lake groves.

After the old shops were destroyed by fire in 1926, new shops were built in 1927 and equipped with the most modern equipment available.

The men running the machine shops were the best in their trade. They were dedicated, innovative and driven. Some parts of the walking dredge had to be replaced every two days. When replacement parts were needed sooner than they could be delivered from Tampa, the men made them on site.

In charge of the shipyard and two boat-ways, for large and small boats, was J.T. "Dode" Russell who, it was said, "knows the waters of Southern Florida as any ordinary mortal knows his own home." He came to Florida in 1893.

Only of a Swiss could it be said that "he puts as much time and exercise and as much care in the making of a large drill as a watchmaker does in building a watch." He was 75-year old John Brandt, "Uncle John," who came to the United States from Switzerland in 1888, and to Port DuPont from California in 1923.

Succeeding G.C. Wilson in charge of all the work at Port DuPont in 1927 was H.W. Bristol, an industrial and mechanical engineer who had built highways in North Carolina.

A physician by trade, Dr. J.C. Edmundoze was a mechanic at heart. He served in the Spanish American War and World War I before coming to Florida to work on the Tamiami Trail and to Collier County in 1924 to manage the machine shop at Port DuPont.

A power plant across the river from Port DuPont, consisting of a 155 VA alternator powered by a 240 horsepower Fairbanks-Morse diesel engine supplied both Port DuPont and the Town of Everglades with 24-hour electrical service. A 15-ton ice plant supplied those cities as well as Caxambas, Deep Lake and the Trail.

Fourteen miles away, the Deep Lake Railroad supplied the Port DuPont wood-working shop with logs three times a day. They were cut into lumber at the shop.

Eight to ten thousand gallons of gasoline a week to run the machinery and supply neighboring communities were brought to Port DuPont from Fort Myers by a fleet of Collier Company boats.

A year before the Tamiami Trail opened in 1928, of Collier County it was said "The pioneer days in this section are rapidly coming to an end."

White Ibis - The Clean Up Crew by Denise Wauters




I affectionately dub these guys "the clean-up crew." Every morning, like clockwork, this White Ibis gang parades through my yard, diligently scouring the ground for their bug-filled breakfast. The adults, adorned with white feathers, black wingtips, red legs, and curved bills, take the lead. Meanwhile, the younger members sport brown plumage with streaked necks and vibrant orange legs, tag-along.

These daily visitors aren't just a visual delight; they play a vital role in our ecosystem. Their yard-cleaning routine keeps the insect population in check, earning them the title of the ultimate clean-up crew.

Sporting a wingspan of 3.1 to 3.5 feet and a weight ranging from 1.5 to 2.3 pounds, the White Ibis favors wetland, expertly foraging in shallow waters and congregating in large groups. Egrets especially love tagging along with White Ibises because the Ibises stir up the waters and allow egrets to catch prey without much effort.

Alongside my morning coffee, I eagerly await their daily visits. It's fun watching them squabble over dining territory.

SAWFISH NEWS

Respect-Release-Report: Guidelines for Interactions with Endangered Sawfish in the United States

Sawfish are majestic marine animals that were once found in coastal waters of the United States from Texas to North Carolina. Unfortunately, decades of mortality in fisheries and the loss of important nursery habitats led to dramatic reductions in both their numbers and range. Now they are

generally only found in Florida and most commonly in southwest Florida around Everglades National Park. Sawfish are federally protected as an endangered species under the Endangered Species Act and need your help to survive and avoid extinction.

RESPECT | Divers

The most important thing to remember when viewing a sawfish is to not disrupt its natural behavior. If a sawfish swims away because of your presence, then you are too close. So, if you are lucky enough to see a sawfish while diving, please keep your distance and don't chase, feed, or touch any sawfish you encounter.

RELEASE | Anglers


While it is technically illegal to catch a sawfish, captures do occur while fishing for other species. If you catch a sawfish, leave the sawfish, especially the gills in the water at all times. Do not lift it out of the water onto your boat or a pier, and do not drag it ashore. Only if it can be done safely and with the sawfish in the water, untangle any fishing line wrapped around the rostrum or saw. Always cut the line as close to the hook as is safely possible. Release as quickly as possible. Don't use a gaff or ropes to secure or handle a sawfish. It is illegal to remove a sawfish's rostrum; sawfish use their rostrum for detecting and catching food so removing the rostrum ultimately leads to starvation.

REPORT | Everyone

If you see or catch a sawfish, note its estimated total length, and the date, time, and your location with GPS coordinates if available. Please share the information by visiting <u>www.SawfishRecovery.org</u>, calling 1-844-4SAWFISH, emailing <u>sawfish@myfwc.com</u>, or entering the details in the FWC Reporter App.

The ultimate goal is to recover the United States population of smalltooth sawfish to the point that it no longer needs the protections of the act.

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How To Research Retirement Communities

Thinking of a retirement community or nursing home? If you are, there are several things you need to think about and do a little research on before you decide. Maybe these few suggestions will help.

Start researching early. Don't wait until you must begin your search. Many good places have a waiting list, so it's important you get your name on the list of the place you have decided upon.

Review promotional material before visiting. Write down various questions you may have. Look beyond the marketing information. You need to visit each one you are thinking about to get an accurate picture.

Schedule an appointment to visit various places. A tour should last about one to two hours. Never visit more than two in one day. You need to be fresh and alert.

Get detailed answers to all your questions. Review with the representative your specific needs and concerns. Write the answers down for your later review.

Try to notice everything when visiting. How do the grounds look? Do residents seem active? Is the community clean and well maintained. Can you imagine yourself living there?

Carefully look at the Health Care component. This is not easy for some people, but it is probably the main reason you are considering moving. Every health care center must be routinely examined by the Florida State Health Department.

Obtain a copy of recent activity calendars. Maybe you could attend a resident function. Is it an active community?

Get a copy of the most recent financial statement. It will tell you about the solvency and competency of the company managing the retirement community and health care facility.

Find out who owns the community and manages it. Many times they are different companies with various types of relationships.

Discover how much voice you have as a resident. Is there a Resident Council and what does it do? Is there resident involvement?

Get detailed answers to health-related questions. What can, and cannot, be provided medically? What type of licensing does the community have? What is the community contractually obligated to provide? What extra charges are there? Go through many "What if . . " scenarios to make sure all your concerns are addressed. Remember, if it is not in writing, don't believe it!

Find out about monthly increases. What controls are in place to keep increases at a minimum?

Talk to residents. Find out if they are happy with their decision to reside there. Residents are your best source of information.

Have dinner with other residents. Don't eat with the marketing staff. Try to be observant. How is the menu selection? How is the service? How is the meal presentation. Do the residents seem happy and content?

Get your children involved. Maybe they can visit a few of the places with you.

Don't be pressured, but don't procrastinate. If it is a good thing, it will be there tomorrow. But don't wait too long. Try to have a time frame established in your mind. This type of careful research will be needed more and more by more than half our population in the next few years. So, it's never too soon to get started. Good Luck!



In 2021 the Florida Wildlife Corridor Act was signed into law after decades of work

from conservationists, scientists, politicians, and many others. The Corridor is a statewide network of connected lands and waters that supports wildlife and people.

Last month I attended the Florida Wildlife Corridor Summit in Orlando to give a presentation about Everglades City as part of the breakout session entitled "Trail Towns: Connecting Communities to the Corridor." Everglades City was designated a State Trail Town in 2019 by the Office of Greenways & Trails, and each year we have provided annual updates on the progress of the specific objectives of our Action Plan. Visit https://floridadep.gov/parks/ogt/content/trailtown-program to learn more about Trail Towns.

Senator Kathleen Passidomo spoke to the attendees via video and mentioned connectivity between the Trail Towns. Visit Florida announced that they will start marketing the 18 designated Trail Towns this month, especially the Trail Towns in rural communities. Everglades City will certainly benefit from these initiatives.

The Summit was extremely informative and provided everyone the opportunity to connect and network with environmentalists, elected officials, FDOT, university consultants, non-profits, researchers, conservationists, and many more like-minded people interested in preserving wild Florida. He said he decided to talk on Earth Day in 1980 after arriving in Washington, D.C., when he believed he finally had something to say after listening to people during his long journey. 
