Fishing In November

This month you can expect the Redfish and Snook to continue to bite!

Capt. Kyle McMillin has been catching his on the outside Islands during the rising tide. Live bait, cut bait, shrimp and jigs will all produce. Catching

the Reds before the tide floods out is critical. Once the tide floods out these fish are back in the roots foraging for crabs and small bait fish. It will be hard to catch them until the tide drops again forcing them out of their cover

Snook fishing has been good both outside and back country. This month is always good in the rivers on the outgoing tides. Look for ambush points and drop a bait in. Hold on because the big ones are around and you might also hook a big Jewfish.

Tarpon are usually here all month as they travel south. Some of my biggest Tarpon have been caught in November. Fish up to nearly 200 lbs. Not that I target these guys a lot but when they get aggressive on the Mullet it gets pretty easy to hook up.

All the winter species should also start showing up. So it is a great month for not just our favorite targets but also a good variety. So get some live shrimp from your local bait store and have a great day on the water!



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Along Our Shores by Lila Zuck



In 1958, the United States filled a Canadian order for 56 Americanmade Bomarc missiles, designed to be fitted with nuclear weapons. Before they could be delivered the missiles had to be tested and those tests took place along our shores.

Earlier that year, the U.S. Air Force flew over the Gulf Coast of Florida, searching for possible locations for several missile

tracking stations as part of the ground-to-air Bomarc Missile Program. After sites were selected and legally secured, the U.S. Corps of Engineers prepared them, bulldozing tropical growth, paving roads, and establishing water and electrical systems on each site. The Air Force contracted Vitro Weapons Service, a Division of Vitro Corporation of America, to construct buildings and missile tracking instrumentation on each site.

The test range sites extended southward 450 miles along the west coast of Florida from Eglin Air Force Base in the western Panhandle to Cudjoe Key, 23 miles east of Key West.

The test sites were A-20 on Santa Rosa Island, D-3 on Cape San Blas near Panama City, D-4 near Tarpon Springs, D-7 on Marco Island, and D-8 at Cudjoe Key. Each station's tracking radar and communications antennas tracked targets and weapons within five yards for 500 miles and accurate to one-tenth of one mile and transmitted the data to a centralized control point at Eglin Air Force Base.

Vitro Laboratories, a second Division of Vitro Corporation and the U.S. Navy's Systems Engineering Coordinator, operated the Marco Station, including the hiring of personnel, which at the height of the program reached 108 employees. Vitro's office was at Goodland.

For a brief six years, Vitro employees assimilated effortlessly into the Collier County community, joining the local softball and bowling leagues and civic clubs. The women organized the Vitro Wives Club, which organized committees designed to promote a healthy lifestyle by inviting a diversity of local speakers to their meetings, who covered topics ranging from communicable diseases to landscaping for the smaller home, floral arrangements and even hair styles. The ladies also hosted fun-filled events such as annual Easter egg hunts, Halloween

Costume parties and covered dish suppers at Cambier Park.

In 1961, Vitro hosted an open house at the Tracking Station, during which 814 visitors toured the grounds and were briefed on each step in the missile tracking process. That year, the Air Force announced plans to launch the Nike-Cajun rocket, equipped with an infrared measuring device, twice a month at night, from the Marco Missile Tracking Station.

For undisclosed reasons, in October 1961 plans to use Marco as a launch site were dropped and boat warning notices were lifted. Had the launches taken place, they would have been the first from a site other than Eglin, where all the launches were made.

In cooperation with the Collier County Board of Public Instruction and the Florida State Department of Education, Vitro Vocational supplied the teachers and county-wide, adult, 60-hour vocational training programs in advanced mathematics, electronics and Radio-Telephony. The county's fee for adult classes was one dollar and they were held at Naples Junior High School.

Again for undisclosed reasons, and although the Marco station had been involved in other projects, when the Bomarc program was completed the U.S. Air Force closed the Marco Missile Tracking Station in January 1964.

Vitro transferred equipment and employees to other stations and by December 1964 the Vitro Wives Club had disbanded. Regardless of the fact that the annual Vitro payroll was estimated to have infused half a million dollars annually into the local economy, Vitro men, women and school children were missed when they were transferred from Collier County.

In 1989 the remaining buildings were demolished and the 30-

acre Marco site, originally leased to the Air Force by the Barron Collier Companies, was prepared for development. The present day condominium community of Cape Marco was developed on the site of Gulf Test Range Tracking Station D-7, along our shores.

SAWFISH NEWS

Critical Habitat for Endangered Smalltooth Sawfish

Smalltooth sawfish (Pristis pectinata) in the United States faced population decline due to mortality in commercial and recreational fisheries and habitat loss from coastal development. In 2003, the U.S. population was listed as "Endangered" under the Endangered Species Act (ESA), leading to the designation of critical habitat for juvenile sawfish in 2009. But what does this mean and how does it benefit the species?

Critical habitat, as defined by the ESA, includes specific areas within the species' geographical range at the time of listing, with essential physical or biological features requiring special management or protection. This designation safeguards vital features to prevent extinction and promote recovery, reducing the need for ESA protections.

Research focused on juvenile sawfish habitats due to limited information about adult habitat use. Essential features were identified as red mangroves and



euryhaline habitats with varying salinity in estuaries, bays, and rivers. Ongoing research aims to identify critical habitats for larger juveniles and adults.

Two specific areas were designated for juvenile smalltooth sawfish: the northern Charlotte Harbor Estuary Unit and the southern Ten Thousand Islands/ Everglades Unit. Now, let's explore how the designation is applied, its impact on

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Are Vacations Becoming a Thing of the Past?

"Eighty-five percent off all our vacation packages."..."Cruise with us and see the world." ..."Come, fly with us."..."Book your vacations with us."..."Spend a night with us and you won't want to leave." You see and read it everywhere. But are people really doing it? Are vacations really what they used to be?

According to a recent news article, United Airlines has implemented a new boarding policy called WILMA (Window-Middle-Aisle) for

economy passengers. This policy allows the airline to seat passengers with window seats first, before passengers with middle and aisle seats. The policy rolled out October 26, 2023 and has been met with mixed reactions from passengers. Some expressed concerns about losing out on overhead luggage space.

Many U.S. air carriers have reduced seat widths to 17 inches from 18.5 inches, with seat pitch —a measure from one point in a seat to the same point in a seat in front or behind — dropping to 31 inches from an average of 35. On some carriers, that distance is now 28 inches. Maybe it's time to diet before you book your flight!

Auto Train is an 855-mile scheduled daily train service for passengers and their automobiles operated by Amtrak between Lorton, Virginia (near Washington, D.C.), and Sanford, Florida (near Orlando). Auto Train is the only motorail service in the United States. Passengers ride in coach seats, or private sleeping car rooms, while their vehicles are carried in enclosed automobile-carrying freight cars, called auto racks, along with them. The train can carry up to 320 vehicles. The train also includes lounge cars and dining cars. Auto Train allows its passengers to avoid driving Interstate 95 in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida while bringing their own vehicles with them.



coastal development, recreational activities, and species conservation.

The critical habitat designation places an obligation on Federal agencies to ensure their actions do not harm critical habitat, considering potential effects on designated features. It plays a pivotal role in proactive conservation efforts, involving federal agencies, State and local governments, and organizations.

The designation doesn't necessarily restrict homeowners from building docks, repairing seawalls, or impose new regulations but adds a review process to protect essential features. The 2009 critical habitat designation hasn't closed areas or limited recreational opportunities but has safeguarded crucial habitats, benefiting not only smalltooth sawfish but also other species.

Charles C. Ebbets, a versatile 1920s photojournalist, blended his diverse interests like outdoor pursuits, aviation stunts, racing, and



wrestling with photography, elevating his craft. His iconic "Lunch atop a Skyscraper" photo earned a spot in TIME magazine's "100 Greatest Images." Ebbets explored the Tamiami Trail early, capturing wildlife and landscapes, and developed a close bond with Seminole tribal leader Ingraham

Billie. On January 18th there will be a lecture by Ebbets' daughter, Tami Ebbets Hahn, who will share personal insights into her father and his work.



11/16 at 2 pm – Roadside Reservations: Seminole Tourist Camps Along the Tamiami Trail

For Native American Heritage Month, Museum Manager Thomas Lockyear will explore the evolution of Seminole and Miccosukee communities along the Tamiami Trail after its 1928 completion. This transition from tourist camps to residential compounds reshaped their culture and livelihoods. The presentation will also discuss the changing perception of Native American handicrafts from souvenirs to recognized art.

12/21 at 2 pm – Low Bush Lightning: Illegal Liquor in the Everglades Prohibition fueled the illicit liquor trade in the Everglades, but moonshining has deep roots in gladesman culture. For those in the 10,000 Islands, distilling spirits wasn't just about income; it was a way of life. Some even profited from smuggling Bahamian rum. Museum Manager Thomas Lockyear will cover the area's rum runners, moonshiners, and the Sheriff's office's efforts to combat lawlessness in Florida's last frontier and maintain a dry Collier County.

Whether you were born in the Everglades or just like to visit, we



- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
