I am still in Brazil at this time but have been keeping up with the other local Captains. Redfish and Snook continue to be caught throughout the Islands. This should continue all month. As the water temps drop we can expect backcountry

Fishing live shrimp will produce even more variety this time of year and that will increase with the cooler water as fall progresses.


Snook fishing in the backcountry with artificial soft plastics is a great way to cover shorelines and find that trophy!

Redfish in the backcountry generally gets better later in the year. These guys will stay in the Islands all month. Jigs tipped with shrimp fished at a slow pace will find them.

If you're not sure what's working stop in your local tackle store and ask. They will help and be happy to accommodate. Support your local businesses.

It's a Wonder the Town Didn't Sink

The weekend of December 5th and 6th of 1947 was a historic period for Southwest Florida. Hotels in Miami, Fort Myers and Naples were completely booked in advance of President Harry S. Truman's arrival for the dedication of the Everglades National Park on December 6, 1947.

The creation of the park had been anticipated across the United States since as early as 1930, as noted by Governor of Pennsylvania Gifford Pinchot, the first Chief of the United States Forest Service in 1905. He said "… It is a land of strangeness separate and apart from the common things we know so well. A new world to play in, and a good place to be in summer as well as winter. There are more fish around Cape Sable than I ever saw anywhere else in a lifetime of fishing."

On May 30, 1934, the Bill creating the Everglades National Park Project was approved by Congress and signed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who knew that his signature had preserved the future of the beautiful Everglades. Unfortunately, he died in 1945 before the park was dedicated.

In November 1947, Colonel Henry T. Myers began scouting Southwest Florida for a suitable landing field for the presidential plane, the Sacred Cow. It was a World War II four-engine transport C-54 built by the Douglas Aircraft Company, and the first United States presidential plane. Capable of flying at 350 mph, it was referred to as the Flying White House. After World War II it was given to President Truman's predecessor, the late U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt and was equipped with an elevator to transport him aboard. Colonel Myers selected the Naples Airfield as an appropriate landing field, since it was in excellent condition, and still under lease to the U.S. War Department.

The preservation of land within Collier County for the purpose of

creating national parks was а dream of Barron G. Collier. His sons Barron Collier, Jr. and Samuel Carnes Collier had the same aspiration, however it was his youngest son Cowles Miles



Collier who was the driving force behind their donation of 30,000 acres in the Ten Thousand Islands for the creation of the Everglades National Park and was in charge of site selection for the dedication ceremony.

The Friday, December 5, 1947 issue of *The Collier County News* was the Special Everglades National Park Edition. Printed in two colors, it was designated by Everglades National Park Commission as the official program for the dedication. It contained maps, pictures, and in-depth articles about the park.

The morning of December 6th, the Sacred Cow landed in East Naples, where a convertible Cadillac Coupe and a crowd of residents and City of Naples officials welcomed President Truman. Smiling and tanned from a sojourn in Key West, he was reported to have been in high spirits. He disembarked and, sitting beside Florida Governor Millard F. Caldwell, proceeded to the Town of Everglades, followed by Naples Mayor W. Roy Smith and Naples Police Chief Cale Jones.

Eighteen cars and a bus carried White House photographers, reporters, members of the Office of Strategic Services, and military officers from Mac Dill Air Base in Tampa, across the Tamiami Trail to Everglades, where they were welcomed by Seminole Chief William McKinley Osceola, members of the Seminole tribe, residents, and Collier County officials. Scouts Bert Arthur Williams, A. E. Canant, Jr., Henry Yonce, John Anson Smith, and Sonny Fugate of the Boy Scouts of Naples, directed by Scoutmaster Rev. A. Waldo Farabee, ushered the guests to their seats.

At the Everglades Airfield, from a wooden platform decorated with palm fronds, Deaconess Harriet Bedell gave the invocation, followed by President Truman, who gave a brief 15-minute speech dedicating the Everglades National



Park to the people of the world. After Chief Osceola presented President Truman with a Seminole jacket, he attended a barbeque at the Rod and Gun Club, and then returned to the Naples Airport, where he boarded the Sacred Cow and flew to Key West for a few days rest.

The Town of Everglades hosted close to 15,000 visitors for the dedication ceremony on Sunday December 6, 1947. Referring to the See **History** p6

fact that the Town of Everglades was built on the Barron River, Norman Herren, Assistant Manager of the Collier Development Corporation at the time and present on the platform with President Truman, recalled 50 years later during U.S. Vice-President Al Gore's rededication of Everglades National Park on December 6, 1997, "It's a wonder the town didn't sink."

"Did you see the President?" wrote Ed Watson in *The Collier County News* on December 12, 1947. "That's what everybody in Naples wanted to know after the dedication. Our party saw him all right, and here is what happened to our party during the day.

"Our party, raring to go, left Naples at 8:30 am Already Cale Jones (looking a little sleepy) and the highway patrolman were on the job at the airport road.

"As we drove on down the trail, it seemed that even the birds and small animals had been informed of the anticipated great event, as they were stationed along the canal banks as though someone had planted them there.

"Arriving at Everglades, we proceeded to the temporary press office (in the bus station) and were greeted by Stuart Rabb, editor of *The*

Collier County News, who was the host to all the newspapermen who covered the dedication.

"After receiving a press ribbon and sticker and instructions, we ambled up to the grandstand site, where the Ringling Circus fellows were still installing the seats and whose Frank Bozarth, of Everglades, was briskly engaged in trying to be everywhere at the same time. There we saw many old friends of Naples and Collier



County, many of whom were putting the finishing touches to the grandstand, speakers, platforms ..." A ladder was provided for the photographers, who motioned to each other to bring it to them when they found a high, unobstructed vantage point from which to snap pictures.

For those residents of Collier County who could not attend the dedication, *The Collier County News* temporarily removed its hat as the voice of Collier County, and became its eyes, watching and taking notes for articles in the next issue of the newspaper and for us, 76 years later. \sim


Marya Repko: Chronicling Everglades City's Tale



Update from City Hall

At our most recent meeting City Council approved the agreement between the City of Everglades City and the Florida Division of Emergency Management

for the \$13 million grant to build an Emergency Operations Center/Fire station (EOCFS) to replace Station 60. The EOCFS will be constructed above the floodplain to provide workspace for our First Responders to ride out a storm or if they are ordered to evacuate, have an operational workspace available upon their return. The intention is to bid this project out on a design/build basis so work can start as soon as possible. Once vacated Station 60 will be temporarily converted to a Community Center until a permanent replacement can be funded and built.


Council also began the process of selecting a general engineer to help our staff and Council with design and grant funding for community projects including working with FEMA on our local streets.

On Wednesday the 15th Mayor Grimm and I met with School Superintendent Leslie Riciardelli, Principal Cherie Allison, Darren Burkett, Carlos Artime and John Monda to discuss the long term plans and opportunities for Everglades City School.

There are 8 Charter amendments on the ballot which will help update and modernize City Charter and have all been work shopped for community input. The Council encourages yes votes on all the amendments Please familiarize yourself with each of them before casting your vote.

A Thanksgiving Tale

Once upon a time, there was a family of four who lived in a small town in the United States. The family consisted of a mother, a father, and two children: a boy, and a girl. They were all excited about Thanksgiving which was just around the corner. The mother had been planning the Thanksgiving dinner for weeks. She had bought a turkey, potatoes, cranberry sauce, and all the other trimmings she needed to make a delicious meal. The father had been busy decorating the house with fall leaves, pumpkins,

and other festive decorations. The children had been making Thanksgiving cards for their grandparents and other relatives.

On the day of Thanksgiving, the family woke up early to start cooking. The mother put the turkey in the oven, while the father peeled the potatoes. The children helped by setting the table and making sure everything was perfect. The house was filled with the delicious aroma of roasting turkey and the sound of laughter and chatter.

As the family sat down to eat, they held hands and said a prayer of thanks for all the blessings in their lives. Then they began to eat the delicious meal the mother had prepared. The turkey was juicy and tender. The potatoes were creamy and

buttery. The cranberry sauce was sweet and tangy. And the family ate until they were full. Then they sat back in their chairs, feeling content and happy.

After dinner they sat in front of the fireplace. The father read a story to the children. It was a story about the first Thanksgiving which has its origins in a 1621 feast shared by the Pilgrims who had arrived in Plymouth, Massachusetts the previous year. They held a three-day feast to celebrate their first successful harvest, attended by around 90 Wampanoag Native Americans and 53 Pilgrims. Then, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national Thanksgiving Day to be held each November to promote unity and healing in the country during the Civil War. And today, Thanksgiving is celebrated with family gatherings, parades, football games, and, of course, a big feast which includes turkey, stuffing, mashed potatoes, gravy, cranberry sauce, and pumpkin pie.

The children listened intently to their father's story; their eyes wide with wonder.

Ebbets in the Everglades: The Unusual Story of the World-Famous Photographer You Never Heard Of September 12 – January 20



Charles C. Ebbets, a versatile 1920s photojournalist, blended his diverse interests like outdoor pursuits, aviation stunts, racing, and wrestling with photography, elevating his craft. His iconic "Lunch atop a Skyscraper" photo earned a spot in TIME magazine's "100 Greatest Images." Ebbets

explored the Tamiami Trail early, capturing wildlife and landscapes, and developed a close bond with Seminole tribal leader Ingraham Billie. On January 18th there will be a lecture by Ebbets' daughter, Tami Ebbets Hahn, who will share personal insights into her father and his work.

We Are Still Here: The Past & Present of the Miccosukee Indians January 23 – May 11



Pauline Reeves Gallery will present both the past and present of the Miccosukee Tribe of Indians of Florida. Created in collaboration with the tribal council, the exhibit explores the Miccosukee's culture and heritage while celebrating their unique achievements in self-governance, education, environmental protection, and

more. During the Seafood Festival (February 3rd & 4th) there will be demonstrations of traditional crafts, cooking, and even alligator wrestling on and around the museum grounds.

Third Thursdays Talk

12/21 at 2 pm – Low Bush Lightning: Illegal Liquor in the Everglades Prohibition fueled the illicit liquor trade in the Everglades, but



quor trade in the Evergiades, but moonshining has deep roots in gladesman culture. For those in the 10,000 Islands, distilling spirits wasn't just about income; it was a way of life. Some even profited from smuggling Bahamian rum. Museum Manager Thomas Lockyear will cover the area's rum runners,

moonshiners, and the Sheriff's office's efforts to combat lawlessness in Florida's last frontier and maintain a dry Collier County.

Celebrating Swamp Heritage

Big Cypress National Preserve spans 700,000 acres of wetlands, harboring diverse life and a unique culture, the "Gladesmen." Laura Ogden's 2010 study revealed these descendants of South Florida settlers who mastered life in the Everglades, learning, collaborating, and forming lasting bonds with indigenous tribes, emphasizing cooperation and coexistence.



The Swamp Heritage Festival at the Big Cypress Visitor Center is a longstanding local tradition established to celebrate the collaborative cross-section of people and cultures for whom the swamp has become central to their lives. Sadly, the annual event went dormant for nearly a decade.

This year, Big Cypress staff and partners have joined forces to revive the Festival. On Saturday, December 2nd, this familyfriendly event returns at the Nathaniel Reed Visitor Center on Sea Grape Drive, near the Tamiami Trail.

The Gladesman Heritage Foundation will be onsite

sharing their unique history and culture with exhibits and displays. These will include a variety of vehicles used to traverse the region's watery terrain - ranging from a historic handmade skiff built by legendary gladesman Glen Simmons to vintage swamp buggies, airboats and more modern machines.

Octogenarian gladesman Franklin Adams, who recently co-authored a book ("Enjoyment of the Same") about the history and importance of public lands in South Florida, will be one of several guest speakers giving campfire chats on swamp-related topics. Other exhibitors from partner groups will offer interactive experiences, with plenty of

activities for kids including hands-on archery instruction by park rangers.

Whether your family already partakes of adventures in the watery wonderland known as the Big Cypress Swamp or just wants to learn more about the opportunities available to explore and enjoy it, don't miss this opportunity to celebrate with us at this year's Swamp Heritage Festival.
